Hello Members,

Happy New Year!

The fall and Christmas seasons are always special at our Club. The fall events included the car rally, fall walkabout, the fall cocktail party and scotch tasting,

Both the Men's and Ladies' shooting sections enjoyed a successful fall season. Our shooting range looks spectacular with the fall colours and the most amazing view over the Hamilton harbour.

New this fall were the Saturday morning Stretch and Tone classes led by Pat de Vries. Thank you Pat. These classes continue through the winter.

Our December events included the Christmas tree lighting evening, Children's Christmas Party and, of course, the amazing Christmas dinners and New Year's Eve celebration. As always, the Club was beautifully decorated for

the holiday season. Thank you to all the volunteers who provided their time and talent.

Once again, our membership made donations to the Ancaster Community Foundation Outreach Program far exceeding the amount donated last year. Our community partner is touched by our generosity.

Hardy shooters continue to shoot through the winter. They tell me there are no cold days, only poor clothing decisions. As a skier I can certainly attest to that. If you are interested in shooting, please contact one of the shooting captains to arrange an introduction.

Dining at the Club by members and their guests continues to grow with attendance during October to December 17% higher than last year. More people are telling me that they feel a buzz about the Clubhouse whenever they attend and how much they are enjoying dining at the Club.

I want to thank our staff for making our experiences at the Club so special. I hope they enjoyed a well deserved break between Christmas and New Year's and during the first week of January when the Club was closed.

We have made the difficult decision to raise prices for Wednesday and Friday evenings due to inflationary pressures on our food purchases. Commencing March 1, Wednesday dinner will be \$55 and Friday dinner will be \$45. Comparing our prices with restaurants offering a similar level of quality confirms that our Club is continuing to offer great value.

I am delighted and more than a little relieved to finally be able to tell you that the finish line for our lift/accessible washroom project is in sight. The fire alarm system and the lift itself are installed and all that remains to be done is a small amount of construction work around the doors to the lift. This work should be done the

first week of February and then all that is outstanding are the permits from the Technical Safety Standards Authority (TSSA) and the City of Hamilton. We are working diligently to have these permits issued as soon as possible so the lift can begin to be used.

The completion of this project has been a long time coming. Stay tuned for details of the ribbon cutting ceremony.

Watch your emails for Marta's weekly eblast of upcoming events, and at the beginning of the month for the programming for the next two months so you can plan your calendars. There are many exciting events coming up that you (and your friends) won't want to miss.

From the Desk of the General Manager

Hello Members,

Happy New Year!

As we start the New Year, I would like to officially introduce our newest members to the Club. Please help me welcome **Dr. Colin and Deanne Day, Sydney and Benita Wilkinson, Vince and Karen Chan, Nelson and Monica Bradshaw** and returning to the Club, **Stephen Palmer Jr. and Lindsay Palmer**. Several of the families were able to attend our very busy Christmas season and thank you to those members that were able to meet them and make them feel right at home.

Speaking of the Christmas season, WOW, was it busy! You and your guests set a new benchmark at the Club for visits. With 645 Christmas visits, the members and their guests surpassed the previous high mark of 594 visits just the year before, thank you. With all these visits, I did receive several emails from members asking about January statements, in particular:

Q – “Why are there 3 separate charges for an event or dinner on my statement?”

A – Event billing is broken down by the guest makeup for the event. The first entry is the member charge for the event, plus the 10% service charge. The second entry is the adult guests of the members charge, plus the 18% service charge. The third entry is the child's charge, which is at a reduced price, plus the 18% service charge. This format was in place prior to my arrival.

Q – “Is my guest able to pay by credit card or cash at the end of the night?”

A – Yes, guest billing does not have to go on the member's account. Also, great news, we have recently updated our credit card machine so that it is wireless. Now the staff can settle a guest charge at the dinner table or discreetly off to the side. The Club is not able to settle a charge with cash as we do not carry cash on the premises.

We are excited to be announcing our first edition of our Tamahaac takeout menu. starting Wednesday, February 12th. Takeout food will be available for pickup on Wednesdays and Fridays from noon until 8 pm, and on Saturdays from 10 am until 3 pm. As a standard, items such as Chef Shawn's homemade lasagnas, chicken dishes, and assorted broths and soups will be available. To place an order, please contact the office with 24 hours' notice of your desired pick up time and our talented kitchen crew will make you look like a PRO in front of family and friends in no time. Menus will be advertised to the membership via an email on Tuesday and will also be available on the Club website.

Our regular Sunday Brunch was also offered this past week, and it was very well received by our members' families and friends. We will continue to offer Sunday Brunch, and our current schedule is February 23rd, March 23rd, April 20th and May 11th (please make sure you don't miss May 11th as we celebrate the most important people in our lives...Moms!

Thank you to Dr. Embree, aka the Chair Doc, Chris Cayley and Ross Wigle for their many hours dedicated to repairs on the main level during the Club closure.

Also, a very special thank you to all of the Tamahaac staff for their exception hard work and dedication to making the Club so successful during our busiest season.

Thank you to all members for your continued support of the Club and I look forward to seeing you around.

