

### **CHAPTER SUPPORT REPORT**

We had a good District Liaison Meeting on April 12th – with 13 District Liaisons present reporting on 25 of our 35 Chapters. It was a lively and informative conversation.

#### Here's a summary of successful programs highlighted:

- The **Faribault** Chapter held a grant-sponsored outreach effort on Barbershop Quartet Day featuring 9 quartets from southern MN singing in a community venue.
  - **Bismarck-Mandan** works as a team involving EVERYONE on Singing Valentines.
- **Winnipeg** credits their Learn to Sing Better program and a move to more contemporary music to their continued growth to nearly 50 members.
- St. Croix Valley is finding success in proactively targeting empty nestors, retirees, and independent senior living residents. They communicate not only with prospects but also with family and friends to encourage prospects to give Barbershop a try.
- Some significant inter-Chapter events are: **Windom-Mankato** plan to do 4 shows together this spring; the upcoming **West Region Spring Sing** in Valey City; **Como Park** event in St. Paul. I can add the annual **Chicken Chew** in Oshkosh and the possibility of an **East Region** event in 2026.
- Several mentioned the financial benefits and adaptability of Choral Tracks to help their chorus learn new music faster and better.
- Another theme is the importance of how Chapters function as a kind of large, extended family culture. But consider **Winnipeg's** experience of having about 30 of the members who have been with the Chapter for less than 5 years and haven't experienced the LOL or BHS Family.

#### Chapter leadership concerns raised this time were:

- If a Chapter is concerned about growth and wonder about shifting from all-male to all-voice, a model to consider might be adding a second chorus, e.g., Greendale, Minneapolis and Regina.
- The LTA materials we offer are good! The tricky part is finding people to fit the roles and prioritizing what matters the most. Developing long-term music planning beyond the next performance can be a real challenge for some Chapters. How might we develop administrative consultants or coaching models for Chapters?

#### Areas of Executive Functioning...And BARBERSHOP

Hello again! I am back to chat with you all a bit more about connections between my professional career as a pediatric occupational therapist, and the hobby that I love so much, barbershop!

This edition's topic is executive functioning.

I work with kids on executive functioning skills almost every day, and have been able to apply a lot of what I have learned to my time as a barbershopper as well! Some of the specific skills I may work on include working memory, shift, emotional control, organization, planning, and goal-setting. Here's an introduction to those areas!

Working memory: Namely, our ability to take in information and hold it for a short amount of time. This is an important aspect of taking in notes from our directors, and being able to apply them shortly after. Working memory can eventually be transferred to long term memory, through practice and using other various strategies, especially learning our music!

**Shift:** This is the ability to change your focus, adapt, and alter your behavior based on the situation at hand. Think about a time something has gone wrong during a performance. How were you able to shift your focus back to the task at hand, making beautiful harmony?

**Emotional control:** Okay, okay, this one is pretty self-explanatory, as it's the ability to control your emotions. I'm not sure if any of you have seen Forward Harmony's

sets, but let me tell you, this is an important skill for us all to learn (Bryan loves some good emotional damage). Being able to understand your emotions (nerves before a big show, feeling silly with friends during rehearsal, anger when you just can't quite sing the song right), and engage regulatory strategies to help you manage these emotions, is huge for us all!

**Organization:** Organizing your physical space, and well as your mental space is incredibly important. Creating methods to organize your music, having a space to practice that is not cluttered, and setting plans for learning your music are all ways to help with the learning process!

**Self-monitoring:** How are you at recognizing what parts of your music you really need to work on? Voice recording can be a powerful tool in monitoring your success with learning music!

**Planning/Goal-setting:** Does your chorus want to qualify for International this year? Are you hoping to start a new quartet? The executive functioning skills of planning and goal-setting are important factors in how you figure out the steps you'll need to take to reach that goal, and take action to check each of those steps off the list as you go.

While the above skills do not encompass all of the executive functioning skills I may work on with my clients, I think this gives a good snapshot into the ones that relate the best to barbershop!

