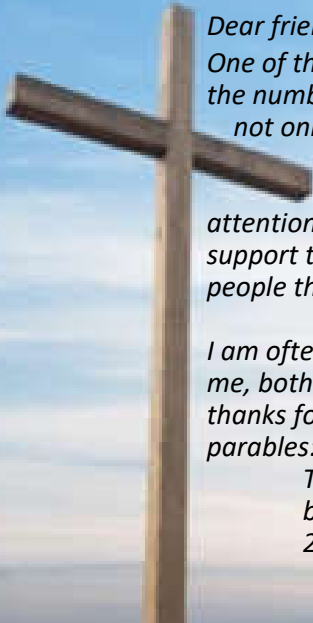
Dear friends,

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

So, the Council Elections took place on the 1st of May and you the Parish electorate were voting for Councillors to represent us on what is our new Ward of Newton Longville, with just two councillor positions as against the previous three, when we were part of the Great Brickhill & Villages Ward. With a turnout of just 2521 across the Ward representing only 33% of those eligible to vote, the two Conservative candidates were elected. These being Cllr Jilly Jordan one of our previous ward councillors, and Cllr Caroline Cornell. As for Buckinghamshire as a whole, it was not good news for the Conservatives who previously held most seats, with them only winning 48 of the 97 seats available, leaving them 1 short of a majority. You will read elsewhere in Martin Tett's Bucks Council news report that after 14 years he is standing down as leader of Bucks Council. As for your Stoke Hammond Parish Council, it was an uncontested election, as only 6 candidates put themselves forward for the 7 available positions. Four being existing Councillors, namely Cllr Mubasshir Ajaz, Cllr Craig Champion, Cllr David Venn and Cllr Greg Noble, with the two new councillors being Cllr Mel D'Agostino and Cllr Stephen Clarke, plus, as you will read further on, Cllr David Jonathan was co-opted at our May Annual Parish Meeting, thus making your Parish Council at full strength. We should at this point pass on our thanks for the most valued contribution made by your outgoing councillors, Fran Sharkey and Malcolm Newing, albeit Malcolm will still be very much involved in our evolving Neighbourhood Plan.



Luckily for us the curse of vandalism rarely rears its head in Stoke Hammond, but sadly some person or persons, did decide that the book swap cabinet by the entrance to the Community Centre was fair game for target practice with a ball or an actual physical kick breaking the glass front door, which luckily is of a toughened/laminated variety and thus did not shatter into dangerous pieces. This book swap is very popular and well used by residents, but up till now has not been deemed to be the responsibility of any particular organisation. It was suggested at the May PC Meeting that perhaps this book swap could be deemed a community facility and that the Parish Council should take up this role and also purchase a replacement cabinet. This is to be an agenda item for debate at the next June PC Meeting.

Not quite vandalism, but the amount of litter and indeed rubbish being deposited in the bin outside the Village shop has led to the area becoming increasingly unsightly with the litter falling out of the bin, or indeed being dumped on the floor because the bin is full. We are aware that many drivers pulling up to use the shop, then use this as convenient opportunity to clear out the rubbish within their cars, but better this than simply throwing out of the car windows when travelling along. Anyway, for a trial period, your PC has agreed to increase the number of times this bin is emptied each week to see if this resolves the problem, with a possible view to make these extra collections a permanent thing.

Well, finally, after some 11 months since your PC placed them on order, and no doubt something many of you will have already observed, Bucks Highways have at last removed the old and very tired looking village gates to



gates are of similar style to those on the Newton Road which were similarly upgraded a year or two ago and certainly make you aware



the Leighton and Fenny Road entrances to the village and replaced with some resplendent looking new. These new



that you are entering Stoke Hammond and also as a result may well assist in making vehicle drivers reduce their speeds, as it now more obvious that you are approaching a residential area.

As is usual, Planning Updates can be found in that section within this publication, but it's probably worth highlighting a new application, which although not actually in our Parish, is one that could have a significant impact on us, and that is namely The Three Locks Golf Course and the application for the siting of up to 46 holiday lodges on part of the site. Many of you will recall, that this is not the first time we have seen an application like this, as a similar one albeit for up to 119 lodges was launched back in January 2021 but subsequently withdrawn in March 2023. We will most definitely have to keep a close eye, on how this new application progresses. Should you want to review the application details, head to the Bucks Planning Website and select Aylesbury Vale area and enter the reference 25/01120/APP.

