Winter Storage



It's that time again to start having the convercar storage. There are varying thoughts on some parts of storing our cars during the winter months. For instance, some say

of fuel, while others say store them with half a tank of gas, but most everyone agrees there are five key areas that most everyone focuses on: TIRES, FUEL, BATTERIES, PAINT protection, and RODENT repellent. Over the next two months, we'll delve into each of these five subjects and express what the most popular opinions are in caring for our cars during the winter hibernation.

Tires: A very important, and sometimes overlooked subject, is the care of the tires!

Michelin, whom many consider to be the leader in tire technology, states: "If your tires have been subjected to long storage times while loaded and overinflated, and with fairly high or low temperatures, the tires could develop a "semi-permanent" flat spotting. This flat spotting will eventually go away, but it may take a good bit of driving. Tires should not be stored loaded (when the car is parked) or over-inflated while subjected to extreme heat and cold.

Tire Storage Tips: Do not overinflate the tires, keep them at the manufacturers' recommended pressures!

sations about winter to keep the cars full

If you are storing the car for an extended period of time, it is best that the car be moved occasionally, by even just a few inches to change the position of the tires which come in contact with the surface below. If possible, put some sort of barrier between the tires and the concrete surface, such as foam insulation pads, to soften the firmness between the tire and the surface below. If you are removing your tires and storing them separately (not recommended), lay the tires down on a flat, padded surface. If the car is being kept on jack stands, the suspension should be kept in a neutral position, (the same height as if the tires were on the car) and not left unloaded or compressed. Additionally, there are products available as shown in the picture that you can buy and drive onto that will keep your tires in their natural contoured shape."

Fuel Storage: This one is open to debate among many: which is the best method to store your Corvette during the winter hibernation months? Some say to fill the tank to the brim, add a fuel storage stabilizer, and you are all set until spring time. Others say to store with a 1/4 tank gas with stabilizer added. Yet others say 1/2 full with stabilizer. However, there are a few things that most everyone agrees on!



- 1. Always add some sort of fuel stabilizer regardless of how much gas you decide to keep in the tank.
- 2. Add premium high-octane fuel when you store the car for an extended period of time. Most everyone already runs premium high-octane fuel year-round.
 - 3. Today's fuel tanks and systems are a sealed and closed system and are not prone to any condensation build up in the fuel tanks. (Most modern cars have a closed system.) Here's the one that the majority of the experts think makes the most sense: Fill your tank between 1/4 and 1/2 full with a good stabilizer. Then in the spring fill your tank with fresh high-octane fuel and it will mix with the stored fuel giving you a healthy mix of fuel going through your system.

The Camouflage War

One of the things that car manufacturers have always struggled with is how to keep secret a new model car prior to introduction. We've all seen the pictures of heavily camouflaged vehicles, both running around on private test tracks and out on the public roads.

Did you know...

There is a science behind the camo that now adorns these cars. It's called "Dazzle camouflage" and the purpose isn't completely to hide what the vehicle looks like. Instead it's designed to confuse the camera's lens when photographed by blurring angles and the sharp edges that the car has. Manufacturers spend millions on coming up with the latest "Dazzle camo" technology to keep adoring eyes (both the public's and, more importantly, rival manufacturers) from seeing all the specific details their new model will have.

By using the latest Dazzle Camo, all the juicy details of the new model get somewhat distorted and leaves a certain level of uncertainty in the car's details. Sometimes, like with the release of the C8 generation, this process gets taken to a whole new level. First, the car was seen covered by a material better known as "Heavy Panel Camo," which is basically black solid panels that cover the car in all the areas GM didn't want spying eyes to see. Sometimes these versions were actually driven out on the streets across America. When they were, they were guarded 24–7 by security details not allowing anyone to get near the cars.

As the real-world testing progressed, the Heavy Camo was then replaced with the latest Dazzle Camo. A Corvette profile isn't something that any type of camo would ever hide, so when word of the new design got out, it was such an engineering departure from the past that the interest was unlike anything seen before. Rumor was that Ford offered a bounty of a million dollars for the first and best pictures of the newly-designed C8. In fact, when the C8 was first being readied for testing, GM worked on the camouflage so intensely the first testing was delayed by weeks to get the camo just right to hide as much detail as possible. With each release of a new C8 variant, the arms race continues to escalate, with more elaborate camo adorning the cars and higher resolution camera's chasing all the juicy details.







GM Heritage Center

There is a division of GM that does nothing but archive the build history of every vehicle they produce... including, yes, every Corvette! They have copies of build sheets, dealer invoices, plant notes, and vehicle spec sheets. You can download copies of your owner's manual or order a printed copy, or learn if there are any active recalls and or service bulletins. It's an interactive site and has lots of hidden features that can provide insight into any issue you may be having with your car, along with maintenance tips and sales brochures for your year car. 2024 New Corvette Pricing

From \$68,300

GM recently released updated pricing for the 2024 C8s. And, as is with everything these days, there is a price increase coming! The new starting price for a C8 1LT coupe is now \$68,300 — a \$2,000 increase above the 2023 pricing. Hardly anyone is debating that, even at the new price, it's still an incredible value for such a world-class automobile. It is, however, disappointing that it's inching towards the \$70,000 price plateau.

One of the hallmarks of the Corvette's long history is it has always been an affordable (a relative term) option for someone wanting to own America's only true sports car. No, they've never been priced to compete with our everyday cars, nor should they be. But they've always carried a low enough starting price that if someone wanted to stretch the budget, they were within the grasp of many people.

GM should absolutely be applauded for keeping the starting base price low on the Corvette over the past four generations! The pricing increase percentage between the introduction year of a generation to the last year has actually been decreasing percentage-wise all the way up thru the C7 generation and even continuing on with the 2020 C8 introduction!

This is a remarkable tribute to GM's cost management and as we look ahead, is the Corvette market changing? Are the days of having a somewhat affordable base model within the grasp of Americans shrinking? Probably so, but not because of GM's greed, but more so because of other outside influencing factors, like increasing material costs, the struggling economy, and the rate of inflation, along with other things, such as the ongoing UAW strike. The strike will eventually be settled, and when the dust clears, the agreed-upon wage and benefit increases will result in higher production costs and that will be passed on to the end consumer walking into the showroom.

Factor in the price for both the 2024 Z06 and the E-ray, both starting way north of the six-figure mark,

and the soon-tobe introduced ZR1 price touching just over \$200,000, our beloved Corvette
