



### **PARISH COUNCIL NEWS**

Firstly, an update on some recent planning applications. Back in October an application 17/02600/APP to remove the agricultural occupancy condition on Kings Farm, Leighton Road was placed before the PC. We objected and AVDC Planning likewise agreed and refused the removal of this agricultural occupancy condition. In the same month the applicant for the Fenny Road site where outline planning permission has already been granted for 74 new homes, was endeavouring to seek the discharge of conditions imposed on this planning consent which related to the preservation and protection of the archaeological remains that had been found on this site. Your PC felt these conditions should remain in place, but the applicant has since submitted further documents providing a more detailed specification for their archaeological excavation investigation scheme

(Condition 9) and Methodology for the preservation in situ of the Archaeological remains (Condition 8). These new documents would seem to have allayed the Archaeological Officers,

concerns who are now suggesting the conditions can be in the case excavation (9) be partially discharged and fully discharged for the preservation in situ (8). What does this mean, well looking at the revised layout plan which is reproduced here, there will be a much larger public open space with retention important hedgerows trees, with a reduced total of 62 dwellings, 43 of which are private, 14 rented 5 shared and ownership. One worrying concern of the layout, is a culde-sac, which would seem to offer a possible future access into the adjoining field!!

Description

The PC meeting held on Tuesday 7th November, was as one might have expected, well attended. The evening was dominated by discussion of planning application ref 17/03772/APP for the demolition of the Dolphin Inn and the erection of 9 new dwellings. Much was made of the fact that the Dolphin Inn aside from the village shop is the only other true village amenity, although almost all in attendance, acknowledged they very rarely if at all frequented the Dolphin. This mainly being put down to the uninviting nature of the Inn. If money was spent it would be a more attractive proposition, but would such an investment be recouped - all rather catch 22! There was a strong feeling that the PC should be doing more and reacting to public comment, albeit it was pointed out that no Councillor had prior to the meeting been approached by any resident regarding this planning application and no public comments had been received by AVDC. It was however, unanimously agreed by the PC to object to this application on many grounds, such as the loss of a village amenity, over development of the site, issues of access already highlighted by the Highways authority, the fact the site falls within the Conservation Area and many more, all of which was to be highlighted in a template letter of objection, which the PC was to distribute to all homes in Stoke Hammond. This certainly galvanised people into action, for at the time of putting this report together, some near 30 letters of objection were being shown on the AVDC planning portal and was yet to show the 79 letters delivered by your Chair directly to the planning office. Next stage is when we present our case before the AVDC Development Control Committee, date yet to be advised.

The discussions regarding the Dolphin Inn overshadowed other matters, but the indiscriminate use of fireworks at this time of year and the nuisance and danger they can cause particularly to livestock was certainly another major talking point. No one wants to spoil people's enjoyment, but in rural areas such as ours, animals can be scared and indeed in a previous year, two horses lost their lives as a direct result of fireworks. For next year, your PC resolved to publicise well in advance of November. as much information as possible concerning the use of fireworks. We will also set up a portal on our website where residents can give notice for all to see of planned firework events/parties.

The Mobile Library service may not be something that many of us use, but for some it is a most important facility, but with yet more cost cutting measures being imposed, it seems likely that the Mobile Library service throughout Bucks is soon to be lost, which would of course include the monthly visit to Stoke Hammond. Despite having already made savings approaching £2,350,000 over the last eight years the library service still needs to save a further £500,000 over the next two years. Thus, Bucks CC are proposing that from May 2018, the current mobile library service is to be discontinued. They are making assurances that they are committed in ensuring that all of our mobile library customers will still be able to access library services, and are proposing to put in place alternative community-based options. Under these proposals, mobile library customers could be served by a range of different options including the Home Library Service, wider provision of online library lending services and working with interested local communities to develop communitybased options such as 'click and collect' schemes. You can have your say, as Bucks CC are running an online survey until 31 December 2017.



The front of the house has been decorated with white lights to enhance the Christmas tree light display.










