Annual Meeting Minutes

Saturday, July 2, 2022

- 1. The meeting was called to order at 9 AM. Approximately 80 people were in attendance and a quorum was present.
- 2. The agenda was adopted unanimously as presented.
- 3. The minutes of the July 6, 2019, annual meeting was approved unanimously.
- 4. Cary McDonald presented the Treasurer's Report, and it was approved unanimously.
- 5. Tom Koehler presented the slate of candidates for the 2022/2024 Board cycle and called for nominations from the floor. There were none and the slate was approved unanimously.
- 6. Tom Koehler reviewed the projects completed by the MLIA since the last Annual Meeting. They included the installation of 52 new fish cribs in the lake; the reduction of the flood plain on the lake by 5.5 feet; the completion of the renovation of the Little Moose picnic area and dock; and the publication of the STR Manual.
- 7. New projects being undertaken by MLIA include a new Osprey nesting platform, fish improvement efforts, and a memorial project honoring Sue Erickson. Input from the members on other new projects was solicited but there was none.
- 8. Lou Grayson noted that there will no longer be a Moose Lake Fest. A Town of Round lake Firemen's Picnic will take its place on August 6, at Louie's Landing.
- 9. Committee Reports:
 - a. Town of Round Lake board member Jim Stranlund noted that area town roads are being considered for repair.
 - b. Jim Onarheim reviewed the results from the DNR Spring netting effort.
 - c. Mike Feldner noted that the new fire truck has been speced and the bid has been awarded. It will be a while until the new truck arrives.
 - d. Cary Mc Donald noted that the 2022 MLIA year ended with 224 members and that 75% have already renewed for the 2022/2023 year.
 - e. Members were referred to the Loon Watch report on the MLIA website.
 - f. Doc Grayson reviewed the current status of the buoy program. He noted that there are 21 buoys on the lake identifying shallow areas in the lake and no wake zones.
 - g. Dave Wiltrout noted that there are no invasive weeds in the lake. This is primarily due to the drawdown and the dark water.
 - h. Amy Mcdonald and Vickie Kvamme have been tending the beautiful gardens at S and Moose Lake Road and S and Pine Point Road. Cary Mcdonald has been mowing the grass in those areas.
 - i. Ted Eisenbacher has been leading the Moose Lake water monitoring effort. He measures water clarity and oxygen at the same hole in the lake every May, June, July, and August.
 - j. Road Clean-up was completed on a spur of the moment schedule. A number of people volunteered to help. The MLIA is looking for a new person to head up this effort in future years.

The Meeting was adjourned at 10:15 AM and followed by a presentation Ginger Molitor from the U.S. Forest Service about the 2 Axe Project that will affect the Moose Lake Area. Information about the project can be found on the Forest Service website.
