

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

As this edition of the SH & NLS News was heading across to the printers, Parish Councillors Stephen Clarke and Mel D'Agostino were due to be holding what was to be their second Public Surgery at the Community Centre on the evening of the 24th July. Providing an opportunity for residents to discuss and raise concerns they may have but in a more informal and private manner than is provided by the Public Participation sessions at our normal monthly PC meetings. Items discussed will then be passed onto the rest of the Council to determine whether some form of response and action is appropriate. Depending on whether these surgeries are well received, they may well become a regular item in addition to the PC Meetings.



So, what news on the Stoke Road layby, and are we any closer to getting it closed off? Well, those of you who read this column on a regular basis, will know that we are very reliant on our Ward Councillor Jilly Jordan and her discussions with Bucks Highways, but some progress has been made, when at the end of May a Court Summons was obtained. The addressed summons was unauthorised occupants of said layby and stated that by 16.00 hours on Sunday 25th May 2025, that they had to leave the land and remove all vehicles and any other property from the layby. We understand that Cllr Jordan accompanied by the police, has since been back to the layby to evict any vehicles/occupants that have returned. We as a Parish Council will continue to press Cllr Jordan for details and timeline for the laybys permanent closure.

Still on the subject of Highways, and as recently posted on Facebook, please be aware that the Newton Road between Church Road and the Fenny Road junction will be closed for what is being called 'development works to make adjustments and carry out resurfacing' from the 20th August until the 3rd September. Unfortunately, at this time we have no details of what will be the sign posted diversionary routes.

Some of you may recall we made mention in the last PC News about the land south of Newton Leys (Chadwell Farm) and the planning application (24/03601/AOP) for the erection of up to 290 dwellings, and that this was now the second time that we as a PC had been asked to make comment. Well, it is now four times that we have made comment, for as new documents are added we are once more being invited by planning to make a further comment, which we did at our PC Meeting in July and again at our Extraordinary meeting of the 16th July. Whilst, it is quite frustrating to have to look at the same application over and over again, one must recognise that some of the new documentation could maybe involve some major and significant change, and

as such it is important that this is brought to people's attention. However, we have not changed out tact on this application, and for both of the latest requests for comment, we reiterated our Objection for the same reasons as cited before, namely:

- The Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan (VALP) states that Stoke Hammond does not need to take on more homes as we have met our allocation.
- This application is outside of our draft Neighbourhood Plan.
- More information is required by Bucks Highways, so information is currently missing from the application.
- The houses in the application all face Newton Leys, with any green space located at the bottom of the development next to the farm

As usual, for other updates on new and previous planning applications, please refer to the Planning Section elsewhere in this publication, where one can also find the latest results from our 3 MVAS (Mobile Vehicle Activated Signs), but the volunteer 'Speedwatch' team which does have two of our councillors as members, has also been in action, and we thought you might be interested in what they recorded. Their first session being held on the afternoon of the 12th June monitoring traffic on the Leighton Road at the corner of Mount Pleasant as it entered from the direction of Leighton Buzzard. Over a 2 hour period starting at 2pm, some 197 vehicles passed by of which 11 were travelling in excess of the reportable speed of 36mph, with a fastest speed being logged at 51mph. For their second session on the 2nd July the Speedwatch were positioned on the opposite side of the road monitoring traffic as it headed south out of the village. Over a 2hr period again starting at 2pm some 268 vehicles were counted of which 6 were reported for travelling at 36mph or above, with the fastest speed this time being 39mph. For vehicles reported to the Community Speedwatch scheme, the registered keepers will receive a warning letter from Thames Valley Police and if a vehicle is reported on 3 separate occasions the keeper will actually receive a personal visit by the police. It is worth noting that there were many of the vehicles travelling above the 30mph limit, but the scheme only allows speeds of 36mph or above to be logged and reported.

