## The Significance of Independence Day

The Fourth of July, our Independence Day, our National Day- the day that marks the birth of our Republic. On this day in the year 1776, the second Continental Congress of the thirteen American colonies, while meeting in Philadelphia, adopted the Declaration of Independence. The original draft of the Declaration of Independence was composed by Thomas Jefferson after being persuaded to do so by a committee of five led by John Adams. It was adopted and signed by 56 delegates to the Continental Congress. In addition to serving its original

purpose of announcing independence, the Declaration of Independence has become a well-known statement on human rights, particularly its second sentence: "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness."

John Adams, our second President and signer of the Declaration of Independence said about Independence Day: "I am apt to believe that it will be celebrated by succeeding generations as the great anni-

versary festival. It ought to be solemnized with pomp and parade, with shows, games, sports, guns, bells, bonfires, and illuminations, from one end of this continent to the other, from this time forward forever more."

Both Founding Fathers John Adams and Thomas Jefferson, the only signers of the Declaration of Independence to later become Presidents of the United States, died on the Fourth of July in 1826. In addition, another Founding Father to serve as President but NOT sign the Declaration, James Monroe also died on the Fourth of July but in the year

1831. The only U.S. President to be born on the Fourth of July was our 30<sup>th</sup>, Calvin Coolidge, born on July 4, 1872.

The fact that Independence Day is celebrated throughout the United States with parades, fireworks, sporting events and picnics is keeping up the tradition that was urged by John Adams back in 1776. The famous painting by A.M. Willard depicting two marching drummers alongside a marching fife player is known as *The Spirit of '76*. It was originally entitled *Yankee Doodle* and is a familiar symbol of American Patriotism.

It is important for future

generations to never forget the meaning of Independence Day. It is not just a day for businesses to run big sales and young people to think about partying. It should always be referred to as Independence Day and not merely the Fourth or July 4. When you hear the term Independence Day it should make a child or adult think about why, how, when and where. Independence Day is not a day of war or military action, but a day to commemorate the birth of our nation and the Founders who drafted and labored to make the Declaration of Independence a reality.

A raucous meeting of the Master Management Board of Directors was held on Thursday May 17 in Activity Center Room A. The fireworks commenced during the open-microphone segment post meeting. Residents took to the open microphone with fervor regarding the recent changes in Clubhouse and Village security.

The litany of complaints

from residents included: "No one is checking I.D. cards now," "Why weren't residents consulted and notified of the plan prior to its implementation," and "We no longer feel safe in the Clubhouse."

New Master Management Executive Director Dan Johnson and Master Management Board of Directors President Eli Okun answered most residents' concerns with alacrity and clarity. The large

crowd that was present left the meeting questioning the motives behind the changes. Some residents believe the new first-responders roaming through the Clubhouse with a *stat-pack* is a good thing. Time will tell. One thing is certain, with alcohol being consumed in the Clubhouse Party Room on numerous occasions, having adequate security on site is vital.




Dear Residents,

The clubhouse is undergoing security enhancements. Many of you have noticed that our nine (9) entrances are no longer being staffed by security officers asking to see your CVE identification. This is part of an effort by Master Management to bring a higher level of service and technology to the community. This includes high definition camera coverage and DVR recordings of the entire clubhouse, pools, restaurant, and parking lots. The monitors are being watched in several locations and record all activity for more than 30 days. The welcome desk is manned by a security officer that can see the activity throughout the clubhouse property and a "first responder" with medical expertise is roaming the clubhouse and grounds. Security Officer's remain at posts located at the ID/Box Office area and bus depot, as we have seen in the past. Security, clubhouse, and restaurant staff all have state of the art, two-way radios in which to communicate a need and/or coordinate a response.

The West door is permanently closed and the drop-off area has been relocated, please see the attached map. Signs indicating such have been placed outside to assist you. It is imperative that residents continue to have their CVE identification with them while on clubhouse property. The Recreation Committee is continuing to look at further advancements at the clubhouse and we will keep you updated.

We appreciate your patience and understanding.

Dear Residents,

We recently made some changes to our Village Security Plan that I would like to update you on.

**Clubhouse:** We have lessened the number of guards at the Clubhouse and increased both our medical response and use of technology. An additional 26 high-definition cameras have been added to the property for a total of 32 visual checkpoints that are monitored all day by a trained guard. These cameras not only serve a real time purpose but also record and save footage for over 30 days. We have paired this technology with a First Responder dedicated to the Clubhouse. These trained medical professionals will be responding to all incidents on Clubhouse property, and serving as a liaison to the paramedics as they arrive on site.

**Outside of the Recreation Property:** We are continuing patrols outside the Recreation Property with our rovers, as well as working on physical structures that will improve security for the exterior of the village. New gatehouses are in the process of being built, with the East Gate (Military Trail) breaking ground at the end of May. We anticipate that the West Gate (Powerline Road) will be permitted and built this summer as well, with the Main Gate (Hillsboro) being erected next year. All of these gatehouses will be equipped with high definition cameras for access control and will continue to be manned.

**Lighting Project:** In June we will embark on our Lighting Project, which will replace the current fixtures with new LED fixtures. These fixtures will both save energy and provide much more visibility.

We are also very close to securing a contract with the Broward County Sheriff's Office to provide regular patrols in the village. As we improve the road striping and signage, we inch our way closer to compliance with their traffic standards. We will potentially have those patrols starting this summer.

Finally, we are in the design phase of a new perimeter wall that will span the length of the property in every direction. This wall will be an aesthetic upgrade, but most importantly will serve as an improved barrier between us and the city. We are working diligently on the permitting and variances required for this wall and hope to break ground early in 2019.


As many of you know, change is difficult. However, given these reallocated resources and focus on upgrades, to both the interior and exterior of the community, we believe our best security plan is being implemented.

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# VILLAGE MEETING MINUTES

## Joint COOCVE Exec. Comm. and Council of Area Chairs Mtg. – May 9, 2018

**COOCVE President**  
Sylvia Smaldone called the meeting to order at 9:30 a.m. Sylvia led the Pledge of Allegiance and a Moment of Silence. Sylvia announced that a quorum was present.

### Minutes

Sylvia asked for approval to waive the reading of the minutes from the April 11 meeting and approve them as printed in the *Reporter*. The motion was carried unanimously.

**Treasurer's Report** - The expenses for April were \$2,229. YTD income was \$68,286; deposits were \$44,608.00. The YTD expenses were \$34,134. The current cash balance as of February is \$78,760.

