A Message from the President

Hello Fellow Members,

"Now is the winter of our discontent", Shakespeare famously penned in the first line of Richard III in 1595. This literary winter/summer metaphor alludes to better times ahead; as we emerge from the cold, harsh winter we are "coming near to the end of our unhappiness", said the King. Well, nothing could be truer. Since mid-December with the onslaught of Omicron, we have missed being together at our Club: the camaraderie, the socializing, and visiting with friends. Speaking for myself, and probably many of us, I think it is safe to say that we all look forward to putting the restrictions which befell us in the rear-view mirror! 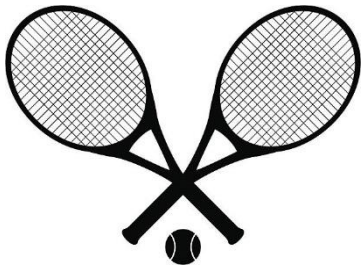

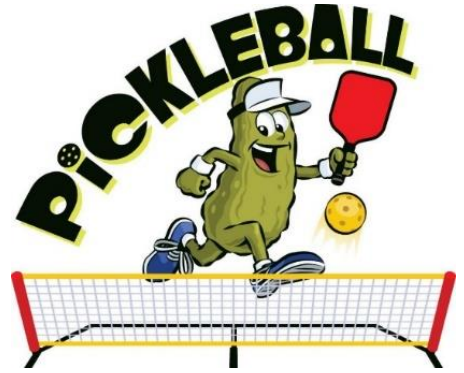


COMMITTEE UPDATES

ARCHIVES

Frank Shirley Panabaker, A. R. C. A.

Most Members of the Tamahaac community are familiar with, and even have in their collections, the works of artist, Frank Panabaker. His oil paintings of peaceful Canadian landscapes, rugged seascapes and erstwhile local street scenes offer a romantic glimpse, and evoke nostalgia for a Canada of years gone by.

Frank Shirley Panabaker was born in Hespeler (now Cambridge) in 1904. He studied at the Ontario College of Art (with Arthur Lismer and J. E. H. MacDonald), and the Grand Central School of art in New York City. He was one of few Canadians to be elected to membership of the Allied Artists of America and was also a member of the Royal Canadian Academy. He was a trustee on the board of the National Gallery of Canada for many years. Panabaker is known for his impressionistic style, favouring an illustrational narrative over the more rhetorical landscapes of his Group-of-Seven peers. Like these peers, however, the colour palettes and tonal composition of Panabaker's work demonstrate an exquisite sensitivity to mood, especially in the landscapes that he painted in all weather and seasons.

Panabaker began his painting career during the Great Depression. In the early years he, with his wife Katherine, travelled widely on painting trips all over Ontario and Canada, ultimately settling in Ancaster. Many of his paintings depict Ancaster's historic buildings and street scenes as well as bucolic landscapes of the Dundas Valley. He developed a loyal clientele, selling his paintings at solo exhibitions in hotels, galleries and libraries and actively pursuing patrons. He sold his work in department stores (Simpsons, Eatons) and through art dealers (The Beckett Gallery, Hamilton and Bronte Harbour Fine Arts, Oakville). He held contracts with Coutts-Hallmark and Rous and Mann to provide paintings to be reproduced for Christmas cards and calendars. Later, his works were sold by Northern Shoreline Fine Art Reproductions run by his grandson, Frank Schwenger. An excerpt from *The Tamahaac Club 1912-2000*, quoting the *Hamilton Spectator* reads: "Hard working, humble and personable are among the words used to describe the man who created thousands of canvasses over almost seven decades." Through the broad appeal of his romantic, impressionistic paintings combined with his vigour and determination, Panabaker was able to earn a living. Indeed, as Laura Ramsay, in her article for *Hamilton This Month* (1989) notes: "He is probably the only Canadian Artist who has been able to support himself entirely through his art." Frank Panabaker was able to continue painting up until the last few weeks of his life, dying in 1992 at the age of 87.

