






#### June Meeting and Patriot Son Grave Marking—Lindsey Cemetery, Republic, MO

The June 17th meeting was at the Lindsey Cemetery in Republic. After a short meeting the participants marched to three grave sites of veterans of the War of 1812 and Patriot Sons (and daughter) of the American Revolution.

#### John Boyd War of 1812 Veteran

Born 14 October 1792 Death 28 February 1868 Republic Burial Lindsey Chapel Cemetery, Greene Co Missouri

Married Margaret D. Harryman Born 17 February 1795 Washington Co Pennsylvania Died 15 September 1885 Republic Burial Lindsey Chapel Cemetery, Greene Co Missouri


John Boyd served Captain Daniel Morgan Boone's Com-

pany of Missouri Militia, a unit authorized by Congress as US Mounted Rangers to fight the Indians along the Mississippi River and to the west. Captain Boone was the son of Daniel Boone, well known militiaman of the Revolutionary War. It is thought that Boyd lived in St. Charles at the time that he was recruited by Boone to take up arms against the British and served from in 1813 and 1814. Throughout the war of 1812 Boone's Militia patrolled the frontier from Ohio to Western Illinois on horseback and by boat, participating in many skirmishes and battles with the British and their Indian allies.

Following the war, John migrated to Southwest Missouri and was the first settler in the township that he settled on a land warrant earned through his service during the War of 1812. John became a prominent citizen who was well liked and successful in Western Greene County.

John's son, Lt. Hugh Boyd served in the Union Missouri Home guard during the Civil War; son David Boyd died as a result of his service in the Union Missouri Home guard during the Civil War.

**Benjamin Hagewood** War of 1812 Veteran

Born 2 June 1791 Virginia Died 12 July 1881 Burial Lindsey Chapel Cemetery Greene Co Missouri

Married Patsy Stephen 1816 Married Polly Robertson Born 11 April 1819 Roane County, Tennessee Died 1861

Burial Lindsey Chapel Cemetery Greene Co Missouri

Polly Robertson was the sister of Lindsey Robertson, another veteran of the War of 1812.

Benjamin was a Private settling in East Tennessee who joined the militia War of 1812 serving from 1813 to 1815 under Colonel John Brown with over 200 volunteers who guarded supply trains traveling through Creek Indian Territory. Andrew Jackson, Sam Houston, Davy Crocket and other notables were involved in the Creek

Indian Civil war that put supporters of America during the War of 1812 against other factions of the Creek Nation. Shawnee Chief Tecumseh and other Indian leaders led the coalition of tribes against the Americans. They were organized and supplied by the British in order to weaken American defenses and spread the war across many fronts. The culmination of this extended engagement of the War of 1812 was the Battle of Horseshoe Bend where Benjamin was in the heat of the battle.

One of the first settlers in western Greene County in 1842 Hagewood became a community leader as the township began to populate and become well established. Hagewood settled on land provided to him through a land warrant earned by service during the war of 1812; he also received a veterans pension.

Benjamin's son, Thomas Hagewood served in the Union Missouri Home Guard during the Civil War.





Lindsey Henry Robertson
War of 1812 Veteran

Born 13 August 1792 Amherst Co Virginia Died 29 July 1861 Brookline Burial Lindsey Chapel Cemetery, Greene Co, Missouri

Married Delilah Jones 28 January 1813 Tennessee Burial Lindsey Chapel Cemetery, Greene Co Missouri

Polly Robertson, the sister of Lindsey Robertson, married Benjamin Hagewood, another veteran of the War of 1812. Robertson received a pension from East Tennessee for service from September 1814 to May 1815. Robertson served under Captain Roger's company of COL Johnson's 3d regiment of East Tennessee Militia; this unit was in many skirmishes and the devastating Battle of Horseshoe Bend.

Lindsey Robertson was one of the earliest settlers of western Greene County and became a prosperous farmer owning over 660 acres of land at the time of his death. Robertson built the first Methodist Episcopal Church in the area and served as the Pastor until his death. Robertson established the church and burying

ground on land that he and his wife, Delilah donated; as well as the nearby Lindsey School. Mary, the grand-daughter of Delilah and Lindsey, was the first to be buried on the site in 1846.

#### Thomas Robertson Revolutionary War Veteran

Thomas Robertson, Lindsey's father, was a Revolutionary War Veteran who received a War Pension and was the son of Arthur Robertson. Thomas Robertson was born in Ireland in 1762 and migrated to the US and served in Captains Richard Ballinger and Woodruff's companies of the Virginia Militia in 1780-1781. He married Elizabeth Laine or Lane in 1789. They moved to Tennessee where Thomas died in Monroe County in 1833. His pension number is S4157 and several DAR members have joined using his lineage, some going through Lindsey.
