Armed Forces Day

After the great national conflict of the Civil War, Union officers, determined to maintain the union of our Nation, joined together for the preservation of peace. Over 125 years ago the Sons of the American Revolution was formed with the goal of patriotic service through youth education, and advocacy for a sustained union.

Sons of the American Revolution founders wanted to support and advocate for the vision of our patriot ancestors who risked their lives and fortunes to form a new, more perfect nation. The vision was based on the Jeffersonian ideal of equality for all by a citizen led, democratically ruled government and a free and open system of education to train those citizen leaders.

President Harry S. Truman, a WW I veteran and President at the end of WW II, recognized the service of his comrades in uniform. Truman wanted to establish Armed Forces Day for all of the men and women of the armed forces, by devoting a single day that we pause to thank those who have gone before us and those who serve under the flag of the United States today.


Chapter Meeting Minutes

May 20 2017

President Fisk called the Meeting to order at 9:10 A.M. at the Ozarks Technical College, Room 108, with 18 members and five guests present.

Compatriot Chaplain Philbrick delivered the Invocation. Compatriots Knowlton and Sentman lead the Pledge of Allegiance and the Pledge to the SAR, respectively.

A Tribute to Armed Forces Day was delivered by Compatriot and former President General David Appleby.



David noted May is Military Appreciation Month. Four days during May are special and related to the military: Memorial Day, Military Spouse Appreciation Day, VE Day, and Armed Forces Day. Armed Forces Day goes largely unnoticed in Springfield, but larger cities, such as Chicago, have large celebrations. Gerald McCoy, while State President, in travels around the State had a theme: "If not us, then who?" 'If we don't do it, who is going to remember?' David talked about the Pentagon being built and establishment of the Department of Defense in 1949, formerly the War Department, that served to combine all American forces under one roof. President Truman, in 1950, made Armed Forces Day a National Holiday. The Holiday shows appreciation for the military and gives the military the opportunity to "show off" their capabilities. What we need to do is treat every day as Armed Forces Appreciation Day. Fly the flag and Thank a Serviceman for their service daily. A discussion followed.

Guests, spouses, and pending members, and others were then introduced.

Officer Reports

Vice-President Swales reported the July 2017 speaker would be Tom Peters, Dean of Library Services at Missouri State University, who will talk about the Ozarks Jubilee.

Treasurer Glenn Gohr read the Treasurer's report. Since the April meeting, we have four new members. The April, 2017, total balance in all accounts was \$10,459.54. For May, 2017, disbursements include \$210 for new member rosettes. May Interest was \$0.08. Checking and Savings Account Balances were \$713.31 and \$9,636.39, respectively, for a total of \$10,349.70.

Compatriot Knowlton asked for a motion to approve the Minutes of April Meeting as distributed in the Patriot Newsletter. The Motion was Seconded by Vice-President Swales and passed unanimously.

Historian Norman Knowlton noted the Vietnam Wall had returned to Missouri from Texas and was reported in the Rural Missourian. Norman's research and presentation was on Etymology, the study of words. His focus was on where and how the 13 original colonies got their names, beginning with Connecticut and continuing through Virginia. Of the fifty states, eleven were named after a person. A short discussion followed.

President Fisk reported that Dan McMurray and his wife have been taken away by their children to Florida to celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary.

Vice-President Swales, in Genealogist McMurray's absence, reported since January 2017, 17 potential memberships have been received: two (2) have been approved, five (5) are awaiting approval at NSSAR, one (1) is awaiting signature and checks, and 9 are in various states of completion.



Sons of the American Revolution Armed Forces Day Flag Award Presentation

June 14th, 2016 was the 100th Anniversary of Flag Day. The Sons of the American Revolution commemorate the adoption of the Flag of the United States in 1777 by a resolution of the Second Continental Congress led by John Hancock.

After the great national conflict of the Civil War, Union officers, determined to maintain the union of our Nation, joined together for the preservation of peace. Over 125 years ago the Sons of the American Revolution was formed with the goal of patriotic service through youth education, and advocacy for a sustained union.

Sons of the American Revolution founders wanted to support and advocate for the vision of our patriot ancestors who risked their lives and fortunes to form a new, more perfect nation. The vision was based on the Jeffersonian ideal of equality for all by a citizen led, democratically ruled government and a free and open system of education to train those citizen leaders.

The color red in our flag represents the blood spilled by the patriots led by Washington, John Paul Jones and Nathaniel Greene at the founding of our country.

That same blood was spilled at the Battles of Springfield, Wilson's Creek and Pea Ridge and on many other battlefields as we struggled to maintain the union some 80 years after the revolution. The Civil War cannon at Wilson's Creek National Battlefield are a constant reminder of that great conflict and the cost to our union in American lives.

The white of our Flag is the symbol of purity of purpose and the traditional color of flowers used to mourn those lives lost in the defense of our American Flag and all that it represents.

The blue in our Flag represent the expansiveness of the heavens, the depths of the seas and the spirit of an America without limits, which educates our youth to be patriotic citizens.