So, since the last PC News there have been two scheduled PC Meetings plus the aforementioned Extraordinary Meeting held on the 16th July. For the June meeting held at the Community Centre on the evening of the 3rd June, the full council were joined by 15 members of the public (MoP) and our Ward Councillor Caroline Cornel, who during the meeting gave a brief update on Ward matters but also provided a fuller report which can be found on our website. As for other matters discussed and debated, some were as follows:

- Concern was raised by some Councillors about the ongoing costs relating to the fields purchase and the likelihood of success if a planning application was submitted for change of use from agricultural to recreational. After a fairly lengthy discussion it was agreed that we would approach our planning consultants to give an indication of their costs for putting together a plan of action and their thoughts on how successful such an application might be.
- With regard to the vandalised Book Swap cabinet, it was agreed by the PC that they would take responsibility and set a budget of £150 to purchase a replacement cabinet. Cllr Noble would search eBay and other such sites to try and find a suitable unit.

- The PC had received a Community Funding Application from the Gardening Club for assistance in the financing of coach trips and other excursion costs. Recognising the value and importance of the Gardening Club for our residents, the PC were unanimous in their approval of the £350 funding.
- During the public participation session, a MoP mentioned that the bin by the bus stop on Fenny Road is being used for dog waste. He asked if a laminated sign could be added to the bin to try and prevent this. The MoP will send the information to Cllr Noble who will then install the sign.
- Again, during the Public Participation session, the matter of the new bench at Lock 21 was raised, as previously the PC were against the idea, but given new information would they now reconsider their stance. However, noting the area of land does not belong to the PC but the Canal & River Trust who had now given their approval, it was felt the PC need not make any further comment.

For the next PC Meeting held on the evening of 1st July, we headed across to the Newton Leys Pavillion where we were joined by 3 MoP. Our ward councillor Caroline Cornel was in attendance, but was suddenly called away on an urgent personal matter, but did leave us with a written update before she left. The planning item on the agenda relating to Chadwell Farm has already been covered earlier in this PC News, but some of the others matters discussed were as follows:

- At the previous June meeting, it had been proposed to go back to our Planning Consultants to enquire about them producing a plan of action for obtaining a change of use planning application for the fields the PC are seeking to purchase. They had advised a cost of £1900 to produce same. Some felt this was excessive and not a good use of PC funds. After a lengthy discussion, with not all councillors in agreement, it was proposed we proceed with the planning application but not use the services offered by our planning consultants. 5 Councillors voted in favour with 1 abstention and 1 not taking part in the vote due to a conflict of interest.
- A representative from the developer for the land opposite Dickens Lane in Newton Leys South that does form part of our evolving Neighbourhood Plan was at the meeting to explain the proposal for the PC to be party to a Section 38 Highways agreement. Which relates to a proposed footpath from Dickens Lane to the new development site. It was agreed that some consultation would be required with the owners of nearby properties and that as part of the Section 38 agreement, vehicles must be prohibited from using the pathway. But in principle all Councillors were in favour of this Section 38 agreement.
- At a previous PC meeting it was agreed to request a quotation from 'Men in Sheds' for repairing the bus shelter next to The Dolphin PH. They had produced two quotations, and it was agreed to accept the second slightly higher quotation at £1,039.88 which was going to uses a higher grade of timber, thus offering a longer life time.
- At a previous meeting the subject of the overflowing litter bin at top of Newton Road near the bypass had been brought up. This bin of a relatively small size having been originally gifted by Mc Donalds Restaurants. It was agreed by all that a larger bin was required, and to then be added to the existing twice weekly bin emptying schedule.

Still on the subject of litter bins a MoP asked as to whether a litter bin could be
installed at Lock 21. But aside from having to liaise with the Canal & River Trust
as it would be sited on their land, the issue of access for emptying the bin would
also have to be addressed as the Lock can only be reached via a private owned
track.

With it being the Summer Holidays and as is normally the case, there will not be a scheduled PC Meeting in August, but should any urgent matters arise then an Extraordinary Meeting may be called. For the next planned meeting, this will be in September, but again due to holidays will not be the normal first Tuesday of the month, but the 9th and at the Newton Leys Pavilion starting at 7.30pm.

Rosemary Anne "Nibs" Clay 19 December 1939 – 17 June 2025



Here follows extracts from Jason's eulogy to his late mother-in-law Rosemary "Nibs" as read out at the Cremation Service held in Bierton on the 21st July 2025 How does one even begin to condense a life into a five minute eulogy. The truth is you can't.

When I started planning this tribute, I had a play around with AI. I think Nibs would have approved as she always embraced new technologies. This, much to Karen's dismay, as when trying to address her affairs, she found everything to be online with no paper statements in sight. I didn't use AI, I couldn't. The prompt I gave it was to write a eulogy for my mother-in-law in the style of Les Dawson. One line however stood out.

