

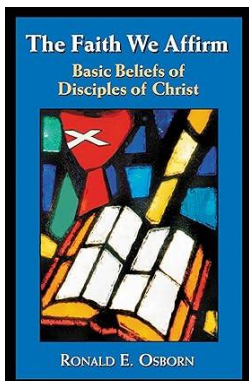

I am definitely aging when a close friend of mine, Matt, from seminary has a son who graduated from college two years ago. When we met, Caleb, Matt's son, was in elementary school but he always talked about leaving home. He didn't exactly know where, but Caleb wanted to go out of state and far away to college one day. For the most part this has played out. He went away to college, had a job overseas, spent a year in Europe, and now he lives in New York City as he has been in a handful of musicals. While Matt and his wife are happy for Caleb being independent and living out his dream, Matt did share with me over a Christmas conversation that it brought him some *parental satisfaction* to receive a phone that basically went like the following: "Hey dad, I have something to ask you. Will you buy me a plane ticket to come back for two weeks at Christmas? I miss home." I can only imagine my friend just smiling...and answering YES!

Getting out and living life is great, but sometimes there is a power in coming home. I think we have all experienced this at some point. During the holidays you might remember sleeping on a sleeper sofa or basement mattress, and after sometime you want to get home. Or, even if you are at a beautiful hotel there is often a breaking point when you want to go home. Or, to tease my own parents, the story line in most Hallmark movies appears to have a sense of home, someone wants to come home, possibly doesn't choose it but they come home. Then, when at home they fall in love, they discover something new about themselves, heal a relationship, and the list continues. Once again, there is a power in coming home. I read a quote recently that said "Home is a place you grow up wanting to leave and grow old wanting to get back to." The Egyptian novelist, Naguib Mahfouz, said "Home is not where you are born; home is where all your attempts to escape cease." Maya Angelou put it this way "The ache for home lives in all of us..." The previous quotes speak volumes because they point to this idea that home is not literally a physical address, not really a hometown, but in the spiritual sense home is a place where you do not have to pretend. Home is where you know you can come and just be welcomed just as you are and you can find rest. It's a place to remember who you are and what is important to you. Spiritually speaking, life takes us all over the place throughout the year. However, sometimes it is important to touch base, come back, and return to our foundation.

I think there is a reason this time of the year that *home* has this sense of draw, because Christmas is the story about home. John, the fourth Gospel writer, shares his understanding of the Christmas story this way: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God and the Word was God. The Word became flesh and made His home among us." There is that word *home* again. I love this metaphor for Jesus being home. Just stop and read that again. Jesus is home but there is a wrinkle to it, right? Most of us think of home as somewhere we have to go, to travel to, but the story kind of flips it. John tells us that home is not so much a place but a person or perhaps even better said a loving relationship. And often we think of

God far away and we have to search for God or pray a certain way to find God, but the story tells us that Jesus comes to us. Jesus comes right where you are. And Jesus invites us to come back.



Speaking of going back home, I'm excited about an upcoming Bible Study at our church on the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ). I cannot tell you how many times people moved to SWFL to worship here and they say "It's good to be back home in a Disciples' church" or "Fort Myers Christian Church 'just feels like home.'" So let's go back home! If you are visiting the church, a relatively new member, or just want to know more about the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) regarding beliefs and practice this

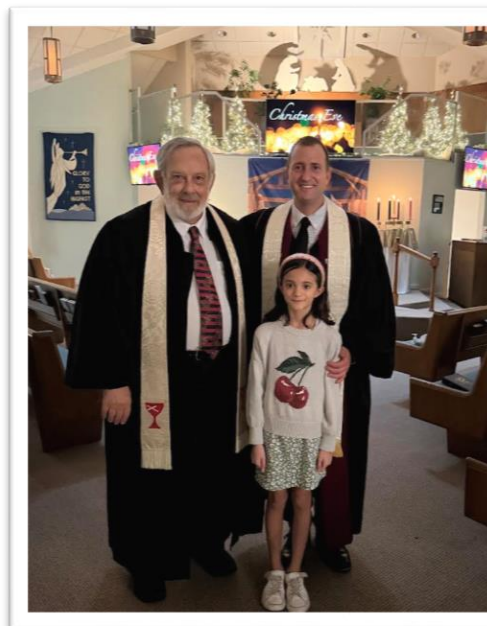
