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PARISH COUNCIL NEWS



Stoke Hammond has unfortunately not escaped the scourge that is 'Fly tipping' which has blighted many of our neighbouring communities. In recent weeks there have been incidents on Bragenham Side up by the Paper Mill Barns, Newton Road and the access way from the Leighton Road through to Soulbury as it passes beneath the bypass and main line railway, and of course the infamous lay by has also not got

away 'Scott Free'.
These incidents ideally with photographic evidence should always be reported via the 'Fix my Street'



website, but there is also a further new website/app that you can also use called 'Clearwaste'. Should you observe fly tipping in progress and if without putting yourself into any harm's way you can get any vehicle details, please do report this to the police via their101 non-emergency number.

As detailed in the 'Planning Updates' section, and somewhat upsetting for the residents on Brook Farm

Close when they learnt that the application (24/02068/CPE) for a Certificate of Lawfulness to confirm that work on the development of 33 homes to the land at the end of Brook Farm Close had been started before the expiration of the approved planning application(16/02432/AOP) had indeed been upheld by the Buckinghamshire planning department. This decision being reached despite many objections and justifications posted against this Certificate of Lawfulness including a long list of reasons submitted by your Parish Council, but the Planning Department decided there was adequate evidence to determine that the developers had indeed undertaken sufficient work within the 3-year window since the original planning application was as approved. So, the development of the 33 new homes subject to compliance with any further normal planning criteria can indeed continue.

As we're sure many of you will know, Local Elections are to be held on the $1^{\rm st}$ of May, which will cover all seats in the 14 County Councils and 8 Unitary Authorities in England and will also include all Parish Councils such as ours. Stoke Hammond has 7 Councillor positions, which subject to one or more of the following 4 statements applying, any person would have been eligible to submit a nomination paper.

- 1/ I am registered as a local government elector for the area of the named parish ie: Stoke Hammond
- 2/I have, during the whole of the preceding 12 months occupied as owner or tenant land or other premises in the named parish ie: Stoke Hammond
- 3/ My principal or only place of work during the proceeding 12 months has been in the named parish ie: Stoke Hammond.

4/ I have during the whole of the preceding 12 months resided in the named parish or within 4.8 kilometres of it ie: Stoke Hammond

Nomination papers were to have been delivered 'by hand' to the Deputy Returning Officer at Buckinghamshire County Offices, The Gateway, Gatehouse Road, Aylesbury HP19 8FF by no later than 4pm on Wednesday 2nd April. So, depending on when you're reading this edition of the SH & NLS News you may if you are interested still have time to apply. As aforementioned, Stoke Hammond has 7 Parish Councillor positions, and if 7 or less valid nominations are received, those applicants will automatically be elected. If, however, there are more than 7 nominations, there will then be two polling papers on Election Day, one for our Buckinghamshire Ward Councillor, and another for the Parish Councillor positions.

On the subject of your Parish Councillors, we have to say a big thank you to Cllr Steven Julier who for personal reasons did recently stand down from the Council. Steven's knowledge and experience in the construction industry brought a most valuable input when looking into planning applications and projects such as the new recreation spaces we are trying to create for our community.

We are pleased to advise that our new website is now up and running and hopefully, you will find this an improvement on the old and easier to navigate. The site address remains unchanged at www.stokehammondpc.com

There have been 2 Parish Council meetings since the last 'Parish Council News' brief details of which follow here:

For the February meeting held on Tuesday the 4th, we were a bit devoid for various reasons in the number of Councillors available, and in fact just 3 were able to attend, the minimum number required for the Council to be considered quorate and able to proceed with the meeting. The meeting was also joined by 4 members of the public (MoP). The meeting fairly 'fast tracked' as with absence of some Councillors, updates or next stages on some projects were not able to be considered, but the main items of interest were as follows:

- It had previously been established that as a Parish Council we were in need of a specific type of accounts package, and the clerk had received a quotation from Scribe who had been highly recommended and were offering a suitable system. It was agreed to accept the quoted costs for both the purchase of the package at a one-off cost of £459, with a further setup cost of £149 and a subsequent monthly charge of £49. With the system to go live from the 1st April this year.
- Although we still await a date for installation of the new village entrance gates by Bucks Highways, they had come back to the clerk to advise that the width of the verge to the Fenny Road entrance, would allow gates of a greater width at some 2 metres each to be installed, but this would involve an extra cost of £627. The question was asked of MoP's if they felt the wider gates given the extra cost would be worthwhile, and the consensus of opinion was that indeed they would. It was therefore agreed to instruct Bucks Highways that the PC accepted the additional cost for these wider gates.

