# From our leaders

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This year, Rotary confronted the turbulence all around us — a global pandemic, natural disasters, food insecurity — and used it as an opportunity to take care of one another, to personally adapt to and embrace these changing times, and to bring about lasting change for the people we serve. We set a fundraising record for The Rotary Foundation, raising more than \$440.9 million in 2020-21. In the coming years, we have the opportunity to increase our impact, expand our reach, enhance participant engagement, and increase our ability to adapt — as long as we continue to build on our Action Plan progress. # YEAR IN REVIEW

Strengthening our foundation for our future



In August, the World Health Organization announced that all 47 countries in its African region are free of the wild poliovirus. This public health achievement demonstrates that we can rid the world of polio. And we will.



RI President Holger Knaack hosted three virtual presidential conferences in Brazil, Nigeria, and the United States to highlight and encourage collaboration among Rotarians and Rotaractors. Attendees discussed strategies for ensuring a strong future for the next generation of Rotary and Rotaract members.

When the Rotary year began in July 2020, we were nearly four months into a global pandemic. The world around us was changing, and Rotary evolved right along with it.

The pandemic made it clear just how critical it is for Rotary to accelerate our efforts to increase our impact, expand our reach, enhance member and participant engagement, and increase our ability to adapt.

Here's a look at some of the ways we made a difference this year by providing the connections, service, and advocacy our communities need.



Protecting the environment, long an important cause for Rotary, became an official area of focus. Rotary members can direct donations to this area and apply for global grant funding to address the effects of climate change and environmental degradation.



Rotary awarded its first \$2 million Programs of Scale grant to Partners for a Malaria-Free Zambia. This evidence-based program aims to reduce malaria in 10 target areas over the next three and a half years, bringing health care to 1.3 million Zambians. The organizers are sharing what they learn with Rotary clubs and districts worldwide to strengthen our impact.



On World Health Day, 7 April, and again during the 2021 Virtual Rotary Convention in June, six Rotary members — from Ethiopia, India, New Zealand, Sri Lanka, and the United States — were honored as People of Action: Champions of Health for their outstanding work to improve health at home and around the globe.



Local community members worked with Rotarians from Germany, Thailand, and the United Kingdom to bring Rotary clubs back to Vietnam. The Rotary Clubs of Saigon and Saigon International were chartered in June.



Rotary members used their decades of experience in the fight against polio to support local health authorities' response to COVID-19. Members volunteered at clinics, combated misinformation, helped prevent the spread of the virus, and advocated for fair and equal access to vaccines.



The first class of Rotary Peace Fellows at Makerere University in Kampala, Uganda, began a yearlong certificate program in peacebuilding, conflict resolution, and leadership development. The peace center at Chulalongkorn University in Bangkok, Thailand, also now offers a yearlong certificate program, a change from its previous three-month curriculum.



Rotary worked with partner organizations to provide learning opportunities for members and program participants. Toastmasters International produced an eight-course leadership and communication series to help members hone such skills as speechwriting and public speaking. And the National Youth Leadership Council provided material for new service-learning courses that teach our youngest participants how to address the causes of community issues, inspiring a lifelong commitment to service among these future leaders.



To support the critical role of diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) in Rotary's culture, we facilitated discussions through a webinar series that addressed topics such as inclusivity, ways to connect with diverse communities, and the experiences of Black members in Rotary. We also surveyed members to learn about their perceptions and experiences in Rotary. The results will be used to create a plan that ensures our commitment to DEI is reflected in everything we do.



The RI Board of Directors, with guidance from Rotary's Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Task Force, strengthened our commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion.



The Otto and Fran Walter Foundation pledged \$15.5 million to The Rotary Foundation to fund a new peace center in the Middle East or North Africa that will focus on peacebuilding and development in the region.

# INCREASING OUR IMPACT

Creating a legacy of change

To encourage innovative change-makers to partner with us, we're implementing evidence-based programs that help define and measure our impact.

Through data-driven decisions, we can improve our projects and outcomes, creating more effective change that can be scaled up and applied to other communities.

# Creating a legacy of change

Partners for a Malaria-Free Zambia is the first recipient of The Rotary Foundation Programs of Scale grant. Each year, Programs of Scale will provide \$2 million to expand a well-developed service program that is led by a Rotary club or district and has demonstrated success in effecting change.

The Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation and World Vision U.S. are each providing an additional \$2 million in funding to Partners for a Malaria-Free Zambia to increase its impact and strengthen the country's health system.

Malaria is a preventable disease, but in Zambia, it is a leading cause of illness and death, especially among infants and new mothers. The Rotary Club of Federal Way, Washington, USA, has been working with partners and Rotary clubs in Zambia and other countries to fight malaria for more than a decade. Together, they've distributed tens of thousands of mosquito bed nets, drug treatments, and testing kits. They've used Rotary Foundation global grants to train and deploy more than 1,500 community health workers, a measure that has proved highly effective in curtailing malaria and other health conditions in rural areas. Partners for a Malaria-Free Zambia will build on current partnerships and evidence of success to bring even more lifesaving care to communities.

The program aims to reduce malaria cases in 10 target districts in two Zambian provinces. It is training 380 health facility staff members and more than 2,500 new community health workers, increasing access to malaria diagnosis and treatment for more than 1.3 million people. Health workers are supplied with rapid diagnostic test kits, antimalarial medicine, and educational materials. They also have bicycles and mobile phones to allow them to reach remote communities and share malaria data within the national health system.

