#### 2021 RICHTER AWARD RECIPIENT



On July 10, 2021, during the Annual Membership Meeting in Gillette, Wyoming, FMCA national president Jon Walker recognized the 2021 recipient of the Robert L. Richter Award: John Seguin, F455062, from the California Chapter.

FMCA's Executive Board voted to present him with the award. Bob Richter was FMCA's founder and first editor of *Family Motor Coaching* (now *Family RVing*) magazine. The award recognizes an individual who is responsible for chapter newsletters and publications, and/or communications to and about an FMCA chapter.

John volunteered to become editor of the California chapter's "Spot-Lite" newsletter, which has been published for more than 50 years, and gave it a face-lift.

He redesigned the layout, including new artwork and other features, and incorporated additional articles and columns. He uses interviews, social media, and the internet to research content. In addition to producing the newsletter, John assists with special mailings sent out to chapter members.





# 2022 Western Area Rally Cancellation



It is with regret that I must once again announce that we must cancel our Western Area Rally for 2022. The Covid-19 pandemic was in full swing when we had to cancel our rally for 2021. Since then, things improved greatly with the distribution of vaccines to combat this virus. Through the year everything was looking positive and we had great optimism to be able to once again have our rally in Indio. While we were marching along with preliminary work for the rally (preparing a budget, getting program artwork done, working on filling vacant captains' positions, etc.) a couple of things occurred that were not foreseen. First was the surfacing of the "Delta Variant" of the Corona Virus. In case you didn't know, throughout the pandemic, the fairgrounds in Indio have been used for Covid testing, vaccination and patient treatment. It is also designated

a Federal Medical Station (FMS) which involves using one of the fairground buildings (one that we use for seminars) to stockpile medical supplies for emergency use. We had thought all of this would end sometime in late summer. Instead, we have learned that Riverside County Public Health will not release the fairgrounds until the end of November at the earliest. This is due to the onset of the delta variant and the coming fall/ winter seasons which will bring people back indoors with the CDC anticipating that Covid cases will be increasing. Another thing that no one anticipated was the move by Riverside County to put the fairgrounds up for bid for a business to assume management and operation of the fairgrounds. They put out a Request for Proposal (RFP) on the fairground's website with the submission deadline of August 26th. We have no idea how long the selection process will take or when they will take over management of the fairgrounds. We would have to enter into a new contract with the winning company for use of the fairgrounds. Any contract we enter into must first be reviewed by FMCA's legal staff. We cannot accept a contract proposal without FMCA legal approval. As you can well imagine, there is no way all of this can be accomplished in time to have our rally or if we can even get acceptable terms with the new management.

On a personal note, this month marks the start of my 2nd year as your WMHA President and FMCA National Vice President. My main goal was to grow our Indio rally and reverse the downward attendance trend. There were several indicators to show we were well on our way. Instead, I have had the unfortunate task of having to cancel our rally, twice now. This was not how I envisioned my term as your president. I have received many words of encouragement and support from the Western Area as well as FMCA. I want to thank everyone for hanging in there as we work through these trying times.





counting all the walk-ins.

During our stay at the convention, I stayed in touch with the FMCA Headquarters members and provide the following information. Over 200 Governing Board members voted for our new FMCA President - Rhett Porter, Vice President - Gary Milner, Secretary - Kathie Balough, and Treasurer Barbara Smith, into these offices for the next two years.

The Board of Directors agreed to set the FMCA membership at a firm \$50 per year.

Our very own California Chapter Spot-Lite Newsletter Editor was selected as the best FMCA newsletter nationally regardless of Size. Great Job!

The next convention will occur in Tucson, AZ, next march (2022), and the Summer Convention in Lincoln, Nebraska.

Several FMCA procedural changes were changed, but none affect the membership, and FMCA is fiscally solid.

