Potential Destinations

What goes into consideration when we choose a destination to bring the group(s) to? On the surface, it sounds simple, you find a destination of interest, pick a date, and put it on the calendar.

In reality there are lots of additional considerations beyond just simply throwing a dart at a map! Our first consideration is always the same one: Does the specific destination want a large group like us there? Are they inviting and open to having 40–50 Corvettes visiting their site? You'd be surprised at how many places are a hard thanks, but no thanks to us visiting them, or...they act like what we're asking is something they've never heard of before.

Then things like ensuring there is adequate group parking is always the next consideration. If we can't get the group in to safely park, then we either pass on the destination, or if its somewhere we really think members would enjoy visiting, we just limit the group size for that ride.

Road conditions to the venue are also at the top of our considerations. Nobody wants to take their Corvette across a beat up or pothole-covered road! (Yes, we'll never forget the miles of dirt road construction in Vermont a few years back.) This consideration alone is one of the reasons why we always conduct a

dry run, usually within a week of the actual trip date, to ensure the roads are in acceptable condition. If they are not, then we adjust our route to avoid the troubled areas.

Are there good food options for us to be able to bring a large group into? As we continue to grow and our caravans get larger, this is becoming a bigger issue each year. Try calling a restaurant and saying, "Yes, hi, we'd like a lunch reservation for 80 people!" This is one of the reasons we also now include so many picnics as part of our larger day's adventures. A necessity and, yes, members always seem to enjoy the picnics.

Admission costs. In this day and age, many museums and other places that in the past have offered free or low-cost admissions, have now been forced to raise prices. So, cost is something we always try to consider if the site is worthy of the added costs.

And lastly time: A big consideration! How far away is a destination? Is it within a realistic drive? We know that some of our events already push the boundaries of time, such as our Bennington and Kanc drives. So, finding locations that are within a manageable drive always a big consideration.

C6 Electrical Gremlins

If you own a C6 from between 2005 and 2013, and you haven't already experienced the wonderful electrical gremlins that GM unintentionally built into this series of cars, you will probably at some point!

iad of causes: Complex wiring harnesses exposed to harsh engine bay conditions, susceptible ground connections which can corrode easily, and a high level of issues with the battery connections! If you happen to own a C6 and you is completely safe to do this.) Then reattach the connections to the appropriate battery terminal and tighten down. (Positive battery cable to positive battery terminal and the same for the negative ones as well — just as you would when installing a new battery.) DO NOT HOOK UP THE TERMINALS TO THE WRONG BATTERY POSTS!

Start the car and your electrical issues should be gone. This procedure resets the car's ECU (Engine Control Module — or the brains of the car) back to the factory setting. It wipes out all the mystery issues that a low voltage reading can cause.



The sixth-generation cars are incredible by most all accounts! In fact, it was voted the most favorite of all generations in a Motor Trend reader's poll back in 2019. But they've also been plagued with annoying consistent electrical issues since 2005. Switches that stop working, dash warning lights out of nowhere, car not starting even after installing a new battery! Drivers being trapped in the cars and having to release the doors manually to get out due to electrical malfunctions. Or the worst, being locked out of the car completely!

Lots of money has been spent at dealerships trying to find out the root cause of the electrical issues.

Why do the C6s have these issues? Well, they stem from a myr-

experience any one of the gremlin electrical issues, here is a remedy I would suggest before you march off to a repair shop to diagnose and fix your problem.

Open your hood, grab, a
10mm wrench or socket and remove both the negative and positive battery terminals from the battery. Hold both connections away from the battery, and connect together for one minute, ensur-

ing each terminal's metal part is touching the other. Again, away from the battery! (It



Read Your Damn Owner's Manual!

Something every Corvette owner should do before ever getting into the car and driving it for the first time is to invest in the time to read the Corvette Owner's manual. This should be a mandatory requirement for every Corvette owner! Be it from your first or to your latest model!

