The NADAR was founded on October 11th, 1890, and has approximately 190,000 members and over 3000 chapters, and has chapters in 8 foreign countries. Missouri has 102 chapters and the local chapter of Rachel Donalson was founded on June 21st, 1910 and has 249 members and is the largest chapter in the state. Their Missions are Historic Preservation, Education, and Patriotism. She told a story of one of the founders, Eugenia Washington, who stated they wanted a society that was founded on service and thus encouraged all its members to volunteer for service in whatever way they wanted to do so in their community. Across the US members have volunteered in the US for more than 2.5 million hours of service this year. Most of the work locally is done through committees and their chapter has nearly 50 committees. They do have a SAR/DAR Liaison and their chairwoman is our own Anita Philbrick.

He encouraged all to visit the YouTube documentation of not only Yorktown but also other Battles. Then he went on to visit Jamestown, Virginia.

Second Vice-President- Jim Robinette – not presentno report

Treasurer – John Angst—The total funds we have as of today consist of \$13,809.00 in our Arvest Bank checking account and \$9,776.18 in an interest-bearing, guaranteed fund at the Community Foundation of the Ozarks. These accounts total \$23,585.18. The report was to be sent to the audit committee for review.

Audit Report—John McAlear—as requested, he has examined the July 1, 2023 –September 30, 2023 OMCSAR financial records to him by Treasurer John Angst. The records consisted of the check register, Arvest and CFO bank statements, photocopies of support for deposits and disbursements, and the OMCSAR Treasurer's Reports.

It was, of his opinion, based on the documents provided to him, the Treasurer's Reports from July 1, 2023, through September 30° 2023, accurately reflect the financial position of the OMCSAR. This report was moved seconded and passed.

Secretary report- Norm Knowlton-acting as Secretary –no new report. He did describe the symbol of the Poppy and its meaning from World War I and the establishment of the remembrance for those who served and died in the US Military and the proclamation of Armistice Day to Veterans Day on November 11th, at 11 AM on 1918.

Editor Report—Dan Piedlow- he apologized for the delay in getting last month's Newsletter out because of delays in getting reports to him. Told all to get pictures of events that members are involved in and get them to him and our Historian for documentation. He will be changing the form of the

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Newsletter into an E-Magazine in the future.

Genealogist Report—Steve Perkins- we will be inducting 6 new members today into the OMC but there will be others from the past and others in the future since he has been very busy. We have had 2 new approvals in the past couple of weeks. MOSSAR will establish a new chapter in the West Plains area in 2024. Three of today's inductees will transfer primary chapter membership to the new chapter. Those that are already members of OMC who reside closer to West Plains will be asked to make the new chapter their primary chapter. They will also be retained in the OMC with a two-year no-cost dual membership. We have had 4 new submissions to the MOSSAR. It takes about 6-8 weeks for approval to research these applications

He continued with a **Color Guard report**-they participated in the Maple Park ceremony-October 8th and he received a nice card from the DAR for our OMC participation. He encouraged all to attend the Color Guard events or consider becoming a member in the Color Guard. For the SAR this is "Our Face" with the community. We have 134 members in the OMC.

George Washington's Thanksgiving Proclamation

Transcript of President George Washington's Thanksgiving Proclamation from October 3, 1789.

By the President of the United States of America —

A Proclamation

Whereas it is the duty of all Nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey his will, to be grateful for his benefits, and humbly to implore his protection and favor—and Whereas both Houses of Congress have by their Joint Committee requested me "to recommend to the People of the United States a day of public thanksgiving and prayer to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many signal favors of Almighty God, especially by affording them an opportunity peaceably to establish a form of government for their safety and happiness."

Now therefore I do recommend and assign Thursday the 26th day of November next to be devoted by the People of these States to the service of that great and glorious Being, who is the beneficent Author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be—That we may then all unite in rendering unto him our sincere and humble thanks—for his kind care and protection of the People of this country previous to their becoming a Nation—for the signal and manifold mercies, and the favorable interpositions of his providence, which we experienced in the course and conclusion of the late war—for the great degree of tranquility, union, and plenty, which we have since enjoyed—for the peaceable and rational manner in which we have been enabled to establish constitutions of government for our safety and happiness, and particularly the national One now lately instituted, for the civil and religious liberty with which we are blessed, and the means we have of acquiring and diffusing useful knowledge; and in general for all the great and various favors which he hath been pleased to confer upon us.

And also that we may then unite in most humbly offering our prayers and supplications to the great Lord and Ruler of Nations and beseech him to pardon our national and other transgressions—to enable us all, whether in public or private stations, to

perform our several and relative duties properly and punctually—to render our national government a blessing to all the People, by constantly being a government of wise, just, and constitutional laws, discreetly and faithfully executed and obeyed--to protect and guide all Sovereigns and Nations (especially such as have shown kindness unto us) and to bless them with good government, peace, and concord—To promote the knowledge and practice of true religion and virtue, and the increase of science among them and Us—and generally to grant unto all mankind such a degree of temporal prosperity as he alone knows to be best.



At Ease: Baron von Steuben's Final Resting Place

Friedrich Wilhelm von Steuben, more commonly known as Baron von Steuben, served as a military officer in both the Prussian and American armies. He fought in the Prussian army for sixteen years, rising through the ranks from cadet in 1747 to adjutant

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general on the king's staff in 1759. In 1762, he served as aide-de-camp to King Frederick II.[1] With the end of the Seven Years' War, Steuben resigned his commission and spent his time at court and traveling.

