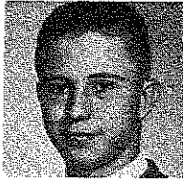

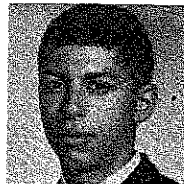

Added felicitations to Greg Dudek who was given a partial scholarship to Canisius College.

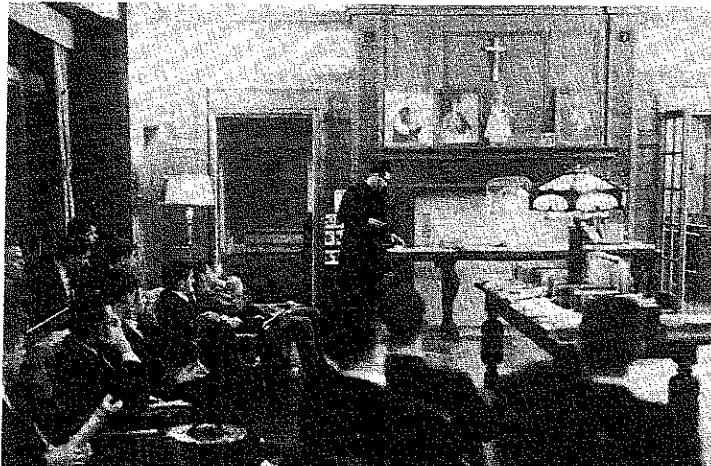
Seniors Attend Closed Retreat At Derby, N. Y.

After Holy Mass, Breakfast

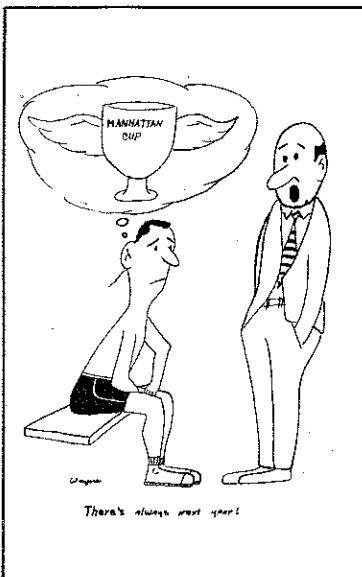

Varsity Bowling Team Places 2nd In League

After losing two games to O'Hara on Mar. 5, the varsity bowling team took two away from Canisius on the last day of competition, Thu. Mar. 12, giving our keglers a won 30, lost 15 game record. The team, coached by Mr. Strasser, finished one game out of first, and is tied for second place in the league with Ryan.

Two of the seniors on our team have the top averages of the starting bowlers, Eddie Kwasniewski had a season average of 178 and Joe Leiser's was 174. Jim Thomas, also a senior had an average of 167, and the juniors on the starting five, Joe Savattieri and Tom Syroczyński had season averages of 169 and 168 respectively. Of our other varsity keglers, John Cierlicki had an average of 177 and John Domin's was 154 although they both did not bowl enough games during the season to be compared to the five starters.

Our varsity bowling team, though one of our youngest sports teams has done the best of all the varsity sports so far this school year.

Within These Walls

In intramural basketball, Senior C beat Senior B, 34 - 20, to win the senior crown with 2 wins and 1 loss. Paul Briandi had 10 points to lead in the scoring.

Junior A was victorious over Junior D as they staged a late rally to come from behind and win, 24 - 14, John Darowz and Ken Malinowski scored 8 points apiece. As of Mar. 16, the junior crown was divided among Junior A, Junior B-1, and Junior C-1 Teams.

Sophomore B beat Sophomore C-1, 32-28, with Tom Scherer getting 10 points for the winners and John Gullo 10 points for the losers. Soph. B has the sophomore crown with four straight victories.

