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PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

It is obviously always very sad when a Parishioner leaves this world, but when that person has been someone who has been an influential and important part of the Community, it is only fitting and right that the PC find some way of providing a permanent reminder of that person. You may recall that we did sadly lose Margaret Aitken last year, who was born in what was the old village shop in 1925 and spent the majority of her life in Stoke Hammond and of course wrote the 'Stoke Hammond Yesteryear' book and was the organist at the Methodist Chapel for some 80 years. So, when the PC was approached by the developers of The Mellows site for ideas for a street name for the new entrance road, which coincidently runs right alongside the old Methodist Chapel, we immediately thought of Margaret and proposed this as a suggestion, and we're most pleased to advise that the street will indeed be called Aitken Close. As a PC we have recognised that there should perhaps be a more formal and public consultation process for things like street naming etc and are currently formalising a proposal for same.

Sadly, we must also report on another recent loss and the passing of John Spires, who although not a Stoke Hammond resident, did for many years serve as the Clerk to the PC and subsequently moved on to carry out a similar role with our neighbouring Parish of Soulbury. On behalf of all those who knew John, we offer our sincere condolences to his family and close friends.

When it comes to planning items, we normally refer you to that section elsewhere in this publication, but the matter of Brook Farm Close and the land to the rear of the existing development up towards the railway, probably deserves more detail and attention. As mentioned in the last PC News the application 22/00613/APP for the erection of 42 homes was causing much controversy, but perhaps first it might be useful to go over some of the history relating to the development of Brook Farm Close. In fact, we have to go back to 2012 when the first planning application for 40 homes went in based on the demolition of the original Brook Farm bungalow, noting this application did not include the aforementioned land adjacent to the railway line. This application was first refused in January of 2013 but subsequently approved on appeal in July 2014. The development went ahead, subsequently followed by further new homes on Brookfields and Kessler Close, but still no proposals for the land in question. But in July 2016 a planning application (16/02432/AOP) for 33 homes was submitted to which there were many objections such as over development, lack of green space/recreational facilities and excess traffic on Brook Farm Close. However, planning permission was granted in March 2018. It was not until February 2022 that this latest application for an increase to 42 dwellings was submitted. Noting, that in theory the original planning permission for the 33 homes had now exceeded 3 years and thus expired. This application for 42 dwellings would only further expand on the previous concerns for the application for 33 homes, and despite many further objections including from your PC the Planning Officer was recommending that this latest application be approved. This was obviously not acceptable so with assistance from two of our Unitary Councillors and our own request, the application was 'Called In' such that it would be debated at the North Bucks Development Control Planning Committee meeting which was held on the 13th March. Ultimately the Committee were sympathetic to the arguments raised by the Parish Council and local residents with respect to the lack of sufficient major Open Space, Incidental Open Space and a Local Equipped Play Area (LEAP) Space and also the failure to demonstrate that a measurable net gain in biodiversity can be achieved on site. 11 of the committee with 2 abstentions voted to refuse the application. The applicant does of course have a right of appeal if they want to follow that course, but interestingly and reverting to the now expired application for 33 homes, on the very next day after the Planning Committee Meeting an application (24/00850/CPE) was logged on the Bucks Planning Portal for a Certificate of Lawfulness. This basically related to the original now expired application for 33 homes, but suggesting with supporting photographs and other material matters those certain conditions had already been undertaken within the 3-year time frame and thus the application was still valid and not expired. Watch this space as they say for further updates.

We are pleased to say that the Neighbourhood Plan Public Consultation meetings that were held in both Newton Leys and Stoke Hammond were very well attended with much feedback received, but for more details and latest updates please head to the Neighbourhood Plan Section.

For those that use Facebook you will no doubt have seen the volunteers who helped plant the new Community Orchard in Newton Leys South on the Saturday 16th March. The trees were sourced as part of a grant scheme with the planting materials being provided by the PC. The weather was extremely kind that day but the previous heavy rains did mean the spades did not need too much force to dig out the ground for planting. Please head to the Newton Leys South section for some pictures of the successful planting.

There have been two PC Meetings held since the last PC News and other than items already covered, here are some of the main points from those two meetings:

PC Meeting held on the evening of Tuesday 6th February 2024 attended by all 7 Councillors, Clerk and 11 members of the public (MoP).

- Cllr Noble advised a MoP had expressed to him about their concerns with the Newton Road/Drayton Road junction and that they believe more signage is needed as you approach the crossroads. It was also suggested that the speed limit is reduced to 40mph. Cllrs agreed to approach Bucks Highways about this.
- There was quite a lengthy discussion regarding a recent change to the Constitution that governs the operation of the Community Centre as managed by the Stoke Hammond Community Association (SHCA) a registered charity, and in particular the removal of the need for a PC representative on the management committee. It was agreed that further dialogue would be required between the PC and the SHCA.
- In an update from the Sports Club, we were advised that the club is doing well. Youth pool evenings have started and are well attended. The SHFC Vets' team are doing well. The PC was asked whether any S106 money would be given to the Sports Club as they would like to build a toilet block and improve their kitchen facilities. ClIr Champion advised that the S106 project is being worked on and the Sports Club will be contacted in due course.
- During the Public Participation session, a question was asked about the situation with the grass area outside of Mount Pleasant. Our clerk confirmed she had written to the owners asking them to cut the grass, but the requests have so far been ignored. Whilst another MoP raised their concerns regarding the path widening by Tyrells Manor. Cllr Newing advised that the Council were happy with the commitments that had been made by the contractors in relation to the section 278 document which had itself been shared with the MoP. The MoP requested a copy of the Section 278 document, which Cllr Venn agreed to supply.

