

Tax Time Means Prime Season For Scammers

As the tax deadline approaches, scammers are eager to steal your money and personal information, whether posing as tax preparers or claiming to work for the IRS. In a March survey from LifeLock, 28 percent of participants said they'd been involved in a tax-related scam attempt at some point in their lives. Of those, 42 percent said the scams involved an IRS impersonator.

- “Your tax return has an error. Act now to avoid penalties!”
- “You’re eligible for a \$5,000 tax refund. Click here to claim it.”
- “The IRS has flagged your account. Verify your information immediately to avoid legal action.”


Know how the IRS communicates. Unless you have been in contact with the IRA about back taxes, **the IRS will never call, or text, or email you to ask for personal information or requests payments.** If you receive a call like this, HANG UP, and don't click on links in emails or texts. The links could load ransomware or malware onto your computer or device.

REMEMBER...IF YOU GET AN UNEXPECTED TEXT ABOUT AN IRS PAYMENT, IT'S A SCAM!

Have you gotten a text message that looks like this? DON'T CLICK ON IT! This is a scammer trying to get your information. **Know how scammers communicate.** Tax scammers often use urgency, fear, and enticements (big refunds) to manipulate victims. Here are some

REMEMBERING THE “BLACK SUNDAY” FIRES, TWENTY ONE YEARS LATER

Thursday, January 23, 2026 marks 21 years since the tragic fires in the Bronx and in Brooklyn that came to be known as “Black Sunday.” The two fires claimed the lives of four FDNY firefighters and left three others seriously injured.



It all started at 7:59am when a box alarm in the Bronx was called. It was a typically bitter cold and windy January morning, with a blizzard the day before blanketing the city. The fire started on the 3rd floor, with the cause undetermined but thought to be possibly an extension cord or space heater setting fire to a mattress. 3 alarms were eventually called: Engine Company 42, Ladder Company 33, Ladder Company 27, and Rescue Company 3 were the first to be directly involved in fighting the fire.

6 FDNY Bronx firefighters were the first to enter the fire building (a 4-story structure built in the 1920's). Initial reports said occupants were believed trapped on the 4th floor, the floor above the fire. (The structure had been illegally subdivided using drywall partitions - a condition unknown to the firefighters at the time). Heat intensified, flashing through the door of the apartments, leaving the firefighters unable to find their way to the fire escape. They were forced to make the decision to jump from the 4th floor window to the ally below. All 6 jumped and sustained critical life-threatening injuries. FDNY Lieutenant Curtis Meyran of Battalion 26

and Lieutenant John Bellew of Ladder 27 died instantly. The other 4, Brendan Cawley, Jeff Cool, Joe DiBernardo, and Gene Stolowski, were severely injured with life altering injuries. Jeff Cool and Joe DiBernardo were permanently disabled and forced to retire. Joe Bernardino was later promoted to Lieutenant but, sadly passed away with line of duty injuries from the fire.

Later that same day in Brooklyn, at 1:37pm there was a fire in the basement of a 2-family home. People were attending a birthday party and reported smelling smoke. Firefighters from Ladder Company 103 responded and were investigating the source of the smoke but needed to withdraw when the heat from the source became too intense. All got out except for Firefighter Richard T. Sclafani. He was soon found unconscious on the stairs, and sadly pronounced dead bringing the total number of firefighter deaths to 3, the highest number in one day since the attacks of September 11th 2001.

We honor the memory of Lt. Meyran, Lt. Bellew, Lt. Di Bernadto, and FF Sclafani. We will never forget the supreme sacrifice of our members 21 years ago.

Following the tragic “Black Sunday” fires, the FDNY reviewed the events of the day and implemented many procedural changes including the return of personal safety bailout ropes for all personnel. Here is a summary of lessons learned and changes implemented.

Key Lessons Learned and Changes:

- Mandatory Bailout Gear & Training: Reintroduction of personal safety escape ropes (NFPA 1983 compliant) for every firefighter, along with rigorous, repetitive training on emergency window exits.
- Mayday Procedures: Enhanced focus on immediate Mayday transmission, ensuring firefighters know how and when to call for help, and that it is prioritized.
- Operational Discipline & Safety:
 - Team Integrity: Strict requirements to maintain team continuity during interior operations.
 - Situational Awareness: Improved, consistent use of Thermal Imaging Cameras (TICs) to identify hazards.
 - Communication: Mandatory, regular progress reports from interior crews to the Incident Commander (IC).
- Command Accountability:
 - RIT Deployment: Rapid Intervention Teams (RIT) must be in place and ready before interior operations begin.
 - Strict Command Functions: Enhanced, thorough size-up by the initial IC to assess risks, such as building layout and fire conditions.
- High-Rise/Wind Conditions: Specific SOPs developed for fire fighting in high-wind conditions to prevent fire spread.

Black Sunday resulted in the first time since 1918 that the FDNY lost members at two separate, fatal incidents on the same day, prompting a major, lasting overhaul of safety protocols and equipment.

The Big Apple Is in a Deep Freeze...What Does That Mean For Firefighters?

As of late January 2026, New York City is experiencing an, "unprecedented" and prolonged "deep freeze," with temperatures remaining below freezing for 12 consecutive days, marking the longest cold snap since 2003. This extreme weather has severely impacted Fire Department of New York (FDNY) operations, forcing crews to battle blaze-related hazards in temperatures as low as 9 degrees, resulting in frozen equipment and increased fire risks.

Key Challenges for Firefighters



- **Frozen Hydrants:** Extreme cold has caused water in fire hydrants to freeze, hindering fire suppression efforts.
- **Thawing Apparatus Deployment:** The FDNY is deploying specialized "thawing apparatus" trucks to melt ice inside hydrants and ensure water flow across all five boroughs.
- **Frozen Equipment:** Freezing temperatures are causing significant challenges, including ice accumulation on gear and equipment.
- **Increased Fire Risks:** The intense cold has led to multiple fires, including a 3-alarm fire in Staten Island and a major blaze in the Bronx that spread to adjacent apartments.
- **Demanding Conditions:** Firefighters are braving sub-zero wind chills to combat these incidents, often dealing with 11+ inches of snow from a preceding, record-breaking January 2026 blizzard.


Operational Context

- **Long-Term Cold:** The deep freeze is expected to last until at least early February 2026, driven by a "Greenland Block" that is forcing Arctic air into the region.

- Life-Safety Hazards: The dangerous cold has contributed to at least 14 deaths in the city, with hypothermia suspected in many cases.
- Emergency Response: The FDNY continues to operate under high-stress conditions, with officials emphasizing the danger of the weather, which has also impacted neighboring Westchester County, where crews battled a blaze in Nodine Hills.

In summary, the 2026 deep freeze has forced the FDNY to utilize specialized, rapid-response thawing techniques to maintain fire suppression capabilities, as they tackle a high volume of dangerous fires in, "12 days of icy hell".

DID YOU KNOW THIS?

STARTING IN 2025, MEDICARE SET A LIMIT OF \$2,000 ON HOW MUCH PEOPLE PAY OUT OF POCKET FOR COVERED PRESCRIPTION DRUGS EACH YEAR. THIS LIMIT APPLIES TO ANY MEDICARE DRUG PLAN YOU HAVE, WHETHER IT'S STAND-ALONE OR PART OF A MEDICARE ADVANTAGE PLAN.

The \$2,000 cap includes everything you pay for covered medications - such as your yearly deductible (if your plan has one) and any copayments or coinsurance you pay when you pick up your prescriptions at the pharmacy or by mail.

Your drug plan will keep track of what has been paid by you and it will report on your progress toward the cap in your explanation of benefits.