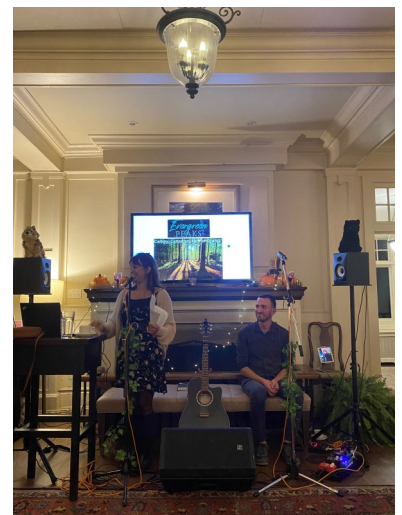

As DOUBLES can be humbling so can be shooting gauges that we don't usually shoot. The FOUR GUN competition is aptly named as we all shoot a round with each gauge; 12/20/28 and .410.

With a 12 gauge, a shooter is using up to 1 1/8 oz. of powder versus only 1/2 oz. with a .410. It is said that the "recoil" on a .410 is the same as "passing gas" = almost nothing. That being said with the progression from 12 through .410 the shooting difficulty increases dramatically. If you are at the top of the contest in the 4 Gun you are an excellent shot – enough said!!

SHOOTING SEASON - MEN

We have had an excellent start to the 2024-2025 Shooting season. Our Men's "Hit and Miss" group has attracted quite a few newer members this year. A number of newer, younger members have shown interest and have come out to shoot. As we are expecting up to 7-8 newer shooters to start this year we will list them in our season wrap up next edition.

Our traditions continue on the shooting field. One of them is having members who are "good shots". This continues but the "boys at the top" are starting to hear the advancement of others as they climb the competency ladder. Notable improvers include Robin St. Jean, Brian Shantz, Greg Ippolito and David Hamber Sr. to name just a few. Regardless of competitive standing, however, the tradition of great camaraderie continues. Our overall # of rounds shot per week has increased significantly as we now have a cadre of regular shooters not only on Saturday mornings, but also on both Wednesday and Friday afternoons. If we were to compare 2015 to 2025 as an example – in 2015 we would have had about 32 rounds of skeet shot per week. Today that number would often be 60 per week. As such our overall engagement has increased over 80%. Mind you – one shooter – Captain Jonathan Walton-Ball, in the words of Scott Wooder – "would shoot until the street lights came on...." So there are some anomalies – but we are encouraged with the increased participation and overall interest.

OTHER EVENT HIGHLIGHTS

If you do not notify the office that you are not coming for your dinner reservation, you will be charged the full price of the advertised events.

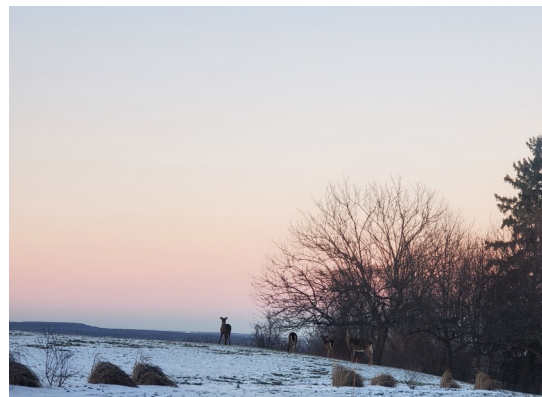

Dress Code

Purpose

Tamahaac members are responsible for ensuring their guests are notified of, and adhere to, the dress code. It is suggested that invitations to guests from a function host include this dress code which is available in pdf format. We believe the dress code sets our Club apart and is an outward display of respect for each other and our traditions.

Rule of Thumb

Unless otherwise stated in the Social Events calendar (and as outlined below), apparel for all events is jacket & tie for men and comparable dressy attire for women. For all events, if in doubt, dress up, not down.

Wednesday Nights [October-April]: Jacket & Tie

Wednesday dinners are jacket and tie for men and comparable dressy attire for women unless otherwise stated in the social events calendar.

Wednesday Nights [May-September]: Smart Casual

Jacket and tie are optional. Collared shirts (tucked in) and dress slacks are appropriate. Knee length dress shorts are also acceptable. Ladies to follow suit.

Pub Nights [October-April]: Smart Casual (Plus Denim)

Jacket and tie are optional. Collared shirts (tucked in), sweaters, dress slacks, corduroy trousers and denim (not ripped, torn, frayed or bleached) are appropriate. Ladies to follow suit.

Al Fresco Fridays: [May-September] Summer Casual

Dress is relaxed. Sportswear (i.e. golf and tennis attire) is acceptable as is denim (not ripped, torn, frayed or bleached).

Club Cocktail Parties

Jacket (tie optional) for men and comparable dressy attire for women.

Christmas Dinners: Jacket & Tie

Jacket and tie for men and comparable dressy attire for women, except Christmas pub night when smart casual plus denim is appropriate.

Men's Christmas Pub Lunch

Jacket required and tie is optional.

Lunch & Lectures: Jacket [October-April]

Jacket for men (tie optional), comparable dressy attire for women except from May through September when Smart Casual applies.

Music Evenings

Jacket and tie for men, comparable dressy attire for women.

Children's Attire

The Club's dress code applies to children ages 12 and older. Younger children should dress conservatively.