"And if, in the silence of night, you hear footsteps where none should fall... speak not. It is only her, passing once more through the corridors of your mind, reminding you that love is not always soft—but it is eternal."

Her Nibs, that's what her Dad always called her. She was born in 1939 and it was six years before they even met. Born to Rose and George at the Royal Bucks hospital in Aylesbury, Nibs' early years were spent living at Orchard Cottage in Stoke Hammond, before Rose moved back in with her parents, Granny and Grampy Lewis, until George returned home from the war. In fact, Nibs did not leave Stoke Hammond until 2014 and lived in Buckinghamshire her entire life.

Nibs attended primary school in the village, and secondary school at Bletchley Road. During that period, at ten years old, she first met Peter, another lad from the village. In 1954 aged fifteen, Nibs left school, as was the norm back then, but Peter left the year before even though there was only four months in age between them. Just take a moment to ponder what childhood for Nibs and Peter must have been like, no mobile phones or internet. Very few families even had a television. In 1953 the village came together and watched the Queen's coronation on a rented set. Incidentally, over a decade later in 1966, Nibs and Peter rented a television for the Football World Cup final, and found their home full of happy viewers. Apparently, England did quite well. Rationing of sweets didn't end until 1953. There was less traffic on the roads and kids played out in nature, cycling to get about and making up her own fun.

Peake as a talented seamstress, making among other garments, fur coats, which only the best seamstresses were allowed to do. Peter, after considering a career as a Cooper, started an apprenticeship with Lathams as a cabinet maker. As the swinging sixties began, the childhood friends married in July 1960. What an amazing time that must have been with all the possibilities of what life has to offer ahead of them. Peter fondly recalls trips to London to visit the theatre, jazz clubs to see Chris Barber and the comedy of Tommy Cooper. It was on one of these trips when Peter returned from using the facilities, to find Nibs attacking a fellow theatre goer with her handbag, for having had the audacity to proposition her.

Life however, has its ups and downs. In 1961 Nib's and Peter's world was turned upside down with the birth of Mandy on Christmas day. She only lived for an hour. Seventeen months later Karen arrived followed by Wendy in 1966, Nibs' pride and joy until the day she died, although I prefer to call them Hinge and Bracket, just don't tell them I told you so.

Aside from raising a family, life was taken up with serving and helping others, be it the copious cricket teas served from the old tin shed, or the eighteen years as Church Warden for St. Lukes in the village. A lifelong Anglican, Nibs also had close ties with the Women's Institute acting in many roles but mainly as Treasurer. Indeed her subs were paid up for the coming year and the WI have kindly offered to return them. A lovely gesture matched by the families insistence that they go to the WI charity of the year. Generous until her passing and beyond. Nibs also gave over forty years to the Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal, organising and collecting, until her health dictated that she had done her bit just two years ago.



Life changes when you least expect it. Nibs had already ended her working career, running the staff restaurant at British Home Stores and following Peter's retirement in 1995 after fifty years with Lathams, they said goodbye to 35 years of living at Bragenham Side, and moved onto Intrepid, a narrowboat on the Grand Union canal. My personal memories of this time are my strongest and no one could ever forget the Fenny Stompers playing jazz all afternoon and into the balmy summer evening in their mooring garden. As Peter says, "Those eighteen years were some of the happiest years of our lives."

As the door to Intrepid regrettably had to close, due to the increasing difficulty of managing the locks, a new door

opened. In 2014 Peter and Nibs, beset with wanderlust, spread their wings and moved to Wing. Eleven more happy years of village life followed with both Nibs and Peter making new friends and taking up new pursuits. When Karen and I were inbetween homes for three months, not only were we welcomed with open arms by Nibs and Peter into their home, but also by the village and their friends.

The last words were given over to Peter, her husband for 64 years and eleven months and friends since 1949.

"The last two years Nibs had several bouts of pneumonia. She could not fight the last one off and died peacefully in hospital. My much loved wife, a brilliant mother and great friend to many. I miss her so much, rest in peace, Peter."