With the powers of all of these skills combined, you will learn your music, power through unexpected challenges, understand your emotions (and be able to connect them even more to your music), and work towards the goal of being the best barbershopper you can be!

Throughout this series we'll continue digging deeper into these core concepts!

### **DEL**By Tim Milbrandt

For "Honoring Our Heroes" this issue we are focusing on someone who isn't a quartet singer (with one humorous exception) or director, but has been and continues to be one of the behind-the-scenes folks who keep things organized and moving forward so that everyone else can enjoy our wonderful hobby. In sports terms they would call him a "glue guy", because what he brings to the table helps everything stick together.

Del Ryberg was born just after the end of the Great Depression in Fairmont, Minnesota. Growing up during World War II and the Korean War was a tough time. After his father lost his job the family relocated to Kenyon, Minnesota, which is where Del Graduated High School. The Draft was in full swing and the week he graduated from High School he received the letter from the draft board and joined the US Army shortly thereafter.

Del was released from the Army in March 1956, was hired by IBM in June, and was married to his High School sweetheart Mary in September. Mary was singing with a Sweet Adeline Quartet and this is what pulled him into the world of Barbershop music.

In 1960 Del and Chuck Guthrie started the Rochester Barbershop Chapter and in a period of 6 years had grown to 66 members. During the following years the Chorus captured the Southwest Division Chorus



Championship for 7 consecutive years.

In the summer of 1974, Del received a call from Jim Richards asking him to fill a vacancy on the District Board for the Southwest Division Vice President position. This began a 40+ year span of officer positions and committee jobs.



While working as a Procurement Engineer for IBM for 37 years Del simultaneously served in many positions for his chapter, the district, and The Society. Some notable activities include:

- Holding basically every board position within the Rochester chapter
- Chapter BOTY in 1963, 1965 and 1997 34 years from first to last BOTY!
- Many district offices including president
- International board member for four years
- District Convention Manager/ VP Events from 1991-2003
- District BOTY, Hall of Fame and Lifetime Achievement Award recipient
- Chapter Officer School committee 1981 to 1995
- COTS/Leadership Academy Chair 1996 2024
- Served on many committees and authored several manuals

# Here are some of Del's highlights as a 66 year member of The Society:

- Serving as faculty for the Chapter Officer Training Schools (COTS) throughout The Society
- The 50th Anniversary District convention in 1993 in Rochester culminating in a chorus combined of the Minneapolis Commodores and Mason City Chorus with over 150 singers leading the audience in singing "From The First Hello to The Last Goodbye" and directed by Joe Liles. There wasn't a dry eye in the arena and a non-barbershop friend remarked afterward, "that was the most awesome thing I have ever heard in my entire life".





- The 1976 Spring Convention hosted by the Regina, Saskatchewan Chapter who hosted a "Provincial State Dinner" on Saturday night for all attendees. There was bagpipe music, a head table on a dais for the District Board members, and board members' wives were escorted in on the arm of Canadian Mounties.
- International Mid-Winter Convention in Hawaii when a Barbershop friend and pilot gave Mary and Del a ride in a single engine plane over an erupting Mount Kilauea volcano at 700 feet.
- Del's one and only public performance in a quartet was singing a tag with Grandma's Beaus as a fill-in for Jim Richards when Jim was the Society President. They sang "TAG NE1".for the International Board. Sound it out and it is "tag anyone?". Friend and coach Judy Ode-Olson listened to them warming up and commented "It can only get better".
- A convention in Racine, Wisconsin at a school when computers controlled everything and the doors

were locked and the air conditioning was off and it took until noon to rectify things as everyone waited.



• A Spring convention in Bismark where there was no backstage so Quartets and Choruses were staged in the lobby of the Hotel across the street. The signal to bring the next group over was turning on the light in the bathroom so the groups across the street could see it and knew it was time to walk on stage.