### President's Report -

Sylvia Smaldone

Sylvia stated that the COOCVE office has been inundated by residents complaining about being harassed and ignored by building Presidents. Some residents have hired attorneys to go after the Presidents of their

buildings. The responsibility of the Area Chairs is to assist unit owners in dealing with the Presidents. Sylvia suggested that Area Chairs have a meeting with the unit owner and building President to try to resolve issues before escalating issues to an attorney. Rita agreed that this is a big problem. Many building Presidents do not understand that they do not own the building and cannot make unilateral decisions. Presidents also do not understand that the documents need to state, dogs are allowed; they cannot just allow it. Sylvia stated that there are no penalties when building Presidents do not comply with the documents. Michael Routburg suggested that residents speak to the Ombudsman to help resolve their disputes; the Ombudsman can overrule building Presidents, Michael will have the phone number to the Ombudsman published in the *Reporter*. Judy mentioned that the Fair Housing Act supercedes the documents, to allow support animals to residents.

Sylvia mentioned that there is going to be a July COOCVE BOD's meeting. Sylvia then turned the meeting over to Pat Bidol-Padva, Chairperson for the Council of Area Chairs.

Pat Bidol-Padva introduced Maryanne Chandler. Ms. Chandler is with the law firm Katzman Chandler and provided the Area Chairs with additional information on changing their documents. The Power Point presentation will be sent to all Area Chairs and Presidents as the equipment was not working. Ms. Chandler reminded the Area Chairs and Presidents that they were all sent a full document rewrite which included optional and alternate provisions and a list of spot amendments with optional and alternate provisions. The first step is to assemble a Board or a Committee to review them. After the Board/Committee review and highlight which provisions are best suited for the Association, the next step would be to sit down and discuss the changes

with an attorney. Ms. Chandler stated that she would meet with individual Board/Committees at no additional cost to review the provisions they chose. After you meet with an attorney, the next step is for the attorney to produce a new document incorporating the existing document with the new provisions. The next step is for the Board/Committee to approve the document so that they can take the document to the owners for a vote. The next step is for the attorney to produce a voting package; the management company can assist the Board/Committee in mailing this package to the owners. If you are producing a full document rewrite, then the vote would be a yes or no. If you are only doing a change on pets or leasing, then those provisions would be pulled out and voted on separately, so that the entire document does not fail if someone does not like one provision when voting. The process is the same with the spot amendments. Once everything is approved, the final step is to send a notification to the attorney so that they can prepare a certificate of amendment to get reported in the public records. Once the documents are recorded they become effective. Gene Goldman asked if a bylaw change needs to be in conformance with Articles of Incorporation and the Declaration of Condominium Rules. Ms. Chandler responded yes, that's the end goal. There is a hierarchy of documents and there may be instances where Articles don't agree with the bylaws. When you are amending your documents, you want to be sure they agree with one another. If there are conflicts between the two, the Declaration of Condominium ranks supreme over all of them, followed by the Articles of Incorporation, followed by the Bylaws and then the Rules and Regulations. It is extremely important for buildings to work with an attorney to be sure all the documents conform with one another. Ms. Chandler stated that the approximate cost is about \$3,000 to rewrite a full set of documents; this includes a voting package, plus the cost of recording the documents. If budgeting this for next year, she suggested \$3,600 to cover all costs.

Pat mentioned that Ms. Chandler will be back in the fall to go over this presentation again. A series of workshops will also be scheduled for building Presidents who have gone through the process to share best practices.

**Master Management** - Dan Johnson

Dan Johnson mentioned that the east gate and lighting project will go before the Community Appearance Board tonight at City Hall. MM is confident that they will have both permits by Friday. Letters have been sent to residents who abut the golf course on the access agreement; MM will be conducting testing on property around the golf course. A new air conditioning unit was installed in Le Club. Dan mentioned that First Responders, medical trained professionals, were introduced at the recent Recreation meeting. These professionals will be in and around the Clubhouse/Recreation facilities to handle any medical emergencies. These professionals will be carrying a Stat Pack equipped with an AED and will walk around the Clubhouse to assist those in need.

**Recreation** - Kelly Hampton

Tickets are still available for the Yankees/Marlins game on August 21. Dinner on the Town is scheduled for May 17; a trip to the Coral Square Mall. Cohen's Customer Appreciation Week is being held May 5 through May 13; buy 1 sandwich - get 1 free.

**Commissioner** - Bernie Parness

The City has hired an additional Code Enforcement Officer and will be working on Saturdays and Sundays. If anyone is interested in signing a petition to ban assault weapons in Florida, please see Bernie after the meeting.

**Seacrest** - Jaqueline

The 2018 hurricane preparedness information kit will be mailed to all Presidents. She asked that Presidents let their Property Managers know how many you want to have posted on the bulletin boards and if any need to be mailed. Sylvia asked for a status on the dues. ## Minutes of the COOCVE Recreation Committee Meeting - May 8, 2018

The meeting opened with the Pledge of Allegiance and a Moment of Silence at 9:30 a.m.

### Minutes:

Susan moved, and it was seconded by Phil to waive the reading of the April meeting minutes and accept them as written in *The Reporter*. The motion carried unanimously.

### Chairperson Comments:

Rita mentioned that many summer projects are underway. The end product to many of the projects is going to be *change*. The dictionary defines *change* as an act or process in which something becomes different. Most people don't like change. It is important for progress and at times it is uncomfortable. ### Clubhouse

**Fire Safety:** Wayne Fire performed inspection, testing and maintenance of the fire pumps, backflow prevention and testing as well as maintenance of the wet pipe sprinkler system.

**Maintenance:** Carrier performed annual maintenance on the chiller.

**Electrical:** EWI, installed a new data outlet at two columns outside of the theatre entrance.

### Pools

**All Pools:** New signage has been installed at every pool bathhouse shower stall, indicating they are to be used only for rinsing. EWI installed a new motor for the pool pump at Ashby. The main pool pumps at Grantham and Ashby were replaced. Preventative maintenance will be performed mid-May at the Upminster

pool and by the end of May at the Berkshire pool; both will include painting. Preventative maintenance was also performed at the indoor pool.

Rita mentioned that there are more than 16,000 residents in CVE, and they cannot act as individual agents on Recreation and Master Management property. If residents believe a sign is needed on these properties, please contact Recreation or Master Management; you cannot post your own sign.

### Maintenance

A total of 309 work orders were completed in the month of March; 18 remain open.