In September 1777, Benjamin Franklin and Silas Deane recommended von Steuben's services to George Washington. They detailed his lengthy service with the Prussian king and had the recommendation of the French foreign minister, Comte de Vergennes and minister of war Comte de St. Germain. Franklin and Deane described von Steuben as having "a true Zeal for our Cause, and a View of engaging in it, and rendering it all the Service in his Power."[2] In his own letter to Washington, von Steuben offered to serve as a volunteer, and stated, "the Object of my greatest Ambition is to render your Country all the Services in my Power."[3]

General Washington recognized the value of Baron von Steuben's military experience and appointed him inspector general of the Continental Army. Von Steuben utilized the Commander in Chief's Guard to build a model company of soldiers,[4] used to train the rest of the army. The Baron's drill manual, called the Blue Book because early editions were printed with blue covers, provided the foundation of training that has evolved and endured in the U.S. Army. The book given to new recruits upon entering basic training is still called *The Soldier's Blue Book*.[5]



Despite his legacy and fame as a Founding Father, Baron von Steuben's life after the Revolutionary War is less familiar. He received property from various states as thanks for his patriotic service, though like much of the Continental Army, he never received all the pay he was due. New

Jersey granted him the use of a house which had formerly belonged to Jan Zabriskie, a Loyalist. Five years later, von Steuben sold the house and lands

back to the Zabriskie family to pay debts.[6] He wrote to William North, a former aide-de-camp, that as soon as the house was sold, the proceeds would "immediately pay to you the money, you so



generously lend me."[7] After leaving New Jersey, von Steuben moved to land he owned in the state of New York, which he had used as a summer residence. It was there, at his

summer estate, that he died in November 1794.

Originally buried in a simple grave, in 1870, New York

Governor Horatio Seymour laid the cornerstone for
his current memorial.[8]

Of the 16,000 acres granted to von Steuben by the state of New York in gratitude for his services during the War, 53 acres are preserved as the Steuben Memorial State Historic Site.[9] Located amidst farmland in upstate New York, about a half-hour drive from Rome, New York, a simple sign at the head of a gravel lane marks the entrance to the park. The lane leads to a two-room log cabin which von Steuben used as a summer residence until his death. It is a humble abode, very different from the lifestyle he enjoyed as a minor aristocrat in the European courts. At the time of my visit, the entrance gate was unlocked and open, but the site itself was unstaffed and the cabin locked. The New York Parks and Recreation website notes that the Steuben Memorial State Historic site is co-managed with the staff from Fort Stanwix National Monument.[10] The site boasts some picnic tables near the cabin and hiking trails throughout the woods.





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A short walk through a lush forest leads to the Baron's grave. A large monument, simply carved with a wreath and his last name, flanked by four cannons, rests over his mortal remains. Nearby, a sign declares the name of the coppice to be the Sacred Grove. Various plaques throughout the property honor Baron von Steuben's work and legacy. While the Steuben Memorial State Historic Site is off the beaten path, it is well worth the drive. It is a peaceful and quiet place to enjoy the New York countryside while honoring the man who "gave military training and discipline to the citizen soldiers who achieved the independence of the United States." [11]

The Ozark Mountain Chapter Missouri SAR kicked off the annual Catts-Crawford Festival & Chautauqua, Saturday, October 7, 2023. The event is hosted by and offered to the general public for historical and educational value, by John & Billie Fulton at their farm just south of Mount Vernon. The farm was first settled on by the descendants of a Patriot of the war of the revolution.

Color Guard, at President Cris Brayman's command, presented colors posting them with historic flags, including the Spain and France flags. President Cris Brayman then requested the Honors Choir from Miller Elementary School to sing the National Anthem. Navy Veteran Max Burson contributed by playing Amazing Grace on the clarinet. The other bookend to the opening of the Chautauqua was the playing of Taps by Logan Nied immediately after a musket salute. They were all presented with a Certificate of Recognition.

This years' program focus began with Steve Perkins' presentation on the Battle of Fort San Carlos, the most chronicled battle west of the Mississippi. Howard Fisk then shared more history and acknowledgment of the Osage Indian tribal lands throughout the region, including on the very ground on which we stood. He also gave a presentation on Spain's support to the war for American independence.

A flag determined no longer serviceable was retired in a ceremony led by Gary Gift. Numerous chapter members assisted, and area school children were given a stripe cut from the flag. The stripes and canton were then destroyed in the fire. It was a beautiful, crisp autumn day attended by just over 100 persons.



In October 2021, the Samuel &

Catherine Phariss Memorial Cemetery was commemorated after being resurrected

from heavy brush and trees by direct descendant DAR members Noralee Faulkner and Barbara Brauch. They crusaded and received lots of volunteers for a cause to honor the memory of these early settlers and their families who set down deep roots in Lawrence County, Missouri in the 1840's. One of the attendees commented that the Phariss's hand an influence in the evolution of the county, and he pondered why a town did not bear the name "Phariss".

Patriot Samuel Phariss, was born 3 Feb 1741 in Virginia, likely the Shenandoah Valley and was a provisioner of beef to the Continental Army. His family, like many others that later moved to Missouri, first settled in Tennessee. Their presence in Cocke County is proved in early Baptist church records. By 1819 he and 3 sons moved on to Rhea County Tennessee, and an older son Samuel Jr. settled in nearby Sevier County. The patriot's death recorded in a surviving family Bible, was in 1836, and wife Elizabeth in 1841.

Son Samuel Jr was born in 1771 when the family was living in Fauquier County Virginia. Years after the family moved to Tennessee Samuel married Catherine McNabb and they owned 160 acres in Sevier County. There

was little available land for his nine children, so they with eight of the children removed to Southwest Missouri about 1838. He appeared in the 1940 census for Barry County in the