There was of course another planning application (24/03601/AOP) of particular interest and that related to the Chadwell Farm site that sits directly to the south of Newton Leys and was seeking outline planning permission for the erection of some

290 dwellings. Basically, this was the same application as seen in January of this year to which we had previously Objected, and with no obvious changes your Cllrs were as one in again in Objecting to this application, citing the same following reasons:

- The Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan (VALP) states that Stoke Hammond does not need to take on more homes as we have met our allocation.
- This application is outside of our draft Neighbourhood Plan.
- More information is required by Bucks Highways, so information is currently missing from the application.
- The houses in the application all face Newton Leys, with any green space located at the bottom of the development next to the farm

Other than the two normal monthly PC Meetings an Extraordinary Meeting was called for the evening of April 29th to consider the PC adopting the open spaces and play park for what is known as the Bovis area of Newton Leys South. In fact, your PC had as far back as March/April 2023 agreed to the principle of adopting this land, as we had felt it was totally unfair that residents were paying double to maintain these areas with both a precept to the PC and a charge to a separate management company, but this wouldn't be possible until such time as residents took control of the management company (First Port) and full financials were available. Cllr Champion was now able to advise his colleagues and the Members of the Public that the takeover of the management company had been achieved and that the financial position was such, that after adoption the PC would receive a figure of circa £5200. Given all this information, the PC voted unanimously in favour of proceeding with the adoption of the open spaces and play park, and the matter would now be passed to the PC's solicitors for the necessary paperwork to be drawn up.

With regard to our normal monthly meeting held at the Community Centre on the evening of the 1st April, we were joined by 7 Members of the Public, and here follows are some of the more major points of discussion from that meeting.

- *It was proposed by the clerk, that some of the PC's reserves sitting in our current account, could for now be moved into an interest-bearing savings account with Unity Trust, noting the savings already held with Unity Trust did last year earn the PC some £1200 in interest. It was agreed to transfer a further £20,000 into the savings account.*
- *Cllr Champion put forward the idea of the PC possibly purchasing the Layby land on the Stoke Road for future use as some form of recreational space. It was noted when a similar such suggestion had been made that the PC had been advised that any such purchase would be a very lengthy and drawn-out process, but it was agreed it was worth again exploring the concept and in the first instance make the enquiry via our local ward Councillor Jilly Jordan.*
- *The PC had received a Community Funding Application from the Community Association for assistance in the financing of the upgrading to the plumbing at the Community Centre. Cllrs, noting Cllr Noble had declared an interest, and took no part in the voting, were unanimous in their approval of the £350 funding.*

As for the meeting held on May 13th at the Community Centre at which we were joined by 9 Members of the Public, this was a twofold event being both the Annual Parish and Annual Parish Council Meeting. The former being an opportunity for local organisations including the PC to give a review of their past year's activities. So,

following Cllr Ajaz as the Chair of the PC giving his review, we also heard reports from the likes of the Gardening Club, High Ash Scouts, Ladies that Lunch, Stoke Hammond Community Association, St Luke's Church and finally Joyful Tots. We then moved onto the Annual Parish Council Meeting with the first order of business being the election of the Chair and Vice Chair of the PC for next year, and Cllr Ajaz with no other nominations was unanimously re-elected as Chair, and likewise with no other nominations, Cllr Champion was also re-elected as Vice Chair. We then moved onto to consider the co-option of a Cllr to fill the one vacant PC position. There were some questions asked as to whether the co-option process be delayed until the June meeting, but the clerk explained the correct process for co-option had been followed and the notice of the election had been on our noticeboard and website since the 18th of March. The majority of Cllrs agreed to continue with the co-option process, and consider the co-option application from a David Jonathan. After some questions had been asked of David, the co-option went to a vote, and with one abstention, the remainder of the Council voted in favour of Cllr Jonathan's co-option onto the PC.

The remainder of the meeting covered what tends to be normal monthly items, but a couple of subjects raised were as follows, remembering the full minutes from all PC meetings are available to view on the PC website:

- *A proposal had been received from the Epic Boating Company for them to reinstate the memorial bench that had previously been situated at Lock 23 on the Grand Union Canal. After some discussion and information provided by a Member of the Public, that there are already two benches at this location and that the bench in question was never a memorial bench but simply an old pew. It was unanimously agreed that the PC would thank the Epic Boating Company but politely decline.*
- *It was brought to the PC's attention that the bus shelter near the Dolphin PH was in need of repair and that the roof is leaking. It was agreed that the clerk would make contact with 'Men in Sheds' who carried out a similar well received repair of the bus shelter on the corner of Bragenham Side.*

For the next two scheduled Parish Council meetings, that for the evening of June 3rd will be held at the normal Community Centre venue, starting at 7.30pm. whilst the Newton Leys Pavillion will be hosting the July meeting on the 1st of the month, again starting at 7.30pm. In future it is hoped to alternate the monthly meetings between these two different venues, so as to provide a better opportunity for residents from our Parish with two distinctly different communities to attend PC meetings.

