

Hopefully your Holiday Season brought you a lot of joy, continued health, and music.

Many chapters have held performances and shows, including ours. What a great opportunity each year to show our communities what we do best!

Rolling into 2025, there is an exciting trend we are noticing from Harmony Hall: though they have always been willing to do what they could to make Barbershop accessible and inviting to more singers, it seems that they are now doing that by dipping into the vast talents

of the membership for our best ideas on the subjects.

Three BHS projects come to mind:

The staff understands that call response times are sometimes lengthy and aggravating even to get simple answers. It is difficult to adequately staff for that in light of tight budgets. This said, Harmony Hall is trying to get a group of member volunteers to grab some of the hours that are unstaffed.

They will train people on the answers people are asking (over 80% of call time is regarding subjects listed in the FAQ section of the society website) and will happily accept any time you might devote to that cause. I believe I alluded to this in a prior article, and will be





glad to direct you to the right contacts if this sounds good to you.

You may have taken part in a survey that is attempting to define the "Brand" that is Barbershop music. Focus groups

(of which I was a part) listened to what it means to be in this great community of great musical people. From this has come a direction that you will hear a lot about shortly into the new year.

Part of the idea with the "Brand" definition is that all of our members should be able to use the verbiage that support it to describe our hobby to new people (ie potential singers, audience members, supporters...).

Our own Jay Althof has been working on a proposed new method of dues payment to modernize the way BHS is funded. There have been others working with him, and now BHS is ready to pilot a program based on some of the pillar ideas.

Here's how it is proposed: there are three tiers based on membership of a chapter. Take the example of a large tier.

A. BHS will halve the amount of BHS portion of dues for members of the chapter. This would take full dues from \$180 down to \$90 for the year.

B. The Chapter would pay BHS \$6,000. (Lesser member-number tiers would pay at a smaller tier price point than the \$6000.)

It does not matter how that \$6,000 is raised. The

chapter could take it from chapter coffers; it could split it among the members - and still save the members money; they could have members who donate to the chapter pick up the cost. Many ways to skin the cat.

I am certain that the volunteer chapters will figure out

what makes the most sense in their situations for making up the \$6,000 - and if it goes forward as a program, we will all learn from it. Regardless, the idea is that you take a lot of the bite out of the International dues portion of our dues for individuals. This should make membership more appealing by removing more of the cost barriers inherent to our sport.



I am currently in the process of speaking with some of our chapters who might benefit most from this experiment for 2025. Jay, Nate Peplinski and I have met to figure out who those first chapters might be.

Look for more information as we get it.
2025 will be a year of change. Let's all work together to make it change for the better.

The Guy Can Do—Lowell Bennes

I was in my early twenties when I joined the FM Ambassador chorus in Fargo. It was my first exposure to an active, active chapter. We sang out a lot, we held annual shows in front of audiences of 3-5,000 people (that's not a misprint). And we had very active programs including a lot of quartet promotion.

It was from those activities that I became curious about who this guy with the beautiful bass voice named Lowell Bennes was. I sang a few tags with him and soon Lowell, Ron Judisch (another now deceased member of the Fargo Chorus) and a friend of mine from college, Phil Vanyo started singing in a quartet—the Broadway Edition. (Later, Mark McLaurin joined in the Vocal Parade quartet.)

"Can we learn a song for the show?" I asked.

"Sure we can," said Lowell. And we did.

It wasn't easy; the learning process was slow in those days. But we did it. And Lowell never wavered.

We wondered about competition. "Sure we can," was Lowell's response. And we competed in the Red Carpet Division contest. We also did a chapter show or two. We had lots of fun and got to know each other well through travels to all of these

events and other chorus activities.
The truth is that Lowell was a very big part of my early barbershop days.

Later, became the director of the Great Plains Harmony Chorus



and my relationship with Lowell now centered around the technical production elements of our shows. Lowell took care of sound and lighting

for our shows and Gary Jacobson and I took care of writing scripts that were often rather technically challenging.

I remember Gary's 28 foot skeleton that needed to slowly be exposed during the



song "Dry Bones". I used a lot of recorded sound effects, placed quartets and actors in unusual places within the theater. There was a time when we had to figure out how best to light the switch



from Elvis to barbershoppers in the Love Me Tender/Aura Lee Medley.

It didn't matter what goofy idea I came up with, Lowell's response to those plans was always the same. We can do that!

Eventually, Del Ryberg discovered that Lowell not only had technical skills but this "can-do" attitude. Think of how hard it is to get volunteers in any organization that you're a part of today. Lowell hardly ever said "no".

And that started decades of Lowell's involvement with District Convention activities. The number of hours he would put in during a contest weekend was staggering. He was a worker!!!

Lowell also assisted the District by teaching the Treasurer course at Chapter Officer Training School for many years. And he was qualified



because he was in the accounting business for over 50 years. He finally sold his practice when he turned 80! Did I mention that he was a worker?

But to limit a description of Lowell to show tech and accounting doesn't even scratch the surface of who Lowell was.

I recall a conversation with Lowell's first wife, Marlene, during a trip to Dickinson, ND to sing a chapter show. I asked Marlene how she and Lowell got together. She told me that they were high school sweethearts and that everyone new "the saxophone player from Fertile, MN with the broad shoulders and skinny butt."

Lowell and Marlene raised two boys that are fine men and of whom they were very proud. When Marlene passed away far too young of cancer, Lowell met Sheryl and, side by side, they worked and lived a full life. (In and outside of barbershop.) For those of you who attend

conventions, you have no doubt had interaction with Sheryl—she's the best. And I'm so grateful that he found someone as great as her to spend the rest of his life.

In Lowell's short retirement, he found himself landing in the kitchen as a cook at the American Legion in Moorhead, MN. I believe he cooked 2-3 nights per week. Again—he loved to work.