As long as I can remember, Del Ryberg has been an important part of the Land 'O Lakes Barbershop landscape. He has been, and remains, passionate about doing his part to keep barbershop healthy and thriving. As we visited recently he mentioned several efforts he is involved in currently (at age 91) as he continues doing what he has always done — making his contribution and doing the behind the scenes work that helps everyone else to continue enjoying this hobby.

If you haven't found your way to give back to this wonderful hobby, take a page from Del's book and consider looking for one small way to serve- you never know where it could lead!

### Musings from a Barbershop Curmudgeon

#### The Rise of Choruses in a Quartet Society

It is clear that O.C. Cash and Rupert Hall envisioned their newlycreated organization in 1938 as a quartet society. The name says it all: The Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barber Shop Quartet Singing in America. It wasn't long, however, before chorus-singing became a staple of chapter meetings everywhere. As early as the first midwinter meeting of the fledgling society held in St. Louis in 1940, the host chapter members directed by Norman Rathert, who was to become the Society's second president, serenaded visiting Barbershoppers with a choral performance. Rathert's counsel to Cash regarding the virtues of chapter chorus development was equally prophetic and persuasive: "If you get a group of men together and teach them to sing their parts, look at how many quartets you are bringing into being real fast."

A brief look back at chapter activity in our Land O'Lakes District illustrates the evolution of chorus activity in the Society. I grew up in Southeastern Wisconsin and first became familiar with the Barbershop organization when the Sheboygan, Wisconsin chapter

was founded in 1945. They presented their first Parade of Quartets the following year and I attended their annual show a few years later. O.H. (King) Cole, later to become President of SPEBSQSA, was the organizer and first chapter president. The new chapter had 75 charter members and put on its first show in 1946. (I actually sang Barbershop harmony with a group of men in nearby Cedar Grove, Wisconsin, although we never officially joined the Barbershop Society. That experience was pivotal in my joining the Junction City Barbershop Chapter in the Central States District while stationed at Fort Riley in 1953).


But I digress! King Cole, who was to become International Society president in 1948 and 1949, simultaneously organized a Barbershop chapter in nearby Manitowoc, Wisconsin. This chapter also chartered in 1945 and boasted 80 members. They put on their first show that same year featuring 15 quartets including international gold medalists, the Harmony Halls (1944) from Grand Rapids, Michigan, and the Misfits (1945) from Chicago. The show also featured the Manitowoc Chapter chorus, so clearly the chapter was formed with chorus-singing as one of its planned activities, a mere seven years after the Society was formed to preserve and propagate "barber shop quartet singing."

I should also mention that King Cole's daughter. Ginny Cole Osborn, demonstrated her own organizing skills by putting together the soon-to-be-famous female quartet, the Chordettes, who began their rise to fame by singing and recording Barbershop harmo-

ny. Moreover, even though they never became members, their rise to fame coincided with the establishment of the **Sweet Adelines** Organization which attracted thousands of women to the art and the thrill of ringing Barbershop chords. It's interesting to note that the Chordettes appeared on the Minneapolis Chapter's initial show in 1948. The Minneapolis Chapter had chartered four years previously, the first Minnesota chapter to do so.

At any rate, the Manitowoc show program makes clear that by 1945 at least, Barbershop chapters were involving choruses in their public performances. The old standard Parade of Quartets was more and more setting aside a time slot for the chapter chorus, and chapter members started campaigning for chorus competition similar to that set up for quartets. According to Harry Purinton, longtime Land O'Lakes District Historian, the Society's first chorus contest was held in Oshkosh, Wisconsin, on July 21, 1946, which interestingly ended in a first-place tie between Milwaukee and Manitowoc.

The international office also lent support to the growing interest in chapter choruses. In 1948 it made available to chapters materials to help with chorus development. This was followed a few years later by the publication of barbershop harmony song folios designed to ease the problem of what to sing.

The next step involved setting up the framework for chorus competition at the international level. Each district was invited to send to the 1953 international convention in Detroit up to two choruses each of which had to include at least 20 singers. Since not all districts at the time had set up the mechanism for selecting their top competitive choruses, the winner of the Detroit contest, the Grand Rapids Michigan chorus, was named the 1953 International Convention Championship Chorus. Naming an International Chorus Champion would have to wait until next year.