Today, Frank Shirley Panabaker's strong artistic legacy and renown continues. His oil paintings hang in many important collections across Canada and the United States. Notably, Sara Delano Roosevelt bought a Panabaker landscape for her son Franklin which he hung in the White House. Panabaker's work is included in many prestigious public collections such as the National Gallery of Canada, Montreal Museum of Fine Art, Art Gallery of Ontario and the Art Gallery of Hamilton. His originals fetch thousands in galleries (Beckett Fine Art, Hamilton; Creations Gallery, Ancaster; McMaster Gallery, Dundas) and at auction. Reproductions of his work remain very popular. There have been several retrospective exhibitions of his work including the Art Gallery of Hamilton (1995) and Creations Gallery in Ancaster (2017). The Tamahaac Club hosted Amy Hunter, Panabaker's granddaughter, in our 'Lunch and Lecture' series. Amy brought several pieces from her family's private collection and shared her unique perspective in her excellent presentation. Those lucky enough to attend were treated to an inside look at Panabaker: the man, his life and work. One of his other granddaughters, Sarah Schwenger and her husband, Bill Jackson are Members here at the Club.

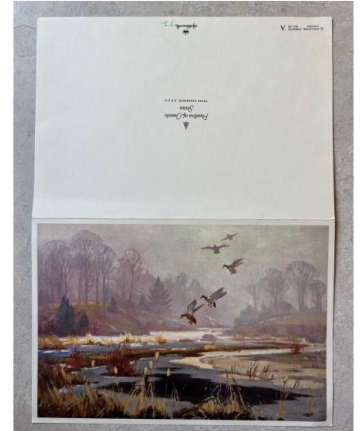
There are four original Panabaker oils in the Tamahaac Club collection.

The first Panabaker acquired by the Tamahaac, *Stream in Winter, 1955*, was donated by Member Fred L. Riffin and his golfing friends in 1957. The Riggins were an American family with multi-generational ties to the Tamahaac Club. As the title suggests, this piece is a rolling landscape of an icy looking stream on a sunny winter's day. It hangs in the centre of the north wall of the living room. The inscription reads:



"Presented to The Tamahaac Club as an expression of gratitude for the hospitality and courtesies extended to us over the years from The American Golfers who compete annually for The Fred L. Riggan Golf Trophy." This trophy, a large pewter bowl, still hold pride of place in the Tamahaac Board Room. This painting could easily be a winter scene of the Hamilton Golf and Country Club.

Ducks Landing in a Pond, 1962, a quiet, wintry landscape was gifted by Member Sis Wigle on behalf of the Wigle family and her brother John. It was the subject of a Hallmark Christmas card in the 'Painters of Canada' series. The inscription reads: "Presented to the Tamahaac Club In Memory of John M. Holton 1926-1997 Donated by the Douglas H Wigle Family." The Wigle and Holton families have a long and storied history with the Club and have supported it for generations. The original oil painting can be found hanging to the left of *Stream in Winter*, 1955 on the north wall of the living room.



The third Panabaker in the Tamahaac collection hangs on west wall in the dining room and was, as the inscription reads, donated to the Tamahaac Club by Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Soule, current and longtime Members and supporters of the Club. It is undated, but titled, *A Winter Stream and Snow Covered Hill*. Another wintry scene, it is assumed to be either the ski hill at Glen Eden or the Beaver Valley ski area.



The fourth and most recent Panabaker original acquired by the Club is **View of the Dundas Valley from the Tamahaac Club**, undated. It is likely pre-1957 as there is a striking similarity to the painting, *Fall Storm, Dundas Valley, Ont.* (Toronto Dominion Bank, Corporate Collection). There is a black and white plate of *Fall Storm* in Frank Panabaker's autobiography, *Reflected Lights* which was published in 1957. This brooding, familiar autumn scene, looking down from the Tamahaac Club over the valley from its escarpment perch, was a gift from Tennis Section and The Tamahaac Club, in partnership. It can be admired from the main stairway to the third floor.



