

Resident Claims Local Door Company Ripped Her Off

A Century Village East resident is accusing a local door company of taking her money and never doing any work.

Frieda Schwartz tells the CVE *Reporter* she contacted the Ability Jalousie Doors Corporation in June to replace her front door. (Ability Doors has been a previous advertiser in the *CVE Reporter*.) The company, she says, sent a representative to her unit and gave her an estimate of \$900 to replace the door. After giving Ability Doors a \$450 deposit in June, Schwartz says the company never replaced the door and still has not returned her money. Bank records show her check was cashed the next day.

Since June, Schwartz says she has placed numerous

calls to Ability Doors. At one point, she says she was told the company would personally hand-deliver a check to her. She was told to expect a visit from someone named Sean. Schwartz says she never received anything. The *CVE Reporter* called Ability Doors to speak with Sean and was told Sean had been fired by the company. When asked why the company had

not returned the deposit, a spokesperson who said she was familiar with Schwartz's

A December closing date is expected to mark a major milestone in Century Village East. The anticipated closing will finalize the Village's purchase of the CVE Clubhouse and all other recreation properties from the private family that has owned them since the Village opened in the 1970's.

Since the gates first opened to CVE forty years ago, ownership of the recreation properties, has remained with the private family that built the Village.

For four decades residents have paid a significant amount of money to lease

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Deerfield Data Breach Worse Than First Reported

Adata breach to the City of Deerfield Beach website is worse than first reported, according to city officials.

Last month, the city announced its online credit card billing system had been hacked, possibly exposing the personal information of anyone who used the city site to pay for water bills, building permits, or business tax receipts. At first, it was believed the breach only covered a six-day period from September 6 through September 12. Now the city says anyone who may have paid online as far back as July 24 could have had their personal information stolen.

The city says the company they use to process credit card payments has advised that they have contacted the major credit card companies and informed them of the incident, according to a city statement.

Credit card theft is one of the most common types of identity theft. According to the credit company Experian, the number of credit card numbers exposed in 2017 totaled 14.2 million, up 88 percent over 2016. In addition, nearly 158 million Social Security Numbers were exposed in 2017, an increase of more than eight times the number in 2016.

The data breach does not affect any systems used inside the Village by Master Management, Recreation, or any other organizations that collect fees.

City officials suggest anyone who has made an online payment to the City for utility bills, building permits, or business tax receipts between July 24 and September 12 should review their statement and immediately notify their credit card company of any unauthorized purchases.

case claimed they sent the deposit in the mail.

Ability Doors advertises they are licensed and insured. However, when asked specifically if they are licensed to replace Schwartz's door, the spokesperson told the *CVE Reporter*, "We are not licensed to install brand new doors." Instead, she said, "The company hires others to do the work." When the *CVE* *Reporter* asked to speak to that sub-contractor, the spokeswoman could only say his name was Junior. She could not provide a full name or contact information.

The *CVE Reporter* also asked what licenses the company does have. The paper was told it would need to speak to someone else, and that the company would call back. The company did not call back.


Public records show several locations for Ability Doors

or its representatives, including Pembroke Pines and Pompano Beach. The City of Pembroke Pines says it has no record of any licenses issued to a company named Ability Doors. Records obtained from the City of Pompano Beach show Ability Windows Corp only has a license for screen repair. The Better Business Bureau has a listing for the company that includes a website. However, the link takes you to a different company website altogether.

The company on the website is named America's Best Windows and Doors. However, both Ability Doors and America's Best Windows and Doors list the same Pompano Beach mailing address.

The National Council on Aging names home repair and contractor fraud as some of the top senior scams. Among the tips provided by the Council are be an informed consumer. It is advice echoed by Deerfield Beach City Commissioner and Century Village East resident Bernie Parness who also says residents must do their homework before handing over their money. "Check references, make phone calls, and ask to see their licenses," says Parness.

The Council also suggests consumers take the time to call and shop around before making a purchase.

If you have to ride at night, wear something that Many bicycle-related crashes resulting in injury or death are associated with the bicyclist's behavior, including such things as not wearing a bicycle helmet, riding into a street without stopping, turning left or swerving into traffic that is coming from behind, running a stop sign, and riding the wrong way in traffic. Village Security Company Promises Improvements

Calling the results of a recent Century Village East security audit eye opening, the leadership of the Village's security company has promised to make several changes to services.

Robb Chambers, Regional Vice President of Allied Universal told the Master Management Board of Directors his company is addressing what he called some hiccups in services by his personnel. Master Management contracts with Allied Universal to provide security inside Century Village East. Among the changes, according to Chambers, are increasing the number of field supervisors and implementing new monthly training for Security personnel. He described many of the needed changes as things that could be easily done. Chambers later said his company is committed to taking whatever actions are needed to improve services, saying Allied Universal is not afraid to do what is required.

Allied Universal is one of the nation's largest security companies, with selfdeclared revenues of over 7 billion dollars.

of generating its own projectrelated problems for the community only to appear to want credit for later solving them.

"They create issues, solve them, and pat themselves on the back," said Deerfield Beach Mayor Bill Ganz, serving in his role as member of the Broward Metropolitan Planning Organization. Ganz also implied FDOT was guilty of committing a type of bait and switch with the community. He pointed to differences in pictures of what FDOT originally showed the public versus the latest renderings. Ganz pointed to the lack of green space and lack of submerged roadways on the latest designs when compared to the original renderings.