Lowell loved his families. His barbershop family, his Legion family, his campground family and of course his biological family.

Now let's pause for a moment of full-disclosure. Not all of those complicated technical plans we had actually came off without a hitch. And sometimes the dress rehearsals turned into marathons. There were equipment issues. Sometimes he forgot the words or his notes in the quartet. Not everything always went smoothly.

But you know what happened when things didn't go well? Nothing serious. Lowell shook it off and went on to the next thing. He didn't back away, he didn't become more selective with his projects. He smiled, packed up his cords, lights, microphones and risers and waited for the next time he could say, "we can do that!"

So, what can we learn from Lowell? I hope that message is pretty clear by now. Work hard. Love your families. And approach everything with an unending can-do attitude.

I will think of Lowell so often in the months to come just like of so many other of my barbershop heroes. I'll think of him when I hear a microphone squeal. I'll remember his Norwegian broque, (What "meashure" are we on?)

But I am so grateful to him for cementing my own barbershop experiences and for just being my friend for 50 years. God Bless the memory of Lowell Bennes.



Ticket Sales In A Rut? Try Not Charging

Donation-model ticketing can increase both your show's revenue and audience over time

Last year, Madison's **Capitol Chordsmen** were looking to shake up our model of show revenue. Like many chapters, we had experienced smaller audiences and more reluctant advertisers in the post-Covid era, and also like many chapters, we were looking for new ways to both expand our show revenues and limit our expenses.

On the urging of members **Ole Anderson** and **Lowell Peck**, we took on a model that they had reported drew success in the **Oshkosh** chapter: Rather than charging a set ticket price, we would allow entry for a simple goodwill donation. Some gave more, some gave less, and in the end our spring 2024 show ended up with roughly similar attendance-based revenues (ticket revenue vs. donation revenue) to our previously ticketed shows - but with more than double the audience.



The benefit to our members was primarily in losing the pressure to sell tickets. Members felt they could talk about the show in more situations without the need to press ticket sales on the spot. We also offloaded the work of organizing, printing, and collecting tickets, negotiating group sales, and "box office" labor, replacing it with one person in charge of simply watching the donation bucket, greeting and thanking our patrons for their attendance and donations.

The long-term strategy was that some folks would be convinced to attend on the basis that there was no entry cost, then be so impressed that they would either choose to donate after the show, or be convinced to come to the next show and donate. Our Christmas 2024 show (a first for our chapter!) saw the *revenues* from donation *nearly double*, and the audience continued to grow as well.

In future shows, we're looking to add a QR code to our show program, which will facilitate easier donation both during and after the show. We're looking forward to continuing the experi-

Bo Gibson, Hero.

Barbershop lost a friend and hero to many last summer. Bo Gibson passed Aug 10, 2024, at age 89.

A Celebration of Life was held Aug 26, where many BBS friends sang Irish Blessing. To honor and remember him, let's start with something Mike Lietke wrote to Greendale chapter members and family (edited):

"I never knew anybody to call him John in 35+ years of acquaintance. He was always Bo or Bobo. Bo drove a series of Saab cars with a Kmosabe vanity plate. Bo was funny. Bo was true. Bo was talented.

Along with Dennis Stern and Harry Hanson, Bo was a tremendous influence and mentor to me when I came to Milwaukee to attend Marquette. MU was Bo's alma mater, although I am certain his academic achievements were remarkably questionable.

When I asked what he majored in, he said, "Gin Rummy and watching the pretty girls. I was the only 8th Semester Sophomore on Campus."

Bo was a bon vivant, especially in singing circles. Never a tall man, and with a full voice tenor, he would tell stories of borrowing a car to bomb down to Chicago #1 chapter and sing with Buzz Haeger, Ray Henders, and all of the greats of yore in the (g)old days. Often, Bo said that they would stay up singing, tagging and woodshedding until the sun came up, and he would then gambol back to Milwaukee just in time to miss his first morning class.

He cared about his friends and family, and showed many of us young

'uns the way to be a great; you would have thought he had won again himself.

Starting in 1955, Bo began his championship ways. Three other MU guys and he formed the *Marqsmen*, and won the LO'L championship. The University heard of their win, and gave them snappy (and fairly expensive) suitcases for their singing travels with the MU logo on it.

Next district win was the Fanfares (great name) in 1965. For 3 years running, they earned their way into the top 10 at International. This made him the only member of the MVE until Bryan Ziegler to have that distinction.

He then won (again) in 1978 with *Sound Gallery*. For a very long time, he was the only man to win 3 LO'L District Championships in a quartet.

He delighted when the MVE started on our ascent in the late 80's and simply beamed when we had a hit set.

Bo had the old vaudeville feel to him, and loved to resurrect the jokes that sustained for over a hundred years. He was with Ron Schilling, Dick Grahn and Frank Marzacco in Shear Delight for many years (likely the busiest quartet in the country doing local gigs)... And carried that on to Easy Days, whose members (with Frank) included Dick Riege, Bill Kilbourne, Dennis Monroe, Jim Ansay and now Matt Nagel... Heck, I even did a couple of gigs with them. Once I was called fifteen minutes before they started because of an illness. I told them I did not know their rep...

Bo said, "Don't worry, this is for the 93rd birthday of this lady. Sing what you know and look cute and she'll be amazed."

His groups were on national TV. They opened for Russell Crowe's band (and he sang with them). To me, Bo embodied what I have held dear in the MVE.

Just wish I could sing one more with Bo.

Guessing that Bo is happy to put on his robe and wings, and once again sing the most honking full voice tenor in the heavens."

Many, myself included, learned valuable ad cherished lessons about performing and entertaining from watching and singing with Bo. Miss you, my friend.