In intramural bowling which finished, Fri., Mar. 13, Sr. A-1 came out on top. Frank Valenti had the high average, 181, the 1st (250), 3rd (233) and 4th (217) high games, and the first four high 3 - game sets of 616, 604, 600, and 597. Al Sasiadek had the second highest average of 164, and Dave Godzisz and Bob Yenalaitus had the third highest averages of 157 each.

Frosh Basketball

The Freshman Basketball team closed its season with a loss to Canisius, which gives them a season's record of six wins and twelve defeats. The top scorers of the Frosh team are: Joe Provenzano, who had a season average of 11.9 points per game, Dave Harter, averaging 6.2 points per game and George Fazzolari, 6 points per game.

Lack of height was a contributing factor to the overall season, but the Card-O-Gram congratulates Coach Donahue and his team on their fine efforts through out the season.

Mr. Hersey will coach Varsity Track, Fr. Townsend, Frosh Track and Mr. Gomlak will coach Tennis.

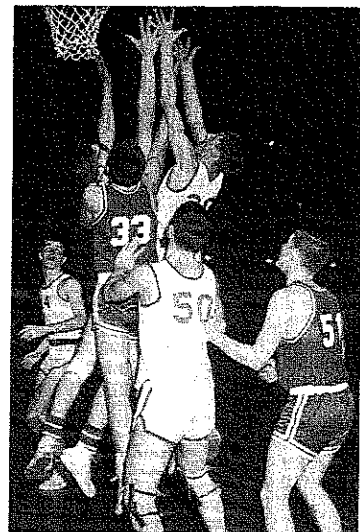
Seniors Dave Saunders and Dave Mazur playing their last game for Dougherty, go for rebound with Tony Masiello and Jon Heinemann.

Cards Lose To Duffy In Close Playoff Game

Duffy, playing around its defense, opened quickly, building a lead of 8 - 0. After many strenuous tries, Tony Masiello finally put Dougherty on the score board for the first time, at the four minute mark. However, Duffy led at the end of the first period 14 - 6.

Dougherty managed to "stick in there" and trailed 21 - 14 at halftime. With both teams continuing to trade baskets, Duffy built up a 28 - 19 lead, but Cardinal fans could "almost feel" a comeback in the making. The Cards opened strong in the fourth period trining the gap to six with Tony Masiello leading the way.

However all seemed lost, when Duffy ripped to an eleven point lead, but Tony Masiello and Dave



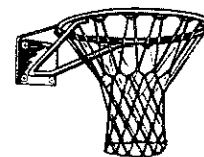
Mazur hit on successive baskets to cut the margin to seven. The Rapideers boosted the lead to ten, when Dougherty attempted a last desperate surge. Tony Masiello sank two free throws and a field goal, cutting Duffy's lead to 38 - 32. Saunders scored twice, the second coming with three seconds left. Duffy prevailed however, winning 38-36, as time ran out on the Cards. Dougherty was paced by Tony Masiello with 15 points, Dave Saunders with 8 points and Jon Heinemann with 6, Lou Giardina had 4 and Dave Mazur, 3 to complete the scoring.

Cards Tie For Third, With 13 Won - 5 Lost Record

On Mar. 1, our Dougherty "Cardinals" finished the season with a 62-49 victory over Neumann. Again Dave Saunders and Tony Masiello were the top scorers for Dougherty, Dave getting 22 and Tony 15 points. In this game Seniors Dave Saunders and Dave Mazur made their final appearance on their home court.

On Feb. 23, Dave Saunders set a school record with 31 points against Turner. During the season the Cards produced two big victories over Canisius and ended the season on a four game winning streak. In league competition the Cards had a WON 13 - LOST 5, game record and tied for third place position with Canisius.

Dougherty has great potential for next year in the Juniors and Sophomores of this year's team.



J.V. Basketball

The Junior Varsity "Cards" finished their season with a great victory over Neumann giving them a won-lost record of 7 wins and 11 losses. During the season the J.
