PARISH COUNCIL NEWS



One must start this month's report with a massive thank you to Stoke Hammond residents for your amazing support and turnout on the Village Green, for the Battle's Over Ceremony held on the evening of Sunday 11th November in commemoration of 100 years since the cessation of World War One, and to remember

all those that served and lost their lives. One can not be sure of exact numbers but we believe well in excess of two hundred residents came out to honour this important event.

St Luke's church and their band of helpers did an outstanding job in serving refreshments and mulled wine to numbers way beyond expectations. The PC would like to thank



everyone involved in helping to put together this event, but special thanks must go to Dave and Diane Webber for sorting the catering, Reverend John Waller who read the sermon, Peter Linley for performing the *Last Post*, John Bowler for lighting the beacon and Harry Davies for ringing the church bell. Another big thank you must go to the kind



resident on the green who kindly allowed us onto her property to replenish the water stocks for the tea urn and also connect the extension lead that powered the very same tea urn, lighting to the gazebos and the PA system. One should of course not forget the remembrance service held earlier in the day at St Luke's church, again a packed affair where several wreaths were laid to honour those who had fallen. The donations made on the day at both events raised almost £350 for the British Legion,

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As many of you may well have read or heard in the local press and or news, the Secretary of State has announced that he is in favour of creating a single unitary authority for Buckinghamshire which of course caused much consternation amongst AVDC which would effectively disappear, a point made most strongly by AVDC Councillor Neil Blake at our October PC meeting (more anon). But what does this mean to us in Stoke Hammond, other than the fact that next year's planned District and County Council elections including those for the Parish Council are likely to be deferred by a year to 2020. Probably, for most one will not see any noticeable or apparent change, other than the change to letterheads and the fact that all services such as highways, education, health, planning and other services will now fall under one global authority rather than the current two. Only time will tell if a unitary authority provides a better solution.

So yes, to the November PC meeting briefly touched on before, which for the first time in many months was attended by both a District Councillor in the form of Neil Blake and County Councillor Janet Blake who were also joined by 10 members of the public. As aforementioned, Councillor Neil Blake gave us his quite strong and forthright views against the Secretary of State's recent decision to form a single unitary authority. Citing that no weight had seemed to be given to the results of an earlier poll which showed that 74% of those who responded to the district's survey did not want a unitary authority. There is an option to have a Judicial Review but Neil felt that it would be unlikely that this would achieve much. There would be a reduction of members on the new council, two thirds of whom would represent the south of the county and this could lead to them consistently outvoting the members in the north of the county. With HS2, housing growth and the Expressway Neil Blake is extremely concerned about the future. County Councillor Janet Blake reported that she too thought the Unitary route was the wrong decision.

There were two planning applications to be considered, the first 18/03592/APP relating to the enlargement and extension of an existing garage roof space to create additional living space to Charleston, Church Road was fully supported by the PC. However, the same could not be said for 18/03052/APP seeking retrospective permission for the change of garage roof designs and the erection of entrance brickwork piers to the new Lodge Lane development. Retrospective because the developers have already carried out the work, and in particular the erection of the brick piers was brought to the attention of the AVDC planning enforcement department who confirmed this was a breach of the original planning consent. Your PC objected to this application, citing that the erection of these brick piers to create a gated community was not in keeping with the village setting, and reduced the road width below that stipulated in the original planning permission and could thus cause major traffic difficulties on what is already a

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difficult access route. There was also no real explanation provided as to why the garage roof designs needed to be changed from that already permitted.

As County Councillor Janet Blake was in attendance, we took the opportunity to raise the debacle concerning the pot holes on the road across the Green that had been reported the day before via the FIX MY STREET web site. Where amazingly just after an hour of posting the report with photographs we received a report back to say that BCC Highways had already been out (really!!) and deemed no repair required. But then at lunchtime the same day a delivery lorry sank down to its axle in the very same hole that apparently required no repair. Photographs (see *Photograph of the Month* elsewhere in this edition of the SH News) were taken and added to the previous Fix My Street post, but amazingly just a few hours later we got another response stating BCC Highways had again been out to inspect and deemed no repair required and the case was now closed!! Cllr Janet Blake promised to follow this up, and at the time of writing this report an engineer has now been out and marked out the road for repair, although no works have yet been carried out.

