PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Thank you to our Parishioners who were able to make it along to the Community Centre on the Referendum Day to vote on our Neighbourhood Plan, and we are most pleased to say that with a majority of 90% voting in favour of the plan, it is now officially adopted, which is very good timing given Bucks Council did just some 11 days after the

Referendum, publicly release details of their Draft Local Plan.

For the uninitiated, a local plan sets out a vision and framework for the future development of an area. It addresses the needs and opportunities over the next 20 years for housing, the economy, community facilities and infrastructure, and in that 20 years Bucks Council as determined by National Planning requirements have to plan for some 95,500 new homes, and it is the proposed sites for these new homes that is creating the loudest noise across the county, with some communities potentially suffering huge growth if these sites were to be developed.

You will see from the map on the next page those sites block filled in our Parish that the Draft Local Plan has identified as potential development sites, some of which have been included in our Neighbourhood Plan, others not, or not to the scale that the Draft Local

Plan is proposing. The closing date for comments to Bucks Council about the plan was the 16th March, and we as a Parish Council did submit our comments, drawing very much on our Neighbourhood Plan which we would hope carries some weight when Bucks Council review the responses received. Those sites outlined are sites submitted during Bucks Council's 'call for sites' process, but for the purposes of their draft plan were deemed not suitable for development, but one of those sites Ref 6570 was part of our Neighbourhood Plan.

As regard our responses to the Draft Local Plan, in brief they were as follows:

Site Ref 47 – Land to the South West of Newton Road MK17 9DH

This site is part of our Neighbourhood Plan and is thus supported and would contribute circa 22 dwellings.

Site Ref 3264 – Land east of Roman Field MK17 9EP

This site albeit only partially is part of our Neighbourhood Plan, where we identified a contribution of circa 19 dwellings. We might accept a certain level of further dwellings subject to negotiations with the developer for areas of greenspace. It should also be