Last month the Florida Department of Transportation cancelled its latest (and possibly last) public hearing on the project. A spokesman for FDOT told the *CVE Reporter* the cancellation was due to public concerns over the project, claiming the most recent issues raised were ones that had not previously been brought to their attention.

"I think they're stretching the truth," Deerfield Beach Commissioner and CVE resident Bernie Parness told the *CVE Reporter*. "This may have been the fifteenth time they've heard our concerns," said Parness. He believes the real reason they cancelled the meeting was the threat of busloads of CVE residents attending the meeting in protest.

Meanwhile, some are calling FDOT's latest design a concrete jungle requiring engineers to go back to the drawing board.

The Mayor's Message

Century Village friends and neighbors, I hope you are well and taking some time to enjoy the fall temperatures. We are moving into the holiday season, and as we do that, I want to talk about something very common in south Florida during this time. This month I want to talk about scams.

The Broward Sheriff's Office warns that nomadic criminals called Travelers usually flood the south Florida area from other parts of the country for the specific purpose of preying on the elderly and vulnerable in our community. Travelers are known for all kinds of scams like the fortunetelling scam, which essentially robs people who are often at a last resort stage of life and desperate for answers. Home repair tricks are also common. Travelers will use the driveway coating/sealing scam where the loss is often \$50 to \$100. The job looks good until the first rain. House painting and roof repair work are the same way. Then there is the distraction scam. Solicitors come to your door and offer landscape, repair, or other kinds of services. They will



often ask you to step outside to show you something. As victims are distracted by the conversation, someone sneaks into your home and robs you of your valuables.

Many victims do not report these crimes because they are often embarrassed about being duped. If you have any questions about these scams or would like to file a report contact the Broward Sheriff's Office at 954-480-4300.

Below is a list of some of the other recent scams that have been reported to the Federal Trade Commission.

1. Zurixx's Real Estate – A scheme that leads people to believe they can make thousands by using the Zurixx system of flipping houses.

2. Notarios – If you, or someone you know, are trying to sort out immigration issues, go straight to an immigration lawyer and skip the notarios. They're not lawyers, and cannot help with immigration.

3. Social Security – This is a robocall scam that says your benefits will end. Do not press

the number 1.

4. Religious - Scammers are pretending to be a pastor, rabbi, priest, imam, or bishop. They ask believers for gift card contributions for a worthy cause. Appeals are often made by email, but people are also getting texts and phone calls.

Be informed, friends! The best way to do that is to know what is happening and remain vigilant! Ask questions, do not leave your doors unlocked, do not give strangers your personal information, and if you are not sure, take the name and number and offer to call back. Happy Thanksgiving neighbors and friends, As we all know, there are specific rules that apply to condo living, and homeowner associations (HOA) usually set those rules. Century Village is no different. For example, the areas outside of our apartments do not belong to any of us, and if you want a new door, you need to get approval from your housing board because the

outside area is considered common ground, and HOA's must approve of the door that you choose. If you have plans to build a patio outside of your apartment, you will need written approval granting your request. Your board may even wish to see those plans before they consent.

I am writing about this because we are finding that many condo owners are



unaware of these rules, so I have asked the City to help

me prepare a list of those requirements for you. We will have copies of that list in the main Clubhouse or you can contact me directly. My contact information is at the end of this article. Please understand what this means. Any changes to something on common ground will need a letter signed by your board to obtain a permit.

The association owns all of the property on common ground. Therefore, unless there is written consent, the City cannot and will not issue a permit to condo owners who wish to build or change anything on the common ground property.

Should you wish to discuss this issue or anything else, I have opened an office in the main Clubhouse to better serve all of you. You can bring your problems and concerns to me every other Monday, on the third floor, between 10 a.m. and Noon. I already met with some of you on October 21, 2019, thank you for coming and sharing your thoughts with me. I will be holding meetings again Monday, November 4, 2019. You can also call me at 954-415-5658 or 954-870-0214.

A Message from Marty Kiar, Your Property Appraiser

ur office receives numerous calls every year asking us to confirm property tax exemptions on the recent tax bills. The Property Appraiser's Office does not set your tax rates or collect property taxes. We assess property for tax purposes and grant tax-saving exemptions to qualified individuals. The property tax bills are mailed by the Broward County Tax Collector's Office. If you have questions regarding the payment of your tax bill, please contact their office at 954.831.4000 or visit their website at https://www.broward. org/RecordsTaxesTreasury.

Where is my 2020 Homestead Exemption?

The tax bill you received this November from the Broward County Tax Collector is for the 2019 tax year. If you purchased your home in 2019 and the previous owners of your new home were entitled to and received Homestead Exemption or any other exemption on January 1, 2019, you may have inherited their exemptions on your 2019 property tax bill. Florida Statutes require these 2019 exemptions be removed for 2020 and the property be reassessed at the 2020 just value. This will often result in an increase in your 2020 property taxes so it is important you apply for 2020 Homestead Exemption and any other



exemptions for which you may qualify. Your new 2020 Homestead Exemption will be reflected next year on all 2020 property records, notices and tax bills. Any exemptions applied to the tax bill are totaled and shown in the third column 'Exemptions' on the

individual tax bill.

Escrow Adjustments for 2019 Tax Bills


Our office often receives calls from property owners inquiring about their escrow and mortgage payments. The Property Appraiser's Office does not handle anything related to the financing of property. If you make monthly escrow payments for your property taxes, your mortgage or escrow company typically does an escrow analysis after paying your annual tax bill. Any increases or decreases to your monthly payment

will be determined and they will notify you directly usually after January 1. Should you have any questions about this, you should contact your mortgage company directly for assistance.

