This spring many people have been seeing several bears in the wild. In last weeks Sawyer County Record there was a good story with photos of a Mother nursing her twin cub bears. This past week on the morning of June 7th I was getting ready to leave for ambulance duty in Winter. My wife and I saw a mother and her two cubs in our back yard. It may have been the same bears that were in last weeks paper. We live not to far from Bob Schmidt the person who took the photos that were in the paper last week. Our bear that morning was nursing her cubs while resting up against a large oak tree. Yes, we did get some photos of her nursing her cubs. The photos did not turn the best because we took them through a patio screen door.

The best photos were those that my wife Barb took about 15 minutes later. The cubs were lying on a large branch that extended out over our back yard. The mother bear sent her cubs up the tree for safety and then she left our yard to find some food. We normally have bird feeders out all the time in the summer, but we started taking them in at night since June 2nd when we had an experience that we will not forget.

On Sunday evening June 2nd about 11 PM we had a very large bear that roams our neighbor hood that we call Chester, come into our back yard. He weighs approximately 500 lbs. On that Sunday evening my wife saw Chester eyeing up one of our bird feeders in the back of our house. She made some noise and he walked toward the woods and disappeared.

Several minutes later I felt the coast was clear so I walked out to get the bird feeder so I could bring it into the garage. I removed the feeder from the hook that it was hanging on and looked up, I was eye to eye with Chester the 500 lb.+ black bear wo was 20 yards away from me. He stood up on his hind legs and just stared at me. He was not afraid of me at all. I was a little intimidated by him though. I think he wanted that bird block that I had just removed. I slowly moved backward toward the garage door and let him be by himself. He walked around our back yard for about another 5-10 minutes and then wondered off. I stayed in the house the remainder of the evening. It was an experience that I will never forget.
