Have your say on the draft Local Plan for Buckinghamshire

Buckinghamshire Council launched the consultation on their new Local Plan for Buckinghamshire (the replacement for the current Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan or VALP) on Wednesday 17 September 2025. The consultation runs until 23:59 on 29 October 2025.

The Local Plan, once it is completed, will set out Buckinghamshire Council's approach to future development in the county (which includes allowance for the target set by central government of 95,000 new homes, but please note that the version of the Local Plan which is currently available for comment has no detail on the proposed locations of the sites for this housing).

Buckinghamshire Council is inviting residents, businesses, local groups and partners to look at the draft Local Plan proposals and feedback their views.

The draft plan has been prepared in two parts:

Part A: The Local Plan vision and objectives, the spatial strategies for housing and employment, including ways to meet travelling communities' accommodation needs.

Part B: Development Management Policies.

The draft Local Plan documents, accompanying Sustainability Appraisal, the completed evidence studies, and details on how to respond to the consultation can be viewed at https://www.buckinghamshire.gov.uk/draft-local-plan

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

As is usually the case for the summer months, with holidays and such like, and with no normal PC meeting being held in August, it has generally been fairly quiet on the news front. But just as this PC News was being put together, we received notification, as you will see on the previous page, that Buckinghamshire Council has launched the consultation period for their new Local Plan, the replacement for the current Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan (VALP). With the Consultation period which started on the 17th September 2025 and running through until 23.59 on the 29th October 2025. The Local Plan, once it is completed, will set out Buckinghamshire Council's approach to future development in the county (which includes allowance for the target set by central government of 95,000 new homes, but please note that the version of the Local Plan which is currently available for comment has no detail on the proposed locations of the sites for this housing).

Buckinghamshire Council is inviting residents, businesses, local groups and partners as well as Parish and Town councils to look at the draft Local Plan proposals and feedback their views. Stoke Hammond Parish Council will be assessing this draft, but given it has only just been received and the documentation is quite extensive, we will need time to read through everything and decide on our next course of action and what comments we may wish to make. On another interesting and somewhat surprising news front relating to the proposed development on the land south of Newton Leys (Chadwell Farm) seeking to build up to 290 dwellings, in that the applicant has now submitted an appeal for non-determination. Basically, the applicant believes a decision on their original planning application (24/03601/AOP) first submitted on the 2nd December 2024 should have by now been made, but given the size and nature of the proposed and the multitude of parties that have to be consulted and invited to make comment, it is certainly not unusual for a planning application of this type to take this length of time. We consider this to be a rather speculative appeal, but it will be down to the appointed inspector to decide whether the appeal is valid or not, and it is scheduled to take place at the Buckinghamshire Gateway offices in Aylesbury, on the 9th December of this year, with up to 8 days allocated to debate the appeal, with the Inspectors decision to be issued on or before the 30th January 2026. If you want to view more details and documentation relating to the grounds for appeal, then head to the Buckinghamshire Planning Portal website entering the aforementioned planning reference.

We have made mention before of the Grand Union Canal Transfer (GUCT) Project, a scheme to transfer water from the Midlands via the Grand Union canal to then be extracted in this locality to a new treatment plant before being piped to Affinity Water customers in the South East of England. There has been some speculation as to where this treatment plant was to be sited, and indeed the front cover of a recent edition of the Leighton Buzzard Observer reported as to how a site next to Slapton was being considered and the plethora of objections from local residents and their Parish council. There was also some concern as to the locations of new pumping stations along the canal including Stoke Hammond's Lock 23. Well, we now know following a presentation at our September Parish Council meeting by representatives from the GUCT project

that the preferred and to be put forward location for the treatment plant will be north of Stoke Hammond in land within the parish of Great Brickhill.

You can see from the screenshot below that the proposed site sits south of the A4146 between the river Ouzel to the rear of Willowbridge Marina down towards Galley Lane. The treatment plant will not encompass the whole site, but this is the approximate extent for the area of land that GUCT will need in order to undertake the various stages of the works. With this being the proposed site, it does mean that there will not now be a need for a new pumping station to be built at Stoke Hammonds Lock 23.



