A DISTINGUISHED VISITOR

Cardinal Dougherty has had once again this year the privilege of a visit by the Very Reverend Edward Boudreault, C.J.M., provincial superior of the Eudist Fathers. Father Boudreault was here for his annual canonical visitation of the community, at the conclusion of which he was received by the faculty and students at a special assembly.

After a brief introduction by our principal, Fr. Boudreault spoke stirringly and convincingly of the progress made by the school within the few short years of its existence, and of the supreme sacrifice made by Father Cottreau. He then dealt with the challenge confronted particularly by youth in Catholic schools. Just back from business in Venezuela where the Eudists have several minor and major seminaries, Father spoke of the awakening of South American youth, their obligation to make a choice between Marxism and Catholicism. A new challenge faces them and faces us: Communism. "You must make a choice: pick up the gauntlet and fight in the most effective manner possible, namely, by becoming better, more militant and more informed Catholics."

Father Roussel. The name is heard a hundred times a day: in class, in the office, on the PA system, on the telephone. "We'd like to know more about him. Why not make him the subject of our feature article in the next edition of *Cardogram*?" "Excellent idea, and we'll get a good picture to go along with the write-up."

Father Joseph Armand Roussel, C.J.M., comes from a small town known as Petit-Rocher, in the province of New Brunswick, Canada. After the usual seven years in the local elementary school, there, he entered the combined high school-college, now known as Sacred Heart University, at Bathurst, N.B., directed by the Eudist Fathers. From here he graduated in 1933 and entered the novitiate of the Eudist Fathers in Quebec, P.Q. in September of the same year. While in the

Theology was ordained a priest on May 19, 1940. Eight other young men became priests on that day, among others, the late Father E. Cottreau, C.J.M., his immediate predecessor as principal of Cardinal Dougherty.

In 1941, Fr. Roussel was appointed professor of biology and chemistry at the university from which he graduated, and remained in this position until 1950. He then became assistant pastor in Baie Comeau, a parish in a recently created diocese formerly staffed exclusively by Eudist Fathers and a Eudist bishop. One year later he was appointed bursar and professor of theology at Holy Heart Seminary in Halifax, Nova Scotia, a major seminary owned and directed by the Eudist Fathers. Two years after, he became chaplain to the Mother House and Novitiate of the

professor at Holy Heart Seminary. In September, 1958, he was appointed superior of the Eudists' Holy Studies in Hyattsville, Maryland, just a few miles from the Catholic University of America.

September 29, 1961, brought Fr. Roussel to Buffalo as principal of Cardinal Dougherty and reappointed superior of the Eudist Fathers staff of the school since its inception in 1957.

During his long and varied career, Fr. Roussel has had extensive experience in all kinds of movements: Boy Scouts, Scouts, Glee Club and C groups, symphonic music, dances, and photography. While assistant pastor at Baie Comeau in charge of several remote camps under the jurisdiction of the parish. During his stay in Baie Comeau, as a missionary, he preached in practically every state of the Union, with the exception of Alaska and Hawaii.

DEATH STRIKES FOR SECOND TIME

The Angel of Death visited the students of Cardinal Dougherty the second time in four years when William "Bill" Burke, '62, Nov. 12, 1961. Bill passed away after more than two and on years of illness, part of which was spent in hospitals, notably St. Joseph's and Park.

He enrolled here with the class in September of 1957 and was forced to discontinue his studies towards the end of his high school year because of serious illness.

While in the hospitals during the last years of his life and still able to get around, even after the amputation of one leg, Bill was a model of good cheer, optimism and confidence in God. The gratitude shown by his strikingly Christian attitude towards life and death will only be known by those who had the privilege of knowing him especially during the last year of his life.

We feel sure that Bill is another protector for us in heaven and that his untimely death has been transformed into many blessings.