In addition to the four original oil paintings, there have been donations of several reproductions that hang throughout the Club. Many of these were presented to the Club by Panabaker himself, in appreciation for allowing him to make prints from his original oil, *Stream in Winter*, 1955 in the Tamahaac Club private collection.

Cottage Renovation Update

The plan to renovate the house was fostered by the Board of Governors with the objectives of saving the previously vacant house/cottage (then a wasting asset) and generating ongoing, rental revenue. A business-oriented, feasibility/pay-back study was completed before Board expenditure approval.

After approximately six months starting in June 2021, the cottage at the Tamahaac, sometimes referred to as the Manager's house, was completely renovated. **This volunteer project was delivered on budget thanks to the skillful, prudent and energetic leadership of Dennis Kuhlmann** and a changing but constant supply of worker-volunteers consisting principally of Club Members willing to provide their generous (and often back-breaking) assistance. In late January, 2022, the cottage/house was listed for rent on Realtor.ca. The working volunteers who come to mind immediately are shown below and there were others, including all their respective friends, partners and spouses.

The Tamahaac Club often provided light pizza lunches a couple of days a week and Melissa Sacco, Tim Enticott, James Bourdeau and the Tamahaac staff were most supportive.

Renovations, changes and improvements to the house include: 1) A new furnace 2) a new roof, 3) new air conditioning 4) all new windows 5) new wiring and fixtures throughout and new pot lights 6) new doors inside and out 7) new bathrooms with new appliances 8) exterior painting 9) new front sidewalk, 10) gravel on the driveway and on a designated parking area 11) An all new kitchen with new appliances and a new washer dryer in the second, main floor bedroom 12) new hardwood flooring throughout 13) New drywall and insulation followed by painting 14) many miscellaneous beneficial expenditures, like repairing the back deck. An exciting new feature – a cathedral ceiling – was also added.

Volunteerism has long been a Tammy tradition. The above is another fine example.

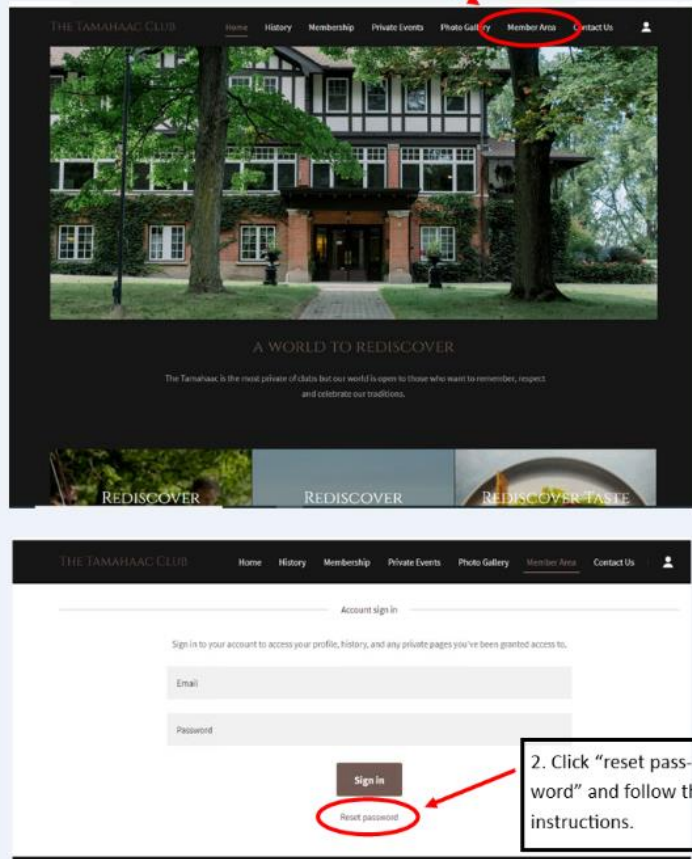