For the following March meeting held on Tuesday 4th we had a compliment of 6 Councillors plus the attendance of our Ward Councillor Jilly Jordan who gave a latest update on Bucks Council matters (see section later in this edition), plus we were joined by 7 members of the public (MoP). There was only 1 planning application to consider relating to Paper Mill Barns, details of which can be found in the 'Planning Updates' section, otherwise the most items of interest were:

- The PC had received a Community Funding request from the Stoke Hammond Youth Football Club to help go towards the Good Friday Easter Event they are putting on. This was agreed by the PC.
- Cllr Noble had put forward a proposal to upgrade the SH & NLS News publication to full colour throughout. Whilst the PC thought this a good idea, it was felt the extra cost was not justifiable based on the current format. But would revisit if some ideas as to how the publication could be revamped.
- Under the section 'Meetings attended on behalf of the Parish Council' it was advised that some of the Councillors had taken part Teams video meeting with the land promoter for the field at Newton Leys South following their recent submission of a planning application. They are supportive of giving the PC recreation facilities and they wanted this meeting to iron out what these may look like. Their original intention was to give the PC the land for us to develop, but they now intend to do this themselves as part of their \$106 obligations. The PC is hoping to increase the size of the MUGA and include additional parking facilities. It was worth noting that without the evolving Neighbourhood Plan, the PC would not have been involved with these discussions, and it's likely that less land would have been set aside for us and additional houses would have been built.

The next two Parish Council meetings are at this time currently planned to take place at the normal venue of the Community Centre, Bragenham Side. The April meeting being on Tuesday 2nd and the May meeting because of the local elections is likely to be pushed back to the second Tuesday of the month on the 13th. It should also be noted that this May meeting is both our Annual Parish and Annual Parish Council meeting and as such will start at 7.00pm, whilst the April meeting will start at the normal time of 7.30pm. For those not aware the Annual Parish meeting provides a review of the past year's events with other local organisations also invited to deliver an insight into their last year's range of activities. As for the actual Annual Parish Council meeting, one of the first items on the agenda will be the appointment of the Chair and Vice Chair of the Council for the next year.

Buckinghamshire Council agrees spending plans and council tax rates for the coming year.

Buckinghamshire Council has agreed its budget for the coming financial year, including confirming an investment of £120 million in the county's road network.

The final budget was voted on by full council last at a meeting last night, where spending plans of more than £600 million on local services and communities were agreed.

The budget includes the following investment over a four-year period:

- £182.5 million on schools
- £130.1 million on strategic infrastructure such as the new South East Aylesbury Link Road
- £120 million on highways
- £30.4 million on waste and recycling services
- £24.8 million on housing and homelessness
- £22.7 million on regeneration projects particularly focussing on town centre improvements
- £10.7 million on highways drainage
- £10.7 million on flood management

These spending decisions were informed by local residents during consultation last Autumn, who told the council they wanted adult social care services, roads and education to be prioritised.

The council's Medium Term Financial Plan details how it will balance the books until 2028, and outlines significant spending pressures the council is facing, particularly with increased cost and demand in social care, temporary accommodation and transporting children with additional needs to and from school. These services make up 71% of the council's overall budget, leaving 29% left to pay for everything else.

Both the Capital and Revenue budgets are funded mostly by council tax, which makes up 80% of the funding for the council's services, with the remaining 20% coming from grants, central government and other income streams.

The council has made significant savings to run a balanced budget, totalling £116.8 million in its first five years of operation as a unitary authority. A further £115.6 million in savings has been identified over the next three years, to allow the council to keep investing in local services as well as providing the critical statutory support services such as social care that residents rely on.

Cllr Jilly Jordan Update, Page 2:

The basic rate of council tax in Buckinghamshire will rise by 2.99 per cent from 1 April 2025, and the Adult Social Care precept will increase by 2 per cent, meaning a total rise of 4.99 per cent, or an extra £1.77 per week for the average Band D home during 2025/26.