Parish Council meetings in Newton Leys Pavilion

We will be holding 50% of Parish Council meetings at Newton Leys Pavilion this year. The other 50% will be at Stoke Hammond Community Centre. Please keep an eye out for dates on the Newton Leys South page. Each meeting has a section for the public can ask questions.

Developments around Newton Leys

There are currently two major planning applications for estates to be built next to Newton Leys. One to the South for over 300 properties and the other is to the West.

The proposed development to the West is in accordance with our Neighbourhood Plan and would provide additional public open space, a sizable MUGA and a playing field. These facilities would be a significant benefit to residents of Newton Leys.

The Parish Council has been asked if it would allow a path to be created to join the two developments over the public open space land at the end of Dickens Lane. We will be asking for views of residents on the location and design of pedestrian access to these new facilities (Please see the plan over on the next page).

Fruit trees around the estate

The majority of our fruit trees around the estate seem to have survived the drought and some have fruit on this year. Please feel free to take fruit once it is ripe, but try to only take what you will use and be gentle with the trees. They are still very young and it has been a very dry year for them.






STOKE HAMMOND BOOK CLUB










Battle Hymn of the Tiger Mother - by Amy Chua



Latest news and views from your Police and Crime Commissioner



At the end of last month, I was pleased to publish my latest Annual Report which marks the conclusion of the first year under my second term as your Police and the Crime Commissioner.

I remain focused in delivering my plan to Protect Communities, People and Property, ensuring that national directives are integrated effectively into the Thames Valley and maintaining a policing service that reflects the needs of our communities.

As we move into the second year of my <u>Police and Crime Plan</u>, I remain committed to working closely with the Chief Constable, our partners, and the public to build on our achievements, address emerging challenges and continue to make Thames Valley a safer place for all. You can read more about the Annual Report, below.

I was hugely disappointed with the Government's 'Comprehensive Spending Review' announcement on 12 June, which risks damaging the effectiveness of policing across Thames Valley. As well as leaving the 'Safer Streets' mission in tatters, the review will also mean that local council tax payers bills will be maxed out. Despite already saving over £20m in the last two years, seeing record numbers of police officers, arrests up and crime falling, this settlement risks pushing these achievements into reverse.

As part of my education strategy under the Violence Prevention Partnership (VPP), we have recently published two Bite-Sized education videos which are focused on Child Exploitation and Online Harm. I would urge parents of children in primary and secondary schools and schools to learn, use and share these resources. You can read more about the resources, below.

Dear Resident 21 July 2025

I hope this email finds you well. We're two months into the new council and lots of work is well underway so I wanted to update you on what is going on, the focus being key projects and services that you should all see and experience. Those that will touch your lives and the lives of people you know or members of your family.

Town Centres – an update

Progress is continuing at pace under our programme of regeneration work within our main town centres. I'm really pleased to be able to share with you some footage of the completed upgrade of one of our main shopping areas in High Wycombe Town Centre – White Hart Street Quarter https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=T0pO5mDAScE



This work is part of the council's major investment in our town centres to upgrade and modernise them, attracting more people and new businesses into our main towns. There are many strands to this work. In High Wycombe we have also announced some major funding to establish a new cultural hub in the town, encouraging more local events and activities. Meanwhile in Aylesbury, work continues on the new Pavilion Quarter, a brand new district to complement the existing Exchange development and introduce new routes around the heart of the town, also acting as a new entertainment space and place for small businesses.

As well as our regeneration work, keeping our towns and villages clean, safe and attractive is a big priority. We want these places to be welcoming and vibrant. As you'll be very much aware, it's been a very dry summer so far but the grass still needs cutting and the weeds dealing with. Weed management in some places falls to Town and Parish Councils and Buckinghamshire Council manages the bulk of grass cutting across the county. Last year more than 6 million square metres of grass was cut as part of the annual programme! This year we are carrying out three grass cuts in towns and villages and over the many miles of rural areas we focus on maintaining visibility at junctions and bends. Resident reports of overgrown grass are invaluable to us as they allow us to respond to any problems quickly, so if you spot a problem please do let us know via our website.