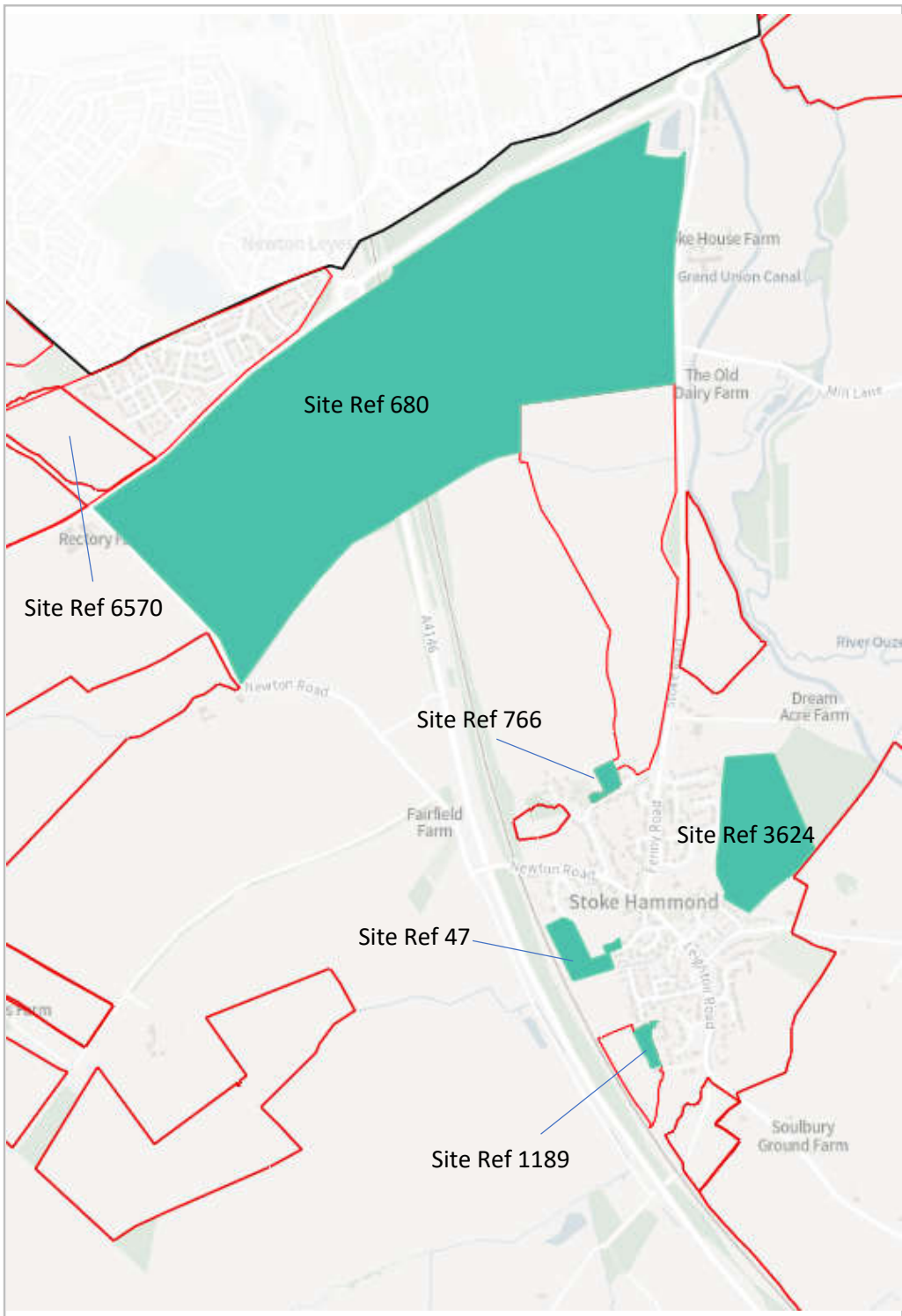

noted that the land sits in an area of Attractive Landscape and backs onto one of the most historic and important buildings in the village, namely Grade 2 Listed Tyrells Manor.

Site Ref 766 – Land west of Fenny Road MK17 9BN

This site was offered as part of our Neighbourhood Plan Call for Sites process, but was rejected and not included in our now adopted Neighbourhood Plan, the main reason being harm to a heritage asset, namely St Luke Church and with access being totally inappropriate as it would be from what is a very narrow single track lane that is also a very significant element of the Conservation Area. We are thus not supporting its inclusion in the Bucks Draft Local Plan.

Site Ref 1189 – Land at Hunter’s Lodge MK17 9FN

In a similar vein to the previous site, this Land at Hunter’s Lodge was put forward for our Neighbourhood Plan but rejected and not included, with the main reasons being the fact that access is via a very small privately owned lane and any development would be out of character with the nearby historic farmhouse and it’s associated barns.

Site Ref 6570 – Land South of Newton Leys MK3 5QH

This site sitting between the existing Newton Leys South development and the Newton/Drayton Road is not included in the Bucks Draft Local Plan but is part of our Neighbourhood Plan. This site could contribute 80-90 dwellings along with a new recreational facility. Given its inclusion in our Neighbourhood Plan and the potential significant input to the Bucks Council housing target we felt a correction should be made and this site included in the Bucks Local Plan.

Site Ref 680 – Land South of Drayton Road & Land West of Stoke Road, Newton Leys MK17 0EE

It goes without saying this is the largest and most controversial site that Bucks Council are supporting in their draft Local Plan offering as it does the potential for some 2100 dwellings. The site owners did not respond to our Call for Sites process in our Neighbourhood Plan and hence is not included in same. In our comments to Bucks Council we highlighted the degree and concern to which this development would close the gap between the natural boundary provided by the A4146 and the village of Stoke Hammond. We also found it difficult to comprehend how Bucks Council did consider all the land further South and South West of Newton Leys unsuitable quoting 'Out of character, settlement pattern and unacceptable intrusion into the open countryside' when this site does exactly the same? The Newton Leys development currently has brought many children to the Parish without any improvement in School Resources and this will be significantly worsened if 2100 houses are introduced into the area. In addition, the traffic infrastructure is poor in this area and a development of this size would make it woeful. We obviously had to make note of the fact that Bucks Council did recently not oppose a development, to which we as your Parish Council did strongly object too, for 290 new homes on part of this site, which was subsequently passed by the planning inspectorate.