It's especially important if you are buying a used one and have no idea how the car functions work and you didn't get an instruction session from a Chevrolet qualified Corvette specialist! If you ever have an issue, that's probably not going to be the best time to have to pull out the manual and dig through thousands of pages to find what you need! In many aspects the Corvettes are like all the car models GM produces and lots of areas in the owner's manual are generalized in the information contained. The manuals, however, also contain all the pertinent information on the uniqueness that Cor-



vette's design brings to bear. Who knows, you might even find out things you didn't know your car could do! Oh, so that's what that button does! And here is the best part: There are downloadable PDF versions of every Corvette owner's manual for each specific year (back to the 70s) that you can put right on your mobile device. Perhaps the next time you are bored and just scrolling on social media, you could invest that same time to learn all about your car and its installed options!

A Breath of Fresh Air


As Spring arrives, something every Corvette owner should do is take a few minutes to check the condition of the cabin air filter. Since the introduction of the C4 generation in 1984, GM has built in a filtration filter for the air coming into the cabin. (73 and up C3s used a charcoal filter on the cowl under the hood.) These filters serve a dual purpose, to both filter the air we breathe inside the car and ensure the A/C system gets a clean constant supply of air. These filters are considered a maintenance item and need to be changed out on a regular basis. If you ever turn on the fan blower in-



side the car, and the air smells anything out of the ordinary, the first place you need to check is the cabin air filter. Depending on your generation, they are typically high on the passenger side on the firewall under the hood. It literally takes 30 seconds to remove it, check it, and replace it. Most filters are around 25 bucks. Another

benefit of checking the cabin filter is it's a surefire way to tell if you've had any small critters making a home inside your car. Pieces of acorns or missing chunks of the filter will be a dead giveaway that your Corvette has been their Winter resort and cold weather home.





This article is a repost from last Spring and is one we feel is important to remind everyone about again this time of year, especially as many of us begin to pull our cars out of winter storage and fire up our cars for the first time in a while. There is a procedure GM has built into every generation since the C4 called Flood Clear. The original intent was to perform just what is states: It is a procedure to remove any excess fuel in the motor intake. This is especially important in the early crossfire engines where fuel delivery was a known issue. So, Flood Clear was a way to prepare the engines to be able to deliver exactly the correct amount of fuel needed to begin startup. It did exactly as it sounds. But GM quickly realized it was also a great way to get oil lubrication to all parts of the motor before the violent start up procedure happens.

Experts say that 40% of all engine wear is done during the first 10 seconds of starting an engine. Metal scraping against metal without lubrication is never a good scenario, but this is exactly what happens when you start an engine that has been sitting for a while. Due to gravity, all the engine oil is sitting in the bottom of the oil pan and isn't where it is needed, doing its job throughout the engine lubricating all the moving parts! Flood Clear immediately starts the oil pump as soon as the starter button is engaged and begins to move the oil throughout the engine. It takes approximately 5–7 seconds for the oil to get to all the areas it is needed and to begin to do its job. Once this procedure is done, oil is in the motor and the car can be started as normal, minimizing wear and tear on the motor. This begs the question, then why wouldn't anyone want to do this every time before the engine is started. Well, you certainly can but understand that if you are driving your car daily, there is oil residue remaining in the motor because it takes a long time for it to all drain back to the oil pan.

This is one of those scenarios that is 100% positive without any negative effects! So, give it a try when you first fire up your car from its winter storage!

Here's how to do it.

- 1. Push and hold the gas pedal to the floor.
- 2. Push and hold your left foot on either the brake pedal in an auto or the clutch on a stick.
- 3. Turn the key to the on position, keeping your gas pedal to the floor for 10–15 seconds and push the start button. The car will turn over (but will not start) and begin to move the oil throughout the engine before starting.
- 4. Stop pushing the start button or turning the key, remove your foot from the gas pedal. Then cycle through just like you would normally start the car! That's it!

Another item that should get some attention when you first bring your car out of hibernation is to inspect your cabin air filter, as this is a sure-fire way to know if you've had critters making a home inside your car over the winter.
