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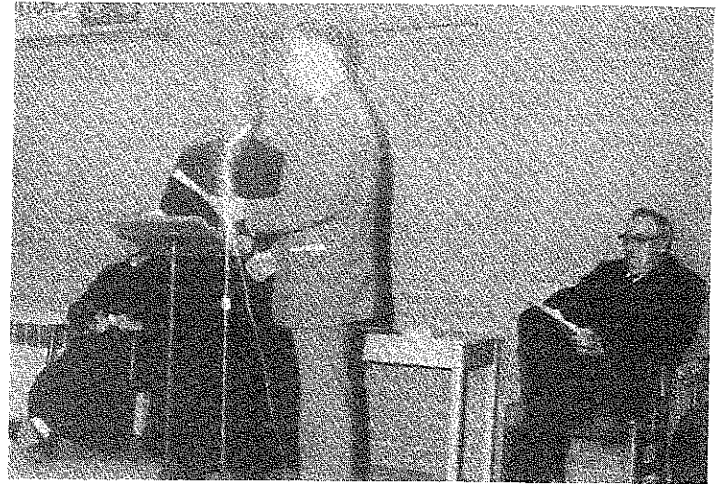

GRADUATION 1964

On Sat. June 20, 1964, the fourth senior class of Cardinal Dougherty High School will hold its graduation exercises at Kleinhans Music Hall. The program is scheduled to begin at 8:00 p.m. The ceremonies will commence as the seniors walk down the aisles to the tune of "Pomp and Circumstance" played by Michael Styn, a junior at Dougherty. Monsignor Hammerl will be the guest speaker. Other speakers will be the Class Valedictorian, Joseph Zirnheld; the Class Salutatorian, Gregory Dudek; and our Principal, Father Poirier. The diplomas will be handed out by the Principal and then Msgr. Hammerl will present the main awards which are: The Cardinal Dougherty Award, for the first in general excellence; The Father Cottreau Award, for the highest in the four year average; The Eudist Provincial for the

second in general excellence; and the William Burke Award for the second highest four year average. The Class Valedictorian and Salutatorian usually receive the Cardinal Dougherty Award and the Eudist Provincial Award, respectively. These are the highest awards that a student at Cardinal Dougherty can ever hope to attain. The Father Cottreau Award, given in memory of Father Edward Cottreau, the second Principal of Dougherty, is based on the combined four year average of the student. The William Burke Award is given in memory of William Burke, a member of our first Freshman Class, who died two years ago, to the student with the second highest four year average. Also awards will be given to the Senior who has the highest average in each individual subject such as English, Religion, and History.



Charter Members Inducted Into National Honor Society

On June 2, 1964, the induction ceremonies for the John Eudes Chapter of the

National Honor Society was held at Cardinal Dougherty. The members inducted must have a four year average of at least 85%. The President of our school's charter is Tom Faber, a senior. Mr. J. Ormande Phelan was the Chairman in charge of the ceremonies of the induction.

To start the proceedings, the invocation was given by Fr. Cleophas D'Eon, our school's Guidance Counselor. Then, the Assembly took part in a salute to the Flag and the Star Spangled Banner. Immediately after this, the presentation of the charter and of the members was made by Fr. Louis Cyr and Mr. Assad, respectively. Then the members took the National Honor Society Pledge. Fr. Marcel Poirier, our Principal, next presented the pins and awards to the members.

Fr. Poirier received a membership pin making him Dougherty's first Honorary Member of our N.H.S. Tom Faber, as president, spoke, followed by Fr. Poirier who then commented on the National Honor Society. The ceremonies were concluded with a closing prayer led by Fr. D'Eon.

Immediately after the induction ceremonies, a reception was held in the school cafeteria for the members, their parents and the members of the school faculty.

CONVENTUM DAY



On Mon. June 1, 1964, our senior class held its Senior Class Day Program. This year, with the idea of setting a precedent, instead of "bumming around" in old clothes, etc., they formed and held, under the direction of the principal and Fr. D'Eon, a special "Conventum Day."

The Conventum '64-'74 is a special organization formed within the Alumni Association, consisting of the members of the

class of 1964 headed by three special officers. The Conventum '64-'74, through its officers, is pledged to meet at Dougherty in ten years.