Please make a note that the next PC meeting the first of 2019 is moving from the 1st Tuesday of the month as this is New Year's Day, to Thursday the 3rd January 7.30pm at the usual venue of the Community Centre, Bragenham Side. All are welcome. But as this is the last PC News before Christmas, your Parish Council would like to wish all residents of Stoke Hammond a Very Merry Xmas and all the best for 2019

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“EVERYTHING BUT THE MOO”

Following last month’s ‘Woman in a man’s world’ we now reach our ninth eighth extract from the book 'Everything but the Moo' written by Hazel Turner's late mother Pam Murphy, we now enter the world of illusion and mystery.

MIDDLE NAME HOUDINI

I am always a little apprehensive at going to a gathering completely out of my meteor. Not because I dislike meeting people, but because I know that by the end of the evening I shall find myself in a “talk/get yourself out of this” exercise. Once the designated ‘farmer’ comes out, one is regarded as being a ‘vegetable, and mineral with strong animal connections”, and probably with a close relationship to Bluebeard.

Recently I was asked to a reception for a woman doing a man’s job; one woman asked me what I did, and on hearing I was a farmer said “How very odd!” and walked away. Interviewing, or rather being interviewed by a Headmistress, who was a cross between one out of Angela Brazil and Joyce Grenfell in St Trinian’s, I mentioned that I was a farmer. She leaned forward and sniffed, quite audibly, twice.

My inborn fear of these terrifying creatures prevented me from saying that I hoped the Chanel No. 5 covered the smell of muck and silage, but I was happy that my daughter did not have to attend her academy of learning.

It is on the subject of animal welfare that I find myself pinned to the wall rather like one of those females in a knife throwing act at a circus. The first subject is Battery Hens. I do not keep battery hens, and in fact do not much care for canaries and budgies in cages, but I do not know the alternative if people want cheap eggs. A great deal of fuss is made about the joie de vivre of the barn yard hen. This must stem from Beatrix Potter and Sally Henny-Penny, and all first reading books. But an autobiography of such fowl would probably make a good horror film. Wet and bedraggled, finding shelter out of the wind and rain in any odd corner out of reach of every cat and dog, not to mention foxes, I can not think it really had such a blissful existence, any more than Peter Rabbit. The car and tractor added to its adventures, and its ultimate fate. Hens kept in portable houses moved across fields probably fared better until Reynard came on one of his night prowls. Anyone who has seen a house of chickens after his visit loses any enthusiasm for that method of poultry keeping. Deep litter in small numbers is fine, if disease and pecking troubles can be controlled, but it is totally uneconomic, in the cost of housing alone. Yet the public want eggs, of a sort, at only twice the price that my own mother paid for them fifty years ago! If they can not have them they will buy them from foreign countries with no questions asked as to the conditions under

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which they were produced. I am entirely in favour of stringent cruelty codes, but it should be ascertained that the imported food is reared, lives and dies under at least no worse conditions. If an animal suffers if kept under battery house conditions in the UK, it presumably suffers equally elsewhere, and it should be banned. The price would certainly rocket sky high, and the farmers would be accused of making exorbitant profits, but you can not please all the people all the time!

One woman accused me of the most terrible cruelty when she heard that my calves were taken away from their mothers at four days old – it was a barbarous practice. I tried to persuade her that it would not only be cruelty, but certain death, to leave them any longer, since the cow would have far too much milk for one calf – but not a hope! When she heard that a March born calf would not see grass for a year, I feared for my life. Nobody had ever explained, and I did not get a lot of chance, that to turn the calf out without being treated against Husk, which could only be done in spring, would probably mean a very nasty complaint and the likelihood of early death. However, she thought there was nothing odd in handing her young baby over to a Nanny almost from birth, so that SHE could return to work. I wish I could find some logic in this.