Quarterly Installment Payments

If you pay your property taxes on the Tax Collector's quarterly installment plan, any newly approved 2019 exemptions will be applied on the 3rd and 4th installment payment amounts. Any adjustments for 2019 are made on the final two quarterly 2019 installment payments.

Stop the breeding of As little as one Mosquitoes breed by laying eggs in and near standing water.

At your house or business: Put away items that are

teaspoon or bottle cap of water standing for more than one week is enough for mosquitoes to breed and multiply.



Around all buildings: At least once a week, empty, turn over or cover anything that

mosquito netting.

Use EPA-approved insect repellants Follow package label instructions.

Do not use on babies younger than 2 months.

Do not put on a child's hands, mouth, cut or irritated skin.

Do not spray onto a child's face—spray repellent onto your hands and then smooth onto the child's face.

Spray clothes and gear with an EPA-approved insect repellent like permethrin for extra protection. outside and not being used because they could hold standing water.

Risk of Burns from Eruptions of Hot Water Overheated in Microwave Ovens

The FDA has received reports of serious skin burns or scalding injuries around people's hands and faces as a result of hot water erupting out of a cup after it had been over-heated in a microwave oven. Overheating of water in a cup can result in superheated water (past its boiling temperature) without appearing to boil.

This type of phenomena occurs if water is heated in a clean cup. If foreign materials such as instant coffee or sugar are added before heating, the risk is greatly reduced. If superheating has occurred, a slight disturbance or movement such as picking up the cup, or pouring in a spoonfull of instant coffee, may result in a violent eruption with the boiling water exploding out of the cup.

What Can Consumers Do to Avoid Super-Heated Water?

 Follow the precautions and recommendations found in the microwave oven instruction manuals, specifically the heating time.

Senior Driving

Know the warning signs of unsafe driving

Issues with health

Health problems don't always mean that driving needs to be stopped, but they do require extra vigilance, awareness, and willingness to correct them. Some health problems include:

• Conflicting medications. Certain medications or combinations of medications can affect senses and reflexes. Always check the label on medications and double check with your healthcare team if you are taking several medications or notice a difference after starting a new medication.

• Eyesight problems. Some eye conditions or medications can interfere with your ability to focus your peripheral vision, or cause you to experience extra sensitivity to light, trouble seeing in the dark, or blurred vision. Can you easily see traffic lights and street signs? Or do you find yourself driving closer and closer, slowing by a sign to see it? Can you react appropriately to drivers coming from behind or to the side?

• Hearing problems.

If your hearing is decreasing, you may not realize you're missing out on important cues to drive safely. Can you hear emergency sirens, or if someone is accelerating next to you, or honking the horn?

• Problems with reflexes and range of motion.

Can you react quickly enough if you need to brake suddenly or quickly look back? Have you confused the gas and brake pedals? Do you find yourself getting more flustered while driving, or quick to anger? Is it comfortable to look back over your shoulder or does it take extra effort?

• Problems with memory. Do you find yourself missing exits that used to be second nature, or find yourself getting lost frequently? While everyone has an occasional lapse, if there's a pattern that is increasing, it's time to get evaluated by a doctor.



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Issues on the road

• Trouble with the nuts and bolts of driving.

Do you see yourself making sudden lane changes, drifting into other lanes, braking, or accelerating suddenly without reason? How about failing to use the turn signal, or keeping the signal on without changing lanes?

• Close calls and increased citations. Red flags include frequent "close calls" (i.e., almost crashing), dents and scrapes on the car or on fences, mailboxes, garage doors, and curbs. Increased traffic tickets or "warnings" by traffic or law enforcement officers.

CDC Investigates Lung Injuries Related To Vaping

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA), state and local health departments, and other clinical and public health partners are investigating a multistate outbreak of lung injury associated with the use of electronic-cigarettes (e-cigarettes). There have been 805 cases of lung injury reported from 46 state and 1 U.S. territory. Twelve deaths have been confirmed in 10 states, including Florida.

All injured persons reported a history of e-cigarette product use. Health officials suspect the lung injury may be caused by a chemical exposure. Although no single product or substance has been linked to all lung injury cases, the latest findings from the investigation suggest products containing tetrahydrocannabinol (THC), the psychoactive chemical in marijuana, may play a role in the outbreak.

E-cigarettes, also called vapes, e-hookahs, vape pens, tank systems, mods, and electronic nicotine delivery systems (ENDS), work by heating a liquid to produce an aerosol that users inhale into their lungs. The liquid can contain nicotine, THC, cannabinoid (CBD) oils, and other substances and additives. While this investigation is ongoing, the CDC recommends the following:

• Consider refraining from using e-cigarette, or vaping, products, particularly those containing THC.

• If you are an adult who used e-cigarettes containing nicotine to quit cigarette smoking, do not return to smoking cigarettes.

• If you have recently used an e-cigarette or vaping product and you have symptoms such as shortness of breath, headache, dizziness, chest pain, fever, cough, vomiting and/or diarrhea, see a healthcare provider.

Regardless of the ongoing investigation:

• Anyone who uses an e-cigarette or vaping product should not buy these products (e.g., e-cigarette or vaping products with THC or CBD oils) off the street and should not modify or add any substances that are not intended by the manufacturer.

