# **Nancy Hart**, Patriot Spy and Frontierswoman 1735 - 1830



Born around 1735 on either the Pennsylvania or the North Carolina frontier, Ann Morgan Hart, better known as Nancy, played an important role in the American Revolution as a notorious female rebel and spy. A cousin to American General Daniel Morgan, Hart was a stalwart Patriot, who employed her own heroic means of supporting the American cause for Independence.

When she was in her thirties, Nancy married Benjamin Hart, a prominent North Carolinian, and the couple had eight children. Sometime in the 1770s, the family moved to South Carolina and then into the Broad River Valley region of Georgia, where Nancy became accustomed to the frontier lifestyle. Standing six feet tall, the red-headed and muscular Hart made an imposing figure for those who dared to cross her. Her fearlessness prompted Cherokee neighbors to call her "Wahatche," which meant "war woman." This nickname would prove appropriate as the Revolution moved into the Georgia backcountry, and Hart became a staunch defender of the Patriot cause. Though Hart was illiterate, she was wellversed in the skills needed for surviving on the frontier. Hart's husband fought in a band of the Georgia militia, and while he was away, Hart's abilities as an herbalist, hunter, and markswoman proved imperative to protecting her family and

#### Instructions to Get Started as a Volunteer with the Patriot Research System

First off, thank you for your willingness to participate in the Patriot Research System (PRS) program!


#### Access

As you can see, this site is completely different from the Patriot Index site, and everything regarding how records are added/updated has changed as well. So, we have been putting together some documentation to assist with the migration to the new system.

First off, access to the new site is different from before. Instead of using your name and national#, you will use your email address as the login, and you will set up your own password for the system. The Access Info document that I attached attempts to address this, but in summary, here's what is going to happen:

Volunteer Access to the sarpatriots.sar.org website

Once the account is created, the Volunteer will receive an email like the one below:



The Volunteer needs to click the link to "Activate Your Account". That activation link takes you to the SAR patriots' website, and you see a screen like the below:



This first step proves the email address is valid and the Volunteer has access to it.

The Volunteer then receives a second email, like the one below:



From now on, the Volunteer can go to http://sarpatriots.sar.org and click on the little person icon in the upper right corner to go to the login prompt:

Once you've set up the password, you'll just log in going forward. **If you ever forget the password**, we can send you a new email with a link to click to reset it again.

#### **Updating Records**

You'll notice when logged into the system, that there are now buttons on the pages allowing for edits and additions, etc.

Now, once into the system, you're going to see a 'Volunteer Task' pulldown menu available to you with access to what I've been calling a 'dashboard'. Any time you're working with a record, it is visible within your dashboard. The really short description of how things work is:

You click on the edit/add buttons to start working with a record.

You make the changes you want to that record. You can save it and come back later if you like.

Do note -- only 1 person can edit a given record at a time, so it is possible that you'll click on one of those buttons, and you'll get a message that someone else is already editing something. Of course, that person could also be YOU and the system saved the item in the "Edit Applications (Updater Dashboard" under your Volunteer ID number.

Finally, when you have the record ready to go, there is a field in the editor "ReadyForApproval". You just change the 'no' -> 'yes' and save the record. That record is now removed from your dashboard (no further editing), and presented to the people who can publish those records out to the Production view. (Right now, Dennis and Jamie). If there's an issue, they can, of course, kick it back to your dashboard for further work, if necessary.

Everyone still has a volunteer ID #. If you were an early volunteer, you should have the same one as used in the Filemaker system.

The Patriot Research system does keep a tally of all records that get published, and which volunteer had updated the record so that we can keep counts of who is doing x records.

Finally, the Info document is still a draft and being updated, but it's an attempt to provide much more comprehensive information about the system.

#### Some other notes

It is important to use the information in the Updater Procedures about editing and adding records. Unlike Filemaker, this system will -not- allow the submission of duplicate entries for Accounting Control Numbers (ACNs) or Patriot IDs. You can try, but it will fail to update the record, causing you some grief and frustration if you try. (Filemaker allowed for lots of duplicate entries).