Christmas Fair: As we go to press, the Christmas fair has not yet taken place,

The Greensand Country Landscape Partnership (GCLP) launched in January this year, and has secured £1.66m National Lottery funding from the Heritage Lottery Fund to support an array of exciting projects across the Greensand Country area- based along the Greensand Ridge from Leighton Buzzard to Gamlingay.

Our partners will be busy working to improve the heathlands, woodland and historic parklands in the area, adding new walking, cycling and horse riding routes and training volunteers and staff in traditional, local skills. We're running events, leading guided walks, holding talks and debates and promoting painting, poetry and photography competitions, encouraging people to explore and enjoy their local landscape, and preserve it for future generations.

We're also looking to work with local communities to celebrate the history and heritage of the area. We're offering communities, clubs, schools or heritage groups the chance to apply for a grant of between £500 and £15,000 to help preserve or investigate the historic buildings, archaeological features or historic landscape in their area.

Our first grant project was a geophysical survey of the remains of Warden Abbey near Old Warden, which is now being used to create set of brand new paintings and drawings showing how the abbey would have looked in it's heyday in the 13<sup>th</sup> century.

We're now looking for more projects to support, and may be able to help your school, local community group, WI or local History Society make something really exciting happen around your village.

This could include helping to restore a building, surveying archaeological remains, mapping old fields and hedges, improving access to a historic site near you, or creating new interpretation about your area.

Projects can be based around sites from any time period, including the 20<sup>th</sup> century. We've given you a few ideas for what you could do, but we're happy to have a chat about anything and see if we can help you get involved!

As well as helping communities investigate their heritage, we also have grant funding available for landowners, schools, sports clubs and community groups who own or manage woodlands, heath or grassland.



We can also can give you grant funding to restore features made of sandstone, for example walls and lynch gates.

SAM: Our class has to get more than 100 points; then we'll get a special treat. (We've already got over200).



SAM: Yes, we probably won't get as many presents 'cos we've got Connie and that's fair.


### What do you think Christmas should be?

### STOKE HAMMOND YESTERYEAR A PERSONAL RECORD 1925 – 1948

### STOKE HAMMOND YESTERYEAR

We are most pleased to be continuing with the publication of extracts from Margaret Aitken's book 'Stoke Hammond Yesteryear' first published in 1997 that provides an amazing insight into the life of our village in years gone by. Many thanks to Margaret for granting us permission to publish these extracts. We now reach chapter 9; 'OFF TO WORK'.

#### OFF TO WORK

When World War II broke out in September 1939 we had left school and found ourselves jobs – not at the same place because Jean was interested in office work and my mother dearly wanted me to become a dressmaker.

In nearby Fenny Stratford there was a draper shop called Cowlishaws, which took dressmaking apprentices. Apprentices had to do all the menial jobs for very low wages. In contrast, Jean was getting 5s per week at the Co-op. With dressmaking in mind, I was then pointed in the direction of the Rodex coat factory at

Bletchley, which made high-class garments and paid 7s 6d per week.

Inside the factory were rows of electric sewing machines, which made a considerable din when they were all working. After the forelady had explained to me what I had to do, she gave me a piece of canvas interfacing to work on. It took me a little time to adjust to the speed, but eventually machining canvas became a doddle. My next step was making up coat linings. A ready cut-out bundle would arrive, often in beautifully coloured satin. When I had become experienced at making up linings I was then put onto coats. The material was of a higher quality and at first I was only allowed to machine the seams. But later, when I gained the required experience, I made up the whole garment in a variety of styles, some with top stitching. The next process was to learn how to make up and insert complicated pockets. I had just reached this stage of my career when I had to give in my notice and leave Rodex coat factory for good.

Almost immediately after the outbreak of the war, my brother Fred, aged 20, had become one of the first militia men in the district to be called up into the Army. Fred normally worked at home with Dad. Most of the time was spent out on the round or filling up the van ready for the next day. My sister Annis still worked in the shop and the Post Office which he had now acquired, but Flo, Mum's sister, had married Albert Sharpe the coalman, so I had to take Fred's place at home.

