Round the Resort...by Al Robinson

Things have been buzzing around the resort for the past 2 weeks. The weather took a turn for the better (best actually) with temperatures in the high twenties under bright sunny skies. This was mixed with substantial rains, about 3 inches over the past 14 days. The village streets reflect the moisture a little but everything had been so dry that it presents no hardship. The crops and hay lands are doing just great and of course the forest and meadow lands are picture perfect green. It is all so pretty to see. The lake is higher than normal, or at least higher than it has been for the last few years. Of course Tobin Lake does not ever suffer from lack of water as some lakes do. The high water is great for fishing and boating but it increases the bank erosion concerns. At the cottage area, the people have provided considerable rip rap which helps the control a great deal, but the unpopulated shoreline loses many yards of shoreline when high water and high winds combine.

As it has been all year, the cottage market continues to be strong. Doug and Carol-Anne Sanders purchased Marvin and Mary Harder's cottage at 1307 Westview Avenue. Tom and Linda Alberts purchased Ralph Alberts' place at 706 Pine Drive. Construction projects are moving along well. The Arnasons on Birch have their lower levels in place and have their roof on. It is a well planned cottage with a million dollar view of the lake. Ed and Benita Rieger, also on Birch, have their double wide trailer in place and are working to finish it up. It looks just great as well. As expected, with the opening of the filleting plant and the increase in fishing in general, the movement of the facilities passes has shown marked improvement. One of the local businesses has sold over 200 passes at the time of this writing.

Walleye Classic: 28 teams headed out on the dot of 7:00 a.m. on Saturday, July 10. Makes quite a spectacle as each team roars off to get to their special selected spot first. Fishing time was 7:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. July 10 & 11. Each boat was allowed 6 fish per day with none in the "slot" (55 cm - 70 cm for this derby). There were 25-30 fish registered that were over 70 cm and about 200 under the 55 cm bottom of the slot. The teams could only register 2 fish per day that were over 70 cm. The fish were carefully released by the officials committee. They used an aerated recovery tank for those that appeared to be suffering some trauma, and then released them gently into deep water out on the lake. There were 5 teams that shared the \$4,000 prize money. Jeff & Preston Protz of Nipawin topped the list followed by Colin Irving & Darrin Kudelka of Tisdale. Boyd Holmen & Darrin Wouters of Carrot River, Kelly Williams & Don Sahli of Nipawin, Leon Wiebe & Andy Ellingson of Saskatoon. We sold barbecued hot dogs and hamburgers as well as beer at the hall on both days. They were long days, but great fun, and a good addition to village funds as well.

Dust Control: A special thanks to Ken Ratzlaff for instigating the application of calcium chloride on most of Birch Avenue. The work was done by NEDC of Carrot River at the cost of 70 cents/foot. Since it was an "opportunity" situation, there was no time to do a complete canvas of who wanted the application done in front of their cottage. Each cottage owner is responsible to pay for their own section, either by direct payment to NEDC or by sharing with neighbors. No other streets received the application. If you want "dust control", discuss it with your neighbors and then ask NEDC to return. I am sure they will, provided they have a street or two to work on. The summer heat, wind and traffic combine to put up quite a dust cloud on the busier streets.

What's Cooking...by Glenda Bueckert

Creamed New Potatoes: 2-1/2 lbs unpeeled red potatoes (cut into 1-inch) slices; 1 tsp salt, 1 pkg cubed cream cheese (8 oz), 1 cup buttermilk, 1 bunch chopped green onions, 1 tsp dried thyme, 1 tsp dried tarragon, 1/4 tsp pepper, 3 tbsp minced fresh parsley. Cook potatoes until tender. Meanwhile, in another saucepan, combine cream cheese and buttermilk. Cook and stir over medium heat until cheese is melted and mixture is smooth. Remove from heat and add onions, thyme, tarragon and pepper. Drain potatoes and place in a serving bowl. Add cream sauce and toss to coat. Sprinkle with parsley. Yield: 6 servings.

Elephant Stew: 1 elephant, 2 rabbits (optional), salt & pepper. Cut the elephant into small pieces (this should take about 2 months). Add enough brown gravy to cover. Cook over a kerosene stove for about 4 weeks at 365F. This will serve 3,800 people. If more people are expected, add the 2 rabbits – but do this only if necessary. Bird's Eye View...by Pat & Barry Hankewich Hand Feeding.

- 1. Install feeders near your decks or areas where birds can get used to your coming and going.
- Sit about ten feet away from the feeder for 30 minutes a day. Let the birds get used to your presence.
- After three days, move your chair five feet closer to the feeder.
- On the sixth day, sit next to the feeder. The birds will be wary but if you sit still they will eventually feed.
- 5. When you feel that the birds are comfortable with your presence or seven to eight days, put some seed in your hand and hold it near
- After a day or so, remove the feeder and filling your hand with feed, hold it in the location of the removed feeder.
- 7. You may have to maintain this position for up to 30 minutes but you will receive attention from at least one hungry bird or skeptical neighbors!
- 8. After the birds are feeding securely you may replace the feeder and start working back to your deck where you can be more comfortable in their feeding off you hand. Remember to be successful you must feed every day for at least 30 minutes. 9. Gulls are another story!!!
