Northern Pines Harmony Platoon

Northern Pines Harmony Brigade (NPHB) will again be sponsoring a Harmony Platoon-like function. The Platoon is a great opportunity for quartet enthusiasts to 'wet their whistle' on the fun of 'full throttle' quartet singing with guys from all over the District. This is a prelude to the full LO'L Convention, starting late Thursday afternoon and into the evening with a fun Random Draw contest open to the public. If you are interested in the Harmony Platoon contact Dave Speidel for more details – a great pre-convention activity for everyone to enjoy!

Quartet Clinic

The quartet clinic was a first last year and we will again host the clinic at no additional charge for any quartet registered for the convention. You will be provided some great feedback from top quality coaches and perform on the non-competitive stage program. If you're in a quartet, prepare a couple of songs and get over an hour of coaching from the best. Whether you're a skilled quartet who has sung for years or just a pickup quartet who sings Valentines you will enjoy this clinic. Sign up early since we may have limited availability.

Quartet Contest and Festival

We will again be hosting a combined district quartet contest and festival. All quartets must register for one or more of the several contests/ festival performances. Your quartet may be evaluated as a male quartet, female quartet, or mixed quartet competing for a number of awards from Novice Quartet to District Champion, as well as, the opportunity to qualify for the International Competition. But, if you don't want to compete and have your score recorded, you may sign up for the festival and just get an evaluation.

Chorus Contest and Festival

We will again host the combined chorus contest and festival. Your chorus may compete as usual or any chorus that does not wish to compete may get on stage and sing for us. Festival choruses will sing a

couple of their best songs and get an evaluation without a published score. Coaching and evaluations by the judges is provided to all choruses and is designed to improve chorus performance. We encourage all choruses to come and enjoy singing with us this year!

All-Chapter Chorus

Some of us don't get the chance to sing on the risers with 100+ singers, but if you want that experience you can do it this weekend. Just sign up, in advance, with Steve Zorn who will send you the music and learning tracks. You must memorize the two songs and then you will practice with chorus members from throughout the District. This will be the fifth year for the All-Chapter Chorus which performs at the Showcase Dinner. If you've never sung with the All-Chapter Chorus, you really need to take advantage of this wonderful experience.

Showcase Dinner and Show

The Showcase Dinner and Show was a huge success and we plan to host another fantastic event to wrap up the weekend. We plan to have another top quality quartet join as our guests along with special performances by our own outstanding quartets. The Showcase Dinner was something new in 2021 and it proved to be a great time for us to meet fellow barbershoppers over a wonderful dinner and enjoy an evening of top notch entertainment. 

Barberpole Cat Certification Times Four

Many of you know that the original Barberpole Cat book has a certification program where you can demonstrate that you know all twelve of the polecat songs for a particular voice part. Many barber shoppers have completed that certification for their voice part over the years. Cliff Turnbull recently took that process three steps further when he was certified for all four voice parts for the twelve songs. Very few barber shoppers have achieved that milestone. Cliff reports that learning all four parts has helped him sing lead better. And at the recent district convention, he had the advantage of being able to join many more informal quartets in the halls, because he knows all the voice parts.

This fall I had the honor of presenting Cliff with the four Barberpole Cat certificates at a Croix Chordsmen rehearsal. During the presentation, I noted that Cliff was one of my barbershop heroes. I admire him for this Polecat achievement, but I also greatly appreciate all the learning tracks that he has created for the Chordsmen over the years. I rely heavily on these learning tracks to learn my bari part. Cliff also sings lead in the "Summertime" quartet. They have great harmonies and sing songs ranging from serious spirituals to comic performances.

Cliff joined the Croix Chordsmen in 2001. In 2007 he was awarded the Barbershopper of the Year award. In 2010 he received the Swede Olson Award for his "sustained, longtime contribution to the St. Croix Valley Chapter". In 2013 he received the George Everitt Award for "bringing order out of chaos". Finally, in 2021 he received the Chordsmen award for his "outstanding level of participation in the chorus during the year". Thank you, Cliff, for all that you have done for the Croix Chordsmen.





A Tale of Two Contests Submitted by Peter Maddeaux

As your new Director of Contest and Judging, I thought it would be helpful to share some of the specific elements of our Fall Contests...some that have caused confusion.

Some history and definition:

A District contest is comprised of three Sessions: The Quartet Semi-Finals, the Chorus Finals and the Quartet Finals

In the Quartet Semi-Finals and the Chorus Final Session, there is a multitude of subsessions (contests) ongoing at the same time.

As an example;

A Quartet may enter to compete for all or more than the following contests:

The District championship;

A Gender–Related quartet contest (Men's, Women's, Mixed);

A Regional Championship (1 of the 3 Regions);

The District Novice quartet championship;

The District Seniors quartet Championship;

The International Prelims to qualify for the next International contest:

In LOL, there are up to 14 contests ongoing at a time. All but the District Championship and the International Prelims are single round contests.

Choruses may compete for all or more than the following:

The District Championship;

The Regional Championship (1 of the 3 Regions)

The District Most Improved Chorus (MIC);

The Regional MIC contests (1 of 3 Regions);

A Gender-related Chorus Championship (Men's, Women's or Mixed Chorus championship);

A District Plateau championship (A, AA, AAA-based upon the number of men in the chorus as of 12/31 of the previous year); and

The International Prelims to qualify for the next International contest.