I know people want to feel safe in our town centres both day and night and our team of community wardens are present to keep an eye on any low-level issues and to provide reassurance. We are continuing to upgrade our CCTV network with new cameras and new technology and we are working with Thames Valley Police to deliver targeted work to keep town centres safe during the summer months. We will be launching a 'Safer Bucks Partnership' survey in the coming weeks to find out more about people's feelings on community safety so please look out for that on our <u>Your Voice Bucks website</u> coming later this summer.

Longer opening hours at our libraries

This month has seen extended hours start at libraries across the county, all part of our new 'Library Flex' service. This is a really good example of how we are doing things differently to improve and modernise our services. The new service launched at Aylesbury Library earlier this month and will follow at Amersham and Buckingham before being rolled out to five other larger libraries during the summer.

The new system means customers can use library services without staff being present during quieter times — a bit like self-access gyms, while ensuring staff are there for face-to-face support and queries during busier times. It also means organisations can make use of the library building outside of staffed hours for events and meetings. It's a positive way to allow even more access to these valued services; we are ensuring safety measures are in place at times where staff aren't present including live CCTV and emergency phones. Check our website for all the information you need about our library service.

Summer progress on the roads

One positive of the dry weather is that it allows us to forge ahead with our large-scale road maintenance and improvement programme, backed by a record £120 million of funding. We have more than 340 schemes planned this year under this programme alongside the many unplanned essential works we also carry out. We repaired more than 30,000 road defects last year and we resurfaced 700,000 sq metres of road. We continue to charge forward with this important work; please report any problems using our website so we can respond as quickly as possible. We maintain over 2,200 miles of road, nearly 30,000 street lights, more than 700 bridge structures and 44,000 road signs so there will always be some defects or broken parts that need our attention – please keep us informed so we can keep on top of any problems.

Other key projects

We are reaching major milestones in many other areas of the council's work too. Two projects I want to highlight today are our Children's Homes programme and the South East Aylesbury Link Road. We are establishing ten new council-run children's homes as part of a transformation programme for children in care and we have just completed work on the first of these. We have more than 500 children in our care, many of whom are being looked after by foster carers but we need more places locally to allow children in our care to stay close to their local community and friends; it's also much better value for money than costly private placements that might take vulnerable children away from their familiar surroundings. So, it is great news that this project is progressing so well and the first of these new homes is finished and ready.

I also wanted to highlight that we are anticipating the first section of the South East Aylesbury Link Road to be finished and open in the coming months. This is a huge project many years in the making and with lots of complex components to bring together. Of course, a project of this scale has an impact and I appreciate the patience people have shown in dealing with the disruption.



The first section that will open soon is a dual carriageway and two roundabouts that will join up with HS2's new Stoke Mandeville Relief Road I will bring you more news on final dates but did want to highlight the stage we are at with this major piece of new infrastructure that, when finished, will ease congestion in and around Aylesbury, include new cycle routes and unlock lots of potential for building new and affordable homes in this area.

Our financial position

We recently reviewed what's called the 'Budget Outturn' for the previous financial year and I'm really pleased to be able to confirm we ended 2024/25 with a balanced budget, being able to redirect some funds back into our reserves. Of course, we constantly monitor income and expenditure through meticulous financial management and planning effectively for risk. While overall, funding for local authorities remains in a precarious position this council is in a stable position. I must also caveat this by saying that overall reform of local council funding is still very much needed to put councils on a sustainable footing.

71% of our budget goes on four legally required statutory services (adult social care, children's social care, school transport for children and temporary accommodation) with demand for these continuing to rise. I can however reassure our residents that at this time, we are in a constrained but stable position financially and as ever, seek to find ways of doing things differently to provide the best possible value for money for our residents and their council tax. **Summer**

As a final note, I want to wish everyone a lovely summer; whether you're staying put, working through or going away, I hope you find time to explore some of the many events and attractions our lovely county has to offer, particularly worth it during these warmer months. Do take a look at our website for a few ideas on things to do – from walks and trails to attractions and other cultural activities. And for those of you with children, our Family Information Services also offers a wealth of information particularly around free and low-cost things to do. Don't miss the upcoming WhizzFizz events that are already underway - the full details are on our website. And our excellent fostering team is out and about at local events too for anyone who wants to stop by for a friendly chat and to find out more about the perks we offer our valued foster carers.

I also want to thank everyone who works in education for their hard work and dedication as we reach the end of another academic year and wish all students collecting exam results in the coming weeks all the very best.
