Those teaching pros brought it in spades.



As the District has again adopted a deficit budget to share the surplus in our treasury, your Chapter Support Team will seek to strike a balance in the **LOL Grants Program** between supporting Chapters threatened with survival and providing funds for thriving Chapters seeking to grow. Thus in 2025, we will continue to provide:

• **Chapter Show Grants UP TO \$750** per Chapter per year to subsidize registered District Quartets to perform at your shows.

• Chapter Development Grants UP TO \$1,000 per Chapter per year to help in your creative projects and Chapter development efforts.

The Chapter Support Team continues to encourage more communication between Chapters and the District. We hope to improve and expand the *District – Chapter Liaison Program*. We have made some assignment changes and the group continue to seek leaders willing to serve as District Liaisons for one or two of their neighboring Chapters. PLEASE reach out to me if you want to discuss getting involved, have ideas to share or questions we can explore together!

KATHRYN ZIEGLER, OCCUPATIONAL THERAPIST

Editor's note: Kathryn is going to be hosting a new segment in the Pitch Piper, related to her expertise as an occupational therapist. (She'll explain below.)

Hi everyone! Let me introduce myself, my name is Kathryn Ziegler, and I've known about barbershop for as long as I can remember; my grandfather was a member of the Narraganset Bay Chorus (Providence, RI), and my family and I joined him at two different internationals in Montreal (2003) and Kansas City (2011). My involvement in barbershop has grown substantially since then, and I am now a lead in Forward Harmony!

When not ringing chords with 49 of the most genuinely kind and welcoming individuals, I am a pediatric occupational therapist in Fitchburg, WI.

"Pediatrics? Occupational therapy? What does that have to do with barbershop?"

Well, as I like to tell the families and kids I treat, occupational therapy is all about helping people do what they need and want to do in their daily lives.

Our lives are filled with what we call "occupations," which fall into many different categories. Occupations include, but are not limited to, activities of daily living (brushing teeth, getting dressed, etc.), rest and sleep, work, social participation, and leisure. I would classify barbershop into two of those categories, social participation and leisure.

Social participation is defined as: "Activities that involve social interaction with others, including family, friends, peers, and community members, and that support social interdependence" (Bedell, 2012; Khetani & Coster, 2019; Magasi & Hammel, 2004).

Leisure activities are defined as: "Nonobligatory activity that is intrinsically motivated and engaged in during discretionary time, that is, time not committed to obligatory occupations such as work, self-care, or sleep" (Parham & Fazio, 1997, p. 250).

Barbershop fits pretty perfectly within both of these, I would say!

A main focus of occupational therapists around the country (and world), is helping people get back to (or start) completing meaningful occupations. What is meaningful to one person, may not be meaningful to the next, and occupational therapists are masters at seeking out and finding what truly matters to our clients.

Barbershop, to me, is absolutely one of my personal meaningful occupations. Not only does it connect me to my grandfather, but my brother (Matt Record, sings with the Capital City Chordsmen and Pour Four More), and it was through connections made through this wonderful little hobby that I met my husband (Bryan Ziegler).

Music and singing have been a part of my life for as long as I can remember, but becoming an occupational therapist and learning more about occupations shed new light on my involvement with music. In a world with so many unknowns, going to rehearsal every other Sunday and singing alongside my friends is something I have come to cherish.

I know that once I step into that room, I am valued, respected, and loved. My voice gets to blend with those around me to not only make music, but tell stories of hope, acceptance, and light. It doesn't get much more meaningful than that. - Kathryn

Heart o' Lakes Harmony Enjoys Holiday Success Brent Gerber, Director of Heart o' Lakes Harmony (Fergus Falls)

As a culmination of a year-long focus on inviting guests to sing with us, we chose to use our Christmas show as an opportunity to have guests join us in preparation and performance. And our results were really incredible. Throughout our 4 week preparation we had 17 different individuals join us at a rehearsal and of those 14 joined onstage at one of our performances.

We've done these campaigns before with varying degrees of success-some very good, but honestly most with mediocre results. So why was this one different?

