While some may have never participated in such a ceremony, I believe this will be a powerful way we can each remember our commitment to God and Christ's church, God's unconditional love and grace for each of us, and ultimately our identity in Christ. I look forward to meeting you by the waters of cleansing, mercy, and grace!