### Special Projects

**Clubhouse Restroom/First Floor:** Demo is complete. The City of Deerfield and the contractor noticed that a fire rated wall needs to be installed. This wall was on the original building plans, but apparently was never installed; therefore, a change order is being submitted for this installation to be done during the first-floor restroom renovation.

**Parking Lot:** Plans for the paving project are being finalized; this project will take place over the summer.

**Pool Houses:** Renovations for the pool houses at Ventnor and Westbury will begin on July 9. Permits are ready and will be picked up by the contractor this week. The pools will be closed for approximately 12-16 weeks.

**Shuffleboard Canopy Phase 2:** The shuffleboard canopy should be ready in the next 30 days.

**Clubhouse Floors:** Plans for the Clubhouse floors are being finalized; this project will take place over the summer.

### Community Announcements

**Shows:** All shows are being held in the Party Room through November. Tickets are being sold as a general admission ticket.

**Clubhouse Diner:** Cohen's Customer Appreciation Week is being held May 5 through

May 13. They are offering, buy 1 sandwich - get 1 free.

**Dinner on the Town:** A trip to the Coral Square Mall has been scheduled for May 17.

**Cirque Du Soleil:** A bus trip to Cirque Du Soleil is scheduled for July 19; there are a few tickets remaining.

### New Business:

**Security:** Dan Johnson, Executive Director with MM spoke to the residents about the addition of First Responders in the Clubhouse. First Responders will be in the Clubhouse every hour that it is open so that they can respond to emergencies. Dan thanked the MM Board and Kelly for coming up with this program and for the Recreation Board for their stamp of approval. First Responders will be present so that they can respond to incidents and accidents quickly as well as relay information to all incoming fire safety and ambulances. The First Responders will be carrying a Statpack — equipped with medical supplies including an AED.

**Summer Shows:** Fran attended the first three shows and stated that they were very good, and the attendance was wonderful. She asked that all attendees keep their conversations low so that others around you and the performers are not disturbed. Also, please refrain from using your cell phones during the performances, this includes texting or searching the internet; the bright phone screen can be very distracting. Jay stated that similar behavior is occurring during the movies. Rita suggested that we ask the ushers in the theater and Party Room to assist in this area.



### Sidewalks, A Capital Suggestion

On many occasions, I have had the opportunity to walk to and from the Clubhouse after dark from various locations throughout Century Village. Due to the lack of sidewalks adjacent to many of the approach roads to Century Blvd., walkers must walk on the approach roads themselves. According to the National Complete Streets Coalition, "Pedestrian crashes are more than


twice as likely to occur in places without sidewalks; streets with sidewalks on both sides have the fewest crashes." Developments without sidewalks are inherently unsafe and discourage residents from walking.

To make walking in CVE much safer, especially after dark, Master Management should consider installing sidewalks, either poured concrete or asphalt adjacent to the roads in the following areas:



- The road that connects Century Blvd. with Cambridge A, B and C.
- The road that connects Century Blvd. with Cambridge E, F and G.
- The road between Markham A and Markham F.
- The road between Lyndhurst A and Lyndhurst H.
- The road that connects Century Blvd. with Grantham D.
- The road that connects Century Blvd. with Harwood E and D.
- The road that connects Century Blvd. with Ellesmere C.

- All of Newport Drive to the West Drive.
  - The road that connects Century Blvd. with Farnham J.
  - And along any other road or drive that connects with Century Blvd.
- A development such as CVE with an in-season population of 12,000 residents, really needs to emerge from its primitive past and realize that we are living in the year 2018! Housing complexes without safe places to walk are products of the old west and/or the roaring twenties.

**Bus Schedule To the Editor:**  
Seven months have passed since the revision of the East bus schedule, which was instituted without input from the CVE residents. All stops

at Broward North Hospital were eliminated, substituted by stops at Latinos Restaurant. I ride the buses nearly every day and in those seven months there were two riders who utilized the Latinos stop. In addition, there was a new bus route added, on Fridays, which was for bingo at Our Lady of Mercy Church. At that time, I asked if at least a stop could be added going to Broward North Hospital onto the bingo run. The answer was NO. The reason given for the cancellation of that vital run to the hospital was that there were not enough riders to warrant that stop. The CVE residents need and deserve such a stop, for patients, doctor and clinic visits and for the volunteers who used that run to volunteer their time two or three times a week. We were told to either use Uber (\$12 each way) or

use the public transportation (four buses each way). Now is the time to consider changes to the East schedule and return our stops at the hospital.

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




Century Village East has Cohen's Deli, if you want to

## Summer Solstice June 21, 2018

**T**he Summer Solstice or longest day of the year in the Northern Hemisphere will take place at 12:24 a.m. on June 21 in South Florida. The Sun will rise at 6:30 a.m. and

set at 8:15 p.m. giving us 13 hours and 45 minutes of daylight. The Summer Solstice occurs the moment that the Northern Hemisphere of the Earth reaches its maximum

tilt toward the direct rays of the Sun. This is the day when the Sun reaches its highest point in the sky as seen from

the North Pole. In the Southern Hemisphere, June 21 is known as the Winter Solstice.

Many cultures celebrate the Summer Solstice with parades, festivals and music. In Canada, National Aboriginal Day is celebrated on June 21 to recognize the cultures of the First Nations, Inuit and Metis peoples. These are the Indigenous Peoples of Canada. International Surfing Day takes place in the U.S. and throughout the world on June 21.

On the day of the Summer Solstice, the farther north you are situated, the longer the hours of daylight. Here are a few examples of length of day on June 21 in various cities worldwide: Rome = 15h 14min, Paris = 16h 11min, Moscow = 17h 34min, Fairbanks = 21h 49min, New York = 15h 6min, Miami = 13h 45min, Rio = 10h 43min, Cape-town = 9h 54min, Singapore (on the Equator) = 12h 12min.







By Monday morning, one of them is gone.



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## Senior Driving

Know the warning signs of unsafe driving

### Issues with health

Health problems don't always mean that driving needs to be stopped, but they do require extra vigilance, awareness, and willingness to correct them. Some health problems include:

- **Conflicting medications.** Certain medications or combinations of medications can affect senses and reflexes. Always check the label on medications and double check with your healthcare team if you are taking several medications or notice a difference after starting a new medication.

