Over twelve thousand soldiers and a few civilians set up camp in Valley Forge during December of 1777. Around fifteen hundred log huts were constructed, but contemporary records suggest their quality was poor. Supply chain issues plagued



the army, leading to the death of around a thousand soldiers from disease and

starvation during the winter months. By the time the army left Valley Forge by June it is estimated that as many as two thousand troops had died from the conditions.

It's certainly worthy of reflection, as we are

This was a celebration of the 40th Anniversary of the OMC

Next Scheduled Meeting: November 20th, 2021 at OTC in Springfield, Missouri

He then read the Proclamation from the City of Springfield and declared this date, October 16th, 2021, to be the Sons of the American Revolution Day in honor of the day Springfield OMC was founded. He was still allowed to sign since he was part and whole of this event. President General M. Graham Clark and Compatriot Seth Caperton were instrumental in getting this done on July 18th, 1981. The name Ozark Mountain Chapter was selected as its name at that time. It met, as it always had done so, on the third Saturday of each month since that time. It has changed locations from the Marketplace Cafeteria on North Kansas Expressway, to the Old Country Buffet on South Glenstone, to Heritage Cafeteria on North Glenstone, to Heritage Cafeteria on South Glenstone, to Heritage Cafeteria on Battlefield, and now at OTCwe have learned to be flexible which is true of our country. He was the last member to sign the Charter, and it has been missing for several years. It has been recovered and is here today and you can see his signature on the back with all the original signers and with Burton Mayfield, State President of MOSSAR.



Ozark Mountain Chapter Celebrates 40th Anniversary Brief History




Charles W. Calef, First President of OMC

In 1981, Compatriot Charles W. Calef, then a member of the Sergeant Ariel Nims Chapter Number 1, was appointed by State President Burton Mayfield to be the organizing officer of a new chapter in Springfield, MO. He was also encouraged by Seth Caperton, Past President of the Missouri Society who at that time was Missouri State Treasurer.

After several organizing meetings, a sufficient number of charter members were available to begin the new chapter. The Ozark Mountain Chapter, Sons of the American Revolution, was chartered on July 18, 1981. The organizational meeting was held at the Marketplace Cafeteria in Springfield, Missouri.

The following were in attendance: MOSSAR President Burton W. Mayfield, MOSSAR Vice-president Merrill D. Berkeley, MOSSAR Secretary Rylan M. Rudy, and MOSSAR Treasurer Seth B. Caperton. There were 19 signatures on the charter application. The officers were installed on that day by Dr. M. Graham Clark.

At the time of this meeting, we became the third SAR chapter in the State of Missouri. The other chapters, Sergeant Ariel Nims Chapter #1 of Joplin, Missouri, was established in May 1976, M. Graham Clark Chapter in Columbia, MO, was organized in April 1981, and the Ozark Mountain Chapter was founded on July 18, 1981.

Samuel M. Phariss Grave Marking Ceremony October 2, 2021

On Saturday, October 2, 2021, The Color Guard from Ozark Mountain Chapter and Ozark Patriot Chapter supported the DAR in a ceremony for the

reclamation of a nearly lost cemetery near Aurora, Missouri. What is now renamed the Samuel and Catherine Phariss Memorial Cemetery, was at its founding around 1840 referred to as the Old Settler's and Indian Cemetery. The FAG cemetery ID is 2686682,

A common migration pattern for early Missouri settlers was through Tennessee. In this case about 45

people, many Virginians, moved in 1838 from Tennessee to what would become Lawrence County. Four generations later descendants located the burying ground and it became their life's passion to learn more about their ancestors, and to reclaim the cemetery.

Nathan Clifton Grave Marking Ceremony October 9, 2021

descendants are buried.
