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The President's Message

Not all important victories in the Revolutionary War were gained on the battlefield. On February 6, 1778 the Treaty of Alliance was signed between the Second

Continental Congress and Louis XVI, King of France. The treaty not only marked the beginning of



the United States as a recognized international entity, but would provide much needed military aid to America during a vulnerable stage of the revolution.

The treaty also validated American claims to any lands in North America that might be captured during the course of the conflict, which helped ensure

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that the colonists wouldn't trade proximity to one European power for another. Under the auspices of the treaty France supplied America with weapons, ammunition, and other kinds of supplies, along with direct military support from the French navy and over ten thousand troops. It was the combined French and American army that eventually forced the surrender of Lord Cornwallis, ending the war in the Alliance's favor.

The revolutionary war was one of several European conflicts that foreshadowed the final transition from classical warfare to modern industrial war where decisive engagements on the battlefield only occur within the context of





OMC CHAPTER DEVELOPS LOGO

Greene County, Missouri, was organized in 1833 and is named after American Revolutionary War Patriot, General Nathanael Greene.

Greene County, Springfield, Missouri, is the home of the Ozark Mountain Chapter.



Portrait of Nathanael Greene

Ozark Mountain Chapter's David N. Appleby donated a portrait of General Nathanael Greene to the William Freeman Society of the Children of the American Revolution (C.A.R.). They presented the framed portrait of Nathanael Greene to the Greene County Commissioners on Independence Day weekend in July 2002. The portrait is displayed in the Rotunda of the Historic Greene County Courthouse in Springfield, Missouri.

General George Washington's Uniform Stained Glass Window - Senate Chaplain's Office Washington, D.C.


The blue and beige colors of the logo represent the colors of General Washington's uniform. The logo colors connect our chapter to our SAR heritage, including our OMC Color Guard Uniforms.

The Ozark Mountain chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) logo features Nathanael Greene, a Major General of the Continental Army in the American Revolutionary War. He emerged from the war with a reputation as General George Washington's most talented and dependable officer, and is known for his successful command in the southern theater of the war.

The logo includes a portrait of Nathanael Greene with white lettering for his name on a dark blue background. The outer logo color is a beige color and lists the OMC chapter, Missouri Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) and charter date. Thirteen stars form an arc in the field, representing the original 13 colonies.

Compatriot Harold (Tom) Sentman designed the Ozark Mountain Chapter logo for the 40th Anniversary of the chapter's founding.

The OMC Logo is scalable for print and digital media including: newsletters, magazines, brochures, programs, posters, and digital projection.



MOSES THOMAS (1740-1818) REVOLUTIONARY WAR PATRIOT

Ancestor of John W. McAlear, NSSAR #157982 Member of Ozark Mountain Chapter Missouri Society of the Sons of the American Revolution

Moses Thomas, born 1740 in Prince William County, Virginia, was the son of Robert Thomas and Elizabeth Linton. Robert Thomas was born 1690 and died in 1768 in Fairfax County, Virginia. He married Elizabeth Linton about 1713.

The 1761-1762 Louden County, Virginia, personal property tax lists state that Moses was overseer for Edward Connors on property near his father's land. (By 1742, Prince William County became Fairfax County, and in 1757, Louden County was formed out of western Fairfax County).

Moses married Frances Read (or Reid) about 1766. She was born November 2, 1750, and died before 1771. Moses and Frances had one child:

Benjamin (born 1767)

The 1767-1768 Louden County personal property tax lists confirm Moses as overseer of the Henry Moore property. On October 4, 1770, Moses leased 200 acres (not far from the Henry Moore property) from Thomas Blinco. The lease was to run until January 1, 1791, at an annual rent of seven pounds (colonial currency under the English Crown). This land is now part of Dulles International Airport in Washington, D.C.

Moses married his second wife, Susan Hutchinson, about 1771. She died before 1784. Moses and Susan had three children:

- Joseph (born about 1772)
- Ely (born 1774)
- Samuel (born February 8, 1776)

Some Thomas family researchers list a fourth child born to Moses and Susan named Kezziah Jane, who was reportedly born before Joseph.

For some time leading up to this this period, the colonists were very displeased with the high taxes imposed by England. The First Continental Congress was formed and met in Philadelphia on September 5, 1774. On May 10, 1775, the Second Continental Congress met and asked George Washington, of Fairfax County, Virginia, to lead them in their fight for liberty. George Washington was a close neighbor to Moses's father, Robert, until he died in 1768.

In the book, *Robert Thomas and His Descendants* by Betty Jane Gilbert, the following information was given regarding Moses Thomas's Revolutionary War service:

Louden County Order Book G: 517-522 names men recommended for service in the Revolutionary War. Moses Thomas is listed therein in May 1778 as a Lieutenant. A copy of his Revolutionary War record shows him first appearing on the roll May 1778 and last December 1779. He served under Captain John Peyton Harrison's company, 2nd Virginia Regiment, commanded by Christian Febiger, Esquire. Said record indicates he was hospitalized 8 September 1778 and served guard duty in 1779.

In 1782, Moses furnished the Continental Army with 525 pounds of beef.

In 1780, a land grant totaling 1,400 acres, in Bourbon County, Virginia, was issued to Moses as payment for his service in the Revolutionary War. That same year, he received another grant totaling 1,000 acres in Fayette County, Virginia. In 1785, he received another 1,000 acres in Fayette County. (Kentucky became a state in 1792, and Bourbon County, Virginia, became Bourbon County, Kentucky.) The Fayette County, Virginia, acreage that Moses owned in the 1780s is now located in either Montgomery County or Clark County, Kentucky.

Moses married for a third time to Elizabeth Remey Whaley in 1784. Elizabeth was born about 1755 in Louden County, Virginia, and died September 5, 1846, in Bourbon County, Kentucky. Moses and Elizabeth had eight children:

- Mary Ann "Polly" (born about 1785)
- James (born about 1786/1787)
- Robert (born about 1788)
- Emma "Annie" Leanna (born about 1791)
- George (born August 7, 1798)
- Henry (born about 1801)
- Elizabeth (born about 1804)
- Sally (born about 1806)


The 1792-1794 Loudon County Order Book shows Moses Thomas as a Lieutenant in the 57th Regiment, First Battalion in the county militia.

Even though Moses owned over 3,000 acres in Kentucky, he was back and forth between Virginia and Kentucky until 1798. The Loudon County, Virginia, personal property tax list in 1797 showed Moses still in Loudon County, while the 1798 list did not include him. He and his third wife, Elizabeth, settled on his Bourbon County acreage.

Moses Thomas died on November 3, 1818, in Bourbon County, Kentucky. His last will and testament divided his estate (which included all his land, cash, personal property, and 24 slaves) among his children and his widow, Elizabeth. He is reportedly buried in the Thomas family cemetery, located on the original Bourbon County land issued to him as payment for his service in the Revolutionary War.

Moses Thomas's name appears on a metal tablet attached to the Bourbon County, Kentucky, Courthouse in Paris, Kentucky. This marker, in memory of soldiers of the American Revolution who died citizens of Bourbon County, was erected by the Jemima Johnson Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, and was unveiled and dedicated on June 4, 1927. The left photo below shows the entire marker, and the one to the right shows the section listing Moses Thomas.