#### How to Keep Your RV Cool in Summer

Staying cool at the campground during the hot summer months can feel like a losing battle. Follow these expert tips to keep your rig cold and comfortable. Bob Cochran, July 5, 2021 TOGO RV

Your RV provides you with many of the creature comforts of home, but your RV's A/C might not be as strong as you'd like on the hottest days of summer. There are a few factors that will impact how well your A/C will work: the climate of your destination, the size of your RV, and the number of A/C units you have.

As an example, if you only have one A/C unit on a

large Class A and you're expecting it to keep your interior cool in Florida during August, you're probably going to be disappointed. But if you're camping in Michi-



gan with a smaller Class B, one A/C unit is probably enough to keep your interior cool.

## Tips for Using Your RV A/C

You should outfit your rig's A/C system to fit your camping lifestyle. RV A/C units are either <u>ducted</u> or <u>non-ducted</u> and come in a variety of weights and cooling capabilities. If you're looking for a rig with a built-in unit, or if you're upgrading or purchasing a new A/C unit, keep the following in mind:

- If your RV runs on 30 amps, then you will only be able to run one A/C unit. If you think you'll want more than one cooling unit, you'll need a rig that runs on 50 amps. Not all 50 amp RVs are prewired or ducted for a 2nd AC, so it's good to ask in advance when shopping.
- A unit with a higher <u>BTU</u> (British Thermal Units) has more cooling power and typically ranges

from 11,000 to 15,00 BTU/hour. Many RVs come standard with units around 13,000 BTU/hour. A more powerful A/C unit



isn't always your answer to cooling your rig as it depends on the size of your rig and the climate you're in.

**TOGO TIP**: If using a portable A/C unit, keep an eye on your electricity usage and note any additions to your RV's dimensions and weight.

#### Tips for Keeping Your RV Cool in the Summer

- Park in shaded areas.
- Use your RV awning and window shades to reduce sun exposure when parked.
- Clean your A/C filters regularly.
- Cover your A/C in the off season or during long periods of storage to protect your A/C unit from critters and prevent the cooling fins from any storm damage.
- Check your A/C for any unwanted intruders or damage (small animals can chew on the wires).
- Check the temperature of your A/C for proper operation.
- If you have non-ducted A/C, close off smaller areas of your rig to cool off your main living area more quickly.
- If you have ducted A/C, some models offer a replacement ceiling assembly to add a <u>direct vent</u> <u>feature</u> so you can perform the above step.

#### Recommended Gear to Keep Your RV Cool

- Vent insulators will help trap cool air in your RV and make it more energy-efficient.
- <u>Solar shields</u> for your windshield, skylights, and windows will reflect UV rays and help regulate your rig's interior temperature.
- <u>Slide-out toppers</u> also help protect your RV from the sun's rays and keep the inside cool.
- <u>Foil insulation</u> works well for hybrids and pop-up campers.
- <u>SoftStartRV</u> is an easy-to-install device that allows you to run your A/C with more appliances by reducing the startup amps by 65 to 70 percent. It also reduces noise so you can sleep more comfortably with your A/C unit on.



# Keeping Your RV Cool in the Summer How can I keep my RV cool without A/C?

Park your RV in shaded areas and use your RV awning when parked. Items like vent insulators, solar shields, and slide-out toppers (if you have slide-outs) can also help.

**TOGO TIP**: You can use a satellite map to check the shade coverage of your campsite when making campground reservations.

## How do I keep my campervan cool in the summer?

Make sure you have an A/C unit that can handle the temperature and environment where you will be traveling and camping. Regularly clean your A/C filters and make sure you maintain your unit(s) throughout the year.

### How do you insulate an RV in the summer?

Purchase items like vent insulators and solar shields to help insulate your RV during the warmer months.

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#### What is RV Preventive Maintenance?

RV Preventive Maintenance is maintenance you can perform on your RV *before a problem exists*. These checks are designed to prevent or identify potential problems that could lead to mechanical breakdown, malfunction or failure of a component or system on your RV. Preventive maintenance con-



sists of cleaning, inspecting, lubricating, adjusting and servicing your RV. If you identify a problem early, you can save money on repair bills and avoid untimely breakdowns.

