School Hosts Workshop For Student Journalists

A press conference with Representative Richard D. McCarthy (D-39th) headlined the Fall Newspaper Workshop, held here Saturday, Sept. 30, Oct. 7, and Oct. 14.

Co-sponsored by Cardinal Dougherty High School and Sigma Delta Chi, Buffalo Chapter of the national professional journalism fraternity, the course gave students introduction to journalism fundamentals.

The conference, held Sept. 30, gave the junior journalists opportunity for practical newspaper writing. Grilled by students, on Vietnam issues, Mr. McCarthy provided material for news, feature and editorial writing assignments.

The stories were assigned by the workshop instructors, mem-

bers of Sigma Delta Chi from The Buffalo Evening News, Buffalo Courier-Express, Magnificent and the Niagara Falls Gazette. The men taught their specialty. They corrected and critiqued the written assignments and returned them to the reporters on Oct. 14. Discussion of common errors followed.

Photographers and sports writers attended classes in their fields.

Newspaper page design and copy editing instructors posed typical newspaper problems for their students.

Newspaper faculty advisors held discussions with Mr. Millard Browne, Buffalo Evening News editorial page editor and Mr. Paul Wardlowe.

One hundred ten students from 18 area Catholic schools attended.

The new library, part of a \$100,000 wing, officially opened last week. The library will be a major factor in education at Dougherty.

Rev. James Burson, school librarian, stated that he hopes to make it a model library for the diocese. Improved audio-visual, periodical reserve and reference sections make this goal possible.

Audio-Visual Section

In the audio-visual section, a new amplifier and record player were added to the tune of \$300. New study carrels with earphone attachments were purchased. Plans are in the making to enclose the entire audio-visual center in a single case.

Reference

A collection of current magazines, both bound and unbound plus newspapers are available to students for research purposes. A new magazine and newspaper rack have been added. All back issues of magazines are shelved in a horseshoe shaped area.

Study carrels provide researching students with privacy.

The reference collection will be open shelf. The library has purchased new editions of encyclopedias and other reference works.

New Volumes

There are over 1000 new volumes in the enlarged library.

Mr. J. Ormand Phelan donated 100 books over the summer. Through the Elementary Secondary Education Act—Title II, 800 books were added.

The Cardinal Dougherty Mothers' Club plans to donate \$1000 to the library this year.

Part of the library is a Student-Faculty Conference Room. The room will house small meetings and conferences. Teachers' magazines and curriculum materials will be available there.

The first visitors to the library were librarians of 35 schools here for Teachers Insti-

tute sessions. They heard Mr. Frank Stevens, state superintendent of school libraries in charge of ESEA-Title II, speak on the government book loan program.

Dougherty faculty participated in an orientation session and guided tour last Wednesday.

Students will be required to come to the library before school to obtain a special pass to the library. With the special library pass the student will be admitted to the library during the day.

The library is staffed by Father Burson and 40 student librarians.

Alumnus Gets SUNYAB Post

James DeSantis, Dougherty class of '62, has been appointed director of the office of Radio-Television Programming Liaison for State University at Buffalo by College President Martin Myerson.

Mr. DeSantis, who has been acting director of that office since June, is in charge of producing radio and television shows about SUNYAB, its personalities and events. He is a former staff announcer for the Niagara Frontier Broadcasting Corporation. He was the producer of "Campus Profiles" for WADV-FM (Buffalo) where he has been a staff announcer for the past four years.

Mr. DeSantis graduated from Dougherty with his school activities showing what could be expected of him in the future. He was an officer of Sodality, first Forensic Society president, and a member of the now defunct school band.

Mr. DeSantis is still active at his Alma Mater. He has been president of the Dougherty Alumni Club for the past two years. At the Tenth Anniversary Dinner held in April he was master of ceremonies.

McCarthy Airs His Views

PC School Drive Starting

The Student Council of Cardinal Dougherty High School is planning to participate in the Peace Corps' School Partnership Program.

This program is an experiment to encourage self-help and is designed to break the cycle of ignorance and poverty that hinders the development of most of Latin America.

There is no set location in the world where these schools are built. They can be in the rain forests of Brazil or the moun-

tainous slopes of Peru. Under this program the schools collect \$1000 for the building of a school participating in Latin or South America. This money is used directly for the materials but not for the labor or construction plans. The community must also guarantee that a teacher will be provided after completion.

The Student Council feels that answering the Peace Corps call for assistance they are doing a worthwhile project. Efforts to raise necessary money are still in the planning stage but soon will be completed.

Listen to radio commercials. They impress. A store impresses its integrity upon you. Banks impress you with their friendliness, availability.

You've heard the commercials, pal. We're right around the corner, celebrating 100 years of service (19) and wish to thank you for your patronage. Shop at our joint, borrow our money (whatever the case may be). You'll be impressed. You'll be glad you did.

Today's teen-agers have money. As a result they are the target of extravagant advertising campaigns designed to convince that they are your store, your kind of bank. In fact, you may get the impression that they are doing you a favor. Real nice people, these.

This reporter traiked downtown last week to sell patrons. I started at The Buffalo Evening News. They had bought a \$20 patron. Encouraging, I was just late.

