


OUR HISTORY

MAIC was created 45 years ago to serve as the catalyst for meeting our community's unmet needs. We were instrumental in founding Loaves & Fishes Soup Kitchen, Feeding the Gulf Coast (Food Bank), and Housing First, Inc. (The Homeless Coalition). In 2002 we established a ministry in the Mobile Metro Jail, now known as the Metro Chaplaincy Program. Again in 2016, we were called upon to create The Neighbor Center, a communitybased reentry program. In 2020, we opened the Academy for Job Opportunities. Due to the end of funding for the Academy, the Neighbor Center absorbed the workforce development activities.

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PROGRAMS

MAIC has been serving Mobile County Metro Jail since 2002. In 2007, a major renovation provided a much-needed chapel space and an office complex for educational use. Another major milestone was set in 2009 with the launch of a GED program which partners MAIC with Goodwill Easter Seals of the Gulf Coast. Services offered at the jail include meeting the spiritual needs of the inmates as well as pastoral counseling, assistance with hygiene supplies and classes including The Fatherhood Initiative, Healthy Relationships, Celebrate Recovery, Anger Management, GED, and the newest program, Job Readiness and Employment. Sheriff Sam Cochran said, "I am so very proud of this program."

By far, our most successful program in the Chaplaincy Office is the GED program. We have had 233 graduates, as of 2024, since the program was expanded. "The outcomes we are seeing in the Mobile Metro Jail GED program are far reaching, from the inmates to the families, to the communities...like a ripple effect" said Elizabeth Dominic, director of education services at Goodwill Easter Seals of the Gulf Coast. The Neighbor Center offers case management and advocacy for helping returning citizens access the resources and services needed to transition back to the community and avoid re-incarceration.