The male salvo usually touches on finance, and refers in particular to the latest Wills. Old Scrooge, who had that mucky holding at Little Puddlecombe, left £X thousand, and the mean old so-and-so never seemed to have a penny to bless himself with. Poor old Scrooge did not. He probably never saw as many pence in his lifetime as he had thousands when he died. But his Grandfather had scraped together enough in the 1890's to get a loan, at a decent rate of interest to buy his 100 acres, and through three generations the family had slaved away for small returns to pay off the overdraft and keep the farm in the family. Try and explain that inflation has overtaken farm properties in the same way as it has hit any other sort of property, and you might as well try and explain nuclear science to a Barbary Ape. Poor Mrs Scrooge now has to sell the farm to pay off the inheritance tax, even at a reduced agricultural rate, and she will also have Capital Gains to pay on the proceeds, probably hoping that the local Council will listen kindly to her plea for a bungalow. Then she might have enough to live on, after she has paid income tax and provided she does not live too long! Young Joe Scrooge, who probably did not bother to go to College and get a degree, though knows more about farming than any graduates, takes the line of least resistance and goes into the local factory, hating every moment.

That's life I suppose!

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Christmas, Sundays, the moment you are ready to set off on holiday, or the moment you have to retire to bed with a bad dose of flu.

I think horses seem to be worst. One Christmas Day the pony was missing, and in spite of exhaustive searches and enquiries of the police there was no sign of it. Early on Boxing Day morning, when Ron came over at 5.30 am for milking, he had an urgent call of nature. There, shut in the lavatory, not fortunately entirely in the words of the song from Monday to Saturday, was a highly disgruntled pony – and a cowman who vowed to take more water with his Christmas Spirit next year!

On April Fools Day, my daughter told me that the horses were in the front paddock in a ghastly mess. I refused to fall for that one, I had fed them and left them two miles away the night before. I was the April Fool! They had brought themselves home, via somebody's prize rose beds presumably, since my old retired show jumper, Rusty (he won the Queen Elizabeth Cup in the early 50's), had three rose bushes firmly embedded in his tail. Again another Christmas, presumably startled by Santa's reindeer – or more likely those leaving the Dolphin (the village pub), three of the horses took themselves in the opposite direction, and the entire family worked up a splendid appetite walking three filthy, soaking animals three miles home.

Cows are no fools either. Most will learn an early respect for electric fences, but every so often one will find that if he pushes the post with the flat of her head she can bend the post over, and going down the line can put the fence out of operation, thus realising pastures new for herself and her friends. If you see a cow with a couple of wire devil's horns attached to a leather head collar, she is probably one of those, though in a herd of any size she must go – she is too expensive a luxury.

We had to suffer a Houdini bull with an insatiable curiosity – he had to know what was going on the other side of the fence. One Sunday he was happily grazing with his twenty two wives when he saw something interesting among the milking herd two fields away. He calmly removed two gates, by lifting them bodily off their hinges, and stepping most daintily over them to investigate. He did have some right to; the excitement was over the birth of a calf, actually one of his daughters, and he was found standing over it proudly. However by the time we had separated twenty two heifers and bull from eighty milking cows on a very hot Sunday afternoon, there might have been some doubt about his own paternity!

Cows sometimes take their hook when they calve. Another Sunday a cow called Mona detached herself from the herd and started to calve right up against a fence. Pushing hard, she broke the fence down and slithered down into a deep dried up brook, sinking into the mire until only her head was showing. It was one of those panic stricken times when no-one was about, so Jill, our herdsman, ran across

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
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the road and asked for assistance from some neighbours enjoying a lazy Sunday afternoon. They went back to Mona and gradually got some ropes around her, and started easing her out, more people arrived, and they began pulling and tugging first by hand and then with a tractor until she finally reached safety. After a rest and rub down she was able to walk to the farm building, where she was safely delivered of a bull calf!

