Berry picking got started this past week. Saskatoons are ready and there are lots of them, although they came in a little later than in past years. Blueberries, raspberries, chokecherries, pincherries and cranberries will all follow in order. Judging from the early appearances, all will have quite heavy crops again this year.

# Village Water Quality

As most of you know, there was a boil water advisory issued July 10. Our water quality is monitored very carefully, both daily and monthly. There is daily testing for chlorine and turbidity levels and regular full laboratory testing once every month. If there is any impairment in the water quality at all, SERM will issue a "Boil Water Advisory". The sampling is so delicate and control is so stringent that any form of even the mildest contaminants are enough to trigger this move. What happens then is that water samples are taken and lab tested in Regina every other day until there are 2 "clear" samples. In this case, the 2 clear samples came soon after the advisory. however sampling and shipping still stretches the time out to at least a week. For example, a sample taken on a Tuesday and couriered to Regina Tuesday is tested Thursday morning. (It has to "rest" in the Regina lab for more than 24 hours.) We get the results Thursday afternoon and, if it is clear, that is step one. A second sample taken on Thursday and couriered to Regina Thursday gets tested Monday morning and we get the results on Monday afternoon. As you can see, even with "clear" samples, a whole week can lapse before SERM will lift the boil water advisory. As can be expected (and accepted), the events at places like Walkerton and Battleford have made everyone super-sensitive to drinking water quality. That is as it should be, but the time it takes to have the all "clear" can make a problem seem more serious then it may have been. As a matter of interest, the only other time there was a boil water advisory

issued was last year immediately after the new system went on stream. It Garbage Dump & Dumpsters

also was of very short duration.

We all need to be very vigilant in maintaining our garbage dump. If we do not, we stand the chance of losing it, which would be very inconvenient and

The plans for maintaining an orderly dump are clear, and signage even tells us where each type of refuse is supposed to go. It is therefore a little frustrating to see building products have been dumped into the "household garbage only" pit and piles of old trees dumped alongside the pit. Even a small amount of time and care could eliminate these actions.

Also, a reminder again about household garbage bagging. It should be bagged in small bags (kitchen catcher size) and then put into regular garbage bags before putting them in the dumpsters. And, of course, NO fish guts (this problem has pretty well been eliminated).

Flubber for Kids: 3/4 cup warm water, 1 cup white glue, few drops of food coloring, 4 tsp Borax, 1-1/3 cup warm water. Mix first 3 ingredients in first bowl. Mix last 2 ingredients in second bowl. Mix first and second bowls together until set. Lift slowly and saueeze out excess water. Store in covered container. Enioy!

Fishing Report...by Darren Opp

The past couple of weeks the fishing and the weather have both co-operated. Since there were very few days that the wind blew the fishermen off the lake, it allowed us all to fish where we wanted to be fishing and not just tucked out of the wind and waves somewhere.

The Big Lake has been awesome for pike. The North Shore, the Flats and Elk Island have been producing excellent numbers of slot fish and over. One group of 5 guys from Minnesota had picture proof of 26 pike caught and released over 40 inches in 4 days fishing the Big Lake. It doesn't get a whole lot better than that! The largest of the 40+ inches was 48 inches, just over 30 lbs. Also, to go along with the 26 over 40 inches they caught and released lots of quality slot fish 10-18 lbs. The few anglers fishing the big water for walleye have still been successful with less numbers, but all quality fish - mostly 3 lbs plus.

The river system has finally turned on. It has been "as good as the river gets". Large numbers of slot fish, many walleye 10-14 lbs and a few reported 15 lbs or more. In addition to a number of big fish, there has also been good numbers of eater size. Grassy Island, New Cabin and White Rock, along with Eagle's Nest and the river mouth between #2 & #3 have all been excellent with the Grassy Island and New Cabin drifts producing more big

The jigging spots are still producing excellent fish (Pemmican, Store Point, Hump, Prudens). Lots of small fish to keep everyone entertained, plus many slot fish as well.

Looking forward to the long weekend. Back to some consistent weather and continued good fishing. We get sort of spoiled fishing Tobin Lake. People travel from all over the country to try and catch a 10-lb walleye or an 18-lb pike. Yet to most that fish a lot here, these are nice fish but not what we are looking for. After years of fishing this lake, we are looking for the 15+ lb walleye and the 25+ lb pike. Yes, we are a bit

Insert the beer can into the body cavity of the chicken and spread out the legs to form a tripod. Tuck wing tips behind chicken's back. Cook about 1-1/2 hours