It started early in the year when we took a few minutes out of our rehearsals in January to do some self-analysis. We looked at our strengths and areas where we had opportunities to grow. We analyzed where our members were coming from as we cover a pretty wide footprint in Minnesota Lakes Country. We looked at our demographic, our average age, etc.

From this analysis, we set 2 clear objectives for the year. We needed to grow the chorus. We typically had between 15 and 20 members at practice and the average age of our members was creeping up there. We set a goal of 10 new members, but more than anything we wanted to just have some good guest activity.

Secondly, we made a goal to perform somewherepaid or unpaid—every month. We knew that to generate interest in the chorus and support for our shows, we needed to be seen in public. It's not easy with three main "market areas"-Fergus Falls, Detroit Lakes, and Pelican Rapids areas of Minnesota.

We have previously done 2 church performance Sundays per summer where we go to multiple churches on a Sunday Morning and sing—usually 5-8 churches per Sunday. We get on a bus and zip around attempting to time things so we can just go in and sing and get onto the next church. It's a lot of fun. (And we miss the collection plate and the sermon!)

So this year we decided to do three—one in each of the market areas. And we did one per month.

That satisfied June, July and August in our pledge to sing publicly every month. All told I estimate that we sang for over 1,500 people in 19 churches plus a stop at the VA nursing home in Fergus Falls. That's really great exposure for the chorus.

Our planning process also told us that most all of our current members came to the group through a personal invitation to join. Others said that some local advertising during the Christmas Chorus push in prior years had piqued their interest.

The chorus members delivered! We had guests almost every week throughout the year. It was nice to see some new

faces; many of whom have stayed throughout the year. And that really was the secret to our success in November-the chorus members invited people to join us. And they came. And the members redoubled their efforts in November as they turned out those 17 interested singers.

Other important elements of our campaign:

•We supported our campaign with radio advertising to promote the rehearsals and shows. The District provided a grant to reimburse us for half the cost. Thank you!

• We selected a show repertoire of 7 songs with a good mix of moderately difficult to easy tunes AND provided top quality learning tracks from Choral Tracks. (They are exceptional with part-predominant, part-missing, and general mix. We have taken advantage of the annual "membership" and I would encourage every chorus to look into that.)

• We were prepared with music folders and materials to provide information about what was happening during the rehearsals and things leading up to the shows.

• We taught the members how to access the tracks in a members-only shared drive. Technology can be scary and we showed them how to overcome their fears. It took some valuable rehearsal time, but it was worth it.

• Our rehearsals were fast-moving and fun. I tried to keep things to about 1 1/2 hours or less.

• We had coffee at the end of the rehearsal and just visited with our new friends. No pressure to join.

• We partnered with a local Sweet Adeline Chorus to present the show. They sang on our show in Pelican Rapids and we sang on theirs in Fargo. It created some variety and lightened the load on the chorus. Great experience for both groups!

But the most exciting part of this campaign is what is happening now. We have already had 6 of these guys sign up to be members and expect perhaps another 4-5 to also join.

They are having a great time! And what they've added to our group in terms of energy, part balance, skill and personality is absolutely priceless.

And the best part is that these new guys all have networks of potential audience members and singers of their own. So growth in your numbers really does position you for more growth.

There is no magic bullet here. This worked because all of the members pulled together to make it happen. Will it work for us again next year-maybe not. But I can assure you we will be doing it some form again.

Just Jack Being Jack

Jack Edgerton was my first boss straight out of school at the insurance company here in Stevens Point in 1974. We've been colleagues ever since. He taught me to be accurate and meticulous about computer programming, and accounting for every dollar from our customers.

By then he had been at this music thing for quite some time already.

Growing up in Madison, Wisconsin, his parents were friends with the Madison Cardinals, a District quartet that competed at International. He got familiar with the barbershop style at an early age. He started quartet singing as a high school freshman with "I Had a Dream Dear." He was in quartets all the way through high school and college.


Jack was a drummer with the Madison Scouts Drum and Bugle Corps, a national champion, from 1950-1958.

