


Lincoln Evangelical Lutheran Church, built in 1890 (26'x46') was destroyed by a tornado on September 21, 1894. At a special business meeting which was held on September 24th, among the ruins, it was decided to rebuild during the fall. The new church was ready for use by Christmas of 1894. The total cost was \$1,342.

In 1890, Mr. Nils Nilson offered two acres of land for a cemetery near
the Lincoln Church. This cemetery is still in use and is supported by
Trinity through a special fund.

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
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



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On April 16, 1967, ground breaking for the new church took place. Among those participating were, Harvey Ordun, Hans Norgaard, Don Carlson, Gus Johanson and Pastor H. Eugene Cedarholm.







On August 14, 1977, Trinity remembered the origin of her growth by placing the bell, which had been purchased in 1910, for the Lincoln Church by Mrs. Andrew Olin, in the Trinity Memorial Bell Tower.



Above the altar in the newly formed Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church was the beautiful painting of Christ in Gethsemane. This picture was painted by the artist Grafstrom of Augustana College, Rock Island, IL, and given by Mrs. Karl Lunbeck in 1914 to the Lincoln congregation.



The design of the nave in the new Trinity church grew out of the congregation's statement of beliefs and needs. It was desired that the seating arrangement gather the worshipping group as closely together as practicable around the pulpit, altar and font. This encourages a spirit of family togetherness and provokes a greater sense of involvement in the Sunday Liturgy.



- ♦ The first baby to be baptized was Rose Christina Miller, daughter of Axel Miller.
- ♦ Mr. and Mrs. John Lidman were the first couple to be married in Bethesda.
- ♦ In its first year after organization, the church had 56 communicants and 20 children.
- ♦ Bethesda was priviledged to have Rose Olson, Lily Wilson and Violet Emrich, triplets, in its congregation.

Trinity Firsts

- ♦ The Reverend Leonard Smith was Trinity's first pastor.
- ♦ The Lincoln Church bell rang from Trinity's tower for the first time on Easter, April 9, 1950.
- ♦ Florence VandeVegte, now of Maple Plain, MN, was the first choir director. Even though she felt musically inept and had a small family to care for, she held this position until Tom Shumate came to Spencer to become Trinity's director of music.
- ♦ Trinity was the first church in Spencer to sponsor an Asian refugee family. Cu and Cuc Van Cao and three children from Vietnam came the summer of 1975.
- ♦ Colleen Last and Shirley Clark taught the first ESL (English as a second Language) classes in Trinity.
 - ♦ In 1985, Jan Striepe introduced the Parish Nurse concept to Trinity.
- ♦ On August 25, 1968, Matthew David Bendlin, the son of Robert and Sue Bendlin, was the first child baptized in our new church. Sponsors were Larry and Laura Bendlin. Pastor H. Eugene Cedarholm officiated.

Did You Know?

- * Andrew Mortenson, who was not a member of the church, built the Bethesda Church and gave it to the congregation for worship. The deed to the land was not secured until 1917 when it was purchased for \$100 by Alfred Johnson, a member of Bethesda, and given to the congregation.
- ♦ The Danish people in Spencer used Bethesda for services, too. They paid a rental of 50 cents each Sunday during the summer but paid 75 cents each Sunday during the winter.
- ♦ Harvey and Joan Sanford were members of Trinity during Pastor Setterlund's years of service. One Sunday, while the choir practiced their anthem in the basement of the church, David, the Sanford's 4 yr. old son, went upstairs. When he came back, his mother said, "Was anybody up there?" "Just God," he answered (referring to Pastor Setterlund)
- ♦ There was a period of time when Trinity had serious water problems in the basement. The water was so deep that the basement could not be used. Shirley Clark's Jr. High Sunday School class, who met on the stage, had a good view of the water each week. As part of their study of the Psalms, they were asked to write a psalm of their own. One group came up with this fitting lament.

Save me, O God,
For the water comes deep into the basement.
The waters have risen to my neck.
I sink into deep misery.
I am swept into deep water,
And the flood carries me away.

I am wearied with crying out; my throat is sore, My eyes grow dim as I wait for God to help me. How long must I wait for my rescue?

Do not let me sink, let not the flood carry me away.

♦ During the years of Pastor Jacobson's service at Trinity this problem was finally resolved. The basement floor was raised and eventually carpeted.



The parsonage at 114 E. 9th St. was built in 1911 for \$3,640. It was owned by both churches. Bethesda owned 1/3 and Lincoln owned 2/3. This remained a parsonage until 1975 when it was sold. This same year, Pastor Michael Last became the first pastor of Trinity to purchase his own home.