- **Eyesight problems.** Some eye conditions or medications can interfere with your ability to focus your peripheral vision, or cause you to experience extra sensitivity to light, trouble seeing in the dark, or blurred vision. Can you easily see traffic lights and street signs? Or do you find yourself driving closer and closer, slowing by a sign to see it? Can you react appropriately to drivers coming from behind or to the side?

- **Hearing problems.** If your hearing is decreasing, you may not realize you're missing out on important cues to drive safely. Can you hear emergency sirens, or if someone is accelerating next to you, or honking the horn?

- **Problems with reflexes and range of motion.** Can you react quickly enough if you need to brake suddenly or quickly look back? Have you confused the gas and brake pedals? Do you find yourself getting more flustered while driving, or quick to anger? Is it comfortable to look back over your shoulder or does it take extra effort?

- **Problems with memory.** Do you find yourself missing exits that used to be second nature, or find yourself getting lost frequently? While everyone has an occasional lapse, if there's a pattern that is increasing, it's time to get evaluated by a doctor.

### Issues on the road

- **Trouble with the nuts and bolts of driving.** Do you see yourself making sudden lane changes, drifting into other lanes, braking, or accelerating suddenly without reason? How about failing to use the turn signal, or keeping the signal on without changing lanes?

- **Close calls and increased citations.** Red flags include frequent "close calls" (i.e., almost crashing), dents and scrapes on the car or on fences, mailboxes, garage doors, and curbs. Increased traffic tickets or "warnings" by traffic or law enforcement officers.

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## What is Elder Abuse?

Each year hundreds of thousands of older persons are abused, neglected, and exploited. Many victims are people who are older, frail, and vulnerable and cannot help themselves and depend on others to meet their most basic needs. Abusers of older adults are both women and men, and may be family members, friends, or "trusted others."

In general, elder abuse is a term referring to any knowing, intentional, or negligent act by a caregiver or any other person that causes harm or a serious risk of harm to a vulnerable adult. Legislatures in all 50 states have passed some form of elder abuse prevention laws. Laws and definitions of terms vary considerably from one state to another, but broadly defined, abuse may be:

- Physical Abuse - inflicting physical pain or injury on a senior, e.g. slapping, bruising, or restraining by physical or chemical means.
- Sexual Abuse - non-consensual sexual contact of any kind.
- Neglect - the failure by those responsible to provide food, shelter, health care, or protection for a vulnerable elder.
- Exploitation - the illegal taking, misuse, or concealment of funds, property, or assets of a senior for someone else's benefit.
- Emotional Abuse - inflicting mental pain, anguish, or distress on an elder person through verbal or nonverbal acts, e.g. humiliating, intimidating, or threatening.
- Abandonment - desertion of a vulnerable elder by anyone who has assumed the responsibility for care or custody of that person.
- Self-neglect - characterized as the failure of a person to perform essential, self-care tasks and that such failure threatens his/her own health or safety.

## What are the warning signs of elder abuse?

While one sign does not necessarily indicate abuse, some tell-tale signs that there could be a problem are:

- Bruises, pressure marks, broken bones, abrasions, and burns.
- Unexplained withdrawal from normal activities.
- Sudden changes in financial situations may be the result of exploitation.
- Bedsores, unattended medical needs, poor hygiene, and unusual weight loss are indicators of possible neglect.

Most importantly, be alert. **The suffering is often in silence.** If you notice changes in a senior's personality or behavior, you should start to question what is going on.

Remember, it is not your role to verify that abuse is occurring, only to alert others of your suspicions.




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

### 2018 Estimate of Taxable Values

The preliminary 2018 property values will be posted on our website at [www.bcpa.net](http://www.bcpa.net) on June 1. This will be your first opportunity to review your 2018 property value and contact our office if you believe the just value to be inaccurate. Florida law requires our market values be a year in arrears meaning we use the qualified sales of comparable properties from January 1, 2018 back through January 2, 2017 for the 2018 property values. If you purchased your property in 2018, your 2018 purchase price will be used in setting your property's 2019 market value. For questions regarding your residential property, please

call 954.357.6831. Our office will be mailing the 2018 TRIM (proposed tax) Notices to all Broward property owners in mid-August. This notice will show your property's 2018 market value, assessed value, exemptions and proposed tax rates as set by the various taxing authorities.

### Did You Have Homestead Exemption on One Home and Purchase Another?

If you had Homestead Exemption on a property in 2016 or 2017 and have purchased a new permanent residence in Florida, please make sure you have applied for both Homestead Exemption and Portability at your new residence. Portability allows you to transfer the savings you built up by having



Homestead Exemption on any Florida property to another Homesteaded property in Florida. To transfer the Save Our Homes benefit, you must establish a Homestead Exemption at the new home within two years of January 1 of the year you sold or moved from the old homestead (not

two years of the sale or move date). **Note:** A Portability application transfers the savings you have earned, but it does not automatically transfer your Homestead Exemption. You must apply for both Homestead Exemption on your new home and complete a Portability application. The Portability application can be found on our website at [www.bcpa.net/Forms/DR501T2009.pdf](http://www.bcpa.net/Forms/DR501T2009.pdf). For questions regarding Homestead Exemption, Portability or any of the available tax-saving exemptions, please call our Customer Service representatives at 954.357.6830.

*The absolute last deadline to file for all 2018 exemptions is September 18, 2018.*

### Government Imposter and Deceptive Advertisement Act

Companies that sell free government forms or persuade businesses to file unnecessary paperwork have operated in Florida for several years. They target people to convince them to pay unnecessary fees to file or obtain paperwork that is provided for free by agencies, such as the U.S. Department of Labor or the U.S. Department of Education.

The Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services worked with the legislature during Florida's 2018 Legislative Session to help create the Government Imposter and Deceptive Advertisement Act (GIDAA), which prohibits companies from targeting Floridians with mailings, emails or websites without prominent disclaimers stating that the sales materials are not related to any government filing and/or that the information or forms can be obtained free of charge. If forms are being offered, the disclaimer must also include the phone number of the agency that provides these documents

for free. These provisions will be effective July 1, 2018.

Consumers and businesses are requested to report suspected violations to the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services. To file a complaint, visit [FloridaConsumerHelp.com](http://FloridaConsumerHelp.com), or call 1-800-HELP-FLA (435-7352) or 1-800-FL-AYUDA (352-9832) en Español.

**Social Media:** Social media can be an avenue for scams.

A common scheme involves scammers gaining access to an individual's social media account, including their *friends* list. The scammer then messages the *friends* and claims that they have won a huge cash sum in a contest, and after paying a *filing fee*, they can claim their prize. The victim of this scam has their identity stolen while the scammer cashes out.