The Seniors met at 10:15 Mon. morning and assisted at a special Mass. After the Mass Fr. Poirier, our Principal, spoke, and the Conventum officers were elected. A President, Vice-President, and Secretary-Treasurer were elected, but

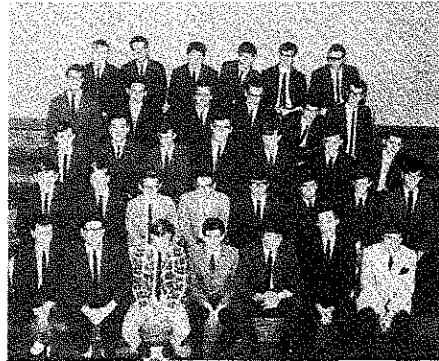

School Life In Cuba

Cardinal Dougherty is privileged to have in its senior class a young man from Havana, Cuba, José Pelaez, who sought safety in the United States. Following his sister, he arrived here two years ago. When asked recently for a comparison between the Cuban and American education systems, José replied that subjects are a lot harder in Cuba, especially the Social Sciences and the languages.

There are seven years of grammar school but there are five years of high school, in which as many as seven or eight subjects may be taken each year. The school system has three types of schools: Catholic, Public, and Private, which may be attended regardless of religion or race. School hours are from 8:30-11:15 and from 2:00-5:00. Cuba's high school system is further divided into three classes: Business, Vocational and Academic.

In these schools, each student must study one language. English is an essential in the first three years and French is given during the last year. Catholic priests and nuns teach, but the priests teach only the boys, and the nuns teach only the girls. Very often, the grammar and high schools are in the same schools. José tells us that the math is more difficult here, but the most difficult obstacle for him is the language barrier. He reports that there is not much interest in sports except for baseball, but

it is due to the fact that the students spend most of their time studying since a lot more homework is required. José says that he came to Buffalo because he thought that it offered more opportunities for schooling and for work.

CLASS OF '68 SCHOLARSHIPS

For the first time in the history of Dougherty, five scholarships were awarded to the incoming Dougherty freshmen. The winners of these awards were decided by an entrance examination taken by two-hundred and fifteen students during last Feb.

Four of the five scholarships were donated by the Mother's Club while the fifth was given by the Dougherty Student Council.

The *Debating Society*, moderated by Fr. Ruddle, is currently conducting its annual intramural debate tournament. As of our press date we find two teams undefeated and going into the final round, these being Freshmen C and Sophomore A.

In Varsity Debating, our varsity debate team qualified for, and attended the N.Y. State Finals Apr. 10 and 11 at Albany, through its participation in the Regional Tournament held in Rochester Mar. 20-21. The season's leading varsity team has been Dave George and Mike Styn. In the overall record for Dougherty's varsity teams this year, we have done fairly well winning 25 out of approximately 50 debates.

In the Diocesan League Finals, held at Canisius H.S. May 21-22, Dougherty won 4 and lost 2 debates tying for second place but received fourth place on the basis of speaker points. All in all it has been a full and fairly good season for our young debaters.

ALUMNI BALL

The Alumni Association of Cardinal Dougherty High School has recently announced plans to hold its first annual Alumni Ball.

Thomas Cook '62 has been made general chairman. Plans are definite but the Alumni Ball committee is planning to hold it away from school at the end of June or during the summer.

Teenage Book Club

Dougherty's Freshmen are proof that students can and do enjoy good reading. Through membership in the Teenage Book Club, these students have purchased and read over a total of 1100 paperback books during the course of the school year.

Fr. Beaton, the teacher sponsoring the club, described the Teenage Book Club as an unequal plan that enables students to buy each month at low cost a wide range of paperback books, professionally selected by educators.

John Hochreiter, the secretary of the club, orders books, keeps records and fills student orders.

What books do these students pick? Offered a choice of *Dennis the Menace* and *Elephant Jokes*, they more often chose literary classics such as *Kidnapped*, *Ben Hur*, *The Christmas Carol* or reference books such as dictionaries and *Roget's Thesaurus*.

Students are not compelled to buy these books; they purchase them only because of their sole enjoyment of books and to increase their own personal libraries.

PARENTS' NIGHT WINNERS

On May 7, 1964, Msgr. David P. Herlihy, Pastor of Coronation Church, Mrs. E. Panczkiewicz, and Mr. Walter Martin acted as judges for Cardinal Dougherty's Second Annual Parents' Night.