• Youth and young adults should not use e-cigarette or vaping products.

• Women who are pregnant should not use e-cigarette or vaping products.

• Adults who do not currently use tobacco products should not start using ecigarette or vaping products.

College football games were played every weekend.


Feeding Wildlife Causes Problems

Sukkot in Century Village

Jollowing closely on the heels of the very serious Jewish Holidays of Rosh Hashanah (Days of Judgement) and Yom Kippur (the Day of Atonement) comes the Jewish Holiday of Sukkot (in layman's language the Festival of Tabernacles). Sukkot is a Festive Holiday of Joy where we are commanded to dwell in a Sukkah for seven days. This year Sukkot started the evening of Sunday, October 13 and continued through to Tuesday, October 22. (Technically the

last two days of the Holiday are a different festival.)

A Sukkah is a temporary dwelling with a roof of natural branch-like material that is sparse enough to allow someone to see the stars through the roof material. Most Sukkahs use bamboo poles or bamboo mats for the roof covering. The commandment is to dwell in the Sukkah and to be joyous. Sometimes it is hard to be joyous when the rain is acting South Floridaish – remember the roof is

designed to allow one to look up through (and for the rain to come down through). Additionally, Master Management has arranged to stop the irrigation for the week of Sukkot for those areas where there were Sukkahs that were set up on grass. It would take away from the Joy of the Holiday to be eating the evening meal in the Sukkah and get watered down by the irrigation system.

This year there were seven Sukkahs on condominium

property in the Village. (Some hide very well - and we are not sure that we found them all). Five years ago there were seven. Additionally, there are two Sukkos by the Young Israel, one by the Chabad, and one by Temple Beth Israel (21 Sukkos total that we found). Most, but not all, of the Sukkahs were prefab manufactured. Sukkahs have come a long way from the Sukkahs of the grandparents that were old wood or spare doors that were nailed

together to make the walls, and branches from local trees that were cut to make the roof (called schach). Sukkahs are now made to go up quickly, come down quickly, and store easily. It does not feel the same in terms of the investment of self into the Sukkah construction - but it is what it is. Not sure if any of us would even have the time any more to build a Sukkah from scratch. By the time the *Reporter* is out, most of the Sukkahs will have been taken down and stored for next year. But, hopefully for those who were able to be joyous in the Sukkah, the memories will remain.

Next year plan to visit a Sukkah.

*14 day passes cannot be purchased consecutively. There must be 14 days between your last date on the previous pass and the date in which you are purchasing a new 14 day pass. If purchasing a pass inside the 14 day period you must purchase an additional week at \$25.

Occupant

Any individual residing in an unit more than 29 consecutive days is considered an Occupant. A background check is required for recreational facility use.

BAR CODE: When you change cars, you must return your bar code (decal) even if in pieces. Remove your bar code and return to the I.D. office in order to be issued a new bar code.

Renter Pass Requirements

- 1. Signed lease: must not be for less than three (3) months.
- Certificate of Approval with Building Seal. 2.
- Owners L.D. turned into the L.D. Office. 3.
- Cost is \$50 per person per year, which 4. includes a bar code.
- 5. Background check is required.
- 6. All tenants must register their vehicle with the I.D. Office.

When selling your unit all I.D.s, passes and bar codes must be turned into the I.D. Office prior to closing. Every outstanding item will incur a \$100 fee payable at closing.

There will be no fee exceptions once a unit has closed - i.e. if an item is found and turned in AFTER the closing there will be no refunds.

y parents knew I was gay; we talked about it in the late 1960s. They said they loved me anyway, but don't tell anybody, even your sisters; I agreed. But it was 1971, and I was now living in New York City and very much out of the closet.

I called the newspaper to find out exactly when the article would be printed. I was told my article was already published on the OpEd page. That surprised me, but I learned something. Payment for any printed work is sent after publication. This meant my parents and everyone else would have already seen the article.

That weekend I hopped a bus to visit my parents in the small town of Mahwah in northern New Jersey; I was anxious. After about an hour, the bus let me off. I walked the small distance to my parent's house. When I opened the door, my mother was at the kitchen sink. She turned and saw me. She dried her hands then took a folded piece of paper from the window ledge, walked over and handed it to me. I started to say, "I was going to..." She turned her back and left the room without saying a word. I opened the paper; it was my article clipped from the newspaper. During my short visit, she never spoke of the article, nor did my father.

After my visit, I rode back on the bus to the welcoming arms of the big city.



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

COOCVE Updates

The Condominium ▲ Owners Organization of Century Village East (COOCVE) was formed in 1976 and filed its Articles of Incorporation. Although the COOCVE Bylaws were revised in March of 2019 in order to increase the COOCVE Directors from 350 to 414, the Bylaws were not otherwise substantially changed. Therefore, the current COOCVE Bylaws Committee determined that the rest of the documents needed to be updated. The Bylaws Committee met

General Counsel to develop changes to the documents that would make it more efficient. For example, the proposed changes will allow each Association to determine directors when a vacancy arises midterm. The Committee is proposing that the membership fees be paid by February 10 regardless of whether the Association pays or one of the other community organizations pays on its behalf.

The Associations will have until March 31 of each year

to submit their new Officer & Director (O&D) form with the roster of current Directors. In order to simplify the voting process, any Association that does not complete the two requirements above will be unable to vote in COOCVE elections. It is imperative that COOCVE has a current roster of Directors so the Elections Committee can conduct the vote for the Boards of CVE Master Management and Recreation Committee/CenClub. Associations must fill out and submit the 2019 Officers and

Directors form to COOCVE by November 22.