Consumers can protect themselves from social media scams by keeping the following in mind:

1. If a friend reaches out to you via email or social media with a deal that seems too good to be true, call them directly to see if they really sent the message.
2. Reduce the risk of your

account getting hacked by using complex passwords, never reusing passwords and turning on two-factor authentication for social media accounts when available.

3. If your social media account is hacked, immediately report it to the company.

Identifying a hacked social media account is not always easy. If you suspect that you have become a victim, report it immediately.

#### Travel Scams

Travel-related complaints ranked eighth on the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services' list of consumer complaints. The department regulates sellers of travel, and most are required to register with the department and post a bond that can be used to provide refunds to consumers.

Consumers can take the following steps to avoid travel scams and fraud:

1. **Do Your Homework:** Find out if the seller of travel is registered with FDACS and if any complaints have been filed against them. Utilize the *Business Search* tool at [FloridaConsumerHelp.com](http://FloridaConsumerHelp.com), or call 1-800-HELP-FLA (435-7352).

2. **Use a Credit Card:** When using a credit card, there is an extra layer of protection under the Fair Credit Billing Act. A consumer's personal liability for fraudulent charges on a credit card cannot exceed \$50. Never give credit card or checking account numbers over the telephone unless you initiated the call and are certain of the company's credentials.

3. **Verify Arrangements:** Get the details of your vacation in writing and a copy of the cancellation and refund policies before making a purchase.

4. **Free Doesn't Always Mean Free:** Be skeptical of unsolicited postcards or telephone calls announcing that you have been selected to receive a free vacation. If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is.

5. **Travel Insurance:** Before purchasing travel insurance, verify that the company providing the insurance coverage is licensed in the state of Florida by using the *Licensee Search* at [MyFloridaCFO.com](http://MyFloridaCFO.com).

#### Moving?

With the school year coming to an end, many families will be on the move.

The American Moving and Storage Association reports that May through September is the most popular time of year to relocate.

Florida law requires intrastate moving companies and moving brokers to register with the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services prior to conducting business. Florida requires professional movers to do the following:

- Provide a written estimate covering the total cost of the move.
- Provide a written contract before performing any services.
- Disclose limitation of liability in writing at the time the estimate or contract for services is rendered.
- Accept a minimum of two of the following three forms of payment:
  - Cash, cashier's check, money order, traveler's check;
  - Valid personal check; or
  - Valid credit card.

- **Widow/Widower Exemption:** Bring a copy of your spouse's death certificate, newspaper obituary, or memorial card.
- **Disability/Veteran's Disability Exemption:** Ask us about the filing requirements for these exemptions.
- **Senior/Low-Income Exemption:** Requires at least one owner be 65 as of January 1, 2018. Note: Husband or wife may file on behalf of both. (call for info on required documents)

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# I.D.'s and GUEST PASSES

**BAY MANAGEMENT**

All Owners / Renters **MUST** have an ID to enter the Clubhouse. All guests **MUST** have personal ID on their person at all times. Admittance to the Clubhouse will be denied if the appropriate ID is not available and presented to Security for review.

**Clubhouse Tours**  
All persons wishing to tour the Clubhouse must be accompanied by a CVE resident and the tour should last no longer than one hour. The resident's I.D. must be left with the guard prior to the tour and picked up at completion of tour. If there is a minor coming on the tour, a security guard will need to accompany the party.  
There is a guided tour of the Clubhouse Monday through Friday at 10 a.m. No charge and no age limit. Apply at the tunnel entrance accompanied by a resident with a valid I.D.

**Guests**  
Guest must always be accompanied by CVE resident to the I.D. Office or a letter from the home owner (when not in residence) giving permission to occupy the condo is required, along with the building president's signature and the building seal. Approval form is available at the I.D. and Staff Offices.

**1 Day Pass**..... \$5  
A one (1) day pass can be issued upon entering the Clubhouse by the I.D. Office (if the I.D. Office is closed, the 1 day pass can be obtained at the Staff Information Office).

**\*2-14 Day Passes**..... \$10  
A pass for more than fourteen (14) days is at the discretion of the Board of Directors of your building, no exceptions. Approval form must have the signature of the building president and the building seal.  
**Additional consecutive weeks** ..... \$25

These additional weeks would be considered weeks three (3) and/ or four (4) of the same 29 day period. After 29 days, a guest is considered an occupant and, in terms of Clubhouse use, a background check must be done.  
*\*14 day passes cannot be purchased consecutively. There must be 14 days between your last date on the previous pass and the date in which you are purchasing a new 14 day pass. If purchasing a pass inside the fourteen (14) day period you must purchase an additional week at \$25.*

**Occupant**  
Any individual residing in a unit more than 29 consecutive days is considered an "Occupant." A background check is required for recreational facility use.

**Guest Privileges**  
A guest pass entitles the holder to the use of all facilities, with some limitations.

**Fitness Center:** November 1 through March 31, Guests can only access the Fitness Center after 1 p.m.; April 1 through October 31, guests may use the Fitness Center during the Center's regular hours.

**Show Tickets:** If space is available, Guests exhibiting a guest pass will be able to purchase show tickets; without the guest pass, guests must be accompanied by a resident or tenant. Guest tickets may have a surcharge added to purchase price.

**Classes:** Guests cannot participate in any classes offered by Recreation, including tennis, swimming or aerobics.

**Gate Pass**  
Relatives who are frequent visitors of a CVE resident must show a valid Florida Driver's License or proof of residency within a 50 mile radius, a Gate Pass form signed by the CVE resident and the Building President and affixed with the Building Seal. Gate Passes are renewed on a yearly basis at the management's discretion. Cost is \$25 per year. Gate Pass form is available at the I.D. Office.

**Companion/Nurse/Aide Pass**  
The Companion Pass requires a 30 day Companion Form signed by the resident. The companion form must also have the building president's seal. First time Companion Pass requires a picture I.D. This pass can be renewed every 30 days for a \$5 fee by presenting the completed form, including the president's seal. The Companion Pass only allows entrance to the Village; it does not provide any recreational privileges.

**Car Sticker Regulations**  
**BAR CODE:** When you change cars, you must return your bar code (decal) even if in pieces. Remove your bar code and return to the I.D. Office in order to be issued a new bar code at a charge of \$5. Un-returned bar codes will be replaced at a charge of \$10.