At least fourteen out of the next twenty eight Christmases were spent recapturing straying livestock. There is something about Christmas – there is a different atmosphere, (apart from hooligans with wire cutters, and a penchant to go round opening gates, and letting the animals wander). Collecting cows or horses and burnt turkey will be my memory for my offspring. Births and deaths take place at Christmas, both human and animal.

Several Christmas's meant repairing to my father's in Yorkshire for a family party, something like Dodie Smith's "Dear Octopus".

The Christmas to outdo all Christmases, must be the year after my husband died (also at Christmas time). My daughters and I were to go to my brother's house in Yorkshire. The day before Hazel went down with flu, and obviously we could not go. I dashed out to buy a turkey, and could only purchase a frozen one; rushed it home and shoved it in a bowl of hot water on the Aga. By 6pm it had thawed enough to stuff. The telephone rang, as I had it on the kitchen table. It was a friend to say that she too had flu and had guests, and could I possibly feed them on the morrow. I said "But of course", and went back to the turkey. But the CAT had got there before me and had eaten half of one breast. I shoved in some sausage meat, and cut off skin from underneath and did a smart tailoring job.

Next day I cooked the turkey, and my unknown guests arrived. In due course I served the turkey. The male unknown guest said firmly that HE would carve. I said he wouldn't it was MY house and I would! We had a to-me-to-you kind of argument and the bare bottomed bird landed on the carpet! Flu ridden daughter appeared in her nightie, and with the knife's flashing it was like a scene out of Macbeth. I won. I disentangled the black cotton the bird had been sewn up with.

Now I live alone, I miss terribly the fun of opening stockings, and chasing cows around the village. My family come to lunch and we open the presents, and my main livestock worry is that other people's cows and sheep get in – animals do not know when it is Christmas, but they are, after all an essential part of it – they were around that first Christmas.

COMMUNITY TRANSPORT SCHEME

The Community Transport Scheme is in need of a Co-ordinator and additional drivers.

The Co-ordinator is responsible for the day-to-day running of the Scheme. Not as onerous as it sounds, demands on the scheme are light.

Drivers must be 18 or over and hold a full clean driving licence.

The work entails providing transport for elderly or disabled parish residents to medical appointments, the hairdressers, shopping and other similar venues.

Drivers are reimbursed mileage and other expenses eg parking. They also have to undertake a DBS check (provided free of charge).

Any individual driver is unlikely to be called upon more than 2 or 3 times in a year.



BELLA, HOLLY & CHARLOTTE

It's that time again and Bella, Holly and Charlotte are starting to get ready for Christmas. The spread of ages; 12, 5 and 2 makes for a very different set of experiences and expectations. For Bella it is very much an opportunity to spend time with extended family and friends. Holly, at 5, is getting more and more excited by the day and little Charlotte is taking her cue from the others but mainly just enjoying the atmosphere – and the lights. The girls live not far from the village and are well known locally especially to those who go to the monthly Community Breakfasts which the girls attend with their parents, Jo and Oliver and grandparents, Greg and Vivienne who live in the village.



- ***DO YOU DECORATE YOUR HOUSE FOR CHRISTMAS?***

Bella – Yes! Daddy does the outside with icicles that light up around the house and roof. We also have a light up reindeer and tree outside and an inflatable polar bear. Our house looks out at a few others which are decorated rather like ours. Mum

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follows her family's tradition and likes to have the tree up by December 3rd because she has two sisters both born on that day but a year apart. We used to have real trees but often they were too wide for the room so now we have a tall, slim one which has "snow" on its branches. While we decorate it we listen to Christmas music. Our ornaments are a mixture of tasteful items and things we have made and/ or decorated such as salt dough candy canes labelled for all the family and sprayed pinecones. Upstairs we all have little lamp sized trees in our bedrooms and we decorate them ourselves.