The Bylaws Committee also realized that these documents were missing essential protection for the Directors and Board so they will be indemnified by COOCVE in the event they are sued while performing official acts.

The Committee worked tirelessly on this task for the benefit of the community as a whole. The vote on the proposed changes will take place at the December meeting. The proposed bylaws changes will be voted on in their entirety and there will not be any specific line item vote.

COOCVE thanks you for studying the proposed changes and voting during



the COOCVE December board meeting.



They empty their emotional gas tank...every time The beautiful universal reality about these artists is that...



How is the City bringing back recycling?

The City has created a new and improved recycling program called DFB Recycling Version 2.0. This new recycling program will focus on bringing recycling back to its basics, and keeping it clean.

DFB Recycling Version 2.0 will include cans, paper, cardboard, plastic bottles and jugs, and glass. All containers should be rinsed and dried. The new program will no longer tolerate contaminants like plastic bags, pizza boxes and other food-contaminated items. The City will be regularly monitoring collection routes for these items.

Know the Recycling Rules. Remember, just because it can be recycled, doesn't mean it is in our program. If it is not in our curbside program, IT IS CONSIDERED CONTAMINATION.

What is recycling contamination and why does it matter?

Recycling contamination is when incorrect materials are recycled. Some of the most common contaminants are plastic bags and materials with food residue like pizza boxes. With the advent of single stream recycling and "wish-cycling," (where people hope something is recyclable and throw it in) recycling contamination has increased significantly. Contamination causes an increase in the cost of processing recyclables and decreases the value of the material, which ultimately makes it more costly to recycle. The most recent composition study showed that Deerfield Beach's contamination rate was over 50% before the program's temporary suspension.

What caused this change?

When will recycling collection resume?

The City will resume curbside residential recycling collection on Monday, September 3, 2018.

How can I help?

Residents should only recycle items that are included in the City's new recycling program. Eliminating contaminants like plastic bags and pizza boxes is the way to create a more sustainable program. Check out www.DFB.city/recycling for details.

Keep watching the City's social media feeds for even more tips and tricks to becoming a smart recycler.

Can I still put garbage in my blue bin come September 3, 2018?

No. Recycling routes will resume starting September 3. Your recycling collection day will be the same as it was prior to the suspension. THIS MEANS NO MORE GARBAGE IN YOUR RECYCLING BIN. Only recyclables that are on the program list are allowed in the bin, anything else is considered contamination. Historically, China has been the U.S.'s main importer of recyclable materials. However, late last year China imposed a ban on materials that do not meet stringent contamination standards. Contamination has always been a problem, but it has become more of an issue with these changes in the market. Additionally, over the past several years, the overall value of recyclables has steadily declined.

DFB Recycling Version 2.0 is aimed at tackling these challenges and becoming a more sustainable and beneficial program for Deerfield Beach.

How can I do more to save my planet?

- · Say no to single use plastics like straws, bags, and take-out containers.

Advanced Swim Lessons – Teacher recommendation preferred. Must be capable of performing the four major strokes proficiently.

- **Aquacise-** This invigorating class held in the pool gives you cardio respiratory conditioning. It also helps you with symptoms of arthritis by reducing the stress of joints.
- Arthritic Aquacise- An easy to follow class held in the pool, focusing on building flexibility, balance and strength to increase joint mobility and range of motion. This program is for residents that might need a little more attention from the instructor.
- Awareness Through Movements (Feldenkrais) Awareness Through Movement classes use slow, mindful movements to achieve powerful effects in terms of strength, flexibility, and holistic integration of body and mind. This class will use functional movements of daily life, such as walking efficiently, safely lifting objects, and improving one's posture in sitting or standing.
- Back in Action Fitness- This upbeat, low impact aerobics and strength training class may be performed standing or in a seated position. The class includes energizing and easy-to-follow movements that promote heart-healthy, total-body conditioning to increase cardiovascular and muscular endurance.
 Balance & Fall Prevention- This class is designed to strengthen muscles used in maintaining overall balance.
- **Ball Sculpt-** This class utilizes the stability ball for total-body muscle sculpting. This class continuously challenges participants with exercises that use either body weight only or dumbbells. The ball lets you offer endless choreography options in addition to built-in balance and stability tests.
- **Barre** Barre is a higher intensity class that covers the full body and incorporates core movements to increase strength and balance.
- **Beginner Swim Lessons** This class will get you comfortable in the water by teaching you breathing, floating and kicking techniques. These skills will prepare you to learn full swim strokes.
- Body & Core- A 60-minute class targeting your abdominal, posture and lower back muscles to help promote better balance through a stronger mid-section.
 Body Pump Using light to moderate weights, Pilates balls and rings for total body workout.
- **Body Toning & Weights-** A total body toning class which helps those with osteoporosis and muscle density loss. **Bones & Joints-** This class combines strength, stretch and range of motion exercise to specifically target joints andbone health.