Leader of Buckinghamshire Council, Martin Tett said: "The last thing I want to do is raise council tax bills but we simply have no choice. The demand and costs for social care, school transport and temporary housing accommodation keep rising steeply. These are services that we legally must provide and are inspected upon. Central government calculates how much it will give us in grants based on the assumption councils will put bills up by the maximum allowed without a referendum and this is what we have had to do in Buckinghamshire.

Because of the enormous cost of some of our most important services to vulnerable people, we can only balance our books by finding huge savings and making difficult choices. These have included 10% cuts to the budget for councillor's Allowances. It is only right that councillors contribute to making these savings.

I am however pleased that due to our prudent financial management, we are not in as precarious a position as so many other councils who are putting up council tax by much larger amounts. Thirty councils are now in receipt of Exceptional Financial Support from central Government.

In Buckinghamshire we can invest in our roads, schools and town centre improvements and we can balance the books for the next three years. While the context remains risky and challenging, I am pleased we have done our best for our residents and have been able to direct their council tax at the services and priorities that matter most."

Stop - It's the law

Council urges drivers to be respectful of the vital work carried out by school crossing patrollers.

Known commonly as lollipop men and women, Buckinghamshire's 60 school crossing patrollers are on duty come rain or shine, morning and afternoon during school term time, wielding their trusty STOP signs to help children and adults reach school safely. While most drivers are respectful and stop when requested, a small minority can be abusive and put lives at risk with dangerous manoeuvres, as they refuse to stop to allow safe crossings.

Since the start of the school year in 2021 to November 2024, there have been 39 reported incidents. Of these, four were injury incidents, 29 were near misses, and the remainder were verbal incidents. However, it is expected numbers are higher than this, as patrollers don't report every incident, despite encouragement. **Cont/d:**

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Cllr Jilly Jordan Update, Page 3:

School crossing patrollers have a legal right to stop traffic for anyone who needs help crossing the road. They have the same authority as a police officer to stop traffic. Failing to stop when a school crossing patrol displays the stop sign is an offence that can result in a £1,000 fine, three penalty points, and disqualification. Failing to stop puts vulnerable road users at risk and patrollers are instructed to report any driver who fails to stop to the police, which could lead to prosecution. Instances of dangerous behaviour include drivers using abusive language, failing to stop when the patroller is already in the road, and swerving around patrollers to get past. Drivers also make patrollers' jobs more difficult by blocking pavements and stopping or parking inconsiderately to drop off children, especially at School Keep Clear markings and bus stops.

Steven Broadbent, Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Transport at Buckinghamshire Council, said: "Our Iollipop men and women play an invaluable role in our local school communities and are deeply appreciated by both pupils and parents.

Drivers are being reminded when approaching a school:

- Slow down when you see a patrol warning sign or flashing lights and be prepared to stop.
- Stop when the patrol is displaying the stop sign.
- Be patient and do not move forward.
- Do not park where the patrol works, on zig-zag lines, or other areas with parking restrictions.

Council spearheads partnership working to address increase in vehicle related crime.

Following a noted increase in vehicle related crime in Buckinghamshire, the council's Community Safety Team has been working with partners, including Thames Valley Police (TVP), to raise public awareness of how to protect vehicles from being targeted.

The Community Safety Team successfully bid for funding from the Thames Valley Police & Crime Commissioner to run a vehicle crime project across Buckinghamshire. The funding has been used to support a range of activities including:

• Clear car campaigns – Community safety officers and the local TVP neighbourhood team have visited car parks and noted down registration details of vehicles displaying items on show, which could lead to a potential break in. Items such as wallets, handbags and cash were spotted by officers.

Owners leaving valuables on show will receive a crime prevention letter with advice and information on how to keep their vehicle safe.


- Pop up events Providing residents with vehicle crime prevention advice and items such as keyless car signal blocking pouches.
- Vehicle crime signage Will be displayed in beauty spots and pub/hotel car park locations with a high vehicle crime rate to increase awareness around vehicle crime.
- Number plate screws In partnership with Kwik Fit, eight garages across Buckinghamshire have been provided with anti-tamper proof number plate screws to install on vehicles. This is a free service offered to local communities to help reduce number plate thefts. Along with securing their number plates, those who use this service will receive an air freshener, ice scraper, vehicle stickers and leaflets all displaying vehicle crime related messages. Garages will record how many have been installed so the effectiveness of the project can be monitored.