Finally, and although not referenced on the Draft Local Plan, it was felt that we should make comment about the area of land behind the Community Centre that had been included in our Neighbourhood Plan that could possibly contribute some 19 dwellings, noting that this site sits within the existing village boundaries. As this area of land is currently used as a play area, it would be a commitment of the Parish Council that equal or better recreational facilities would first be provided on other village land areas before any development would be commenced.

Moving away from planning matters, we are most pleased to advise that as a Parish Council we are now back to a full strength of 7 Councillors following the Co-option of Cllr Nikki Gladdish at our March PC Meeting. Aside from adding a much needed female element to the Council, Nikki has wide ranging experience and knowledge that will only serve to further strengthen the Council when making decisions for the benefit of the Community. We should also thank the other candidate who expressed an interest in joining the Council.

Before the aforementioned March PC Meeting, we of course had our February meeting held on the evening of the 3rd at the Stoke Hammond Community Centre, where we were joined by 10 members of the public (MoP), but no attendance by either of our two Unitary Ward Councillors. Aside from normal monthly items to be agreed/signed, other matters of interest, remembering planning items are covered in the relevant section elsewhere in this publication, these were:

- During the 'Highways, Footpaths & Lighting' matters agenda item, Cllr Clarke mentioned signage on public footpaths and bridleways and the need for consistency in the area. He will liaise with the Clerks at Soulbury and Great Brickhill to agree an approach to the signage which can be shared with Bucks Council. Cllr Clarke is to report back to the Parish Council with the findings
- Cllr Champion during his S106 update, advised that the planning application for change of use for the fields the Parish Council is trying to purchase has been submitted. He is now hoping to re-start the working groups and he will contact anyone involved with these previously. If any other residents would like to be involved, he asked that they email him or the Clerk.
- In order to provide a fairer distribution of funds from the Community Grant Policy, it was agreed that whilst the number of applications a community group could submit each financial year would in its self not be restricted, the total amount a community group could successfully receive for each financial year would be capped at £350. This new policy to apply from 1st April 2026.
- Following on from the previous point a Community Fund for £350 from the Stoke Hammond Sports Club to go towards the cost of their Easter Egg Hunt Event was unanimously approved.
- During the public participation session, a MoP mentioned the lack of lighting along Bragenham Side near Meadowbrook. Cllr Clarke asked the MoP to send photos to the Clerk which can be shared with Highways, and the Clerk will also raise other areas of the village where residents have mentioned a lack of lighting with Highways.
- A MoP also asked if anything can be done about the spinney area between Phoebes Orchard and the sports field. The Clerk advised the MoP to report via Fix My Street as the land belongs to Bucks Council. This was followed by another MoP asking as to why the injunction at the layby was allowed to lapse and mentioned that there are many vans back on site. The Clerk confirmed Bucks Council has started the closure order on the layby which can take up to 12 months to complete.

As for the March meeting held on the 3rd at the Newton Leys Pavillion, we were joined by 8 MoP, all of whom were residents of Stoke Hammond village, and given this seems to be the case for all meetings held at the Pavillion, that no residents of Newton Leys are attending, some were suggesting we should revert to the village Community Centre being the permanent meeting venue. Oh, and yet again no Unitary Ward Councillor in attendance.

As for the meeting itself, the item of most interest other than the already mention co-
option and our response to the Bucks Local Draft Plan was an issue raised by a MoP
who thought the cost for the new Fenny Road Bus Shelter seemed exorbitantly high. It
was first explained that the Council had already made the decision to go ahead with
the project, and the cost, for which the PC can reclaim the VAT element, included both
the removal and disposal of the old shelter, the laying of a new concrete base, and then
the delivery and installation of the new shelter.

Our next PC meeting is to be held on Tuesday 7th April at the Stoke Hammond
Community Centre, starting at the normal time of 7.30pm. As for the May meeting this
will be held on the evening of the 5th May again with a start time of 7.30pm which will
be proceeded by the Annual Parish Meeting at 7pm and unless otherwise agreed at the
April meeting the intended venue will be the Newton Leys Pavilion.