Clubs are increasing their impact in their communities by:

- Focusing on the issues and projects that matter most, guided by community assessments
- Gathering data before and after each project and using that data to recognize improvements
- Sharing stories that demonstrate measurable results and show a long-term commitment to a cause

# EXPANDING OUR REACH

Doing more, together

People of action come from every background and are in every community. They may be Rotary members or other local leaders who share our passion for service and friendship.

We expand Rotary's capacity for doing good when we welcome and engage people who represent a variety of experiences, cultures, and perspectives.



We are stronger when we work together, within our clubs and our communities.

# Doing more, together

District 5450 (Colorado, USA) and Easterseals Colorado teamed up to develop a Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) program for teenagers with physical disabilities. During the weeklong summer camp, attendees have fun in a welcoming and inclusive environment while trained medical staff and counselors offer specialized support. Campers practice teamwork, problem-solving, and overcoming physical challenges. They make new friends and build self-confidence. Many campers return the following year as junior counselors, learning leadership skills and creating a memorable experience for others. This program was a runner-up in the Leaders in RYLA Awards, which recognize exceptional RYLA events.

In Brazil, children with visual impairments will receive a better education through a partnership between the Rotary Club of São Paulo-Liberdade, São Paulo; the Rotary Club of Fujinomiya, Shizuoka, Japan; and the Dorina Nowill Foundation for the Blind. Through a global grant from The Rotary Foundation, 169 teachers learned how to tailor learning environments, adapt materials, read Braille, and work with specialized equipment. The partnership has helped address a larger issue in Brazil: the need to expand training for educators so they can enhance classroom instruction and improve outcomes for students with visual impairments.

## Clubs are expanding their reach by:

- Telling stories about people of action through social media, club websites, and local media outlets
- Becoming innovative by trying new projects and formats and increasing their flexibility
- Approaching local businesses and organizations to establish new partnerships
- Committing to being diverse, equitable, and inclusive

# ENHANCING ENGAGEMENT

Putting members and participants first

To ensure a strong future for Rotary, we must provide a fulfilling experience to every member and participant. Clubs are listening to what their members want and making changes to meet those needs while staying true to Rotary's vision, mission, and values.

By remaining flexible and receptive to new ideas, we make members and participants feel valued and respected.

# Putting members and participants first

A group of Rotaractors in England formed a Rotary club tailored to the needs of young professionals who are establishing their careers and raising families. The Rotary Club of Maidenhead Bridge, Berkshire, meets twice a month on Sundays in a coffee shop. It's casual — no toasts, no prayers, and no jackets or ties, though you may see a few children running around. Club members focus on skills-based volunteer opportunities, donating their time and professional talents to help community organizations with marketing and branding. The club has more than 50 members and continues to grow.

The Rotaract Club of Abugida, Ethiopia, concentrates on a specific community need: maintaining a safe supply of blood. It has held a blood drive quarterly since it was chartered in 2004. Back then, one of its drives drew 30 donors. Today, they bring in 500. The club expanded its reach by partnering with the Ethiopian Red Cross Society and other local Rotaractors. By committing to a project that provides a vital service, the club has proved its value to the community and to its own members.

The Rotary Club of Vilnius Lituania International, Lithuania, was founded by two Rotarians and a Rotaractor who wanted to create a flexible club that emphasizes global affairs and inclusivity. Half of its members are women — a rarity in a country where service organizations are often male-dominated. The club's openness to innovation appeals to both current and prospective members.

In the Philippines, the Pilipinas Rotaract Multidistrict Information Organization partnered with Toastmasters International District 75 to help Rotaractors improve their public speaking skills. Rotaract members delivered short speeches to Toastmasters coaches, who provided constructive feedback while building their confidence. The collaboration gave Rotaract and Toastmasters members a chance to expand their networks and learn from one another.

Clubs are enhancing the experiences of members and participants by:

- Asking what members, participants, and the community want and need from the club
- Examining their practices, culture, image, and the membership experience they offer to identify strengths and address issues
- Finding new ways to include everyone in leadership roles, service projects, and club activities

# INCREASING OUR ABILITY TO ADAPT

Overcoming challenges

To succeed, organizations must be nimble, responsive, and open to new ideas. During the COVID-19 pandemic, Rotary has demonstrated that we can adapt in the face of adversity — and thrive.

Balancing our traditions with the needs of today and tomorrow creates experiences and relationships that will carry us forward for years to come.

# Overcoming challenges

As stay-at-home orders took effect around the world, Rotary found ways to keep going. When student travel through Rotary Youth Exchange was suspended, virtual exchanges allowed young people to meet and collaborate with new friends from faraway communities. And when Oktoberfest was canceled in Munich, Germany, the Rotary Fellowship for Beer hosted a 24-hour virtual global beer festival. Starting at 17:00 New Zealand time, more than 500 participants raised their glasses while raising funds for the Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene Rotary Action Group.

The Rotary Club of Colombo Reconnections, Western Province, Sri Lanka, not only adapted its approach to service during the pandemic but also expanded its reach by collaborating with program participants. The club used virtual meetings to teach its community how to slow the spread of COVID-19 while Sri Lankan Interactors used their social media networks to encourage people to wear masks, wash their hands, and practice social distancing. When the nation's lockdown order was lifted in May 2020, Interactors helped schools implement COVID-19 safety protocols so they could reopen.

Clubs are increasing their ability to adapt by:

- Establishing funds to be spent on trying new ideas and activities
- Experimenting with new meeting schedules, formats, and locations
- Re-evaluating their governance structures and making them more inclusive and effective
- Inviting community members to advise on or participate in projects so they can offer new perspectives