- **Chair Taiji-** Learn slow, gentle Taiji movements synchronized with the breath to enhance your vital energy and promote life-long health and well-being. **Chair Yoga-** Like Relax with Yoga, but this class is focused on residents who have limited mobility, difficulty with floor exercise, arthritis or are recovering from surgery.
- **Chinese Therapeutic Exercise-** Created by a Chinese Orthopedist, this set of 18 short forms combine range of motion movements to promote supple, pain-free joints and life-long health. The class is synchronized to traditional

- **Intermediate Swim Lessons** This is a continuation of learning and building upon the techniques of the strokes learned in beginner swim lessons. Begin to perfect your skills while taking it to the next level.
- Limited Mobility Arthritic Aquacise- This easy to follow class, focusing on building flexibility, balance, & strength to increase joint mobility and range of motion. This program is for residents that might need a little more attention from the instructor.
- **Line Dance-** This choreographed dance class reviews a repeated sequence of steps in one or more lines or rows, all facing either each other or in the same direction, and executing the steps at the same time.
- **Low Impact Aerobics-** A low intensity workout designed to help you condition the cardio respiratory system by using a diversity of exercises. The class starts with 30 minutes of aerobic workout followed by 15 minutes of weights and 10 minutes of abdominal work and stretching.
- **Meditation-** Recent scientific studies show that the practice of meditation changes the brain in wonderful ways affecting ability to have greater balance, more focus, increased compassion, less anxiety, and improved well-being. Meditation is a practice by which a person achieves a greater sense of awareness, wisdom, and introspection.
- **Perfect Posture-** A class designed to help correct posture and body alignment while incorporating it into your daily life. Perfect Posture helps to reduce injury or pain and help you function better.
- **Pilates-** This class will connect the whole body and mind through proper breathing and slow, controlled movements to help you develop core abdominal strength and a leaner body by lengthening and stretching the muscles without building bulk.
- **Relax Yoga-** This class teaches practical self-discipline to gain mastery over body and mind. It also helps to increase strength, flexibility, balance, stamina and endurance in a positive mental atmosphere. There is special emphasis on proper breathing, relaxation and meditation techniques.
- **Restorative Yoga-** The restorative yoga practice gives us the power to manifest and return to our intuitive nature. We do this by entering our bodies slowly, building up fire within the body as a warm up and then fully surrendering in gentle poses for the rest of class. Through the breath, we observe every sensation, feel each muscle release into relaxation and notice how interconnected our physical bodies and mind really are. Memory Support, Naturally

m paramount\ importance}$ to function optimally. Whether vou're holding down a job, attending school, socializing with friends raising a family, or participating in retirement activities keeping your memory sharply focused is key to successfully managing the tasks of daily living.

There are two main types of memory problems. The first and most serious one, senile dementia, affects five to ten percent of people over 65 and includes Alzheimer's disease and Multiple Infarct Dementia. Common to both illnesses are the progressive nature of the memory loss. Those affected slowly loose increasing amounts of cognitive function and may deteriorate to a point where self-care is no longer possible. The second and far more common memory problem is Age-Associated Memory Impairment. Here, people experience memory loss, sometimes referred to as *a senior moment,* but there is no deterioration in other functions such as speech or vision. Both types may be caused by



a decrease in circulation and oxygenation to brain tissue, along with other factors.

Maintaining an organic whole food diet, eliminating trans fats, fried food and processed food, which clog *up* circulation is a great start. Equally important is a regular exercise regimen throughout life - healthy eating and regular exercise is the best insurance against memory loss, and many other health problems. In addition, there is one member of the herbal kingdom that has gained medical acceptance as a helpful treatment. Ginkgo Biloba made medical history when the

Journal of the American Medical Association published research about its usefulness for senile dementia; (Le Bars, et. al., JAMA 1997; 278:1327-1332). Ginkgo is a very ancient species of tree that has existed for over 200 million years. It is an excellent example of what herbalists refer to as the *doctrine of signatures,* where some aspect of the plant gives us a clue to its use in health conditions. The leaf of the Ginkgo looks like the hemisphere of a brain, and its fruit also has a brain-like shape. Numerous studies show that it significantly increases blood flow to the brain (as well as to the heart), while also inhibiting PAF (platelet activation factor), which causes clotting of the blood. In addition, tests have indicated improvement in short-term memory and reaction time after using Ginkgo. Other applications for this herb include impotence, macular degeneration, tinnitus, vertigo and asthma. Finally, Ginkgo may also be useful in preventing the rejection of transplanted organs.

Often lost in Ginkgo's shadow and perhaps even more effective for increasing blood flow to the brain is Periwinkle (Vinca minor). This common ground cover sports tiny purple flowers in the early spring and has been used in folk remedies as a *love potion*, perhaps due to its beneficial effects on circulation. Periwinkle contains an alkaloid, vincamine, that the medical reference book, The *Merck Index*, lists as a drug to improve intellectual capacity, Gotu kola, also known as Brahmi in the Ayurvedic System, is another herb known to have a positive influence on brain function, and has been used for centuries by Ayurvedic Physicians in India to promote longevity and offset many health problems associated with aging. It is an energizing tonic that has a calming action, making it useful in brain formulas.

Other herbs to consider include Hawthorne (a great heart tonic that lowers peripheral resistance to blood flow), Rosemary (an aromatic that supports circulation and digestion while stimulating the central nervous system; ancient Greeks believed it helped preserve memory as well), Prickly Ash (supports circulation and

carries the formula deeper into the body) and Cayenne (promotes circulation and acts as a carrier). These herbs can really provide that needed "lift" when mental clarity is desired such as during final exam week or when working on a special project, as well as acting as a long term tonic for brain circulation.

