GOD'S SHEPHERDING PSALM 23

¹The Lord is my shepherd, I lack nothing. ²He makes me lie down in green pastures, he leads me beside quiet waters, ³ he refreshes my soul. He guides me along the right paths for his name's sake. ⁴Even though I walk through the darkest valley, I will fear no evil, for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me. ⁵You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies. You anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows. ⁶ Surely your goodness and love will follow me all the days of my life, and I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever.

I. Terms to Know [Defined as used in Psalm 23]

<u>shepherd</u> - to care for, look after, or take care of livestock, and to guard them from wild animals. [God is the one who guides and protects His people.]

<u>pastures</u> - places of grazing, such as green meadows, where sheep can find abundant food. <u>refreshes</u> - to return or to come back. [God prepares us for the deepest core of our being by restoring and renewing our souls.]

valley - a low area of land between hills or mountains, typically with a river or stream flowing through it. [difficult times, such as darkness, despair, defeat, or discouragement. The valley of the shadow of death is a place of danger, pain, scarcity, and the unknown.] rod - a short, thick, heavy stick that a shepherd uses as a weapon to protect his sheep from predators and thieves.

staff - a long, lightweight pole with a curved end that shepherds used to guide their sheep.
 anoint - to rub over with oil or an oily substance. [He anoints my head with oil" signifies God's abundant blessings, His provision, and His care for His people.]
 overflows - to go beyond filling something with a liquid, so that it gushes over the edges. [has more than enough for their needs.]
 dwell - to inhabit or live.

II. Summary

- Psalm 23 is a Bible verse that conveys a message of comfort and reassurance that God is always with us, even when life is difficult.
- God's presence: Psalm 23 shows that God is always present, protecting, guiding, and loving us.
- God's guidance: God guides us and helps us make the right decisions.
- God's love: God's love is evident in his goodness and mercy, which follow us throughout life.

- God's strength: God's power can renew our strength, both physical and emotional.
- God's eternal life: God offers us eternal life in addition to blessings on earth.
- God's relationship with us: Psalm 23 expresses the relationship between God and humans, which is marked by trust, comfort, and the assurance of God's presence.

¹Lord, you are my God; I will exalt you and praise your name, for in perfect faithfulness you have done wonderful things, things planned long ago. 2 You have made the city a heap of rubble, the fortified town a ruin, the foreigners' stronghold a city no more; it will never be rebuilt. 3 Therefore strong peoples will honor you; cities of ruthless nations will revere you. ⁴ You have been a <u>refuge</u> for the poor, a refuge for the needy in their <u>distress</u>, a shelter from the storm and a shade from the heat. For the breath of the ruthless is like a storm driving against a wall 5 and like the heat of the desert. You silence the uproar of foreigners; as heat is reduced by the shadow of a cloud, so the song of the ruthless is stilled. 6 On this mountain the Lord Almighty will prepare a feast of rich food for all peoples, a banquet of aged wine—the best of meats and the finest of wines. ⁷ On this mountain he will destroy the shroud that enfolds all peoples, the sheet that covers all nations; 8 he will swallow up death forever. The Sovereign Lord will wipe away the tears from all faces; he will remove his people's disgrace from all the earth. The Lord has spoken. 9 In that day they will say, "Surely this is our God; we trusted in him, and he saved us. This is the Lord, we trusted in him; let us rejoice and be glad in his salvation." 10 The hand of the Lord will rest on this mountain; but Moab will be trampled in their land as straw is trampled down in the manure.