Free online volunteering platform for Buckinghamshire

Volunteer Bucks, the online volunteer platform for Buckinghamshire, helps potential volunteers to find and apply for volunteering opportunities according to interests, location, and availability.

Launched by local charity Community Impact Bucks in September 2024, the platform now has over 300 volunteer vacancies ready to be filled from 129 organisations from across the county – from foodbanks and community libraries, to conservation charities and youth organisations.

Over 650 people have already signed up to the platform in its first six months, with 90 volunteers already having started in their role and many more in the pipeline. Extra features include an online quiz to help those unsure what type role would suit them, and an interactive map. If you are 13-17 years old or need support, there is a team on hand to help.

Over 35,000 account hackings reported in 2024.

This year Action Fraud and Meta are encouraging the public to protect their social media and email accounts as data shows there were more than 35,000 reports made last year.

Data shows there was a rise of social media and email account hacking reported in 2024, with a total of 35,434 reports made to Action Fraud, compared to 22,530 reports made in 2023.

Action Fraud, the national fraud and cybercrime reporting service, has launched a campaign, supported by Meta, to encourage people to take an extra step of online protection by enabling 2-Step Verification for each online account they have. The warning comes as reporting shows nearly £1 million was lost to hackers last year.

The most common motives for social media hacking were either investment fraud, ticket fraud or theft of the targeted account, reporting insights revealed.

Adam Mercer, Deputy Director of Action Fraud, said:

"As social media and email account hacking remains the most reported cybercrime this year, this Action Fraud campaign marks a critical issue for everyone who has online accounts. That's why we're raising awareness of the ways people can protect themselves online.

"Follow Stop! Think Fraud advice and protect yourself online: enable 2-Step Verification on each online account you have – this will help prove your identity and stop fraudsters trying to steal or access your valuable information. Secure your social media and email accounts by ensuring each password is strong and uses three random words. Remember to never share your passwords with anyone else."

David Agranovich, Security Policy Director, Meta, said:

"Scammers are relentless and continuously evolving their tactics to try and evade detection, which is why we're constantly working on new ways to keep people safe while keeping bad actors out. Two-Factor Authentication (2FA) is one crucial example of how people can add an extra layer of security to their Meta accounts, to help reduce the risk of scammers accessing your accounts. We've also started rolling out facial recognition technology to help people get back into compromised or hacked accounts and are always working on new ways to stay ahead of scammers."

In the reports made to Action Fraud, there were various different methods of hacking highlighted, these include:

On-platform chain hacking

This is when a fraudster gains control of an account and begins to impersonate the legitimate owner. The goal is to convince people to reveal authentication codes, including one-time passcodes, that are sent to them via text. Many victims of this type of hacking believe it's a friend messaging them, however the shared code was associated with their own account and the impersonator can now use it to access their account. Usually when an account is taken over, fraudsters monetise control of the account via promotion of various fraudulent schemes, like fake tickets or crypto investment schemes, while impersonating the original account owner.

Leaked passwords and phishing

The other common method of hacking is when account details are gained via phishing scams, or the use of leaked information used from data breaches, such as leaked passwords. This becomes prevalent as people often use the same password for multiple accounts, so a leaked password from one website can leave many of their online accounts vulnerable to hacking.

What can you do to avoid being a victim?

2-step verification (2SV) will keep criminals out of your account — even if they know your password. Turning on 2SV gives your most important accounts an extra level of protection, especially your email and social media accounts. It can be turned on in a matter of minutes — time well spent to keep the fraudsters out. Find out how to enable it here. Email and social media passwords should be strong and different to all of your other passwords. A good way to make sure your passwords are 'long enough and strong enough' is to combine three random words to create a unique password which is easy to remember. Find out more here.

Membership for the sports club are due 1st May, please pop in and ask behind the bar for details.



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

Firstport update - Bovis side adoption

We are still pursuing Firstport to send the final client funds they hold on behalf of the Bovis side of Newton Leys. Once those are received, we should be able to proceed with the next steps towards the adoption of the public open spaces and park.