By 1954 all districts had set up qualifying procedures and 22 choruses showed up in Washington, D.C. to compete for the first international chorus gold medal. The Land O'Lakes District was represented by the Madison Chapter Chorus directed by **Joe Ripp**, baritone of the popular Cardinals quartet. The Washington, D.C. chorus became the first international chorus champion.

Prior to the 1955 Miami Convention rules had changed a bit. Each district was allotted only one chorus slot. Unfortunately, only ten of the Society's districts sent a representative to Miami. (Central States, Evergreen, Far Western, and Michigan districts failed to compete). The primary reason for their absence appeared to be the high cost of participation, especially for choruses which had to travel significant distances to district


contest sites, not to mention the host city of the international contest.

There were serious questions about whether or not chorus competition would survive given the cost issue. Our Land O'Lakes District took immediate measures to reduce travel costs associated with chorus competition by adopting what they called a "divided chorus contest." In 1956 two chorus contests were held to select the district champion. The Sheboygan Chapter hosted the eastern contest on July 29th; St. Paul hosted the western contest on August 19th. The same judging panel was used for both contests and scores from the two contests were combined to select the champion. The Sheboygan chorus won the eastern division and the overall contest. Eau Claire outscored its rivals in the western division but finished third overall. (To the best of my knowledge the "divided chorus contest" was put to rest after its one-year trial).

Because of the financial issues associated with chorus competition, serious consideration was given at the 1955 meeting of the Society Board of Directors to discontinue the international chorus contest. Moreover, a motion to do just that was defeated at the 1956 Midwinter Convention held (believe it or not) in Minneapolis. However, a motion was approved to present the same motion to the House of Delegates at their meeting at the 1956 Convention held in Minneapolis. Needless to say the motion to abolish chorus competition failed; it's still going strong today. As far

as I know there has never been another serious challenge to that aspect of Society competition.

In 2004 moreover, the Society changed its name from the Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barber Shop Quartet Singing in America to the Barbershop Harmony Society. Barbershop quartetting was no longer singled out as a point of emphasis; Barbershop Harmony, whether sung by foursomes or larger groups, clearly became the focus and remains so today.



### What is Happening at Headquarters?

So here's a quick update with a few points.

- 1. BHS is (finally) solidly back in the black, financially speaking. The regrettable mess with HFI is in the past and recovery is above expectations. Convention registrations for International in Denver are also outpacing budget. Things are looking good, from that standpoint.
- 2. One of the biggest complaints from membership is that staff is hard to get ahold of for customer service. The leadership team at HQ is astutely aware of this completely legitimate concern and is looking at possible solutions that will continue to keep the budget safe:
  - -BHS has a wealth of folks willing to volunteer.
  - -Somewhere in the range of 80% of calls and messages can be answered from a list of the FAQ's on the website.

The initiative that HQ is looking to implement is how to train and mobilize its great volunteer base to help with some 80% of the volume of customer service issues on the plate so the CS staff can be more prompt and responsive and, you know,

ACTUALLY PROVIDE CUSTOMER SERVICE.

3. The other biggest disconnect between headquarters and the "boots on the ground" Joe Barbershop folks, has been that the highest amount of money from dues goes to the level of the organization with which they interact the least. Most folks get the most fulfillment from their weekly rehearsals and community involvement, which makes HQ seem superfluous and perhaps unnecessary. Discussions here are thorough and ongoing, because everyone can see that that's poor business practice!

Value can be either direct or indirect, and the discussions get complicated. Pilot programs have been discussed, heatedly, and ended up back to the drawing board to work out more of the kinks that have been brought up. The main takeaway is that communication is improving and the feeling of "top-down" mandates is lessening. We will continue to keep you informed throughout the process. Lots to unpack.

So there's been legit frustrations. We feel now that they've actually been heard. And not just lip service, we're really working to make changes. (Even if some of it is still frustratingly slow.)