Obituary: Allen Siemen 11.12.42 – 12.04.25

Allen's Life Story

Allen Siemen was born in Dresden, Germany on 11 December 1942. He was only just almost 3 years old when the Second World War ended. Allen and many others were transported all over the world. Allen went to London, and then he moved on to Bletchley. He stayed in various digs.

Allen had many jobs in his life. He worked for the council doing a variety of jobs, he was a bin man for a few years, and he was also a grave digger at St Mary's Church. He had a job at Willowbridge Marina too. In his younger days he was a long-distance lorry driver, he was away from home working on the lorries a lot.

As Allen got older Allen dabbled in antiques, French Polishing, and repairing old furniture. He loved making rocking horses, and he also helped at the church and chapel when items needed repairing.

We got married in November 1961 when I was 17 and Allen was 19, together we had 5 children, 3 boys Roger, John and Ken and 2 girls, Mandy and Sharon. Roger now lives in Ireland, with 2 boys and 1 girl. Mandy lives in Bletchley with 2 boys, John lives in Bedford with 2 girls, Ken in Southampton with his 2 girls and Sharon lives on the Isle of Wight and has 1 girl and 1 boy. Due to his work, Allen was not around much as the children were growing up.

We came to live in the village forty-two years ago, prior to which we lived in Bletchley. We had had a few moves but never really settled. So, when 'Little Thatch' came up for sale we put in an offer and it was accepted, so we moved in. Fortunately, we only had one child still living at home at that time. Allen started to renovate the cottage. We lived there for a few years then decided to move again, this time to Bragenham Side.

Allen loved most antique things, he had a collection of grandfather clocks, tables and chairs. He took his time repairing old furniture and making it look beautiful again. He started going to antique fairs, he would leave home at 4.30am in the morning and not return home until late, but he would have sold everything he made or had repaired.

All the villagers were so very kind to me and Allen when he was alive, but since he has been gone the villagers have gone the extra mile, and I have received lots of lovely cards and flowers so thank you all so much.

Allen was a grandad to Michael, Harry, Lee, Joe, Emma, Rebecca, Megan, Emma, Jessica, Ben, Rachel Daniel. Great Grandad to: William, Thomas, Amy and Dylan.

Allen will be missed by his many friends and family and even Tiger (his dog) is missing him.

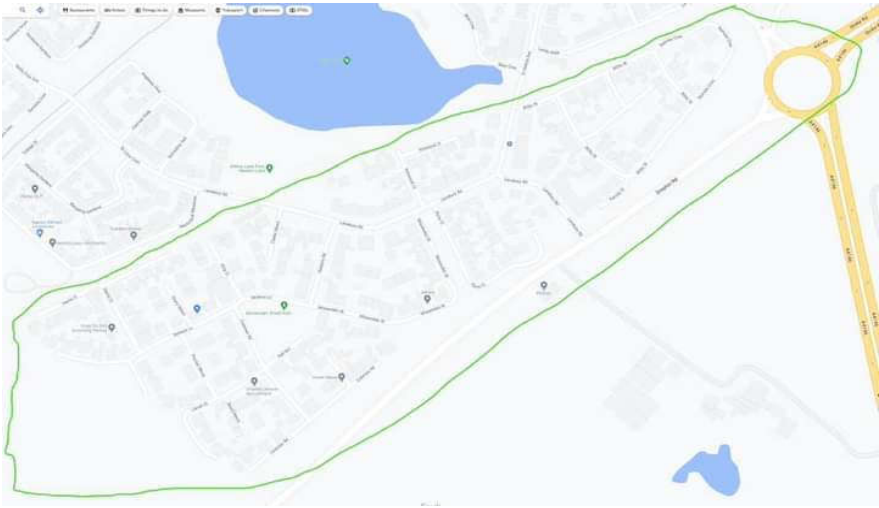

WELCOME TO THE NEWTON LEYS SOUTH SECTION



We are slowly getting closer to competing the adoption of Newton Leys (Bovis estate), and also the Taylor Wimpey side.

On the Bovis side Stoke Hammond Parish Council held a meeting on 29th April to agree to proceed with the adoption as the finances have now been finalised from Firstport.

The directors of Newton Leys Management Co Ltd have a final park inspection to carry out and to have the land transferred from the builders.

We are aiming to complete the adoption of the public open space around the Bovis estate and the Dickens Lane park over the summer if we can.

On the Taylor Wimpey side of the estate Councillor Ajaz and Champion have walked around the estate and provided Taylor Wimpey with quite a long list of works that will be required to be fixed before the public open space around that estate can be adopted. There are a lot of TW's trees that need to be replaced and a few areas of grass that needs to be tidied up.

S106 update

As part of the planning application Stoke Hammond Parish Council has had to prepare documents on the justification for changing the use of the fields it is trying to purchase to be changed to recreational use. We have completed that and are meeting our planning consultant to discuss the application this week.

We have had to conduct multiple surveys and reports on the site and will be considering those reports as part of the process.