#### RV Chassis Preventive Maintenance Checks

Check fluids: Check the engine oil, transmission flu-

id, power steering fluid, brake fluid and windshield washer fluid. Adjust fluid levels as required. Change fluid and filters "In Accordance With" (IAW)



your vehicle owner's manual recommended intervals. When checking the transmission fluid consult your owner's manual for proper instructions.

Any low fluid level indicates a leak or potential problem, and must be investigated further. If the transmission fluid has a burnt smell it needs to be replaced. Follow your owner's manual for the proper types of fluids to use when adding or changing fluids.

Check the air filter: A clean air filter helps your engine perform better, and improves fuel economy. Replace the air filter IAW scheduled maintenance intervals, or whenever you see it is dirty.

Check for any leaks: Look under the RV and/or the tow vehicle for any indications of leaks. Locate the source of the leak and have it repaired. Transmission fluid leaks contacting hot surfaces like exhaust system components contribute to vehicle fires.

**Chassis lubrication**: Have the chassis lubricated IAW the manufacturer's recommended intervals.

Check radiator coolant: Check the level, condition and concentration of the anti-freeze. Automotive antifreeze not only protects the engine in cold



temperatures, it helps the engine run cooler in hot temperatures too.



For best results, coolant should be flushed and replaced IAW your owner's manual guidelines. Do not drain or flush coolant directly on the ground.

**Caution:** Never remove a radiator cap when the engine is hot and/or under pressure.

Check radiator hoses & clamps: Look for worn, cracked, brittle or soft spots in the radiator hoses. These are early indications of hose failure. Check for any leaks. Replace hoses and clamps as required.

Check heater hoses & clamps: Look for worn, cracked, brittle or soft spots in the heater hoses. These are early indications of hose failure. Check for any leaks. Replace hoses and clamps as required.

Check all belts: Look for signs of wear and for any cracking on the inside or outside surface of the belts. Check the belts for proper tension. It's a good idea to take spare belts with you on extended RV trips.

**Check all lights:** Check all of the lights on the RV and the tow vehicle for proper operation prior to leaving on a trip.

Check the wiper blades: Check your wiper blades for wear and/or poor operation. It's too late after it starts raining. Periodically clean the wiper blades using windshield washer fluid on a clean rag or towel.

Check the starting battery: Check the RV or tow vehicle starting battery state of charge, water level, cables and connections. If you're not familiar working around lead-acid batteries have the batteries checked by a qualified service center. Whenever you work around batteries remove any jewelry and wear gloves and safety glasses.

Check the condition of your tires: Look for uneven wear, cuts, poor tread depth and cracking on the tire sidewalls. Do not operate the RV if the tires reveal any of these conditions, until they are inspected by a tire professional.

Check tire inflation: Check all tires for proper tire inflation pressure using a quality tire inflation pressure gauge. Check the tire pressure before traveling each day and always check the tire pressure when the tires are cold, before traveling more than one

mile. Adjust inflation pressure to the manufacturer's recommendation based on loads.

**Start the engine and allow it to warm up:** Check all of the gauges for proper operation. Monitor your gauges while driving. If a gauge reads out of the normal range pull over as soon as it is safe and call for assistance.

### Check the dash air for proper operation: Note:

When you are towing a trailer or driving a motor home it helps if you can avoid using the dash air when the engine is under a strain, like ascending a steep grade.

Check your emergency roadside kit: At a minimum it should include a flashlight, extra batteries, jumper cables, a first aid kit, basic hand tools and warning devices.

## **RV Coach Preventive Maintenance Checks**

Exterior of the RV: Maintaining the exterior of your RV contributes to extending the life of the RV, and protecting your investment. If you let your RV go, without cleaning it for periods of time, it can be very difficult to get that new look back again. Wash and clean the exterior of your RV on a regular basis. I wash our RV after every RV trip. Wax the RV to restore the shine and protect your RV's exterior. Use a wax compatible with the exterior surface of your RV. Use a black streak remover to remove those miserable black streaks and other road grime. Follow the black streak cleaner instructions for best results.