There are 3 dashboards -- one for each kind of record: Bios, Patriots, and Applications/Lineages. The pulldown menu will show a # next to each dashboard to indicate how many records you have personally in the dashboard. Right now, you can see all of the records from all volunteers in the dashboard, and while you can filter these yourself to see only yours, it might make sense to just limit it to your own records only. (Looking for feedback here from you guys once you try it).

Also, if you inadvertently clicked on add/update a record or changed your mind about an edit, it will still be in your dashboard. You can safely delete records from your dashboard and not affect the production data on

the site. I would encourage doing that since no one else can edit a record if it's on a dashboard somewhere.

Additionally, we also have ACN information for membership where we do not have the record copies available. This is because I'm getting data from National HQ's database on our membership and their member<->patriot relationships. This is why you may see records showing up for a member, but the Patriot is noted as "unindexed". This means we have some application information, but it isn't associated to a Patriot ID at this point. (We may or may not have the record copy to move forward on those.)

<u>Finally</u> - There is a LOT more happening in this system vs the old one, and it's all new. If something seems strange or confusing, please ask questions. If there are things we can potentially do better, I'm always open to ideas.

community.

As the Revolution moved into the Southern colonies, Nancy played an important role fighting against Tories in the Georgia backcountry. Hart succeeded in outsmarting British opponents on multiple occasions, frequently disguising herself as a "crazy man" and wandering through British camps to procure information for the Patriots. When one of Hart's children discovered a British soldier spying on the Hart home, Nancy doused the man with boiling water that she was using to make soap before tying him up and turning him over to Patriot forces. Some accounts hold that in addition to her more covert operations, Hart was also present for the Battle of Kettle Creek, which took place in Georgia on February 14, 1779.

Though Hart gained recognition after the war for a variety of exploits, one of the most popular stories involved her capture of several British soldiers. According to local legend, six British soldiers entered the Hart home to question Nancy about assisting a Patriot in escaping from the Redcoats. The soldiers then demanded that Nancy feed them, and displaying unusual hospitality, Nancy agreed to host them, providing a fair share of food and drink. With help from her 12-year old daughter, Sukey, Hart succeeded in discreetly removing several of the soldiers' muskets from the stack they had formed in the corner of the room. Hart had passed two of the firearms to Sukey through a gap in the wall before the soldiers noticed. Hart instructed the soldiers to remain where they were, and when one of them rose to approach her, she shot him dead and wounded one of the others before taking the remaining four men hostage. Sukey ran to inform Benjamin, who returned to the cabin. After debating whether to shoot the remaining men or hang them, the Harts and their neighbors decided to hang the soldiers from a nearby tree. The story became a local legend after the war, and variations of the tale have continued to circulate since then. In 1912, a railroad company's archaeological excavation of the land near the Hart's cabin unearthed six skeletons, suggesting that some version of the myth was true. After the death of her husband, Hart moved with

one of her sons to Henderson County, Kentucky, where she became a devout Methodist and lived past the age of ninety.

In the decades after the Revolution, many of Hart's adventures became the stuff of legend and inspiration. During the Civil War, a band of Georgia women formed a militia unit named in honor of Nancy Hart, illustrating how the legacy of Hart's heroism has lived on. Today, the state of Georgia has memorialized Hart in several ways, including one of the state's counties, a state park, a lake, and a highway. In the 1930s, the Daughters of the American Revolution reconstructed the Hart's cabin, which had been washed away in a flood many years before, in order to commemorate one of Georgia's most famous female Patriots. Nancy Hart, like many American frontierswomen, played an important role not only in defending her family and community during the War for Independence but also in shaping the memory of the American Revolution in ways that still resonate today.

The archaeological recovery of the mortal remains of fourteen soldiers engaged in combat on the Camden Battlefield is the heart of this endeavor. These men and boys gave the supreme sacrifice with their lives twelve for a new nation of Liberty, two to preserve their country and king. This national battlefield in the southern campaigns is also a cemetery. Archeologists found them; coroners removed them; historians study them. Their remains are being handled with the caressed care and honor befitting them. From the dusty sands of this field's debacle, rise the solemnity of these heroes who re-envisioned Liberty in the revolutionary United States of America. This project will culminate in the respectful reinterment, with full honors, on April 22, 2023, of these soldiers in the actual locations where they were found on the Camden Battlefield. Thank God they lived. These fallen are not forgotten.