**Renter Pass Requirements**

1. Signed lease: must not be for less than three (3) months.
2. Certificate of Approval with Building Seal.
3. Owner's I.D. turned in to I.D. Office
4. Cost is \$50 per person per year, which includes a bar code.
5. Background check is required.
6. All tenants must register their vehicle with the ID Office.

**When selling your unit**  
All I.D.s, passes and bar codes must be turned in to the I.D. office prior to closing. Every outstanding item will incur a \$25 fee payable at the closing.  
There will be no fee exceptions once a unit has closed - i.e. if an item is found and turned in AFTER the closing there will be no refunds.

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
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

# V-J Day

**V**-J Day or Victory Over Japan Day is remembered throughout the history of the world as the day the Empire of Japan surrendered to the Allies at the end of World War II. The surrender was announced on August 15, 1945. So, August 15 is the official V-J Day in the United Kingdom, while in the United States it is commemorated on the second of September. On September 2, 1945, a formal surrender ceremony took place in Tokyo Bay, Japan on board the battleship USS Missouri.

When the formal announcement of Japan's surrender was made, crowds gathered in Times Square, Montreal, Paris, Shanghai, Sydney and many other places to celebrate. The famous *Life Magazine* photo of a Navy sailor kissing a nurse in Times Square was taken on August 15, 1945

when the surrender was announced. Although September 2 is recognized as V-J Day in the U.S., it is not an official holiday except in the state of Rhode Island and observed there on the second Monday in August.

# Century Village Celebrates Jerusalem Day

Jerusalem Day celebrates the reunification of the City of Jerusalem which occurred during the 1967 Six Day War on the 28<sup>th</sup> of the Jewish month of Iyar. This year that date corresponded to May 13. The reunification of Jerusalem has allowed Jerusalem to flourish. People of all faiths now have access to their holy sites that previously under Jordanian rule they were prohibited to visit. This day is a day of joyous celebration in Israel and world-wide for the Jewish people.

At the Century Village Jerusalem Day Celebration approximately 300 residents were in attendance. Eli Okun served as the Master of Ceremony and set the tone for the Fourth Annual Jerusalem Day Celebration by mentioning the historical importance of the day and that this year the American Embassy was moving to Jerusalem. Richard Rosensweig led the Pledge of Allegiance. The singing *G-d Bless America*, *Hatikva*, and *Jerusalem of Gold* were led by Cantor Gary Sherman (from Temple B'nai Shalom).

Rebbitzen Leah Goldblatt (from Chabad) spoke of *Hearing the Shofar – A Prophecy Being Fulfilled*. Rebbitzen Goldblatt spoke of the 6 Day War with all the foreboding and fear that preceded it worldwide in the Jewish community. But, she said "The Lubavitch Rebbe spoke with optimism stating G-d is protecting the Jews living in

his Holy Land. He is sending them his blessings, success and salvation! Do not be afraid!" And the war turned out to be miracles, one after another. She said that the whole world recognized the hand of G-d in this miraculous war and Jewish people began searching for their heritage. She said that the Rebbe related this to the prophesy of Isaiah of how the Jews will return *one by one*. And that G-d is now holding each one of us by the hand and calling out, "It is time that you finally come back!"

She ended stating that we should inspire those around us, our children and grandchildren, to do something Jewish and that together we can hear the great shofar sounding louder and louder until we can all finally serve Hashem with the coming of Mosiah in Jerusalem.

Rabbi Yisroel Edelman (from Young Israel) spoke of *Jerusalem – City of Dreams*. He spoke of how, for generations, Jews have dreamed for

the return to Jerusalem. And how it has always been the centerpiece of our prayers; at a wedding when we break a glass; or on Passover and Yom Kippur when we say, "Next Year in Jerusalem."

He said, "It has long been a dream that we would all be united in service of the Almighty in the Holy City of Jerusalem. And while for generations it was but a dream, but now we have been blessed that Jerusalem is our capitol, and everyone in the world is free to come there. He said that when one comes to Jerusalem and sees the sun gleaming off the Kotel, it touches our very soul. And just as the real mother would not allow her child to be cut in half by King Solomon, we should not allow Jerusalem to be divided. Also, he commented that tomorrow the American Embassy will officially move to Jerusalem and even though we could have gone to Tel Aviv to the Embassy, it is a very good thing in Jerusalem's world image. He ended with a thought that this serves as a reminder that a united Jerusalem will ultimately bring us peace."

Videos were shown that ranged in a variety of topics - all dealing with Jerusalem.

*The Jewish Peoples Ties to Jerusalem 3000 Years Ago, Today, and Forever* discussed the absurdity of UNESCO denying any connection of the Jewish people to Jerusalem by presenting historical, biblical, and archeological data of the constant link and tie of the Jewish People to Jerusalem for thousands of years.

*Indivisible Jerusalem* dealt with the technical feasibility of dividing Jerusalem - the East for the Arabs and the West for the Jews. The conclusion reached is that it is technically impossible, dangerous, and would go against the will of a majority of the residents - both Arab and Jews to divide the city.

*An Interview with then Israeli Prime Minister Golda Meir* from 1972 made it clear that although, to achieve

peace with the Arabs, everything is negotiable - yet there are certain pieces of territory which Israel is determined to hold on to: Jerusalem, the Golan Heights and Sharm el Sheikh in Sinai. The justification she said is to be found either in past history or in the practical necessity for Israel to have what she terms secure borders.

*Nikki Haley in speaking to the UN Security Council* (on Dec. 8, 2017) explained the US decision to move its' Embassy to Jerusalem stating clearly what the U.S. was and was not doing.

*Israel Defying the Odds* discussed Israel and all of the amazing accomplishments the nation and its people have made in its' 70-year existence.

*Israel 70 the Home of Hope* is an inspirational video by Rabbi Sacks about Israel and

its accomplishments being the nation of HOPE.

The event ended with the singing of *Jerusalem of Gold*.

The Century Village Jerusalem Day Celebration was sponsored by Young Israel of Deerfield Beach, Chabad of Deerfield Beach, and Temple B'nai Shalom. It was organized by Michael Routburg to help bring unity to the Century Village Jewish Community.

Many thanks to Rabbi Edelman and Rebbitzen Goldblatt who spoke; to Eli Okun the Master of Ceremonies; to the volunteers who worked to plan, post flyers, set up, serve, and cleanup; and especially all those who came and participated in the event.