When he moved to Stevens Point in 1962 he joined the local chapter and was in a quartet within six weeks, competing right away and performing in chapter shows. He was elected chapter president in 1966 at age twenty-six.

"That was very intimidating. How could I tell these older guys what to do?"


He's been involved in the chapter management in one way or another ever since.

He won the first of his five Stevens Point Barbershopper of

He helped form a quartet when the Stevens Point chapter toured Europe in 1981. The Suburbans thought they would compete at Division in the Spring just to get some practice, but were surprised to come in second. That quartet performed in Germany, Austria, France, Switzerland, and for a BABS chapter in the UK. When they competed that Fall at District they took fourth. They brought props on stage including a tennis racket, a charcoal grill, and a golf club. At the end of their last song they actually teed up and hit a golf ball into the judge's pit. It was a whiffle ball, but still.

His Ragtime quartet competed at International in 1978-1979. He's been in any number of quartets before and after that.

Later he grabbed a few newer guys and formed an off-the-cuff quartet to enter Division for

fun and to get them involved in the contest environment. He did that again to form Regal Blend, my quartet for twenty-five years.



His first District contest

was in Hopkins Minnesota in the Fall of 1963, and he's been to every one since. Over a hundred to date. The furthest one was in Saskatoon.

He held District board positions from 1991



through 2024. He started as Packerland Division VP in 1991, was District President 2001-2002, and was District Treasurer for nineteen years.

Not to mention District Barbershopper of the Year in 1997 and getting selected to the District Hall of Fame in 2004.

He was certified by the Society as a Contest Administrator from 2005-2013. Not least of all, he has sixteen Man of Note awards. So far.

His life experiences are tied to barbershop events. He dates his heart attack in 1994 to the District contest weekend.

Do you have anything to say, Jack? Besides 'What bright side?'

"Yes. Get involved in something."

Why do you do all this, Jack?

"Music has been my life. I've gotten a lot out of Barbershop, I owe it to people to give back."

The District is in good financial shape today, thanks in large part to Jack's careful work as Treasurer. The care and precision he drilled into me is the same care and precision he brought to his District work, and indeed to singing.

Downtown Stevens Point has a large mural featuring the scene from the 1910 Stock Fair Day on the Market Square. Dozens of present-day citizens were added into the picture. Jack is immortalized there on the stone wall. He looks like he is about to break out in song.

I've known Jack as long as I can remember. I have vivid memories as a five-year old of sitting on the floor in the basement of the Stevens Point clubhouse at an after-afterglow listening to Ragtime sing "If I were a Rich Man," and Jack interplaying with the audience, especially me.

I was 13 when I joined the chapter and Jack uneqivocally and unsurprisingly took me under his wing, especially after I switched parts to sing tenor with "God's chosen few."

Jack followed all my sports in High School, even though my alma mater of Amherst was a rival of his kids' Pacelli. As I grew threw college and after, we spent many late nights closing down the rehearsal afterglows, rinsing the beer pitchers, switching parts to fill holes as the crowds dwindled, then going out for breakfast at 3 or 4 am.

When Coulee Classic attended the chapter installation banquet and Christmas party the December after our 2021 win, who was the one telling stories til 3am? The man the myth the legend, Jack.

Care for a bit of wisdom from the man who has been the identity of the Stevens Point chapter for so long? "There's no such thing as a bad potato salad, only varying degrees of good."

No due is enough to represent everything you've put in, Jack, but know that your friendship and influence is felt and will continue to inspire others.

Hi Land O' Lakes Friends,

I just returned from the Midwinter Convention in San Antonio, and what a joy it was to see so many of you there! But this wasn't my first time in San Antonio—my first visit was in 2008, and it changed my life.

I remember standing on stage with 25 nervous but excited young singers from Northwest Vocal Project. We were one of only six choruses at the very first Youth Festival, and none of us knew what to expect. But when the lights came up and our voices filled the hall with Sweet Georgia Brown, When She Loved Me, and Wade in the Water, the response was electric. The standing ovation, the cheers—it was unforgettable.