My new job entailed working out on the round with Dad and serving in the shop and Post Office. I really enjoyed being out in the fresh air and getting to know the customers. Some were dear old souls who had dealt with us for years. I had to help Dad 'do' the van every we time we came back from the round. This meant stacking the shelves with groceries and pumping the tank full of paraffin.

On Monday mornings at about 8.45 Dad would set off in the van for Soulbury, serving the outlying customers on his way. After the first rush of customers in the shop, I cycled after him and caught up just as he had begun serving in the village. With my bike propped up against a convenient wall or hedge, I then got down

to work. I had my own customers to serve and Dad had his. Both Dad and I wore leather money bags across our shoulders, with coppers in the first section and silver in the second. I used to keep a few 10s notes for change but gave the £1 notes to Dad. Some of the housewives would come out to the van to look around and help themselves. Most of them wore a pinafore, which they put the items of shopping until we added up the contents. When we had finished at Soulbury, Dad went on alone to Burcott and Wing, where there were only a few customers, and I cycled home. After dinner I washed and changed and served behind the counter with my sister. When Dad came home from the round I had to pump the tank and help him 'do' the van.

Tuesday was our half-day closing and how we all looked forward to it. It was market day at Leighton Buzzard. In the early afternoon Dad got out the car and we all piled in.

At Dixon's Garage he would fill up with enough petrol to last us through the week. When we had browsed around the stalls we then took on the shops. If we needed new clothes, shoes or knitting wool and jumper patterns this was the place to buy them. I loved rummaging around Purrett's Music Shop. It was dark, dingy and untidy inside, but I could usually find what I needed.

If the required sheet music was not in stock Miss Purrett would order it and it would be there next week. Annis and I enjoyed buying the latest songs that we had heard on the wireless. Sometimes, as an extra treat while we were in Leighton Buzzard, we stayed on for the pictures at the Oriel Cinema.


On Wednesday Dad went to Newton Longville on his own. He did not need my help as we did not have so many customers there, so I worked in the shop and post office.

We visited Drayton Parslow on a Thursday. Dad drove on ahead of me and I cycled later to catch him up. We had some nice customers there and one in particular I shall always remember. Her name was Mrs Harold Capp and she lived in one of the newer detached houses, with a well-kept front garden. One winter's day, when it was bitterly cold and my hands were frozen from drawing paraffin and carrying heavy cans, she invited me in. 'Come and have a warm by the fire,' she said. She took me into her best room, where she pulled up a pouffe and sat me down in front of the hearth. A while later she brought me a steaming cup of cocoa made with milk. I must have looked like an urchin in my dirty old working clothes and smelling strongly of paraffin. It is a wonder, though, that I had not ignited in front of the fire! After that episode I always thought of Mrs Capp as a real lady.

Friday was a long hard day, but compared with the early days when Dad and Auntie Flo went off in the horse and cart, it was easy. We now had the mobile shop with a warm cab to protect us from the weather, but we also had a bigger round and more customers so it took almost as long. The sale of paraffin had greatly increased so that we now had to rendezvous in Whitchurch at mid-day with an oil tanker that came from the depot at Aylesbury to fill up the tank on the van. When we reached Little London Mrs Gurr would bring out a tea tray, set with cups and saucers, a jug of milk, sugar and a pot of tea covered by a cosy. We drank this with our packed lunch.

In the early afternoon we continued on to Oving, which adjoins Whitchurch. We did not have quite so many calls there but it still took several hours. When the last customer in Oving had been served we tightened up the remaining depleted stock, unrolled the canvas side-curtains and hooked them in place ready for the journey home. By now we were tired, but satisfied with a good day's work well done.

Once we were out in the countryside Dad would hand me his money bag and then produce a wad of £1 notes from his inside jacket pocket. 'Here you are – straighten these out,' he would say to me. It was a thrill to count through a lap full of paper money and tell him how much we had taken.

When we reached the isolated gated road through the fields at Dunton, Dad would stop the van and he and I changed places, me behind the driving wheel and he in the passenger seat.