In LOL, there are up to 15 contests going on at a time. All chorus contests are single round contests.

Chorus Contests: District Contest vs. Int'l Prelims

One area of our contest that sometimes causes confusion is the difference between winning the <u>District Championship</u> contest and qualifying for the International <u>stage through the Preliminary Qualifying</u> contest. Choruses can compete in both at the same time and both are adjudicated simultaneously during the contest.

Stated simply, The District Contest and the International Preliminaries are **two completely different contests**:

- 1. One to determine the District Championship; and
- 2. One to decide which chorus(es) will represent the District on the International stage the following July.

On most occasions, the chorus that scores the highest wins the District Championship and automatically represents the District at

the International Contest. However, this is where the confusion begins. The Society's Contest Rules state this is the case, **but there is a credentialing stipulation**. The winning chorus must "meet or exceed" the 'minimum score" to be eligible to perform at International. There is confusion here also; to be explained below.

There are 2 scoring levels that have an impact on eligibility for the International Chorus contest. A "Target Score" (automatic eligibility, regardless of District placement) of 81% and a "Minimum Score" of 74%. During the pandemic, the Society Contest and Judging Committee (SCJC) has temporarily lowered the Target Score to 78 to accommodate the lack of rehearsals, etc.

If any chorus's score "meets or exceeds" the "Target Score" of 81% (78%), they are automatically eligible for the International contest, whether they win the District contest or not. The "Target Score" for automatic eligibility is a recent credential (within the last 5-10 years). However, as far as anyone can remember, there has always been a "Minimum Score". Meaning, any chorus scoring under this level will not be invited to the International stage (regardless of District placement). In other words, if the highest scoring chorus in the contest (ie., the District Champion) does not meet the target score, but meets the "minimum score" of 74, they are the District Champion and are eligible for the International stage. If they **do not** "meet or exceed" the 74 level, they will not be eligible to compete on the International stage regardless of being the District Champion. The only deviation from this is in the event that fewer than the minimum number of Society Choruses qualify by the methods described above. The minimum number is 27 choruses.

This past contest season was an anomaly. Due to the pandemic over the past 2 years, most of the contests for all Districts were cancelled. The SCJC ruled that the scores of the 2019 contests could be used to qualify for the 2022 International competition. During the 2019 contest, two of our choruses met or exceeded the lowered Target Score and are automatically eligible (GNU-84.8% and Greendale-80.9%). Reference: BHS Rules, C&J Handbook, Article II.E1.b and Art II.F1.e.

New Central Park Stage To Honor Schmitt Brothers Quartet

A new stage to be built as part of the Central Park West 365 project in Two Rivers will be named in honor of the Schmitt Brothers. The famous quartet is known for putting the city on the map when they won the 1951 Barbershop Harmony Society title.

With performances routinely booked years in advance, the quartet sang together for 35 years, spreading harmony from all the major stages in the country as well as the Ed Sullivan, Arthur Godfrey and Lawrence Welk shows.

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Any Future Judges Out There in LOL Land?? Submitted by Peter Maddeaux

The BHS judging program continues to change and rejuvenate every three years. Candidates are selected from all over the world and the process is a rewarding one. There are 4 classifications to consider: Administrative Judge, and the 3 scoring Judges; Music, Performance and Singing.

Administrative Judge:

The Contest Administrators are now renamed "Administrative Judges "(ADM): Duties encompass every aspect of the contest except adjudicating a contestant's performance.

The chief ADM (Panel Chairman) is completely in charge of the operation of the contest. No one can override the decisions of the Panel Chair (PC), whose authority must be used wisely to make the contest run smoothly for the contestants.

After the contest starts, the PC's primary duty is to run the contest and be in charge of all activities. The ADM must make the environment as fair and consistent as possible for all contestants.

Music:

The Music judge evaluates the song and arrangement, as performed. The judge adjudicates the musical elements in the performance: melody, harmony, range and tessitura, tempo and rhythm and meter, construction and form, and embellishments. The judge judges how well the musical elements of the performance establish a theme and the degree to which the performance demonstrates an artistic sensitivity to that theme. The judge adjudicates the degree to which the musical elements of the song and arrangement display the hallmarks of the barbershop style.

Performance:

The Performance judge evaluates how effectively a performer brings the song to life; that is, the believability of the theme in its musical and visual setting. The judge responds to both the vocal and visual aspects of the performance, but the judge principally evaluates the interaction of those aspects as they work together to create the image of the song. The judge adjudicates the quality and appropriateness of the overall effect. The Performance judge evaluates everything about the performance that contributes to emotional impact upon the audience.

Singing:

The Singing judge evaluates the degree to which the performer achieves artistic singing in the barbershop style. Artistic singing is accomplished through precise intonation, a high degree of vocal skill and appropriate vocal expression, and a high level of unity

and consistency within the ensemble. Mastering these elements creates a fullness and expansion of sound, and when combined with expressive vocal skills will convey a feeling of genuine emotion to support the message of the song.

Please consider the possibility of becoming 1 of the $\sim \! 160$ Judges in this Society of $\sim \! 20,\!000$ members. Please contact me...Now is the time.

"Love is a friendship set to music" - Joseph Campbell


It is with heavy hearts that we've said our last goodbye to