We as sailors think of the Battles of Midway, Leyte Gulf and of course the attack on Pearl Harbor. What we may not remember are the Battles of the Chesapeake, Block Island, Nassau, Delaware Bay, Cape St. Vincent and Fort Royal. During all of these conflicts, American sailors defended our nation and American patriotic values dedicated to a free democratic republic, serving with honor, courage and commitment.

Howe, Orion P. (Section 4, Grave 207A)

Musician, Company C. 55th Illinois Union Army

Vicksburg, Mississippi, 19 May 1863.

A drummer boy, 14 years of age, and severely wounded, and exposed to a heavy fire from the enemy, he persistently remained upon the field of battle until he had reported to General William T. Sherman the necessity of supplying cartridges for the use of troops under command of Colonel Malmborg.

A historian wrote of Howe: "We could see him nearly all the way::... he ran through what seemed a hailstorm of canister and musket-balls, each throwing up its little puff of dust when it struck the dry hillside. Suddenly he dropped and hearts sank, but he had only tripped. Often he stumbled, sometimes he fell prostrate, but was quickly up again and he finally disappeared from us, limping over the summit and the 55th saw him no more for several months."

General Sherman wrote to Secretary of State Stanton about Howe and for his bravery President Abraham Lincoln appointed him to the United States Naval Academy. Following his graduation in 1870, he went to New York University Dental School and following his graduation settled in Springfield, Missouri to set up his practice.

Joseph Barrett Fisk is a 6th generation descendant of William Freeman. His lineage comes through both his mother, Janice Strickland Fisk, and from his father, J. Howard Fisk, whose patriot ancestor was James Gambling. J. Howard Fisk is President of the Ozark Mountain Chapter (SAR).

Jan Fisk is a member of the Rachael Donelson Chapter DAR. Daughter Hillary Fisk is also involved with the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) as Vice Regent of the Eleanor Wilson Chapter in Washington, DC. Hillary aided her mother, father and brother with membership documents for their Revolutionary War Patriots and was the first local member to prove William Freeman as a DAR/SAR lineage link.


He (Barrett) took the SAR oath during a Memorial Day Wreath Laying Ceremony at the grave site of William Freeman at the Springfield National Cemetery in Springfield, Missouri on May 27, 2017.

William Freeman, a North Carolina native, enlisted following the Battle of Moores Creek in North Carolina. He also served at Valley Forge, he was a scout for Washington, and he served with Nathaniel Greene at Guilford Courthouse and Camden South Carolina.

In 1834 Freeman moved to Greene County, Missouri and at death was buried on his farm. In 1912 the Rachel Donelson Chapter DAR applied for a government marker and had Freeman moved to the Springfield National Cemetery. Freeman is the only Revolutionary Patriot buried in the Springfield National Cemetery.

Greene County is populated with many notable descendants of William Freeman including the intermarried descendants of Patriot Samuel Austin, whose sons married Freeman daughters.

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National Society Sons of the American Revolution Proclamation National Flag Day

June 14, 2017

June 14th is National Flag Day, a day when Americans celebrate the meaning of their nation's flag, honor the traditions associated with its care, and educate those around them to its significance. The Flag of the United States is to be honored and carries with it both history and traditions. There are three Flag Acts which are laws that sought to define the design of the flag of the United States.

Flag Act of 1777

On June 14, 1777, in order to establish an Official flag for the new nation, the Second Continental Congress passed the first Flag Act: "Resolved, That the flag of the United States be made of thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new Constellation."

Flag Act of 1794

The Flag Act of 1794 was signed into law by President George Washington on January 13, 1794. It changed the design of the flag to accommodate the admission into the Union of the states Vermont and Kentucky. It provided for fifteen stripes as well as fifteen stars. This would be the only official flag of the United States not to have thirteen stripes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress Assembled, That from and after the first day of May, Anno Domini, one thousand seven hundred and ninety-five, the flag of the United States, be fifteen stripes alternate red and white. That the Union be fifteen starts, white in a blue field.

Flag Act of 1818

The Flag Act of 1818 was enacted by Congress on April 4, 1818. It provided for the modern rule of having thirteen stripes to represent the original thirteen colonies and having the number of stars match the number of states. It also provided that subsequent changes in the number of stars be made on July 4, Independence Day.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of American, in Congress assembled, That from and after the fourth day of July next, the flag of the United States be thirteen horizontal stripes, alternate red and white: that the union be twenty starts, white in a blue field.

And be it further enacted, That on the admission of every new state into the Union, one star be added to the union of the flag, and that such additional shall take effect of the fourth day of July then next succeeding such admission.

On May 30, 1916, President Woodrow Wilson called for the nation-wide observance of Flag Day. In 1949, President Harry S. Truman signed congress' decree, making June 14th of each year National Flag Day. In 1966, Congress requested that the president issue annually a proclamation designing the week in which June 14 occurs as National Flag Week.

Flag Day is a time when American reflect on the foundation of the nation's freedom. The flag of the United States represents freedom and has been an enduring symbol of the country's ideals since its early days. Americans also remember their loyalty to the nation, reaffirm their beliefs in liberty and justice, and observe the nation's unity.

So, remember to raise your United States flag high on June 14th, and pay tribute to the symbol which means so much to all of us—our nation's flag.