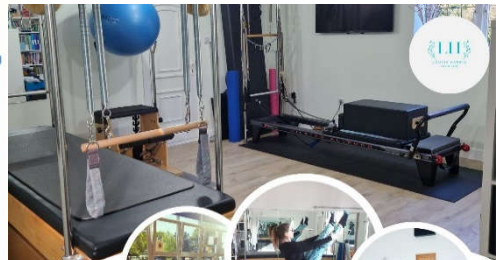

Stoke Hammond and Newton Leys South Neighbourhood Plan Update

Our thanks to all those parishioners who turned out on the 5th February to vote in the Neighbourhood referendum. The result was a resounding 95% vote in favour of adopting the plan which means it is now formally part of the AV local plan and will be part of the Bucks Local Plan when it is eventually made.

Planning is a minefield and I understand many people are unclear what value is gained from having a Neighbourhood Plan. For clarity what it isn't is a veto against any further development, which if many residents had a wish I know would be the case. In a world where most people accept new houses are necessary and where Bucks have been targeted by the Government to build 95000 homes by 2045, stopping further development is an impossible dream. What the Neighbourhood Plan does however, is give the Council and thereby parishioners the ability to influence what development is acceptable, most importantly where it's acceptable and what type of homes are appropriate. It can also increase protection of valuable green spaces and historic buildings. It encourages prospective developers to enter into helpful and meaningful discussions with the Local community. Our plan does all these things. It means therefore that when Bucks council receives applications within the Parish boundaries the policies we have and the wishes local people have demonstrated must be given weight during the decision making process. For example, in the recent Bucks call for sites a number of places rejected during our deliberations have resurfaced and I would expect our prioritisation, largely aimed at protecting the village boundary and conserving areas of historic significance, to be taken into context of account. We have already made suitable representations to Bucks by the due date of 16th March.

In addition, beyond the village boundary we have policies to protect the rural nature of the Parish, which indeed to be fair, is true of the AV Local Plan.

Neighbourhood Plan Update Cont/d.

The Neighbourhood Plan as explained above will have value in protecting the countryside and our rural way of life but it's important to understand all Councils will look to expand the reach of major towns and Cities in trying to meet the targets laid down by government. Our Neighbourhood plan is less useful when arguing against strategic growth. To this end if the proposed site opposite Tommys Carwash and along the A4120 is proposed by the Council for 2100 houses it will require arguments using the policies in both our plan and the wider Local plan to stop it. In addition, I think it would likely require a very significant protest to be mounted by the Local community if that was the general desire. This will be my last update on the Neighbourhood Plan now it's delivered. Can I thank again the steering group who helped craft it Bon Hine, Eileen Currie, David Venn, Damian Willingale, Nick Ellins, Greg Noble, Craig Champion, Lorna Sharkey, Andy and Michaela Gardner and Tracy Ocee.

Raise lower crown to 3m height to help with vehicle access and visibility, particularly when dark, shorten x 5 lowest limbs over driveway by 2m and crown thin canopy by 10% to allow more light through x 1 Cedar (T1). Reduce in height by 2.5m and reduce side branches by 2m x 2 Silver Birch.

Clrs resolved they had NO OBJECTIONS to this application, which was subsequently approved by the planning authorities on the 10th Mar 2026.

24/03601/AOP Land South of Drayton Road (Chadwell Farm) MK17 0EE

Outline planning application with all matters reserved apart from access for up to 290 dwellings, open space, landscaping, drainage features and associated infrastructure following demolition of existing agricultural buildings.

Originally objected to by your Parish Council, an appeal 25/00052/NONDET was lodged for non-determination, to which Bucks Council did not oppose, and the appeal was subsequently allowed and planning permission approved on the 2nd Feb 2026

PL/25/4636/FA & PL/25/4637/HB– Bridge Farm Cottage, Leighton Road, Stoke Hammond MK17 9DD

Insertion of a side access door and internal alterations comprising the replacement of study with boot room, relocation of kitchen and dining rooms, removal of oil boiler, installation of underfloor heating and removal of radiators on ground floor and the refurbishment of 2 bathrooms, together with alterations to outbuilding comprising removal of oil tank and installation of solar panels, air source heat pump and EV charging point.