Although we do undertake fairly regular checks on the trees sitting on PC land, the recent tragic incident in Southend caused by a falling tree branch, prompted many Parish Councils to undertake an immediate professional assessment of all of their trees being under their responsibility, and we did just that. We actually have some 59 trees on land for which your PC is responsible, and the tree inspection did highlight some in need of urgent work including a few that needed to be felled. As soon as this was identified we instructed our tree surgeon to carry out all required works on an urgent basis and some of you will no doubt observed some trees have indeed been felled or in other cases pruned as required. We will continue to monitor all trees that are our responsibility and ask our tree surgeon to undertake regular inspections, but if you do spot a tree on PC land that you believe requires some attention, please do contact the PC Clerk.

Many of you will know our local PCSO Tina Hobson who came along with her new colleague PCSO Mike Coker to our September PC Meeting held at The Pavilion, Newton Leys, and aside from running through some local issues, what was quite astonishing and indeed alarming was when Tina ran through the number of logged incidents in our Parish since the beginning of January this year to the present day. Over on the following page, you will see the full list and we think you will also be disturbed by these figures. Tina did however point out that in relation to road/traffic related incidents these do geographically include anything that has also occurred on the bypass.

As for other matters discussed/debated at the September PC Meeting, where we were joined by 15 members of the public (MoP), and sadly yet again not by either of our 2 ward councillors, it was very much the normal monthly items such as the signing off accounts and expenditures. Plus, limited updates on some of the PC projects. The absence of our ward councillors, meant we and the public were unable to ask one of the most pressing questions, in that where are we at regarding the Stoke Road layby and its permanent closure? We were however pleased to approve 2 Community Funding applications from the High Ash Scout group, the first for a £150 contribution towards their winter camp, and the second for £300 to help support their hardship fund. We were also pre warned of another Fund application to be made by the Sports Club, which has now been received and to be decided at our November meeting, to go towards the cost of the fireworks for their forthcoming Guy Fawkes night to be held on the evening of Friday the 7th November. We also learnt from a MoP and a resident of Harrup Close, that they are anticipating a new planning application for another property on the patch of land at the end of the Close, but until submitted, the PC can make no comment.

The flashing and explosions of the powerline as pictured on the front cover, was also mentioned as this did unfortunately cause some damage to the streetlight that sits just

Stoke Hammond and Newton Leys South Neighbourhood Plan Update

'I am pleased to report that Bucks Council have now appointed an Examiner to review the plan following their completed Bucks Council consultation period. His role is to ensure it meets the Basic Conditions laid down by the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF). A copy of the letter received by the Parish Council from the examiner Andrew Freeman, can be found in the Neighbourhood Plan documents section within the Parish Council website. He hopes to complete his report by the end of October. Assuming he recommends the Plan is acceptable for inclusion in the Bucks Local Plan then the final step in the process will be for a referendum of SH Parishioners to confirm its adoption.

As you may well have seen in the Parish Council News section, Buckinghamshire Council have launched the consultation on the new Local Plan for Buckinghamshire (the replacement for the current Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan or VALP) which started on Wednesday 17 September 2025 and runs until 23:59 on 29 October 2025.













STOKE HAMMOND BOOK CLUB







Our post box (big enough for perhaps a dozen letters) has details of collection times printed on the front. This has become a work of fiction.






St Luke's Gift Day will be taking place on 18th October - St Luke's Day! We will be

Bible verse of the month: 1Timothy 6 v 9-10a: ⁹Those who want to get rich fall into temptation and a trap and harmful desires that plunge people into ruin and destruction. ¹⁰For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil.

What does it mean? This passage is taken from St Paul's letter to Timothy in Ephesus: he's giving guidance on how to lead the Church there, but it applies equally today. How many of us have thought about what we would do if we had a big lottery win? Or have a gamble on the horses/ football results thinking of the reward? St Paul advises that the love of money is the root of evil, not money itself, but greed. Better then, to try to be content with what we have - to live within our means and if that seems too difficult, to swallow our pride and ask for help. If we have food and clothing, a home and loved ones, we are far richer than we realise and often richer than those who only have money. God gives us all we need.