But the real magic happened after we left the stage.



In just hours, those young singers transformed. They weren't just "kids" anymore they were barbershoppers. Swapping tags, making friends, realizing that even the "elderly" (30 and up!) could hang. Barbershop became a bridge across generations.

That transformation wasn't luck. It took vision—BHS daring to create a Youth Festival. And it took generosity—HFI donors stepping up to make it possible.

Now, nearly two decades later, that vision isn't just surviving—it's thriving. Young singers are everywhere at district and international conventions. Programs like the Next Generation quartet contests and Harmony University are growing, and HFI initiatives like The Power of Harmony and AIC outreach are lifting up new voices.

But here's the truth: this work doesn't fund itself. BHS creates these incredible programs, but HFI makes them accessible to young people. It's one thing to host an event—it's another to ensure kids can afford to be there. HFI donors make that possible.

Repertoire That Engages Audiences and Performers

We, as performers, always want to be as entertaining as we can be; our audiences deserve to be wanting more as we leave the stage. A major factor in bringing butts outta seats is our song selection.

So often we find ourselves pining after the big-time groups. "Champ-chasing," it could be called. We hear Vocal Spectrum or After Hours or Westminster slay on the International Contest stage, and we think, "that's what we need to do." Kinda, is the answer. We need to slay for *who we are*. And just ask any judge, they'll say the same thing!

The problem we face is that those charts are designed to show off vocal and musical prowess of elite talents. Hey guess what, I'm not an elite talent and most of us AREN'T. If we want to slay, we need to have music that is achievable at our appropriate level! The paradox here is that not all of that attainable music is fully ENGAGING, for both performers and audiences (those two concepts are very much related).

1. Audiences love to hear music they're familiar with.

2. They love to hear music executed pretty decently.

I think we all have experienced that reaction during a performance.

Singers like to grow, but also don't like to waste too much time. (If a crazy difficult song takes 1.5 years to really learn, it's a good exercise in improvement, but at the expense of perhaps learning several other, easier songs. And BOTH CAN BE GOOD! That's part of why all of this is difficult, right?)
 We all know that when we program a song we genuinely like, we both learn it faster and perform it with more gusto. (and audiences can tell)

THIS IS A SERVICE THE DISTRICT CAN OFFER.

I have personally had several conversations on this subject and district leadership is working on putting together a LIST of potential rep songs that are FUN, FAMILIAR, ENGAGING, AND ACHIEVABLE. FFAE! Some smarter than I would say all music VPs and directors should use this concept as a filter for the majority of musical decisions.

So keep your eyes open for this list to be coming out this spring. Shoot an email to me (starquarterback14@yahoo.com) or Scott Perau (sperau@gmail.com) or Jim Rasmus (pjras20@gmail.com) if you have any ideas or suggestions. We're looking for about 500 titles. STAY TUNED!!


young teaching quartet is important for this event. The young men can identify with them and know that this is not just an old guy's hobby.





Paul Herzog Remembrance

February 13, 1933 to December 30, 2024.

Paul Herzog was originally a member of the Tri-Town Chapter, which became the Greendale Chapter of the S.P.E.B.S.Q.S.A. (Village Showmen Chorus) where he won a BOTY award. He became part of the Milwaukee Chapter when Greendale and Milwaukee merged in 1984. He sang in the Festival City Chorus well into his 80s.

Paul was well known for his handyman skills, and was responsible for designing and constructing many sets for chapter shows.

He was seldom without a big smile on his face and a wisecrack or two.

He mostly sang bass, but would often migrate to the lead or tenor note if he liked that one better. When we were woodshedding, he loved to sing the lead part, which could be a struggle for whoever was singing bass, because Paul would pitch the lead part down where he was comfortable. The tenor would never complain, though !

Paul was from Illinois, where he worked as an installer for the telephone company. In his later years, he did handyman work for anyone who needed it, at reasonable prices. Many of us in the Chapter made use of his services. There was almost no job he wouldn't tackle.