Your PC had previously resolved they had NO OBJECTION to these applications and both were approved on the 10th March 2026.

PL/25/3492/FA – Burnell Farm Cottage, Drayton Road, Stoke Hammond MK17 0ED

Proposed additional storey and single storey side extension.

Your PC had previously resolved to OBJECT to this application, as they felt the proposed additional storey would be overbearing in nature and not in keeping with other properties in the area and would seem Bucks Planning agreed, as this was one of the main reasons given in their REFUSAL to this application on the 4th Feb 2026.

Just a reminder that Buckinghamshire Council have recently updated their planning website, so that the previous 4 separate planning regions have now been combined into one single system. 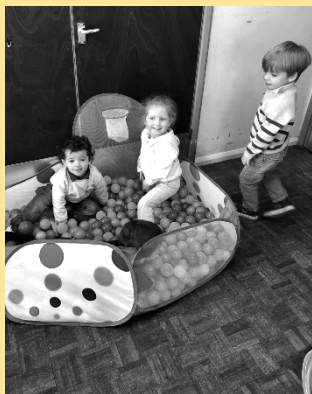
Joyful Tots

Catch Up Newsletter 06/03/2026

It's been a busy and positive month across our community.

In slightly colder weather, it was fantastic to get out and about during Parliamentary recess, meeting residents, businesses and a cross-section of our parish councils (more on this below). I also held supermarket surgeries at Tesco in both Buckingham and Bletchley, where I had some really thoughtful conversations about local and national issues. Thank you to everyone who stopped to chat.

One of the highlights of half term was getting in touch with three of our excellent local schools after they each received letters from Bridget Phillipson congratulating them on their outstanding results last year. Huge congratulations to Knowles Primary School, Priory Rise School and The Premier Academy. I couldn't be prouder.

A small confession: this newsletter was meant to go out last week, but I held it back so I could share that I have officially launched the petition for the Bletchley railway station Eastern Entrance - a vital step towards improving access and unlocking opportunity in our town. Please do sign and share it. The more signatures we secure, the harder it will be to ignore.

On national matters, the Government has launched a consultation on banning social media for under-16s. People I've spoken to locally seem overwhelmingly in favour, but there is more listening to do. I'll be sharing more of my thoughts soon and would very much welcome yours.

The new Cancer Plan has also been published. I recently met with Wes Streeting to discuss its direction, and closer to home I've been speaking with the brilliant team at Henry Allen Trust about how we ensure families get the support they deserve.

I'm also pleased that £162,000 in clean energy funding is coming to Milton Keynes University Hospital, helping to cut costs and emissions locally. And I'm fully backing Milton Keynes' bid to become UK City of Culture. It's a fantastic opportunity to showcase the creativity and ambition of our city.

Finally, I know the latest developments in the Middle East will understandably be causing concern for many. If you are worried about family or friends in the constituency, please do contact my office at callum.anderson.mp@parliament.uk and we will do everything we can to help.

I have been asked by a concerned village (Stoke Hammond!) resident to mention the above in the light of present proposals. Hang on I thought, this rings bells. Looking through previous GOM's I found the following:

“And there is a nice bit of new asphalt in the bus stop in Fenny Road - on the pavement that is. Took days of 3 way traffic lights to complete. I call it a bus stop as it is clearly not a shelter. It has only one side (back) which is protected by the houses behind. If the wind blows from the North, East or South there is no protection from wind or rain. Hopefully “Men in Sheds” will make a better (and cheaper) job of renovating the shelter opposite the Dolphin.”

That was two years ago (doesn't time fly!) and now the bus stop opposite Scotts Close has come to the attention of the Parish Council. I've looked at the old shelter and note it has a roof and three and a half sides. This makes it a very effective shelter but I agree it needs some TLC. A little washing of the Perspex and a lick of paint and it would be as good as new. Is this going to happen? No - we're going to have another “new” bus shelter.

And is this new bus shelter to be in wonderful modern materials that will outlast HS2 (if that is ever finished and used)? No, it's going to be in good old fashioned wood (albeit with sides). In this connection I refer you to the shelter opposite the Dolphin. Wood has a fairly finite lifespan.

