

Not only did Psalm 56 grabbed my attention, but knowing a bit about the possible context, the superscript, (prior to the actual Psalm if you have a Study Bible) made this poem come alive speaking louder and even more powerful than ever before. The superscript notes that David was just captured by his enemies, the Philistines, in the town of Gath. Therefore, he writes the Psalm in response, "Whenever I'm afraid, I put my trust in you-in God, whose word I praise. I trust in God; I won't be afraid. What can mere flesh do to me? (vv.3-4)" It's important to acknowledge David did not write that he was never afraid. In fact, by using the word "whenever" proves he certainly has had times of being afraid. For the record, let's not forget this is the same David whom we know would become Israel's most known King, after Saul's death. Even the mighty, beloved, future King David confesses he was afraid, and he unquestionably had plenty of reasons due to the Philistines.

As important it is to make room and acknowledge there are times in life that cause us to have concern (most of us are human, right?), it's much more important and a better usage of our time to focus our attention on David's next move. That is, he shouts with a megaphone that he will still place his trust in our Almighty God. Remember this was written to music, therefore when he pencils in "I put my trust in you-in God, whose word I praise. I trust in God; I won't be afraid," David cannot help from singing with joy. He is singing this in his own mind. David repeats these words until they move from his mind to his lips to his heart and eventually every tiny cell throughout his body. Therefore, David says it again and again and multiple other times throughout his life: "Whenever I'm afraid, I put my trust in you-in God, whose word I praise. I trust in God; I won't be afraid. What can mere flesh do to me?" To set the record straight so there is no confusion, David certainly knew what the Philistines undoubtedly were capable of doing to him. In short, they would kill him limb by limb. So David had plenty of reasons to be afraid, he very well knew death was a high possibility, but he was still going to trust in God. In fact, trust God enough that even if he should perish by that he would be okay or to quote Julian of Norwich (1342-1416) "All shall be well, and all shall be well and all manner of things shall be well."

Shoah, the Hebrew word, in what we refer to as the Holocaust was nothing less than the appalling and horrendous genocide of European Jews during World War II. Six million Jews, two-thirds of Europe's Jewish population, were systematically deported to extermination camps to die from poisonous gas, others starvation, exhaustion, abuse, and other souls even being used as test subjects in inhumane experiments. While this raises many theodicy questions (why bad things happen), I cannot



imagine the faith and courage both victims and the survivors embodied. And, thank God for those who pushed back against Hitler such as the famous theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer. In his 1937, modern classic book, The Cost of Discipleship, and other writings he contrasted cheap grace with costly grace. In Bonhoeffer's words "Cheap grace is the grace we bestow on ourselves. Cheap grace is the preaching of forgiveness without requiring repentance...Cheap grace is grace without discipleship, grace without the cross, grace without Jesus Christ." Bonhoeffer would eventually be accused of the July 20 plot to assassinate Hitler, and eventually held in jail and subsequently hung.



I pray we can all have the bold faith like King David, the millions of Jews murdered, and German Pastor Dietrich Bonhoeffer. Whether facing tough times and trials oneself or standing up for others-let us have the courage to know at the end we have no reason to be afraid.
