




#### **Full Throttle Corvettes**








#### SONHC Merchandise Store is Getting a Facelift!

#### **Corvette Accidents!**

A recent local Corvette accident brings to mind something we probably don't often think about having happen to any of us. But it does happen and sometimes it happens with dire consequences! There are on average 18,000 car accidents each day in the US, with on average 115 fatalities! The average US driver will experience and be involved in just over 3 motor vehicle accidents during their! These statistics, when divided into all the drivers and miles driven is a miniscule number — until it happens to you!

Back in the 90s the Los Angeles Times did a report on Corvette accidents (based on the then-current C4 Gen) and the resulting fatalities and the stats were alarming: 5.2 deaths for every 10,000 Corvettes involved in accidents! The second highest rate, at the time, of any car model!

And while safety measures have certainly vastly improved in every car's overall performance, including the later generations of Corvettes, it's still a concerning scenario! As I have mentioned several times before, GM doesn't build these cars any different than any other car they make! They are tested and crashed to ensure they are built to withstand the *National Highway Safety Institute* crash-mandated safety standards! They are also tested on the streets for literally thousands of miles to make sure they are able to safely withstand everyday driving conditions.

But when you have a car as powerful, low to the ground, and built for speed as the Corvette is, coupled with **little to no performance driving experience** by the average Corvette owner, it can be a recipe for disaster. The saying "Speed Kills" is usually a big part of many of the stories. Time and time again, when an accident happens involving a Corvette, it usually turns out that speed was one of the underlying factors!

This is why we will never tolerate or be involved with any on-road racing or high-speed driving when we're in these cars, either alone or when we're traveling as a group. Way too many things can happen that in the blink of an eye can change or erase lives!



#### Laps for Charity Events

One of the 2023 season highlights was our members' participation with the **Speedway Children's Charities** events that took place at NHMS in Loudon. Last year we visited NHMS on three separate SCC event dates, allowing members to take their cars onto the track to enjoy some spirited laps plus enjoy a fun evening together at the track!

In 2024, we're looking forward to once again supporting this great cause and have a little fun at the same time! Four SCC events are on the NHMS schedule May through August and we plan on being there for each one. In fact, at the August 9th event, not only will members get to enjoy some track time, but we'll be adding an afternoon SONHC members' Corvette car show on the grounds of NHMS in Loudon prior to the on-track event that evening!

### Rules of the Road

As our cruise and caravan season is upon us, it's a great time for all of us to be reminded of our caravan rules that are in place at all our events. We take these rules very seriously, as the consequences of not adhering to them can be dire for our members and the public we share the roads with! It is everyone's responsibility to read them, know them, and adhere to them at all times!

#### **Rules & Safety Guidelines**

- 1. If this is your first caravan, be cautious and stay alert! Be aware of the car in front of you at all times.
- 2. **DO NOT GET SPREAD OUT** but leave enough distance between your car and the one you're following! Remember, **it's always a procession and never a race!** Also try to know if the car in front of you is an automatic or a standard, as those of us with standards don't always use the brakes alone to slow the car!
- 3. Always be aware of your surroundings and the public we share the roads with!

  Never assume you'll be given the right-of-way and always respect the traveling public when in caravan! They don't always understand what we're doing and letting your guard down for just a second can have dire consequences for everyone!
- 4. **USE YOUR TURN SIGNAL AT ALL TIMES!**Every car, every turn! Cars as close as three back from the ride leader will not be able to see the leader's turn signals and it's imperative that you help the riders behind you by giving them a heads up! **Use your turn signals!**
- 5. Be considerate of all your fellow Corvettes. No burn outs, engine revving or any behavior other than behaving like choir boys and girls on our first day of drivers ed!
- 6. There is never any passing within the Caravan, and we'll try to always stay close to the speed limits! We'll be traveling many

- main two-lane roads and back roads and should encounter just a few city streets. However, if we get separated by stop lights, the group leader will pull over at the first safe place large enough for the waiting cars to stop and remain waiting till everyone gets through the lights. **DO NOT RUN traffic lights!**
- 7. At our designated stops, remember to pull all the way into any parking area as quickly and safely as possible to get the stopped cars behind you off the highway. Due to the size of our group, every stop will take time to get everyone off the roadway! Always try to back into your parking space as it makes it easier when we leave.
- 8. If at any time you encounter a problem, pull over and the caboose car will stop to check on you. The caravan will continue and you can catch up at the next scheduled stop.
- We will use Channel 5 for anyone bringing their own radios. If you get separated, don't despair as the group will pull over and wait for you as soon as there is a safe location to do so.
- 10. When you pull over to the side of the road, stop with your wheels turned out toward the road so when you see it's all clear to proceed, you can pull back into formation quickly. Look for the car behind you to enter back into traffic and proceed in front of them. The caravan goes back into traffic from the back to the front. If we stop, do your part, pull off the side of the road, and watch behind you for the cars to pull back into traffic.
- 11. DO NOT EVER TAKE OFF IN FRONT OF THE GROUP'S LEAD CAR unless you are leaving the caravan and heading straight home!

# The "Mother Road" Route 66

It was 2016. We planned for months, gathering brochures, maps, YouTube videos, you name it, we researched it. Tim and I were going on the road trip of a lifetime: The "Mother Road," aka "Route 66"!

