The President's Message



Fall also saw several important battles during the course of the Revolutionary War. Once such battle was the naval engagement at the Chesapeake Bay on September 5, 1781. A British fleet of nineteen ships of the line, intended to relieve General Cornwallis at -

Minutes from the OMCSAR Chapter Meeting Saturday, September 18th, 2021 at Ozark Technical College

Next Scheduled Meeting: October 16th, 2021 at Ozark Technical College at Our 40th Anniversary Celebration at 10:00 AM

President Curtis Trent called the meeting to order at 9:02 AM via Zoom with 25 and 2 guests.

He then asked **Compatriot Dan Philbrick** to give the Invocation, then **Compatriot Norman Knowlton** to lead the Pledge of Allegiance and then **Compatriot Don Higgerson to lead** the Pledge to the SAR.

President Curtis Trent then introduced the guest speaker of the day: **Bill Nash** who is presently a Park Ranger at Wilson's Creek National Park.

Yorktown, was intercepted by twenty-four French ships. The fleets were fairly similar in overall strength and did not fully engage, but multiple ships were damaged on both sides and the British fleet was forced to scuttle one vessel.

The battle stretched out over an entire day, with much of the time spent simply moving to engage after the forces spotted each other. Though the British had the initiative, the French force was able to fire on opposing vessels from a superior angle. Raking fire across several British bows inflicted

damage to their ability to hold position in the battle line with two ships, *Intrepid* and *Shrewsberry* falling away before fighting ended. Night ended active engagement, although over the next few days both fleets exchanged long range fire and attempted to gain advantage for a renewed attack. Ultimately, the British fleet determined that no successful attack could be mounted and, after scuttling the warship *Terrible*, returned to New York.

French victory completed the encirclement of General Cornwallis and infused the besieging land army with new troops, heavy guns, and control over surrounding sea lanes. While not apparent at the time, the engagement would prove to be decisive in ultimate American victory and successful conclusion of the war. It is the same for us today; we never know when our actions or successes will have an outsized influence on the future, so we should take care to always be diligent. I hope everyone has a good month.

Bill Nash has been with the Wilson's Creek National Battlefield for six years as lead distribution assistant and has served as an interpreter of regional

caves.

He has worked in interpretation now for 20 years and most of that



has been underneath the ground where we now sit and has been in hundreds of caves across the country, but his opportunity to work for the National Park Service came up and he took that chance. He has been there for 6 years, very much enjoys it, and is looking to move on within the Park Service.

The Battle of Wilson's Creek has been a big part of Missouri's history. August 10th, 1861 is when the battle took place. This year is the 160th anniver-

sary of this battle. COVID kept this years' observance down from previous years, but they did have 80 reenactors on the field and several firing



demonstrations. There last artillery demonstration will be the 25th of this month. There will be two cannons in this demonstration.

The Battle of Wilson's Creek was on August 10th, 1861 and was the second largest battle at that time, It was very early in the War, just 3 weeks after the first Manassas. It grew national attention. Soldiers were signing up for 90 day enlistments because they thought this war would be over very quickly. Most people even today think of the Civil War was primarily on the east coastie.Gettysburg, Antietam, Shiloh and Fredericksburg. This battle grew national attention because

General Nathaniel Lyons was the first Union General killed in the War. Lincoln had 16,000 men out

in the west and he just lost one of his Generals-thus gaining national attention. They realized that this War was going to be bigger and last a lot longer. The Governor of Missouri was wanting to join the South but General Lyons gave his speech saying "he would rather see every man, woman and child be dead before going to the South". These two men were going to meet and did so at Wilson's Creek. The Missouri State Guard with Governor Fox

along with true Confederates out of Arkansas joined together to fight General Lyons. Lyon's troops were outnumbered by almost 3 to 1. The plan was, the night before the battle, he would split his forces, but because of lack of communication this failed. Franz Siegel was to take his men around the southern camp and attack from the south and Lyons was to attack from the north using both of the high grounds. Lyon was to start the

attack and that was supposed to signal Siegel to attack from the south with the Confederates trapped in the middle. Siegel got confused in the battle and gave up their surprise. He saw men coming toward him wearing blue uniforms and mistook them for union troops from Iowa that were to reinforce his line. They were not, but instead were the 3rd Louisiana Pelicans who got to within 50

yards of his men when they opened fire on his troops. He instantly left the battlefield and retreated all the way back to Springfield. This left Lyon and his men by themselves at Bloody Hill to face all 12,000 Confederates and with him only having about 3500 men. He was severely outnumbered and he was eventually killed at about 11:00

in the morning. The battle was not very long. It started about daybreak and ended at noon. Both

> sides sustained very heavy casualties with each side losing about 25% of their forces. Lyons plan overall worked. He tried with his inferior troop number to attack the Southern and State Guard troops so hard and then retreat toward Rolla. He knew he would not be able to defeat them, but he could hurt them severely enough that

they could not chase him down the old wire road to the rail head at Rolla and they might not have the forces necessary to take over the state of Missouri. This plan worked with the Confederates withdrawing to Arkansas while Price headed north. This left Missouri without a large number of Confederate troops until later in the War when General Marmaduke came into Missouri.



The Battle of Wilson's Creek is the reason that it is now a National Park. It did not occur for 100 years. This did not occur until 1960. The Foundation at Wilson's Creek had a lot to do with the funding for this Park. Funds for purchasing the land started in the 1950s even

with the Penny Brigade where young students raised money to help in this endeavor. The first purchased was Bloody Hill and later it became a National Park. He felt that Congress did not want to make this a National Park since there was

already a National Park at Pea Ridge in Arkansas. These were the same Armies that fought here in Springfield 6 month later. This was considered a Confederate victory, but neither side truly won, but because the Union forces retreated, the battle has been consider a Confederate victory.

After they purchased the land, they proceeded to accumulate funds for the buildings, roads in the park, and even the Ray House in which persons lived in that facility until 1966. Plans to secure this house and the grounds went into effect to develop the Visitor Center. Now the park is 2200 acres. The roads in the park have been completed since 1985. The visitor center has had 4 major upgrades with the most recent just completed. The collection of many artifacts is now on display. They have two original cannons on display with an old map

table which is under repair. They have presently tried to restore the actual site of the battle to its original landscape as much as possi-



ble including the trees. There were 31 cannons on the battlefield and they now have 26 in the Park. He mentioned briefly the story of Gipson Mill and Plummers Crossing.

He was thanked for his presentation and was given one of our OMC Anniversary Challenge Coins for his presentation by **President Curtis Trent.**

Pictures were then taken.






Harold Kerr II Funeral 8-16-21