Taylor Wimpey side of Newton Leys adoption

We are hoping that the adoption of the public open space on the Taylor Wimpey side happens over the summer. The legal work is ongoing, and we have let Taylor Wimpey know the items they need to address before adoption. The main one is 80-90% of the trees they planted have died. Taylor Wimpey will need to plant replacements and there are some other items they need to sort out and tidy up.

Fruit trees

It has been a year since the residents of Newton Leys (with help from a few councillors) planted 200 fruit trees around the Newton Leys estate. As part of the monitoring of those trees your Newton Leys councillors surveyed them during March. The Taylor Wimpey side trees fared the best, with only 2 fatalities so far. We could only plant about 40-50 on that side, but that is a remarkable achievement. On the Bovis side there were 28 trees that didn't make it over the winter. However, that means we still have 170 fruit trees that should hopefully fruit this year. We planted a mixture of cherries, pears, plums, many varieties of apples and even apricots. We are hoping that the apricots could be one benefit from climate change!

If we get a really hot period, we may ask for help from residents to keep them watered.

Parish Council elections - 1 May 2025

Since the last election we have started some really key projects that will make a massive difference to people in the parish; saving £25-28k a year for residents in the Bovis part of the estate and a similar amount in the Taylor Wimpey estate by adopting the public open space, working to ensure any developments around Newton Leys (and Stoke Hammond) have access to good quality facilities and open spaces, and revolutionising the recreation and nature facilities across the Parish. Proposed development opposite Dickens Lane

Councillors met with the promoter of this site in March. The development of this site was included in our Neighbourhood plan, and discussions with the promoter have allowed the councillors to help guide the public open space and leisure facilities the residents in Newton Leys would like to have in this area. Currently those plans include a substantial amount of the site dedicated to public open space, and we are aiming for a reasonable sized MUGA (with parking) and an informal playing field that is large enough for children to play sports on to the North of the site. A formal planning application has been submitted for that site.

S106 park in Stoke Hammond

We have received the results of some of our surveys over the 13 acres in Stoke Hammond we are proposing to purchase. We are hoping to submit a planning application by May. Once the purchase is finalised, we will start the more detailed part of the project to work out what to put on that site to benefit the whole community. Whilst on my holidays I have been having a close look at what other countries put in their parks, which have included climbing walls, skate parks, and even dog assault courses. This summer should start to see ideas for the site to be fleshed out.

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


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LADIES THAT LUNCH






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
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STOKE HAMMOND BOOK CLUB

Conclusion: Different theme but not really recommended.



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
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A Month in the Country - by J.L. Carr

Your Council had submitted an Objection listing many reasons as to why works had NOT been lawfully started within 3 years. Bucks Planning thought otherwise and, on the 5th February 2025, issued a Certificate of Lawfulness determining works had indeed started within 3 years and thus the development can continue.

religious service by default: it must be specifically requested. The Rector can conduct a funeral service at a crematorium if you wish. Also, any village resident can be buried or have their ashes buried in the churchyard if wished (for a small fee). Memorial stones must conform to the Oxford Diocese

News from Buckinghamshire Council

Dear Resident 17 March 2025

I hope this update finds you well. As ever, I want to make sure that you're up to date with the very latest information from the council, including progress updates on some important developments locally and nationally.

As I write this, after a lovely weekend before last, the weather has been bitterly cold. This will inevitably mean more damage to our roads. We have 21 teams out repairing defects but we do need to know about them, so please tell us about any defects you see via the council's website.



Ukraine Regional Partnership

To start with some good news, I am really pleased to announce that Buckinghamshire Council has signed a new regional partnership agreement with the



Kyiv region of Ukraine. This is an expression of solidarity and friendship, as well as offering the opportunity, with no financial commitment, to explore the opportunities for collaboration in the future, particularly around sharing information around areas of joint interest such as education, skills, business, culture and much more. This is similar to a twinning arrangement.

This is particularly appropriate given that Buckinghamshire has hosted over 2,000 temporary refugees from Ukraine. We were honoured to sign this agreement via a remote link this morning (Monday 17 March) and we look forward to welcoming a delegation from the Kyiv State Region later in the spring.

After all the difficulties the Ukrainian people have been through in recent weeks, I hope this will send a clear message that they are not forgotten.