But what has agitated at least one villager is that this fine construction is costing £25,000 (inc. VAT)!! I repeat

that time flies - when I got married you could buy two starter houses for £25,000.

I wonder what else could be done with £25,000 - hmmm. Are there not cheaper alternative shelters? I would hope for automatic doors, central heating and Wi Fi for that sort of money. Or how about filling all the potholes and resurfacing some of the side roads and pavements. Or revising the "Parish Boundaries" which I believe the Church have done by nominating a Church in Bletchley as the Parish Church for Newton Leys South.

Editors Comment: It should be noted, as mentioned in the PC News section, that the cost for the new bus shelter will not be £25,000 as the Parish council is able to reclaim the VAT. The cost also includes for the removal and disposal of the old shelter, the laying of a new concrete base, the delivery and erection of the new shelter, and an extensive warranty against both defect and damage.

As regards the filling of potholes, road resurfacing and Parish Boundaries, these are the responsibility and governed by the local authority, namely Buckinghamshire Council.

News from Buckinghamshire Council

Dear Resident

26 February 2026

I wanted to update you with the good news that we have now approved a balanced budget for the council for the coming financial year. This means we can now focus on investing in the priorities that you as residents have asked for, including ongoing investment in our roads, maintaining weekly bin collections and continuing to provide key statutory services such as social care.

Once again, this year, reaching this end goal of achieving a balanced budget, as we are legally required to, has not been easy. Our task has been shaped by significant financial pressures linked to the national government's Fair Funding Review which is redirecting locally raised funds away from Buckinghamshire to other parts of the country. As a result, we will see a reduction in funding of £44.5 million as the government diverts resources away from services here in Buckinghamshire. There is nothing fair about that in my opinion and as a council we will continue to lobby the government with regards to this new funding system.



As residents, you are being let down by central government. They assume that we will raise council tax by the maximum amount when it allocates our funding. Even then, in real terms, this revenue will not go far enough to cover vital services so we will have to work even harder to balance the books in future years.

To help safeguard essential services in the county, we will be raising basic rate of council tax by 2.99 per cent from 1 April 2026, and the Adult Social Care precept will increase by 2 per cent, meaning a total rise of 4.99%, or an extra £1.86 per week for the average Band D home during 2026/27.

Since becoming a unitary authority in 2020, we have made significant savings to run a balanced budget, totalling £186m by the end of this financial year. Additional savings and efficiencies totalling £109m have been identified over the next three years, to allow us to keep investing in local services as well as providing the critical statutory support services. Consequently, by the end of the three-year period, the council will have delivered savings compared to the combined, pre-unitary council budgets from 2020 of 67%! Meaning your council is efficiently run and ensuring value for money in what it does.

NW Keeping Your Car Safe

This is a message from Val McPherson Area NW Representative and Administrator for all Aylesbury.

I have been informed by a Coordinator down in the Chalfonts & Chilterns area, that they have had a number of cars damaged and broken into overnight of 15/16 March, and as you are all aware opportunists, car thieves jump areas.

If your car has been broken into report to the police on 101 unless you witness your car being broken into then it is 999 telling the police the offender is near-by.

Inform your Insurance Company.

Do not touch anything in case the police need to take finger prints or carry out other investigations.

Make a note of anything missing or stolen and photograph any damage done to your vehicle. Your Insurance company may require this information.

So here are some safety tips to keep your Car Safe:

- Do not leave your keys in the ignition or door open when your car is unattended.
- Make sure your car is secure with the roof, sunroof, windows and doors all locked.
- Do not leave valuables in your car where they can be seen and stolen.
- Do not leave car documents, credit cards in your car.
- If you cannot park your car on your drive make sure it is parked in a well-lit area or secure car park.
- Most sure your alarm is working in your car.
- Fit lockable wheel nuts, fuel cap and other security devices available.
- If you have Keyless car fob's some allow you to switch off the wireless signals. Check with your manufacturer. If not please keep your fobs well out of site especially away from the front of your property.

I sell Faraday signal blocking pouches in two size, one small @ £3.00 each which will take a single fob, or a larger one at £4.00 each which takes a mobile phone or two fobs.
