FATHER BILL NAMED ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL

New Teachers


Two new faculty members will also be joining the Dougherty family for the coming school year. Mr. Thomas Galas will be teaching business courses and Mr. Joseph Vendetti will teach in the Science Department.

Two teaching reassignments will also effect long time staff members at Cardinal Dougherty High School. Mr. Bob Pacholski, who has taught I.P.S. for six years, will be teaching Biology and Mr. Ed Nowicki, in addition to his English IV duties, will teach two classes of European Studies.

Closer Ties

Father Rowland, the first Dougherty student to become a Eudist priest, graduated from St. John Vianney Seminary in East Aurora, N. Y. He came to teach Religious Studies at his Alma Mater in 1970.

Since that time he has also acted as Frosh-Sophomore Guidance Counselor,

Director of Alumni Activities, a member of the school's Admissions Committee and been the very successful coach of the Frosh Cross Country team.

U.B. Grads

Dougherty's two new teachers are both grads of the State University of New York at Buffalo. Mr. Galas recently graduated from U.B. while Mr. Vendetti received his initial degree in 1965.

Mr. Galas will be teaching Bookkeeping, Typing, Consumer Education and Business Law. Mr. Vendetti will teach all the frosh I.P.S. and Physics to the seniors.

Departures

The school year will also be marked by the departure of some teachers who have long been part of the Dougherty scene.

Father Godbout, who taught Biology, served as Guidance Counselor and Assis-

tant Principal here, has left to go on to further studies.

He will be studying pastoral counseling at the University of Ottawa. Father Godbout also served for many years as the Superior of the Eudist Community in Buffalo.

Father Girard Rioux, who introduced many Dougherty students to the French language, has also been reassigned.

Father Rioux, who served also as second assistant principal here, will be doing pastoral work in the Diocese of Lafayette in Louisiana.

Mr. Francis X. Daumen, last year's senior Social Studies teacher and Varsity basketball coach, has returned to teach junior high school at Gateway Academy.

Mr. Rich Regula, who spent many years at Dougherty teaching Biology and Earth Science, will be teaching at Hopevale Academy in Hamburg, N. Y.

Mr. Regula also served as moderator of the Media Club, Asst. Track Coach and Varsity Wrestling Coach.

Another person departing is a long tenured Dougherty teacher, Mr. Gerald Gaudy, who was promoted to the position of Assistant Principal of DeSales High School in Lockport, New York.

Mr. Gaudy, not only taught the business courses, but also served as Director of Driver Education, and was moderator of the very successful Christmas Basket Drive.

Dougherty's cross country team will seek its eighth consecutive winning season this year when it opens a five meet league slate October 1st against Fallon and Duffy at the Delaware Lake Course.

The Cards, once again coached by Bob Pacholski, will be faced with replacing graduating Dom Secchiaroli, John Ryerson, Robbie Rath and Larry King, who made up four of the top seven on a squad which capped third in the All Catholics.

Coach Pacholski, who will be starting his fourth season as varsity mentor, will rely heavily on juniors in what most observers feel will be a rebuilding year for the Card harriers.

ROBBIE RATH: MAZIKOWSKI WINNER OF '73

Robbie Rath, who won a total of 12 varsity letters in his four years at Dougherty was awarded the Edmund Mazikowski Memorial Award as the "top Card athlete" of 1973 at the Spring Sports Banquet in June.

Rath, who is now attending Arizona State University, participated in Basketball, Track and Field, Baseball and Cross Country during his four year stint at Dougherty.

During his four years wearing the "Green and White," he turned many key performances, including an 18 point performance in the Cards upset of St. Joes in basketball and a 10 point double victory in the Cards-Canisius meet,

which resulted in Dougherty's only track victory over the Crusaders.

Rath also holds the school's high jump record of 6'0", which he set in his senior year, when he placed second in the Burke All-Catholic meet, after pitching seven innings of baseball the same afternoon.