Farther down Main, I was informed that "It is not our policy to advertise in yearbooks." Well, what's one big "100 years of service" department store, anyway?

At a bank: Wedding through thick carpet and past two secretaries. I was told "It is not our policy, etc."

And even down to the Courier-Express. They bought one—from someone else—but they bought one.

Is this all our merchants and bankers care about us, our school. Did they build their buildings to impress us, to sell us their goods, make profits on our money and the money of the other countless Buffalo teens.

"If we bought one from you, we'd have to buy one from everyone." So they didn't buy anything. Would \$20 to 50 schools break a bank?

The patron returns are coming in. The small businessmen, the florist, service station owner, and bakery can afford \$1, \$20. The banks can't, the department stores have their policies. They can't afford teen-agers' goodwill.

Teen-agers don't count. Only their money does.

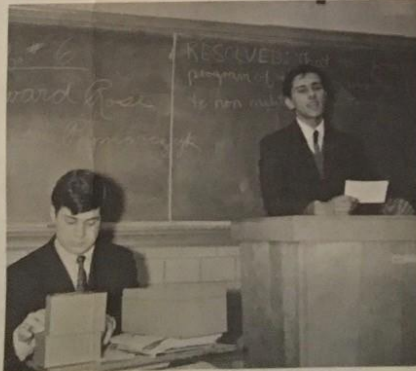

Mark Reyerson Breaks CC Course Record

A rugged schedule including fifty miles of roadwork weekly paid off for Dougherty's Mark Reyerson Monday, October 16, as he broke the Magr. Martin Catholic Assn. 2.5 mile cross country record with a time of 12:30.3. He cracked the standard before it was set only four days before by Bill Speck of DeSales at a time of 12:32.3.

Before the meet Mark appeared optimistic about breaking the mark but after the race he said that he thought that he had very little chance once he passed the 1.5 mile point in 7:40.

Mark has been running for three years. In his sophomore year he started on the JV for two weeks but his fine times merited

a chance to finish the season on the Varsity. Finish he did in second place among the school's best.

Last year, he won eight out of nine cross-country races in the regular season and finished second in the All-Catholics. To add to his running feats, he was undefeated in track in the mile and the two mile, and he won the All-Catholic honors in the two mile. He was the only Cardinal athlete to win All-Catholic in two sports, track and cross-country, and he was only a junior.

He is a "B" student and a proctor for two years.

He looks forward to bigger and better things as colleges are beginning to correspond with him. And the whole track season is yet to come.

Breaks Decide Games For Dougherty Gridders

Dougherty 6—Timon 13
Despite the fine running displayed by Greg Ritting and Leo Amigone, Dougherty lost its first game Sept. 15 to the Timon Tigers, 12-6. Throughout the game, penalties marred a fine attack and stopped the Cards short of scoring.

The lone TD was made by Leo Amigone from the seven yard line. It was set up a seventy-five yard run by Greg Ritting. George Bandle played a fine game at halfback. Victor Vacanti, in his first varsity game, excelled on defense, along with Ted Maiers and Rich Ziarkowski.

Dougherty 25—O'Hara 12
Sunday, Sept. 24, Leo Amigone and Greg Ritting turned in great efforts for the Cards as they defeated the O'Hara Hawks 25-12. They each had two touchdowns, with Ritting gaining 167 yards and Amigone 100 yards. John Valvo threw one touchdown pass to Amigone from the 16-yard line.

The defense played a crucial part in the game. They intercepted four passes. One was returned forty yards by George Franczak. Ingrand, Maiers and Ziarkowski turned in fine jobs on the line.

Dougherty 40—Ryan 6
The powerful Dougherty offense exploded against the Ryan Rams on October 1. Continual offensive drives by the Cards stacked up 40 points. Greg Ritting and Leo Amigone led the offensive charge scoring 3 and 2 touchdowns, respectively. Sophomore Mike Mooney contributed with an 87 yard scoring sprint. Meanwhile the defense, playing as a well organized unit, held the Rams to

only 6 points. The game ended with the Cards scoring the most points in their history 40-6.

Dougherty 13—Turner 14
The second loss of the season was handed to the Cards as Turner triumphed, 14-13. At the end of the first half, the score was 13-0 in favor of Dougherty. Turner's first touchdown was scored by their defense. This happened when a pass from John Valvo to George Bandle was dropped. As the ball lay on the ground, a Turner ballplayer picked it up and ran all the way for the score. The referee ruled that the pass was a lateral, and that therefore it would count.

Turner made the extra point. They scored again on a sweep of the right side. The run for the extra point was good. The game

ended with Turner on their own 45 yard line, after an unsuccessful series of plays by Dougherty.

St. Joe's 7—Dougherty 0
On October 15, Dougherty and St. Joe's, two evenly matched teams met on Dougherty Field. Once again breaks decided the contest and they turned in St. Joe's favor. Punting from his own goal line, Leo Amigone's punt was run back to the Dougherty 30 yard line. From there St. Joe's marched in to score.

The Cards threatened to score late in the fourth quarter, only to have the drive thwarted when a Valvo pass was intercepted. The Cards have now had 1, 6, and 7 point setbacks, giving them a 2 win, 3 loss record.

Results of the Canisius game were not available at press time.