Be sure to discuss the use of any herbs with your physician, because at times they can interact with medications, such as blood thinners. Holistic physicians will often work with each individual to adjust dosing, since herbs can provide memory support with a much lower adverse effect profile than many pharmaceuticals.

Flu Season

ˈt´s flu season again and Lit's time to be flu safe. Did you know the flu can be especially dangerous for young children, the elderly and people with certain medical conditions? That's why it's important to take simple precautions like getting the flu vaccine and washing your hands. It's never fun to get sick and it's important to take preventative measures so you physician, but flu vaccines are widely available at a variety of retail stores.

Be aware that chronic respiratory conditions, diabetes, kidney and liver disease, neurological conditions, cancer and HIV, can heighten the risk of flu complications.

According to the CDC, people with flu can spread it to others up to about six feet away. Most experts think that flu viruses spread mainly by droplets made when people with flu cough, sneeze or talk. Someone can also contract the flu by touching a surface that has the flu virus on it and then touching their own mouth, eyes or nose. The CDC recommends getting a flu vaccine every year because flu viruses evolve quickly, and last year's vaccine may not protect against the current year's flu strain. If you get sick, see your doctor right away. Antiviral drugs are used to treat the flu and should be administered as soon as possible because they work best if started within 48 hours of symptoms appearing. Using antiviral drugs can make flu symptoms milder and speed up



stay healthy.

So, what is the flu? Simply put, it's a respiratory infection that can cause serious complications. Symptoms can be mild to serious, and at times, even lead to death. An influenza, or flu vaccine, is the best way to combat this illness. In fact, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommend everyone six months and older be vaccinated annually against the flu. And by the way, the flu vaccine is safe.

The flu shot is an inactive vaccine containing killed virus. A higher dose is recommended for people over age 65, who are more susceptible to flu complications. The best place to get the flu vaccine is at your private

recovery. Such medications may also prevent serious complications.

The Department of Health in Broward urges everyone to take these steps to fight the flu:

 Get vaccinated. Getting the flu vaccine is the best way to protect yourself and your family.

• Cover your cough or sneeze. Use your sleeve or a tissue when you cough or sneeze and then toss your used tissue in the wastebasket and wash your hands to keep from spreading germs.

• Wash your hands often with soap and water or use an alcohol-based hand cleaner.


• Avoid touching your eyes nose and mouth. If you touch a surface with the flu virus, you can get the flu by touching your eyes, nose or mouth.


• Stay home if you are sick. Viruses go wherever you go when you are infected so stay home and check with your healthcare provider if needed.

If you are not on the email list, stop by the Staff office or the Bay Management office during business hours to get added. This is a great way to keep updated with alerts involving Recreation and the Clubhouse as well as emergencies and schedule changes.

Upminster: The restrooms at Upminster were remodeled; new epoxy floors, new wall tile, new LED fixtures, new plumbing fixtures and new partitions.

Clubhouse: The Clubhouse furniture was delivered and installed. The next shipment will be on or around October 18.

Lighting: LED lighting upgrades continued in the Clubhouse; 40 LED fixtures were installed in the upstairs hallway. This will save a great deal of energy and money as the fixtures have a 40-year life expectancy.

General Maintenance

182 work orders that were completed in September. The maintenance staff performed the following repairs; continued painting of the facility, painted the floor of the Clubhouse tunnel, the men's restroom in the game room was remodeled with new floor and wall tile, LED fixtures and plumbing.

Pools

There were 54 work orders completed in the last three months. Preventative maintenance was completed at the Durham and the Tilford pools. PM includes draining the pool, repairing any issues, freshwater fill and chemical balance and startup. The pool decks at Durham, Ventnor, Newport, Lyndhurst North and South and Markham were pressure washed. All gutters on the canopies were pressure washed and the pool heat pumps were pressure checked and tested in preparation for the colder weather; no problems were found.

October Projects

Theater: An acoustical treatment is scheduled in preparation for the season showcase. This treatment should add more clarity of sound and music to the shows.

Paving: The paving project is underway and is on schedule for completion before the end of October. During this time, traffic patterns will change. However, the entire facility and amenities will be accessible to all residents.

Pool Parking: Seven additional parking spaces will be added to the Upminster Pool area for recreation use only. These spaces will be available in conjunction with the Swansea area paving; signage is ordered for the spaces.

Pressure Washing: Pool deck pressure washing will continue in October.

EWI Electric: EWI Electric will be wiring two new heat pumps at Newport and connect them to the BAS system for automation.

Courts: All of the courts, which include Petanque, Bocce, Pickle Ball, Tennis, Horseshoes, will be serviced by the end of the month.

President's Report - Eli Okun: (9:33:53 a.m.)

Eli remarked although the Board has not held a recent public meeting, they have continued to meet throughout the summer as often as twice a week to work on Village issues and future planning. 1) Storm Preparation -

Eli thanked staff, Val, property managers, Recreation, Mike Burdman and his staff approval per questionnaire and feedback. 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
Cooke's Look at Books

This Just In: What I Couldn't Tell You on TV

By Bob Schieffer, Putnam, 432 Pages, \$26.95



Writing about his TV coverage of the mass anti-Vietnam war riots following a major speech by then-president Richard Nixon, former CBS Evening News anchorman Bob Shieffer writes, "I thought it was the best and longest story I had ever done for the news program. The only problem was I was proved totally wrong. I had overlooked the obvious and violated a solid rule in journalism: Be wary of information that seems to confirm what you have been wishing for." He had concluded the riots were over, chaos in the Nixon White House had ended, the country was back to settling the Vietnam war problem peacefully and at the


a beer. He joined CBS News in 1969 and became one of the first few correspondents ever to have covered all four major White House beats: the White House, the Pentagon, the State Department and Capitol Hill. He writes, "Those events I covered have become part of our history and you already know most of them. But I want to tell you about the parts that didn't get on television or in the paper.

