Everyone I talk to tells me
how much they are enjoy-
ing the programming, food
and service and wow, it
shows. Numbers talk and
this year, the Club has had
more members out enjoy-
ing member events in the
nine months ended De-
cember 31 than in the full
year last year.

I want to thank our staff for
their dedication and hard
work over the fall season. I
can tell you they were ex-
hausted by the end of

December. Our staff take
such good care of us and I
hope they enjoyed a well
deserved break the first
week of January.

Thank you as well to the
volunteers who decorated
the Club for both the
Christmas season and for
the New Year's Eve party.
The Club looked
spectacular.

I also want to acknowledge
the generosity of our mem-
bers, and in particular the
women's shooting section,
for your support of our
Christmas donation cam-
paign. We donated over
\$1,000 in cash and many
wonderful gifts to the An-
caster Community Founda-
tion Outreach Program
which were used to make
Christmas better for many
local people.

Women's shooting ended
its schedule for the winter
in mid-December, but
men's shooting is in full
swing. The shooting sec-
tion is more active than
ever. There are many great
shooters at the Club, but
sadly I am not one of them.
I do enjoy shooting when I
can at both the men's
regular shoot on Saturday
mornings and the Wednes-

day and Friday afternoon
mixed practice sessions.
As Bill Dalley once said to
me "skeet shooting is like
an arcade game for
adults". Everyone is wel-
coming and has a lot of fun
in a very safe environment.
If you are interested, I en-
courage you to contact one
of the captains for an
introduction to the sport.

Behind the bustle of the
events and regular activi-
ties, improvements have
been taking place to the
Club infrastructure. This
fall the Club replaced the
main range/oven in the
kitchen, upgraded the in-
ternet and ordered replace-
ment carpet for the stairs
on the first and second
floor, the boardroom and
the upper hallway. The
carpet is to be installed in
early February.

We continue to work close-
ly with the City of Hamilton
Building Department to
obtain the building permit
for the lift/accessible
washroom addition. We
are hopeful the last few
details raised by the City
can be dealt with in a
timely manner.

Unfortunately, an increase
to the Wednesday and Fri-

day dinner price has become
necessary. Effective March 1,
2024, there will be a \$3 in-
crease to our Wednesday din-
ner price which will increase to
\$50 and Friday dinner price
will increase to \$41.

Food prices have increased in
excess of 20% over the last
two years and the price of
Wednesday and Friday dinners
has not changed in three
years.

Even with the increase, dining
at our Club is a bargain. The
Club recently presented a
steak frites dinner with Caesar
salad and desert for \$38 (soon
to be \$41). A similar dinner at
quality Hamilton/Burlington
restaurants is priced at \$66 -
\$85. Please know that man-
agement works diligently to
ensure members receive good
value for money spent.

Watch your email in basket for
Marta's weekly eblast of up-
coming events and at the be-
ginning of each month for the
programming for the next two
months so you can plan your
calendars. There are many
exciting events coming up that
you (and your friends) will not
want to miss.

From the Desk of the General Manager

Hello Members,

I have never really been able to put my finger on it but for whatever reason, I have never been a big fan of Elon Musk. Perhaps it is just jealousy. How could I not be jealous of someone that seems to be able to accomplish whatever crazy ideas he thinks up and I still can't seem to grasp on to the thought that I need to bring bags to the grocery store.

Recently, that jealousy has turned to admiration. It started just recently when the satellite installer powered up our new Starlink internet satellite. If you are not familiar with Starlink, it is the brainchild of SpaceX founder Elon Musk and this project currently has 4,000 satellites circling earth and bringing high-speed broadband internet to over 71 countries that previously had unreliable or completely unavailable connectivity to information.

With this new connection, our internet speed has improved by approximately 200 times. Not only does this increased speed now allow our members wishing to hold business meetings at the Club fast and reliable connectivity to video conferencing or downloading/uploading large documents, but it makes regular tasks around the Club less onerous. Inside Dave's many rustic and automotive decorated barn-garages was an amazing selection of Dodge trucks from the earliest commercial models up to the seventies era 'Lil' Red Truck' model which in 1979 was the fastest 0-100 mph vehicle made in North America and was sold to commemorate similarly named famous drag racing wheelie machine of the sixties. Bruce Trail Niagara Section and Iroquoia Section Complete

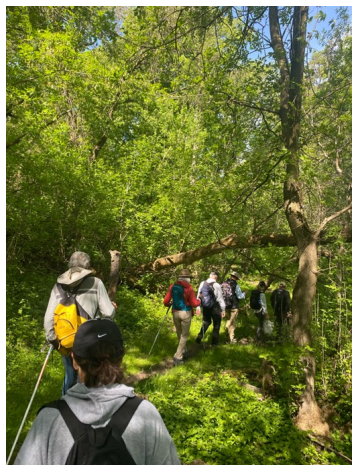

Dress Code

Tamahaac members are responsible for ensuring that their guests follow our dress code. We suggest you share this information with your guests along with a reminder of why we have a dress code. Simply put, we believe it sets our Club apart and is an outward display of respect for each other and our traditions.

Rule of Thumb

Unless otherwise stated in the Social Events calendar (and as outlined below), apparel for all events is jacket & tie for men and comparable dressy attire for women. For all events, if in doubt, dress up, not down.

Wednesday Nights [October-May]: Jacket & Tie

Wednesday buffets from the beginning of October through May are jacket & tie for men and comparable dressy attire for women unless otherwise stated in the monthly calendar.

Wednesday Nights [June-September]: Smart Casual

Jacket and tie are optional. Collared shirts (tucked in), turtlenecks or sweaters, dress slacks and corduroy trousers are appropriate as are (true) Bermuda Shorts and knee-high socks. Ladies to follow suit in comparable attire.

Pub Nights [September-May]: Smart Casual (Plus Denim)

Collared shirts (tucked in), turtlenecks or sweaters, dress slacks, corduroy trousers and denim (not ripped, torn, frayed or bleached please) are appropriate. Ladies to follow suit. Jacket and tie are not required.

Al Fresco Fridays: Summer Casual

Dress is relaxed. Sportswear, e.g. golf and tennis attire, and capris for women, are acceptable as is denim (not ripped etc.). Jacket & Tie are not required.

Club Cocktail Parties, New Year's Eve

Jacket & tie for men and comparable dressy attire for women. Some members will dress more formally (e.g., a tuxedo) but this is optional.

Lunch & Lectures: Jacket [October-May]

Jacket for men (tie optional), comparable dressy attire for women except from June through September when Smart Casual applies.

Music Evenings

Jacket & tie for men, comparable dressy attire for women.

Children's Attire

The Club's dress code applies to children ages 12 and older. Younger children should dress conservatively.
