


December, 1894.





Lincoln Lutheran and Bethesda Lutheran merged to form Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church February 23, 1949, located on the corner of 9th St. and 3rd. Ave. West. The two churches were joined together in an L-shape. The width of the Bethesda church and the length of the Lincoln Church made a nave of 72 feet in length, with a seating capacity of 275.

## **Trinity Lutheran Church**

"The Little Church That Grew"

The history of Trinity Lutheran Church traces "a little church that grew"and grew and grew.

Its birth took place in 1889 when Lincoln Evangelical Lutheran Church outside of Royal was organized. Its first pastor was August Road who was a licensed lay catechist who was later ordained. His annual salary was \$150.00. Twenty years after its organization, Lincoln built a church. Membership dues, to be used to finance the new building, were \$5.50 per male and \$4.50 per female.

Three years later, in 1892, Bethesda Lutheran Church was organized. It was located on West Ninth Street. There were eighteen charter members. August Road also served Bethesda. In 1893, Andrew Mortenson, a non-member, built the church building and gave it to Bethesda. In 1917, Mr. Alfred Johnson, a member, purchased the lot from Mr. Mortenson as a gift to Bethesda. The cost? \$100.00.

On September 21, 1894, a tornado destroyed the Lincoln Evangelical Lutheran Church. The congregation showed its dedication by rebuilding the church by Christmas.

Through the years that followed, the governing boards of Lincoln and Bethesda met jointly. Wishing to benefit from a more complete union, the two churches were united into Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church on February 23, 1949. The united congregations called Pastor A. Leonard Smith of Stanton as their pastor.

In order to provide the necessary worship space for the newly merged church, the Lincoln church was moved to Spencer and structurally joined to the Bethesda church. Dedication of this new structure was celebrated on January 21, 1951. On March 27, 1950, curious people lined Spencer streets to watch the Lincoln church move on wheels down busy Grand Avenue. Once again, "the little church that grew" was growing.

The generosity of a sister congregation, Trinity Lutheran Church in Alta, Iowa, was demonstrated with a gift - a Hilgren and Lane pipe organ. (Seven ranks of pipes and the console are a part of the present organ.)

Just as the merging of two churches represented growth, so did the Greater Trinity Committee formed in 1957 to study future needs. This needs study established 1963 as the year of ultimate growth for Trinity. The calendar of events read as follows: May 26 - New church site is blessed: June 30 - Funding campaign begins: October 8 - Executive Building Committee appointed. Donald Carlson was selected to chair the Executive Building Committee. Others involved were Hans Norgaard, Gerald Hollander, Gus Bendlin, Oscar Swanson, Paul Twesme, Ivan Carlson, Harvey Ordun, Gus Johanson, and Larry Albaugh. On March 28, 1967, the congregation voted unanimously to begin construction immediately.

On August 11, 1968, the service of leave taking from the old church marked another growing experience in "the life of the little church that grew."

The new church was dedicated on October 20, 1968.

Not only had Trinity grown facility-wise, it had also grown in its view of worship and its place in the world.

The new worship facility emphasized the importance of the Eucharist and the centrality of Baptism. Its contemporary style also lead to the development of a contemporary form of the Eucharist which has now become a regular part of the monthly worship schedule.

In August, 1975 Trinity recognized its responsibility to the displaced of the world by bringing the first Asian refugee family to Spencer - the Van Caos.

On August 14, 1977, Trinity remembered the origins of her growth by placing the bell which had been purchased in 1910 for the Lincoln church by Mrs. Andrew Olin in the Trinity Memorial Bell Tower.

With more childcare needs emerging in the community, Trinity responded to this need in 1979 by establishing the Trinity Montessori Preschool and Day Care Center. (Although the Montessori approach is no longer emphasized, the TLC Preschool and Daycare Center continues to serve the Spencer Community.)

Further childcare and parenting needs were recognized by the acceptance of the Time Out Nursery into the Trinity facilities in 1980 and the Reach Out program in 1983.

In 1985, two giant steps in Christian outreach were taken when Jan Striepe introduced the Parish Nurse concept and Kathryn Groenewold was ordained as a pastor.

As Trinity moves into the 90's, it will continue to make history as "the little church that grew." Trinity is most thankful to her Lord and Savior that she has Pastor C. Peter Maisenbach to lead the way!



Pastor Elmer Sahlgren graduated from Augustus Adolphus College in St. Peter, MN in 1934. He completed his study in 1934 at Augustana Theological Seminary, Rock Island, IL where he was ordained. He came to Spencer following his ordination where he served Bethesda Lutheran Church from 1934-1937. During his pastorate here, he was married to Anna E. Lundquist of Chicago.