Further changes to Planning rules

We have had more information from the Government this week around their wideranging changes to planning regulations, including proposing taking away powers from planning committees where developments of up to 100 homes are concerned, according to press reports. This will have a big impact on local people who may be concerned about a development nearby and want their genuine concerns listened to and decided by local councillors that they elect for this purpose. This will no longer be possible. Also, very significantly for those in the south of the county, we are also being informed that there is a plan to re-define greenbelt land that separates villages as being available for development. This could mean that developers will be able to build on Green Belt land that currently separates villages, leading to them effectively merging and losing their separate identities.

The implications for a place like Buckinghamshire are enormous. I've already expressed my concerns around the approach to the comprehensive overhaul of the planning system, and while no-one disputes the need for more new homes, these should be the right developments in the right places and decided locally through Local Plans with the necessary infrastructure. I cannot overstate how these proposals would completely change Buckinghamshire on a permanent basis and I want to assure you all that we are responding back to Government to robustly outline our concerns about these proposals and lobbying for changes to be made in the proposed legislation.

Holding utilities firms to account over roadworks

Today, (Monday 17 March) the council's Cabinet submit an application to the Government to implement a Lane Rental Scheme (LRS) in Buckinghamshire. This is a major step towards addressing and ultimately reducing disruption caused by the growing number of roadworks. If approved, this would mean that the council will be one of the first local authorities in the country to obtain the relevant powers to deliver such a scheme.

Lane Rental powers enable an authority to charge those working on key roads, at the busiest times, up to £2,500 a day to occupy the most traffic sensitive parts of the highway network. The aim is to incentivise those working on the highway network to either move their works to less busy times, or complete them in a quicker timescale, to avoid accumulating charges. The result should help reduce congestion and create more reliable journeys for road users. The scheme would complement the existing permit scheme operated by Buckinghamshire Highways, and would only apply to selected roads, not the whole of the county.

Work on growth and our local economy

We have progressed a number of different strands of work under this theme in recent weeks. While a lot of our work quite rightly focusses on providing our day to day services for residents (bin collections, fixing roads, keeping town centres clean and safe) we are constantly working on plans and projects around the future of our county too.

This is about how we keep building a thriving local economy, have attractive town centres and how our residents can access good jobs and training opportunities. It's also about making sure our digital infrastructure is right and that all parts of the county can access good broadband and digital connections, something I've been particularly invested in championing and driving forward as too many of our rural communities are still being left behind on this front.

Last week we agreed a new Digital Infrastructure and Connectivity strategy aimed at addressing this very point and to make sure the right decisions are being made to ensure all Buckinghamshire communities have good access to digital connections.

Boosting local skills

Another important aspect of a thriving economy is to make sure the local employment market is flourishing. That we have the right people and right skills to fill local vacancies and that people are able to access opportunities to give them the

best possible footing into sustainable employment. We already run regular jobs and skills fairs and we have now approved a new approach to Adults Skills Funding. This is part of the devolution agreement that was established with the previous government and that we are progressing, to allow us greater power at a local level over our adult learning budget (currently held and managed by central government) to make sure we can offer courses where they will most benefit local people and the local area.

Improving our Town Centres

Boosting our local economy also involves regeneration and new development. I'm really pleased at the huge strides we are making in this area, with key improvement and transformation schemes already underway in both High Wycombe and Aylesbury Town Centres. It was good to be in High Wycombe last week to see the major improvements being made to the White Hart Street shopping area to give the whole location a facelift, encouraging shopper to stay longer and enjoy the area and maybe have a coffee or a meal. We are introducing upgraded paving and new planting and seating areas.

We will also be introducing camera enforcement of the parking regulations to stop the virtual abandonment of parked cars along the street that used to take place.

In Aylesbury Town Centre work is well underway creating a whole new district through our new 'Pavilion Quarter' shopping and cultural development, that will link the High Street and the thriving



Exchange development and create new routes around the town.

This is a flagship scheme for Buckinghamshire which is significantly progressing on site. The demolition of the old building that occupied the space is nearly complete, clearing the way for the new development.



The second phase of the Pavilion Quarter will be for a temporary use while the council develops and engages with the community over the permanent use of the site, which will be developed as a place for independent business to flourish, with potential for live entertainment and cultural events, bringing new routes to better connect the town centre and rejuvenate the high street.