Use bug-off to remove dead bugs from your windshield, grill or anywhere else. It really makes removing bugs easier. Use a cleaning product designed to protect all of the leather, vinyl, plastic, and rubber components on your RV. This includes interior items too, like the dashboard and upholstery, and exterior items like awnings and trim pieces.

**RV Odors:** To eliminate odors caused by pets, smoke, cooking and chemicals use a good odor eliminator like Febreze.



**Carpet and Upholstery:** To remove stubborn stains from the carpet and upholstery, use a good quality carpet and upholstery cleaner.

## Inspect the RV roof and body seams & sealants:

Every seam on your RV, and anywhere the manufacturer cut a hole in your RV has the potential to allow water to get in. Inspect your RV roof and all of the seams and sealants on a regular basis for potential water leaks. Consult with your RV dealer for sealants compatible with different types of materials on the RV. If you are not comfortable working on the RV roof, have the inspections and maintenance done by an authorized RV repair facility.

Test the roof air conditioner (s): Clean or replace dirty air conditioner filters. Clean filters help the AC unit work more efficiently. You can use a small handheld vacuum cleaner to clean the air conditioner filters. It's a good idea to keep replacement filters on -hand.

**Test the refrigerator:** Check the operation of the refrigerator in both the 120-volt AC and LP gas modes. Do not over-pack the refrigerator, allow room so air can circulate. Installing a thermostatically controlled refrigerator vent fan can help improve the refrigerators efficiency.

Check the coach/auxiliary battery(s): Check the auxiliary battery state of charge, water level, cables and connections. If you're not familiar with lead-acid batteries have them checked by a qualified service center. If the RV is equipped with battery disconnect switches make sure they are in the off position when you're not using your RV, to help prevent battery drain from parasitic loads.

# Check the operation of the generator under load:

Check the generator engine oil & all filters. Always inspect the generator exhaust system prior to operation. A faulty exhaust system can lead to Carbon Monoxide poisoning. Service the generator as recommended by the manufacturer. Exercise the generator monthly with at least a half-rated load. Consult the generator owner's manual for load ratings.

Check all appliances for proper operation: Check all of the AC, DC and LP gas appliances for proper operation. It's a good idea to have your LP gas system checked by your authorized RV service facility annually.

**RV Holding tanks:** Thoroughly flush the holding tanks every time you empty them. Use RV toilet paper, and enzyme holding tank treatments to help extend the life of your RV holding tanks.

**12-volt appliances and accessories:** Check all the 12-volt appliances and accessories for proper operation.

*Check all 12-volt & 120-volt interior lights:* Check the interior lights for proper operation.

## Check & test all safety devices:

Check the fire extinguisher, smoke alarm, carbon monoxide and LP gas leak detector before each trip. Replace batteries as required.



Important RV 101 Tip: Check the expiration dates on all safety devices and replace the unit with a device designed for use in RVs. Write the expiration date on the cover so I know in a glace when it needs replaced.

Check the operation of the awning: Inspect the awning fabric for any damage and for cleanliness. Inspect the awning for proper operation. If it's a manual awning and you have the awning extended when it is raining, lower one end to allow the rain to run-off and prevent water from pooling on the fabric, which can cause extensive damage.

Check the operation of all slide-outs: Make sure nothing is in the path of the slide-out and check all slide-outs for proper operation. Lubricate the slide-out mechanism following the manufacturer instructions.



The RV water system: When you return home from a camping trip (and do not have another trip planned for two or more months) drain the water out of the water system. Locate and open the low point water drains, drain the fresh water holding tank and the water heater tank. Periodically sanitize the RV water system. I do it every spring and anytime I notice an odor in the water system.