Pastor Oscar H. Bohman 1937-1942

Pastor Oscar F. Bohman was born on June 5, 1896 in Moline, IL. He was ordained on June 10, 1923 in Rockford IL. Soon after his ordination he accepted a call to Immanuel Lutheran Church in Akron, IA. He served there from 1923 until 1927 when he accepted a call to Mediapolis, IA. In 1937 he came to Spencer where he served both Bethesda and Lincoln Lutheran Churches. In 1942 he left to become Chaplain in the Army. He served several parishes in Minnesota before his death in 1979.

Pastor A. Harry Ericson was born on Dec. 21, 1891 in Kville, Sweden. He came to America in 1910. His ordination took place on June 10, 1923 in Rockford, IL. It was through the efforts of Pastor Ericson that the merger of Bethesda and Lincoln Lutheran Churches was accomplished. He served the two churches until April 17th, 1949 when he preached his final sermon. He accepted a call to the Friend's Home Lutheran Congregation, Savonburg, Kansas.

#### Pastor A. Leonard Smith -- 1949-1953 He served as the first pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church.



Pastor Wallace V. Setterlund 1954-1960

Pastor Wallace V. Setterlund was born in Duluth, MN. He graduated from Duluth High School, Gustavus Adolphus College, St. Peter, MN in 1938 and Augustana Theological Seminary, Rock Island, IL in 1942.

Following his ordination he served First Lutheran Church, Olivia, MN and First American Lutheran Church, El Campo, TX. After serving as Trinity's pastor from 1954-1960, he served St. Timothy's Lutheran Church, Omaha, NE, Grace Lutheran Church, Central City, NE, and Fridhem Lutheran Church, Hordville NE. From 1979-1989 he served as visitation pastor from Mt. Carmel Lutheran Church, Minneapolis, MN.

He and his wife Lorraine have two children: Virgil and Annette.

Pastor H. Eugene Cedarholm, a native of Marquette, KS graduated from high school in 1948, Bethany College, Lindsborg, KS in 1956 and Augustana Seminary in 1960.

He served in the U.S. Navy from 1948-1952.


In 1960, he came to Trinity where he served until 1969 when he accepted a call to First Lutheran in Newton, IA. He continues to serve that congregation today.

Pastor H. Eugene Cedarholm 1960-1969


Pastor Gary R. Gabel, a native of Swea City, IA, graduated from Swea City Consolidated School in 1953, Gustavus Adolphus College, St. Peter, MN in 1957, and Augustana Theological Seminary in 1961.

Before coming to Trinity in 1970, he served Hebron Lutheran Church, Burdick, KS, and St. Andrew Lutheran Church in Liberty, MO. After leaving Spencer in 1974, he was a Sales Manager for Pulpit Supply and did interim work until 1982. From 1982 until the present, he has served Bethany-Elim Lutheran Church, Ivanhoe, MN and Bethany Lutheran Church at Arco, MN.

Before coming to Trinity, he served Hope Lutheran Church, Cedar Rapids, IA from 1972-1975. He served Trinity from 1975-1980 when he accepted a call from Saint Paul Lutheran Church, Clinton, IA. He continues to serve that congregation today.

He and his wife Colleen are the parents of four children: Gretchen, Andrew, Megan and Joseph.



Pastor Jerry A. Olson 1981-1982

Pastor George Jacobson was born and raised in Oakland, CA. He graduated from Bethany College in Lindsborg, KS and Augustana Seminary in Rock Island, IL.

Following ordination in 1962, he accepted a call to Mi-Wuk Village, CA. After serving as a chaplain in the U.S. Navy for three years, he accepted a call from the Division of Missions in North America to develop a mission congregation near Colorado Springs, CO.

He came to Trinity in 1982. He served here until 1987 when he accepted a call to St. Paul Lutheran Church, El Paso, Texas. He continues to serve this congregation today.

He and his wife Nancy have four children: Nels, Laura, Nate and Andy.



Pastor Michael A. Last 1975-1980



He spent his internship year serving Faith Lutheran Church, Griswold, IA, and St. Paul's Lutheran, Atlantic, IA.


Before coming to Trinity in 1981, he served Elfsborg and Trinity Lutheran Churches in Pomeroy and Pocahontas.

The Rev. C. Peter Maisenbach, Pastor 1988-

Pastor Maisenbach graduated Summa Cum Laude and Phi Beta Kappa from Augustana College, Rock Island, Illinois, in 1977. Following completion of his pastoral studies at the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago, he was ordained on June 14, 1981.

Pastor Maisenbach served Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, Elgin, Illinois, as an assistant pastor from 1981-1983. According to the grace of God given to me, like a skilled master builder I laid a foundation, and someone else is building on it. Each builder must choose with care to build on it. For no one can lay any foundation other than the one that has been laid; that foundation is Jesus Christ.

I Corinthians 3:10-11

The year 1992 A.D. is a time for us to remember. It is a time for us to remember that 100 years ago our parish community was founded. As we look to the future, let us also ask God to strengthen and empower us by the Word, the Sacraments and the Holy Spirit that we might build upon the witness of those who have gone before us and so continue the work of Jesus Christ into our next century or until He comes again.