When I left school back in the mid sixties it was “suggested” by my parents that I should obtain some form of employment with a view to paying them rent. At that time there was no lack of available jobs. I believe it’s the same now : there are plenty of vacancies although it seems people are over qualified and don’t want to do anything beneath **their anticipated** level of employment.

So, I bought a copy of the Evening Standard and reviewed the options. I ended up getting an interview with a small Bank in the City. Notwithstanding my limited GCE results I persuaded them to give me employment. I say *give* as my salary was a mere £12 per week. (To put that in perspective, beer was only 1/9d – you do the maths).

In addition to that I was expected to work Saturday mornings every other week. Annual Holidays were mentioned in the employment contract – 8 days per year!

Having set the scene, the value of bank holidays can be appreciated. Bank holiday week-ends were eagerly awaited and get-aways planned.

And so, it went on for a few years. But as life progressed the country prospered – everyone strived to own a car and most of them appeared on Bank holiday weekends.

Travel became a chore. The joy went out of rushing to the hills for a break. Since then, I have never been away on a Bank Holiday.

That is until last Easter Monday. I was persuaded by a friend to venture forth. “It will be alright” he said. We would be heading North on the Monday and everyone else would be coming home. Blow me down if he wasn’t right! We had an easy trip.

But it made me think – what is the point of Bank Holidays.

Back in the 60’s there were only 4 holidays a year. Now there

Latest news and views from your Police and Crime Commissioner



At the start of this month, the Chief Constable and I presented awards to community groups across Thames Valley as part of our Community Fund at an event in Milton Keynes.

As well as being an opportunity to provide over £200,000 of cash taken from criminals to worthwhile local groups, it was also an opportunity to say a huge thank you to those who do so much to support our communities. You can read more about the funding, below.

In April, we received confirmation that my bid to fund an additional 68 neighbourhood police officers for Thames Valley had been successful. These new officers to be recruited this year are on top of the increase that we have already seen in neighbourhood policing locally. This is the keystone of my [Police and Crime Plan](#) and once these officers hit the streets there will be more than two and a half times as many neighbourhood police officers as when I launched my [Crimefighters strategy](#) in 2023.

Overall crime in Thames Valley continues to fall, and Thames Valley Police are doing a good job but there is more work to do. I urge you to report crime or concerns directly to the police, don't assume someone else will do it. Reporting on social media, turning a blind eye or assuming that crimes will be dismissed won't lead to action.

Only reporting crimes to the police will lead to more criminals being caught and, if cases can be prosecuted, victims getting the justice they deserve.

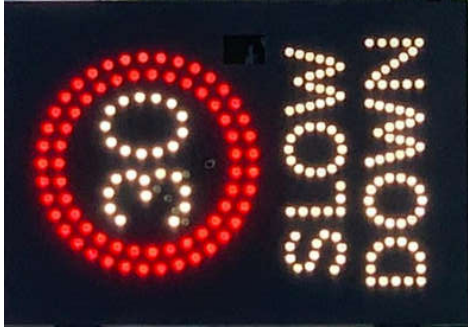

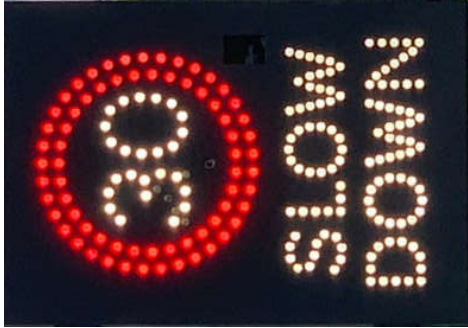

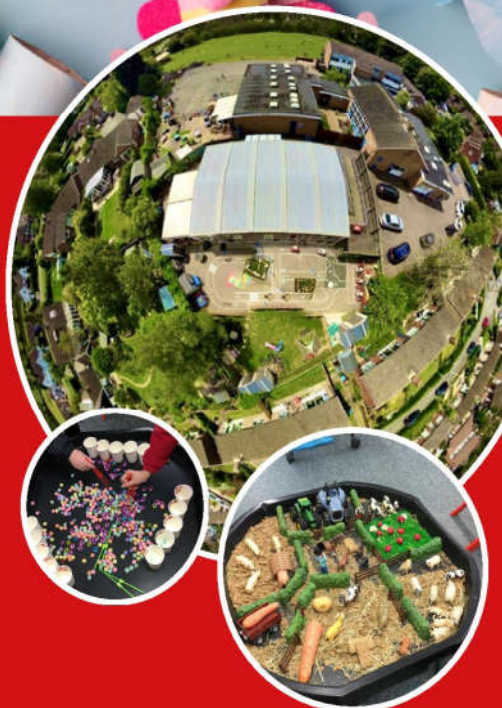