- ***HOW DO YOU ACKNOWLEDGE THE RELIGIOUS BASIS OF CHRISTMAS?***



Each year we attend a Christingle Service at a local church. Last year it was held in Heath and Reach and this year it will be at St Luke's in Stoke Hammond. Each child is given an orange during the service. It symbolises the world and is decorated with a red ribbon to show the blood of Christ and a candle signifying that Christ was the Light of the World. Finally, we have sweets which are there to show that we are all creations of God. Five years ago

a Nativity Service was held on the Stoke Hammond Village Green. Holly was six weeks old at the time and took the part of baby Jesus as there were no available boy babies. Bella played an angel, Dad (Oliver) was Joseph, Aunty Nikita took the role of Mary and a local pony stood in for the donkey.



- ***HOW DOES YOUR FAMILY CELEBRATE CHRISTMAS?***

On Christmas Eve we put out a mince pie and milk for Santa and a carrot for the reindeer and they all get eaten.



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Bella. We all wake up early but Holly will probably be first. Then we take our stockings into our parents' room to open them before going downstairs to see if Santa has left more presents for us under the tree. After that we have breakfast before getting ready to go to our grandparents' house in Stoke Hammond. Here we find lots more presents left under the tree by Santa and our relatives. Our cousin Florence who's two and a half, aunts and uncles also come and altogether there are about sixteen of us to lunch. The wood-burning stove is always lit and the sitting room becomes very warm. During the afternoon we watch a Christmas film, play games such as Articulate or Monopoly, eat snacks and carry on opening presents throughout the day. Around 6 or 7pm we go back home. On Boxing Day we go to Mum's parents' house but unfortunately one of my parents, usually Dad has to go to work.

- ***WHAT DO YOU EAT FOR CHRISTMAS DINNER?***

Holly said she likes turkey and Grandad's roast potatoes, carrots, parsnips and cauliflower. She's tried sprouts but doesn't like them and pigs in blankets but will only eat the pigs. Yorkshire puddings are a great favourite, filled full with gravy. Afterward they all have chocolate log from Marks and Spencer and Great Granny has Christmas pudding with brandy butter.

- ***WHAT WOULD YOU LIKE TO GIVE YOUR FAMILY THIS YEAR?***

Holly answered:

I want to give Mummy a new ring, a pink one, because the gem has come out of her old one and I like pink.

For Daddy new socks because he has always got holes in his socks.

For Nanny it will be a ring as well, a purple one to go with her purple jacket.

And for Grandad - a newspaper- because he's always reading the news and I go with him to buy the paper.

I'm going to get a new blanket for Charlotte to put over her doll and it will be red and white with pictures of Santa on it.

I think I'll give Bella leggings, a tee-shirt and socks – all white so she looks like a snowman.

- ***IF YOU COULD HAVE JUST ONE PRESENT WHAT WOULD YOU CHOOSE?***

Holly. A new baby doll and I'll call her Annabel.

Bella. I'm hoping for clothes or trainers rather than vouchers or money.

They think Charlotte would like a new buggy for her dolls but think she will probably be just as happy with the wrapping paper and boxes

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

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STOKE HAMMOND BOOK CLUB



'THE WIDOW'S TALE' by Mick Jackson.

This is a slightly strange book in that it deals with the thoughts and re-actions of a recently widowed woman. Her first re-action is to escape from her Hampstead house and the sympathy and curiosity surrounding her and retreat to the wilds of a Norfolk village where she can hide away and contemplate life without her husband. She moves into a basic cottage with few comforts and seems almost to be punishing herself.

Her thoughts fluctuate between deep and meaningful and rather flippant and her tart and no frills observations about life and men is refreshingly frank. She has strong opinion on most things and these are often witty and well described.

I sometimes had difficulty accepted that it has been written by a man (unless Mick Jackson is another George Elliot!) and the Group's reactions were, on the whole, not too favourable. Several thought that it was more of a Memoir than a story, that it was depressing and they wouldn't have continued with it had it not been the Club's book of the month. Others considered it cleverly written with moments of pathos and reality and everyone enjoyed the descriptions of Norfolk - two members said they wondered how it managed to be published. So, as you can see it was not a book to be recommended this time round but nevertheless had moments which provoked an interesting understanding of the reactions to grief experienced by some.

Next month's book is **'Battle Hymn of the Tiger Mother'** by Amy Chua
