August 12, 1944.

Dearest Robert, Mother's last letter to me was so typical that I thought you would get a bang out of it, just as I did. "A little baby billy goat has been strolling about our yard for three or four times. He is gentle. His mother is grazing about a block or so away. I took a paddle to him. He just skips away and starts eating on a bush, so I gave him another scare. He just trots down the driveway, then up the steps by the swing and down the front steps, on

down the walk out of my reach. There he starts nibbling again. Just so he doesn't destroy my few zinnias and ferns." (Can't you just see that?) "Aunt Eva wrote that Bud phoned Margie from San Diego and she may go out there if things

look favorable. Margie spent 10 days with Elizabeth and Stanton. They went to Corpus Christi twice and spent one day at Aransas Pass fishing. - - Daddy and I trimmed the hedge and I raked up the leaves, branches and carried them off. Then I swept the walk. Now with the yard in condition, I must concentrate on the bedrooms again." Mother is very good about writing to me and her letters bring home close to me.
