### **MAY**

#### Bahá'í

- 1 The 12 th Day of Ridván concludes this important Bahá'í festival (Baha'i's suspend work on this day).
- 16 'Azamat (Grandeur), the 4 th month of the Bahá'í year.
- 23 The Declaration of the Báb commemorates the day in 1844 on which He announced His identity as the Báb, or Gate, the Herald of the New Age (Bahá'ís suspend work on this day).
- 28 The Ascension of Bahá'u'lláh marks the anniversary of the death of the founder of the Bahá'í faith. It is commemorated at 4:00 am DST (Bahá'ís suspend work on this day).

#### Buddhism

**12 - Wesak** is the most important day of the year for Buddhists. It commemorates the birth, awakening and passing away (paranibbana) of the historical Buddha, Siddartha Gautama. (Theravāda) (May be celebrated on different dates, according to country and tradition.)

#### Christianity

**29 - Ascension** (W) is the anniversary of Jesus' ascension into heaven and enthronement as universal sovereign. It comes 40 days after Easter, Pascha.

#### **Judaism**

16 – Lag Ba'Omer commemorates the day that Rabbi Shimon Bar Yochai, a great sage and author of the Kabbalah, Jewish mysticism passed away. Tradition says that on the last day of his life, he gathered his students and illuminated the world with his knowledge and mystical teachings of the Toral To this day, bonfires are lit on this night to celebrate the importance of education and to signify the light which illuminated the world through Rabbi Shimon.



## Love Your Neighbor, Know Your Neighbor Panel Discussion

You're invited to a free, inclusive event co-hosted with the Connecticut Council for Interreligious Understanding (CCIU). Join us for a moderated panel featuring representatives from Judaism, Islam, and Christianity as they explore shared values and ways to work together for the common good. Happening this Saturday, May 3, from 10:00 to 11:30 a.m. in the Undercroft.



Rick Hathaway is the executive director of the Connecticut Council for Interreligious Understanding (CCIU). Prior to joining CCIU Rick Hathaway served as a Vice President for Habitat for Humanity International, responsible for the overall success of Habitat's affordable housing activities in dozens of countries throughout Europe, Asia, Africa, and the Middle East. Over a 35-year career in community development he has supported volunteer programming, fund raising, and leadership development across 50 countries globally collaborating across faith boundaries in carrying out this work. During this period Rick and family lived in New Zealand, Korea, Philippines, Thailand, and Slovakia.

Rick graduated from the University of Massachusetts in 1983 with a degree in Mechanical Engineering. Prior to joining Habitat, he spent six years as a Design Engineer with the Aircraft Engine Business Group of General Electric Corporation. Rick holds two master's degrees: one in Urban and Environmental Management from Australia's RMIT University in Melbourne, and another in Business Administration from Eastern University, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. He was awarded a Doctor of Education from Northeastern University in Boston, Massachusetts in 2024. His dissertation, titled 'Developing Emerging Leaders in Civil Society: An Experiential Learning Initiative in North Macedonia', was awarded the 2024 Northeastern University Outstanding Doctorate in Community Impact.

Rick and his wife Wan Sook currently live in East Hampton, Connecticut and have two children Christine and Justin.



Tamkanat Mohiuddin earned a B.S. degree in Economics from Punjab Universiry, Lahore, Pakistan, and has diplomas in interior design and a certificate in domestic violence assistance. She has taught ESL in private and public schools in the US and in Pakistan. She has also served on the board of the CT Council for Interreligious Understanding and was a member of the Interfaith Clergy Association of Glastobury, CT. She played a number of social service and teaching roles aiding refugees and immigrants in Houston, Texas prior to returning to Connecticut where she is currently active in community service. Tamkanat is married and has two adult children.



Lance Goldberg is a board member of the Connecticut Council for Interreligious Understanding and a West Hartford native who is very active in the Jewish community of Greater Hartford. An engaged member of The Emanuel Synagogue, he is also the immediate past president of the Jewish Historical Society of Greater Hartford and is presently serving on its board as well as on the Jewish Community Relations. Council and as a committee chairman for the Greater Hartford Sports Hall of Fame. Lance has also been an award winning social studies and government teacher for over the past twenty years at Farmington High School teaching AP US Government and AP Comparative Government and overseeing many clubs. Additionally, he also teaches Jewish American History and The Holocaust on Sunday mornings to students at The Emanuel Synagogue as well as other rotating courses for the Jewish high school extension program JT Connect, Lance has Masters' degrees from Weslyean and University of Hartford, and a BA from Charter Oak State University. Earlier in his professional career he worked in Hollywood as a sound engineer, and later he was the overnight supervisor at the Samaritan Homeless Shelter operated by the Manchester Area Conference of Churches. He lives in West Hartford with his son, a sophomore at Hall High School.

We wanted to share with you a quick note about the excitement the Board has regarding recent and upcoming program activities. Our year started with a wonderful World Religion Day celebration co-sponsored with the Baha'is of West Hartford. The program was held at the West Hartford Town Hall and was streamed live. In March, we resumed the annual interfaith film series, co-sponsored with the Wadsworth Atheneum. CCIU had offered this film series for many years prior to COVID, and so we were thrilled when the Wadsworth reached out to us about reinstituting. We expect to be able to continue the film series in the following years, and look forward to further developing our relationship with the Wadsworth.

The film series offering also coincided with the relaunch of our Love Your Neighbor Panel Discussions. These panel discussions are a mainstay of CCIU, and we can see the gathering momentum. Thanks for tireless efforts of our Executive Director, Rick Hathaway, we have so far held four of these events, and have scheduled twelve more before the end of the year. In 2026, we expect to hold at least 25 panel discussions, with commitments made for several already. During these discussions, audience members submit written questions which are posed to the panel by a moderator, resulting in a lively, educational and insightful conversation. A host site selects which three of CCIU's nine religions will be represented by the panelists. Our most Love Your Neighbor Panel Discussion was held at the Noah Webster Library in West Hartford on April 21st. The panelists represented three faith traditions - Yusuf Mansoor (Islam); Sujit Singh (Sikh); and Menaka Kannan (Bahá'í Faith). Each shared personal insights on family, service, and the journey of the soul, and fielded questions from audience participants. Their honesty, clarity, and warmth resonated with everyone in the room. Rick Hathaway moderated, and CCIU volunteers helped with setup, cleanup and refreshments.

We have Love Your Neighbor Panel Discussions scheduled in May: (1) 11:30 am on May 3 rd – St. John's Episcopal Church in Essex (Christianity, Islam and Judaism; (2) Noon on May 4 th – Universalist Church in West Hartford (Christianity, Buddhism, Judaism) and (3) 6:00 pm on May 27 th – Noah Webster Library (Baha'i Faith, Buddhism, Judaism).