The good times I had, and the presidents, senators, correspondents, big-time crooks and small-time swindlers." All of whom Schieffer got to know, whether he chose to or not. And, in this book, that is what he does, tells us the secrets he learned by interviewing presidents including Nixon, Johnson, Ford and Carter. Wherever news was happening, from the White House to the United Nations, from the halls of political power to the rural streets of small-town America, from the JFK assassination to the terror of the Ole Miss riots, to the chaos and grief of 9/11, Bob Schieffer was there to cover it. These are the stories he has, to date, told his friends and, as he writes, "They are also stories I now want to share

with you."

tal illness and drug abuse. Through it all she survived."

The wife of President George H.W. Bush became only the second woman in American history (Abigail Adams was the first), to be the wife of one president and the mother of another.

America's Grandmother, as she came to be lovingly known, the matronly, plain-spoken, disciplined strong woman who White House speechwriter Peggy Noonan wrote, had "Those merry eyes, a lack of pretension, a breeziness but who was, underneath, Greenwich granite," is the subject of this new, eminently readable biography.

Her trademark necklaces of pearls – for which, some claim, she never paid more than \$29.95 – hint at the practical, down-to-earth person she was, and why her comfortable, easily self-deprecating appeal never failed to transcend differences in wealth and social status.

Daughter-in-law Laura Bush was often a target of Barbara's sharp tongue. "People think she's a sweet, grandmotherly type," she told at a White House Correspondent's dinner in a humorous speech in 2005. "She's actually more like Don Corleone." And, in this book, we find that the frosty relationship between Barbara and President Reagan's wife, Nancy, was very real – and more Nancy's fault than Barbara's.

Finally, author Page writes, "Her mind was sharp to the end, but her physical health was failing. At the end of one interview, I asked her, 'What do you think the title of this book should be?' She answered without missing a beat, *The Fat Lady Sings Again*, she said. And she smiled, pleased with herself." Author Michael McFaul writes that it was a bright, sunny, April 2010, morning when Air Force One landed in Prague carrying him, President Barack Obama and other Russian experts to a meeting with then-Russian president Dmitri Medvedev later that afternoon.


Upon landing, Obama asked McFaul to ride with him in his limousine –the Beast – to majestic Prague Castle where the spring meeting and ceremony heralding New Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty (START), reducing by 30 percent the number of nuclear arms weapons allowed in both Russia and the U.S., was to be signed. Crowds lined the streets. It was to be a day of celebration. McFaul was Obama's wingman on, what they both expected, was a victory lap which both men had worked hard to achieve.

"Later that day," McFaul writes, "Medvedev and Obama signed the new treaty, drank champagne together and spoke glowing about possibilities for further cooperation." At the time, solid majorities in both countries were convinced of such possibilities. Russia was popular in America, and America was popular in Russia. I flew home the next day in a great mood, convinced we were making history.

Only two years later, on a cold, dark day in January 2012, McFaul arrived in Moscow as the new ambassador to the Russian Federation. At his first meeting with president-elect Vladimir Putin, McFaul came face-to-face with a man who, with steel blue eyes and a stern scowl, angrily accused McFaul of purposely seeking to ruin U.S.-Russia relations. "The hair on the back of my neck stood on end," writes McFaul, "And sweat covered my brow as I endured a tongue-lashing from one of the most powerful people in the world. I had returned to Russia as a revolutionary, a usurper and Vladimir Putin's foe." What happened? How did we go from toasting Russia, our international security partner in 2010, in Prague, to lamenting its end, in Moscow, just two years later? The answer can be found in this electrifying new book by Mc-Faul, currently a political scientist at Stanford University. It's all here in this revelatory behind-the-scenes account of **Russian-American relations** from the optimistic days of the Reagan-Gorbachev era to the confrontational era of Putin, from one who has lived it. A page-turner, to be sure.

Greenwood is haunted by the question, "How can a man tell the truth and be reviled for it?" In a village ostensibly founded as a benevolent Utopia, Greenwood wants only to honor his duties but his friendships with a woman scientist and a renegade newspaper editor threaten to draw him into a vendetta with the town's powerful men. With uncommon skill and feeling, author Kingsolver brilliantly brings two periods of history to life, unspooling a magically captivating tale of what seems, for both families, to be the end of the world as they know it. What better time than now to remind us that the times we are presently in are repeats of history past - a history past, unfortunately, from which we, still, never learn. Fortunately for readers, this novel not only hugely entertains but, at the same time, teaches – if we stop to listen and learn.



Florida Headlight Laws

Headlights on Cars and Motorcycles

All motor vehicles in Florida must have 2 headlights in good working order that shine a white light. The headlights must not be covered or altered in any way.

You must turn your car headlights on between the hours of sunset and sunrise, and when it is raining or when visibility is insufficient due to lighting or weather conditions. Failure to use approved headlights could result in being cited for a moving violation, the fine for which varies based upon frequency and severity – up to a maximum of \$500.

You must have your headlights on at all times while riding a motorcycle, even during the day.