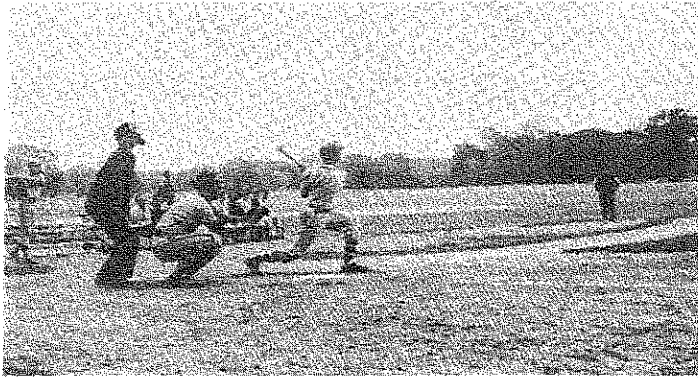

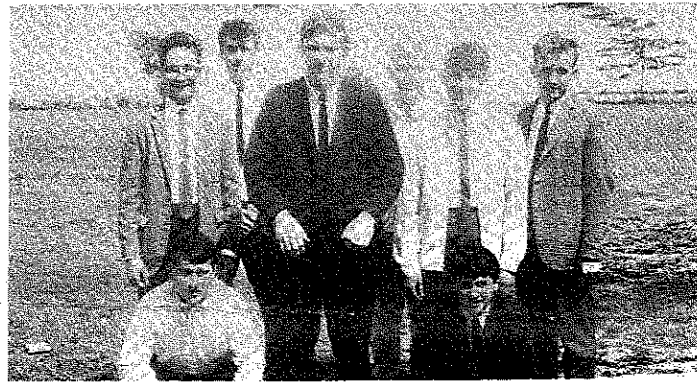
WITHIN THESE WALLS

DOUGHERTY'S TRACKMEN DEFEAT RYAN, 50 - 41 FALLON, 66 - 25

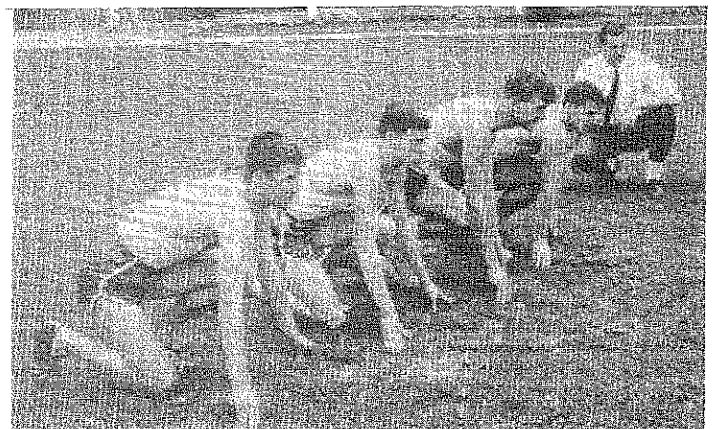
As of our press date May 26, our track team, under the direction of Mr. Hersey and Fr. Townsend, has won two decisive victories, defeating Ryan 50-41 and Fallon 66-25. In all their meets this year, our trackmen, greatly improved over last year, have had first place wins in the majority of events. Besides the hard work of the team in general, this factor can be attributed to the outstanding members of this year's team.

So far this year our 880 relay team composed of Jim MacDonald, George Gillmeister, Tom Donahue, and Dick Reddein is undefeated and has set a school record of 1:36.2 minutes. Our mile relay team, Ralph Rizzetello, Norm Daley, Tom Kager and Tony Petrosky, has won five times out of six meets.

Mike Logue has also set a school record, throwing the discus 150 feet. In the 880 Dave Mazur took three "firsts." Bill Janiga, running in the mile, has placed first four out of six meets. Tom Madej has also taken four first places in the broad jump event.

On May 23 at Aquinas Field in Rochester, our 880 relay team came in third and our mile relay team came in fourth, both out of over 25 participating schools.

Our team was well represented at both the All Catholic Trials, Jun. 3, and the All Catholic Meet, Jun. 6, but final results were not available in time to make our press date.



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