Although I was still only 14 or 15 years old he insisted that I learned to drive. There was very little traffic on the roads then. Every Friday I drove the couple of miles

through the fields and, long before I was officially old enough, I was a competent driver.

Each Sunday morning the Soulbury orders had to be made up ready for Monday, as well as the tedious job of doing up the rations. Sugar came loose in a sack and was weighed into 1 lb blue paper bags. Where there was one person living alone we had to weigh up8 ozs. Margerine and compound cooking fat came in large blocks and were cut into 4 ozs and 2 ozs rations. Butter was easier to deal with, at 2 ozs per person. Quarter-pound packets of tea had to be broken open and weighed into 2 ozs per person. Cheese and bacon were also on ration at 4 ozs per person but we did not cut or wrap those until required. Many things were in short supply. Occasionally the wholesaler would let my parents have a flank of fat American streaky bacon, off ration, which my mother boiled in a large pot.

We have recently had two incidents where it is believed the intention was to steal the dogs from the owners.

We are asking dog walkers to be vigilant, keep your dog on a lead, and to report any suspicious incidents via the 101 non-emergency system.

URN 810 11/11/2017 On Saturday 11 November 2017 at around 2pm in the Church Lees area of Great Linford. A member of the public reported that they believed someone had tried to steal their retired guide dog.

As they walked along the Church Lees the dog was off the lead and walking beside them. They described seeing a white transit van pull up and stop. One of the occupants started to call their dog over, and they heard the sliding door open on the van, where they believe a second person got out of the van, they heard calling 'Here Boy & Good Boy', realizing something was wrong, they called the dog back, which ran back to the owner. They heard the van doors close and it sped off towards St Ledger drive.

URN 1456 14/11/2017 On Tuesday 14 November 2017 at around 9pm the victim of an attempted robbery was walking down the redway between Buckingham Road Bletchley opposite Windmill Hill Drive, when he noticed two males walking towards him with their hoods up. They are both described as white, both between 5ft 10 – 6ft tall, one was wearing a dark grey hooded top which was black on the rear above the shoulder line and was taller than the other male. The second male was described as wearing hooded dark clothing. It is believed the males maybe Eastern European from their accents.

The males walked past and the victim felt a heavy blow to his lower legs and he fell to the floor. They males than assaulted the victim and tried to take the dog off him by trying to grab the lead., being unable to take the dog, the males were last seen running away towards Windmill Hill.

Alternatively, if you have information but wish to remain anonymous, please call Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111 or online @ crimestoppers-uk.org. No personal details are taken, information is not traced or recorded and you will not go to court.

### Keeping your dog safe

Think twice before leaving your dog tied up outside a shop. You will make them a vulnerable and tempting target for opportunist thieves.

Don't leave your dog alone in the car, even for a few minutes. Thieves can easily break into your car to steal your precious pet.

Make sure your dog is microchipped and that you keep your contact details up-to-date, especially if you move house or change your telephone number. Dogs and puppies in the UK must be microchipped by eight weeks old, by law.

Your dog should always wear a collar and ID tag with your name and address on it. This is a legal requirement when your dog is in a public place. A mobile number is also a good idea, but avoid putting your dog's name on the disc.

Take clear photographs of your dog from various angles, and update them regularly. make a note of any distinguishing features.

Have lots of photographs of yourself with your dog, to help you to prove ownership if needed. Train your dog to come back when called, and never let them off the lead if you are not sure they will come back to you. If in doubt, use an extending lead, especially if you are in an unfamiliar area where your dog may get lost more easily.

At home, make sure your garden is secure and fit a bell to the gate so you hear if anyone opens it.

Keep your dog in view in the garden, don't just leave him outside unsupervised

If you breed puppies for sale, take great care when inviting people in to view; ideally have someone else present and limit the numbers of people you allow in at a time. Show the puppies in one secure area.

### STOKE HAMMOND BOOK CLUB




This month's book was 'Five Rivers Met on a Wooded Plain' by Barney Norris and concerned five different characters who all had their own story.