Community and voluntary organisations are invited to apply for the latest round of my Community Fund, with £200,000 of grant funding available to support ongoing policing priorities across Thames Valley. Further details on how to apply can be found below.

My office has recently published a short video which details my role as your elected Police and Crime Commissioner. It is my role to ensure that Thames Valley Police are providing an effective and efficient service to residents in Thames Valley – cutting crime, and catching criminals. You can find out more by watching the video below.

It is promising to see that rural crime continues to fall across Thames Valley, demonstrating the work done by our Community Safety Partnerships, Thames Valley Police, the National Farmers' Union and farmers. In particular, we have seen a 36% decrease (in the first quarter of 2025 compared to last year) across West Oxfordshire, South Oxfordshire, and the Vale of White Horse.

You may have seen recent reports in the media around shoplifting, following my comments made at the Police and Crime Panel in June. As I said in my original comments, I am not expecting anyone to put themselves in harm's way, but this is about being aware and as a minimum reporting shoplifting to the police.

I have made tackling shoplifting a priority for Thames Valley Police which has resulted in more criminals being charged, more patrols being visible, easier sharing of evidence from stores, more support for retailers and a focus on the most prolific offenders.

I encourage retailers, shop workers and the shoppers to report crime so the police can act. It's their job to investigate and fight crime, including shoplifting. But we all play a part in building a safer community – at the very least reporting crime we see, rather than accepting it

News from Buckinghamshire Council

Dear Resident 18 September 2025

I hope this finds you well. I am sure I speak for us all when I state we want to ensure a bright future for our county and each other, as Buckinghamshire residents. I'm clear that, as Leader of the council, we use the scope and reach that we have to help deliver that future. It's about ensuring access to opportunity, making sure council services are prioritised and meet the needs of our population.

It's also about making sure the special character of our towns, villages and countryside is protected and enhanced. This means that they continue to offer maximum value and enjoyment for everyone who lives, works and visits here. Shaping our future is a particular focus at the moment and I want to be sure our residents' voices are heard in key project and decisions.



How should your council tax be spent?

Ensuring that your council tax is spent wisely, to demonstrate value for money is a priority that I have written about before. After all, this is your money, and we want to make sure it goes toward the services and initiatives that matter most to you. While we have statutory commitments that we must fulfil first and a budget that needs to be balanced, your opinions are important in helping us make these important decisions.

Monitoring our budget is a constant process. Just like any household or business that has to make ends meet, we need to ensure that our expenditure does not exceed the income we receive and that we can fund the 700+ services we manage. It's essential for us to understand your priorities so we can allocate and prioritise available funds and resources effectively.

Council tax contributes 80% of our income. It supports a wide range of day-to-day services we all rely on, such as bin collections, street cleaning, road maintenance, and town centre improvements. Additionally, it funds vital services for those who need extra help, including adult social care and children's services.

It's no secret that our budgets are severely constrained and, with the government's proposed changes to the funding formulas, likely to be even more pressured in the years ahead. We are managing this challenge in a number of ways, from making savings to finding new ways to do things. Since the formation of Buckinghamshire Council, we have removed £116m of expenditure.

It's critical that our residents are heard in the financial planning for the future of these local services, so we really want you to tell us which areas and services you want us to prioritise in next year's budget.

First section of South East Aylesbury Link Road is completed

This really is headline news given the period of time spent in anticipation of this moment. The council has undertaken, with construction partners, a long and complex project to build a new link road to relieve congestion in Aylesbury town centre and to open up new routes, unlocking new development potential. A key section of this road is the South East Aylesbury Link Road, or 'SEALR', as it has become known. I'm delighted to report this section of road, in the Stoke Mandeville Area, southeast of the town centre, is now finished and is ready for traffic.



It will open when the new Stoke Mandeville Relief Road that joins SEALR, being constructed by HS2, is finished, and we hope this will happen before the end of the year. This means a whole new section of road including two new roundabouts will be open before the end of the year, all being well.