**Caution:** Never drain the water heater when the water is hot or under pressure. Turn the water supply off, open a hot water faucet to relieve pressure and allow sufficient time for it to cool down before draining.

**12-volt RV water pump:** With potable water in the fresh water holding tank, check the operation of the water pump.

**RV water heater:** I recommend draining the water heater after every trip, unless you have another trip planned in the near future. If you have a Suburban water heater inspect the anode rod every time you drain the water heater, and replace it when it is 75% consumed. Periodically flush the water heater, to clean the tank and remove any loose debris.

In addition to inspecting the anode rod, it's also a good idea to periodically flush the water heater tank.

# CCFMCA Chuck Wagon Vittles

#### CHUCK WAGON AND FOOD HISTORY

From Cookie: A chuckwagon was originally a wagon that carried food and cooking equipment on the prairies of the United States and Canada. A chuckwagon would accompany a wagon train of settlers or a group nomadic workers like cowboys or loggers. Charles Goodnight, a Texas rancher,



invented the idea of a chuckwagon in 1866. Chuck was a slang term for food and chuckwagon food included easy-to-preserve items like beans and salted meats, coffee, and sourdough biscuits. Supplemental foodstuffs were also gathered while on the trail.

Important Chuckwagon Items: Dutch oven, large coffee pot, extra kettles and pots, crossbar, and fire hooks. Also included: a dishpan for mixing bread, a kettle for heating water for washing, a "wreck" or "roundup" pan for dirty dishes, and a "squirrel can" for scraps

## Typical Day's Food the Crew Ate on the Trail:

- Breakfast: meat, sourdough bread, dried fruit, and coffee
- Lunch/Dinner: roast beef\*, boiled potatoes, beans, brown gravy, light bread or biscuits, and coffee. Occasional Dessert: stewed dried fruit, spiced cake made without eggs or butter, dried fruit pies, or spotted pup (rice and raisins).

\*Northern cowboys were more likely to get beef with their meals. Some outfits in the Southwest made do with salt pork, beans, and sourdough.

#### A Typical Cook's Day on a Cattle Drive:

- Before sunrise: Get up and start fixing breakfast.
   Wake the horse wrangler. Wake the cowboys and call them to breakfast. Wash dishes, pack the wagon and move up the trail. The cook would move ahead of the cattle because he could move faster with his team of horses.
- 11:00 a.m. Make a new camp and have lunch ready by noon. Lunchtime gave the cowboys a chance to rest and the cattle time to graze. 1:00 p.m. Pack the chuck wagon and ride toward the evening's campsite.
- 5:00 p.m. Set up the night camp and prepare a dinner of beans, biscuits, and coffee to be ready about 6:30.
- 9:00 p.m. Go to bed. Unlike the cowboys, the cook did not have to take a turn watching the cattle at night

### Green Chile Chicken Enchilada Casserole

## Ingredients

- 3 chicken breasts, cooked and shredded
- 2 cups. roasted, peeled, and chopped New Mexico Green Chile
- 1- 26 oz. can Cream of Chicken soup
- Milk (Use Cream of Chicken can)
- 2 c. shredded cheese
- 1/4 cup. onion, chopped
- 10-15 corn tortillas, torn into quarters
- 1/4 t. salt
- 1/4 t. pepper
- 1/4 t. garlic powder

#### Preparation

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Combine chicken, cream of chicken soup, milk, New Mexico green chile, salt, pepper, and garlic powder in a saucepan. Bring to a boil and stir. Remove from heat. In a 13" x 9" glass pan layer corn tortillas, chicken sauce and cheese. Add onions to middle layer. Cover with foil and bake for 20 minutes. Uncover and bake an additional 20 minutes or until casserole begins to pull away from side of pan.

- 1 can kidney beans
- 1 can corn
- 1 can wax beans
- 1 can green bean
- 1 can great northern beans (optional)
- 1 pound mild cheddar
- 1 bottle Italian salad dressing (16oz)