#### A Bit of History



Route 66 was the East-West twolane road leading the way to California, where many people packed up and headed for a better life after the

"dust bowl" in the heartland. Route 66 was officially decommissioned as a highway in 1985. The last remaining portion was in Williams, AZ, in 1984. It's estimated that approximately 85% of the road is passable. The other 15% was demolished or replaced with homes, etc. You do need old-fashioned maps for this journey!

Our two-week adventure began in Chicago, II at the starting point,

and ended on the pier in Santa Monica, CA.

We decided we were not going to be dining at any "chain" type restaurants along the way, only at the Mom and Pop, locally-operated food joints. No McDonald's or BK. Best decision we made; the variety of food was great, different specialties in every state, Missouri and Texas BBQ, Mexican, Indian fry bread (yum), all the way to the traditional greasy spoon diners that offered up daily specials. You know the type, a display case full of homemade pies and treats for dessert, and where the waitress always keeps your coffee cup full.

Our plan was to drive 250–300 miles per day, leaving early in the morning and giving enough time to stop at the tourist traps along the way.

Our journey brought us through Illinois, where we saw one of the original Standard Oil service stations, the cemetery where President Lincoln and family are



resting, car museum, and a spaceman statue right there on the side of the road. We saw the World's Largest Red Rocking chair

and Chain of Rocks Bridge, now a foot bridge. The movie *Escape* from NY was filmed at this bridge site. And a giant ketchup bottle.



Who would think...?

Missouri included a stop at the Arch in St Louis. Note, if you go, get tickets ahead of



time as they are often hard to come by the day of your visit. To get to the top of the Arch, you climb into little pods that ratchets you along, click by click, until you get to the top. They are definitely not for claustrophobic folks. What a view from the top!



We came across a T-Rex hanging out on the side of the road at a strip mall in Uranus, MO. This was a little tourist trap, selling fudge and Route 66 items. Cuba, MO is popular for the many street murals decorating their brick buildings.





The Route brought us into Kansas for only 15 miles or so. Oh my gosh... there he was: "Mater" from the Cars movie, and his friends at an old service station on a deserted street. The garage was across the street from an old dark gray Victorian type building that is now a museum, but rumor has it the establishment was where the ladies (working girls) entertained the gentlemen, if you know what I mean. The "museum" was closed when we were there so we couldn't get all the details. The street was lined with old brick buildings, one building was abandoned and you could still make out the faded paint on the outside wall advertising the Snowdrift Flour Company. Wheat farms were the big industry in the area we traveled through. Most are now gone.

An Oklahoma sight: A giant blue whale perched in a small



pond. This was a great attraction back in the day. Families would pack a picnic and bring the kids for a day at the "whale." It sits near a pond used for swimming, etc. We came across a farm museum that housed just about every make of tractor, farming tools, and a replica of a street from days gone by. We spent about 3 hours wandering through the museum. We met a

group of folks who shipped their motorcycled from Germany to the US, just so they could drive Route 66. We saw them here and there along the route.

Oh, did I mention tornado warnings! The radio started howling with alert warnings in the early afternoon when the atmosphere started heating up. Luckily, we didn't actually get caught in one.

Texas, Cadillac Ranch, Big Texan Steak House (home of the famous 72 oz. steak eating contest), BBQ, and a barbed wire museum. Yes, your heard it right, a barbed wire museum. We just had to stop. There is no entry fee, only a donation. It's full of farm items, sculptures made from barbed wire, old



highway signs, tools, artifacts, and pictures. It was operated that day by two volunteer ladies from the historical society.

In New Mexico, we ended up on a dirt road part of 66. No cars for miles. Many small villages with only have a few residents. Defunct roadside motels and gas stations, nothing left but the shell of the buildings. We detoured to the Bandelier National Monument, a historical site where native Indians lived.

Arizona offered the Petrified Forest and a detour to the Grand Canyon. 66 is a twisting and winding road leading to Oatman, AZ. Oatman once was a flourishing mining town. The main road is about ½ mile long. The street is lined with a dusty, worn wooden boardwalk, swinging doors into gift shops, and a restaurant that has thousands of dollar bills stapled to their walls. The biggest attraction in Oatman is the roaming



donkeys. They are descendants from the original mining donkeys and burros. They are free to roam here and there, usually looking for a handout. The donkeys are managed by the Bureau of Land Management who monitors the herd health. The store keeps, are armed with water squirt guns and spray bottles that they use to deter the donkeys from entering their stores.

Detour to Nevada, spent a couple of days in Las Vegas. What happens in Vegas, stays in Vegas. Moving on...

California, through the desert, dinosaur tracks, teepees, wine bottles made into trees, broken down bulldozer's half buried by drifting sand, and then back to the highways and traffic.

The route ends on the pier in Santa Monica. As you would expect, there are always a group of people waiting for their turn by the "end" sign. We too were in line, but we had just completed the best road trip in America!

There are so many sights, oddities and curiosities that were along the way, too many to mention in this brief outline. Albeit, sad when you think about it. Once thriving, flourishing towns offering lodging and meals for weary travelers are now ghost towns and time forgotten, run-down buildings as Route 66 was bypassed by Hwy 40. Nobody needs or wants to get off the super-highway, everyone is in a hurry.

What a trip that was!!!
