I have a full life: a supportive spouse, active children, meaningful work, and an almost-PhD. This is to say, I am always doing something, and when my body is still, my mind dances between worry, plans, and

dreams. As a woman, a woman of color, and a woman of color in male-dominated field, I am used to things being difficult. I am no longer surprised when someone dismisses me due to my gender, appearance, or my accent. I'm no stranger to the cold dismissal of some male colleagues nor the passive aggression of those who can't get past my Latinidad [a shared sense of cultural identity and belonging among people of Latin American heritage, shaped by history, language, and lived experience].

When I chose to live in in this country, I knew it would be an uphill walk. I knew that functioning mostly in my second language would be an ongoing battle. I knew I would always be playing catch up in pop culture matters. But what I didn't expect was the fear now taking residence in my heart. I didn't expect to hesitate to stand up for what's right, regardless of the consequences, for fear that said consequences will affect my children. In other words, I didn't expect my life away from my birthplace to be a walk in the park, but I definitely never imagined that I would witness the decline of society, firsthand.

Overwhelmed with disappointment, fear, and anxiety, I turned to my husband José Morales Torres (the philosopher-theologian) and asked, "Why should we bother trying?" How can I focus on an academic paper when people are being kidnapped from the streets, from their jobs, from their homes... from their kids! How can I plan a birthday celebration when the well-being of our children is threatened by political ploys, and their health and safety are mere playthings for the rich and powerful?

As usual, José quoted a philosopher, one of his favorites, Miguel de Unamuno, who said, "At times to be silent is to lie." In other words, to do nothing is to be complicit. As it's been often said, you can't be neutral on a moving train. Also, as usual (and annoyingly so), he got all abstract, quoting Unamuno again, "If it is nothingness that awaits us, let us make an injustice of it; let us fight against destiny, even though without hope of victory." Or to

put it in regular words, if the devils want to run the show, then let's give them hell. If we are stuck in this train moving toward chaos and tyranny, then let's do everything we can to derail it or at least make it the most unpleasant, agonizing train ride for those pulling the engine into treacherous terrains.

This reminds me of Dietrich Bonhoeffer, whom we've been learning about during our Feeding the Body and Soul on Wednesday nights. He said that a Christian is someone who asks herself, every day, this question: "What is Christ's will for us today?" It is important to note the "ongoing-ness" of this question. We are to ask it every day and for each day.

What then is the will of God for FCC in this moment? What is God requiring from us today? Micah 6 comes to mind: act justly, love mercy, walk humbly. As Bonhoeffer said, "Silence in the face of evil is itself evil: God will not hold us guiltless. Not to speak is to speak. Not to act is to act." (Unamuno: "to be silent is to lie.") In Micah 6, the Lord does not require some abstract or passive personality trait. The call is not to be just, to be merciful, to be humble. We are required to act justly, to love mercy and walk humbly. All verbs! All actions! As Church we have a moral obligation to act on behalf of those who cannot speak for themselves. As Bonhoeffer said, "The church is the church only when it exists for others."

This is what we are called to do, as church, together! The train has already left the station. Time for action! Let's go! Let's go knowing that when we work "to lose the bonds of injustice" and "to let the oppressed go free," God "will go before you; and the glory of the Lord shall be your rear guard." (Isaiah 58) Amen and amen!