## Ant Invasion – A Natural Approach

Ants are incredible creatures with a wide range of species that are found almost everywhere in the world. They are certainly a model of communal living, with each ant having her own unique job as part of the colony. All worker ants, the ones you may see in your house, are female. Male ants are produced in small numbers and have one mission in life, to mate with a Queen ant, before he dies!

Ants can certainly be an annoyance if they get a foothold in your home. Here in Florida we have a large variety of ants that range in size, they can be tiny (less than 1/16 inch), medium sized (1/16 to 3/8 inch-long), or large (greater than 3/8 inch-long). No matter the size, most people do not like them *visiting* inside their home!

Before you reach for the

convenient commercial can of ant spray, consider this. The National Library of Medicine's Toxicology Data Network reports that exposure to the active ingredients in these sprays can have a long list of negative effects on humans, including irritation to the throat, nose, lungs, and the central nervous system.

Luckily, there are several all-natural strategies that can safely and effectively *invite* the ants to live somewhere else, other than your home!

Here are some Natural Suggestions:

**Lemon juice**- spray openings of drains and bottoms of doors with pure lemon juice-the acid might confuse their sense of tracking.

**Cinnamon** – sprinkle ground cinnamon or cinnamon oil wherever you think ants might be entering the home – you can *paint* it



around doors, windowsills - you can also add in ground cloves to increase the repellent effect.

**Sugar Water and Borax** – leave a bowl in areas where you see ants. The sugar will invite them to ingest it, and borax is toxic to ants.

**Peppermint** - Dr. Bonner's liquid Peppermint soap can be used to wash areas to repel ants. Mix one to one with water in a spray bottle. Spray wherever you think it is needed. You can also use this

soap in the shower for a tingly clean peppermint wake-up!

**Diatomaceous earth** - use food-grade rather than *swimming pool* DE. Simply sprinkle it around edges and corners where you have an ant problem. Don't wet the area since that will stop the diatomaceous earth from being effective.

**Chalk** - ants won't walk over chalk...you can purchase it in a squeeze tube for easy application to help discourage ants.

**Baking soda and powdered sugar** – when ants ingest baking soda it can interfere with an acid in their bodies...they won't eat baking soda, by itself, but mix it with powdered sugar and watch ants disappear within a week.

**Coffee grounds** – gardeners often use coffee grounds to keep pests away from plants. If you place some in ant-invaded areas inside it discourages them from returning.

**Vinegar** – consider using vinegar for all kinds of

household chores, including as a safe cleaning fluid! The vinegar aroma vanishes within an hour or two. It can also be poured directly on garden weeds for a toxic-free weed remover, and works great for getting rid of ants, especially if you know where they are nesting and pour it directly on the area.

There are also many non-toxic commercial ant repellents on the market that are easy to use and effective, which gets rid of the ants, but is not toxic to people and pets.





## Dirty Hands


Dirty hands, glasses splattered, my fingers caked with wet mud

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
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## Tips for Traveling

### Be Practical When Packing

Pack light. For a person traveling with at least some limitation, aim to pack everything necessary in a roll-aboard suitcase plus a medium size over-the-shoulder carry-on. Do not check the roll-aboard as luggage, as in-cabin flight staff will gladly stash it in the overhead rack. Such will save a lot of time at the final destination airport.

All prescription and over-the-counter medications should be placed in a one quart zip lock freezer bag, including also copies of any prescriptions and/or physician statements in the hand carry bag. Do not place the pill combinations separately into a separate plastic box as "the next combined dosage." Such will never get through security. Enclose also any medical appliances such as extra braces or first-aid needs.

If toting gifts to relatives, do not wrap them. Place the items in the roll-aboard luggage.

### Think about Safety, Security and Comfort

There are thieves everywhere and, particularly, in high-traffic travel centers. Don't give the scalawags any opportunity to steal from you.

Women should not carry a purse but, instead, a money belt worn under a blouse or a neat Passage Wallet hidden under their coat by a neck cord. Men should not carry a wallet in his back pocket but, instead, the same Passage Wallet from the neck cord or as a hidden wallet tucked into his pants and secured by a cord to his belt.

For comfort, consider the purchase of a travel pillow, a c-shaped balloon that supports the neck and head when resting aboard transportation.

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
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


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
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

when in some places in Massachusetts, overhead structures were removed because they were unsightly and caused slums below. I've heard of other places, once beautiful, turned into a slum after an overhead structure was built.

But, I find it is the lack of following the directions that brings out a special sense of ownership to the project. I am investing myself more attentively and completely into the building of the item. I develop a closer attachment to the finished product. Perhaps it is the difference between

enjoying just the finished item you are building verses enjoying the finished product and enjoying the process of building it.

More generally stated; it's the difference between getting to the destination and enjoying the ride while getting to the destination. There was a time where car travel across the U.S. (from Chicago to LA) was on Route 66. You saw the sites as you traveled. Not so much today. We move faster to get somewhere, ignoring the in-between. I used to enjoy going out to some area and getting lost. It was fun to see the local scenery trying to find my way back home. Remember, if all else fails you have Garmin or Google Maps to get you safely home, and you have directions to help get the furniture together.

So, whatever you are doing, sometimes turn off the *autopilot* (be it Garmin or furniture assembly directions) and *Enjoy the Ride*.

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
# Cooke's Look at Books

### Great Fortune: The Epic of Rockefeller Center

By Daniel Okrent, Penguin Books, 512 Pages, \$18, Paperback



"I feel all right," said John D. Rockefeller, Jr., one day in 1931, during the planning phase of Rockefeller Center. "But I don't sleep so well. I walk the floor nights, wondering where I'm going to get the money to build these buildings."

The world's richest man was worrying about his bills as if he was a homeowner who had taken on too much mortgage. The severity of the Crash of '29 had left many of New York's wealthiest families destitute, although, even in the bleakest days of the Depression, Rockefeller's income still exceeded \$15 million per year.

But like so many other Americans, Rockefeller had been suckered in by the 20s. At Standard Oil of New Jersey, owned by Rockefeller, annual profits had fallen from a pre-Crash \$100 million to less than \$300,000 – yet Rockefeller had committed to erecting a group of remarkable buildings in the heart of America's largest city in the middle of the Great Depression when the just completed Empire State Building had just opened for business and was struggling to find tenants. During its construction, 56 of its 102 stories were left as raw, unfinished space. If you couldn't find tenants, why bother with walls?


In this eminently readable book, a Pulitzer Prize finalist, with characters worth of a Dickens novel, author Daniel Okrent weaves together

the story of four remarkable individuals who created the majestic suite of buildings that came to dominate the heart of midtown Manhattan and, with it, the heart of the world: billionaire John D. Rockefeller, Jr., his ambitious son, Nelson Rockefeller, real estate genius John R. Todd and visionary skyscraper artist Raymond Hood.

Laughed at and mocked by virtually every real estate expert, how they fought to see their dream of creating a stunning American landmark come true is one riveting story.

### Sense of Occasion

By Harold Prince, Applause Books, 343 Pages, \$29.99



Harold Prince, the creative genius behind such musical theatre behemoths as *Phantom of the Opera*, *West Side Story*, *Cabaret*, *Evita*, *Fiddler on the Roof* and literally dozens of other wildly successful shows introduce his new book with, "From the age of eight, when my parents took me to the Mercury Theatre's production of *Julius Caesar* starring Orson Welles, I knew there was something special about the theatre that could not be duplicated anywhere.

Of course, there was no television then but there were swell movies (not films in those days) and we lived for the radio. Never underestimate how potent radio was, for the simple reason that it invited your imagination. As in live theatre, the audience becomes complicit with live actors. You can't do that in a movie theatre or sitting before a television screen."

In this new book, Prince shares with the reader the highs and lows of his past seventy-plus-year career. Recollections, anecdotes, regrets, surprises, backstage secrets, they're all here – and the story is as exciting and engrossing as any of his shows.

About *A Little Night Music*, the Stephen Sondheim show


that Prince directed, Glynnis John's second-act number, *Send in the Clowns*, arrived ten days before we were to leave for Boston for the opening of pre-Broadway previews. We met in the theatre at eleven that morning, Steve played the song and Glynnis adored it. It remains my favorite version of that song.

In 1958 Prince was invited by the Eisenhower administration to do the first entertainment show that ever played the White House. Prince writes, "While rehearsing, the dancers made a lot of noise. At one point there was a call from upstairs that Mrs. Eisenhower was resting."

Harold Prince's new memoir is a genuine gift for any fan of musical theatre.

### The Future of Humanity

By Michio Kaku, Doubleday, 339 Pages, \$29.92



According to New York University professor Michio Kaku – the acclaimed scientist who co-discovered the string field theory – future generations will have to find another place to live. At some point, this planet Earth we now call home will be unable to support humans as a species.

But the good news is that, by that time, nearby stars will be reached by space-ships traveling on laser beams at near the speed of light discovering new homes for earth-dwelling families. And by that time, Mars will have already been reached and possibly inhabited and scientists will be looking at the moons of space giants, each with their own array of geysers, oceans, canyons and atmospheric lights as potential homes for humans.

Why will those new populations be growing so quickly and so exponentially? Because by harnessing the new science of Biogerontology, scientists will have discovered how to stop the process of aging, gen-

erating generations of people who simply will not die.

According to Kaku, scientists have already found numerous planets orbiting the stars and are close to finding the holy grail of astronomy – a twin of the Earth. He discusses how new technologies such as nano-ships, laser sails and fusion rockets will make interstellar travel possible.

And, as if that is not enough, the author shows us how humans may someday achieve a form of immortality and be able to leave their bodies entirely, sending their consciousness via laser beams to new havens in space.

You are saying, "Impossible!" That's what people said about the horseless carriage, the telephone and the moving picture machine.

### The Flight: Charles Lindbergh's Daring and Immortal 1927 Transatlantic Crossing

By Dan Hampton, William Morrow, 317 Pages, \$28.99



May 20, 1927, 7:50 a.m., Roosevelt Field, Long Island – Charles Lindbergh peered through the open window and down Roosevelt Field's narrow runway, begins Dan Hampton's account of the epic flight which would make one man a worldwide hero. Not that he could see much on this

drizzly Long Island morning.

The tachometer showed thirty revolutions low. That worried him, as did the slight tailwind. Lindbergh had planned a sunrise takeoff into the easterly nighttime wind. But he was late. Now the breeze was from the west, and he had to have the aircraft either moved to the other end of the runway or live with the problem – or possibly die with it, as well.

It was 3,610 miles to Paris and Lindbergh's flight was to be the first to try it nonstop and alone. Crowds had been gathering at the field since midnight and hundreds stood expectantly in the rain to see what, the *New York Times* called, *one of the great dramas of the air*.

Lindbergh, a tall, lanky former mail pilot, had the best maps available and had planned the flight for a year. While others had crossed the Atlantic piecemeal or in airships, he was aware that few believed he, young and unproven, had a chance.

Losing the plane's engine somewhere over the Atlantic was a nasty but persistent worry.

Finally, after getting the plane off the ground, it suddenly dipped back down and slid sickeningly to one side. The next minute the ground began falling away. Then Lindbergh realized he was much too close to clear the wall of trees and telephone wires a thousand feet ahead of him – and it's barely page two!

Author Hampton, himself a decorated Air Force pilot, has created a breathtaking journey of a terrifying adventure that has already claimed six men's lives. No matter how familiar you are with the Lindbergh story, this new, dramatic telling will keep you hanging until the end.





## Stop Lines at Intersections

Many intersections are marked with stop lines to show where you must come to a complete stop. These stop lines help to set you farther back at an intersection to give larger vehicles more turning space. Always stop behind stop lines.

After a complete stop, you must yield the right-of-way to all other traffic and pedestrians at stop signs. Move forward only when the road is clear. At three-way and four-way stops, the first vehicle to stop should move forward first. If two vehicles reach the intersection at the same time, the driver on the left yields to the driver on the right.

Assume that Karl is the chef. This would make Clue 1 Philip's statement a true statement. But Clue 3 Max's statement that he is not the chef would also be a true statement. Since only one clue is true, the assumption that Karl is the chef is wrong.


Assume that Robert is the chef. This would make Clue 1 Philip's statement the true statement. But Clue 4 Robert's statement that he is the chef is then true, but since only one clue can be true, Robert cannot be the chef.

Assume that Philip is the chef. This would make Clue 2 Karl's statement a true statement. But Clue 4 Robert's statement that he is the chef is also true, but since only one clue can be true, Philip cannot be the chef.

Therefore, by process of elimination, Max is the chef.

To confirm this, Clue 1 Philip's statement is false; Clue 3 Max's statement that he is not the chef is also false; Clue 4 Robert's statement that he is the chef is also false, but Clue 2 Karl's statement that Philip or Max is the chef is true.

And there you have it.