Now to the PC Meeting held on the evening of Tuesday 5th March attended by 5 Councillors (apologies received from 2), Clerk and 9 members of the public (MoP).

- Under Finance the PC agreed to appoint Brian Fludgate as Internal Auditor for the 2024 audit period. During the same section the Annual Review of both the PC's Financial and Management Risk Assessments was undertaken and approved and likewise the same process was undertaken and approved for the PC's Standing Orders.
- Following a person having a fall on the unofficial parking area at the bottom of Old School Lane the Clerk had been asked to speak with Bucks Highways to find out if it could be made safe. Highways had replied to say that cars should not be parking on this land which is owned by Bucks Council, but as the residents are blue badge holders, they should apply for disabled parking.
- Some concern was expressed about the new bus shelter on the Fenny Road in that its design did not actually offer any shelter. But it was explained that whilst the PC were invited to choose the materials of its construction the actual design with no side panels was very much dictated by Bucks Highways.
- •During his update on the Newton Leys Management Company Cllr Champion confirmed that he has finally received the financial information he has been waiting on. He now feels he is very close to being in a position to negotiate with the PC regarding the possibility of adopting the area the management company is responsible for, and if this happens, he can then fold the company.
- During the Public Participation session, a MoP raised concerns regarding sewage entering the canal from the pumping station located by the lay by on Stoke Road. Anglian Water have been made aware of the situation but are yet to respond. The sewage is starting to enter the neighbouring field. The whole aspect of the poor state of the lay by and whether anything could be done about it was again raised. Cllrs confirmed the lay by is owned by Bucks Highways and has been the subject of many discussions and broken promises in the past. Cllr Newing said he would arrange an on-site meeting with all interested parties, specifically Highways, canal and River trust and Anglian Water, in an attempt to resolve the issues of concern.

With regard to next PC Meeting dates and if you're reading this edition over the Easter Bank Holiday weekend, then you're in time to be made aware that the April meeting is being held on the evening of Tuesday 2nd April but at the Newton Leys Pavilion, Furzey Way, Newton Leys MK3 5SP. Start time is 7.30pm and as usual members of the public are most welcome to attend. As regards May, well this is a double header, as it is both the Annual Parish Meeting and the Annual Parish Council Meeting, back at the more normal Community Centre, Bragenham Side, Stoke Hammond, MK17 9DB location Tuesday 7th May with a slightly earlier start time of 7.00pm.

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Stoke Hammond and Newton Leys Neighbourhood Plan Update

The 'Walk In' sessions for the Neighbourhood Plan all went ahead as planned during the early weeks of the Regulation 14 Consultation on the Pre-Submission version of the Neighbourhood Plan. The sessions were well attended allowing steering group members the opportunity to clarify any issues Parishioners had with the plans.

The consultation period has been extended until the 11th of April to allow for Easter and to give all statutory consultees reasonable time to provide their formal feedback.

The Reg 14 consultation is a very important stage of the overall process as it gives parishioners and consultees the opportunity to influence the final document before it is sent to Bucks Council for their consideration. Parishioners are encouraged to provide both positive and negative feedback which will all be considered by the Steering group. So far 35 written feedback forms have been received and all of these will be given due consideration and receive a formal response once the consultation period ends on the 11th of April.

Earlier this week I attended the North Bucks Planning committee, with Kim Balmer, they who were considering the latest application for 42 homes on the Brook Farm estate. The planning officer had recommended acceptance and we were arguing that the application be refused. I'm pleased to say that the committee, based on the evidence presented, determined to refuse the application. During the discussion a few councillors stated it was unfortunate that a Neighbourhood Plan did not already exist for Stoke Hammond as it would, almost certainly, have prevented the application from reaching that stage. This demonstrates how important the activity is and why we are asking for the support of all parishioners. This will be most important when the finally

agreed Neighbourhood Plan is presented for adoption via a Local referendum later in the year.

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

Community Orchard

We would like to thank everyone who helped us plant 200 fruit trees in the public open space around the outside of the estate.



We planted them from two locations and had over 35 volunteers of all ages. The weather was perfect (which isn't something we can take for granted). Everyone had a great time and we were finished in two hours.

Hopefully, the trees can flourish and we can all get some of our five a day for free each summer.

Councillors Venn and Ajaz's help was invaluable, enabling everyone to concentrate on planting.

We planted cherry, a few types of pears, several types of plum, a couple of types of apricot and lots of varieties of apples.

The trees were funded from a grant from the Forestry Commission with some additional funding towards planting costs from Stoke Hammond Parish Council.

Newton Leys Management Company

Kieron Duggan and I are now the directors of the company, but it has a contract with Firstport.

Firstport didn't get its unenviable reputation without justification. Even though Kieron and I are in charge it is proving very slow work to get Firstport to complete simple tasks and respond to requests.



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However, we have finally managed to get to the bottom of the private lights that 16 houses are being charged for. I have been speaking to those residents to work out how to go forward if we collapse the management company.

As I write this Kieron and I will be discussing with Stoke Hammond Parish Council how we can have it take over the management companies' responsibilities (this is called adoption).

We are hoping to take it to the Parish Council meeting on 2 April to agree the adoption. If we can meet that deadline, we can serve three months' notice of termination to Firstport and the Parish Council will be able to take over.

Kieron and I will be in touch by mid April for next steps, but they will include one final service charge bill to be paid by everyone. I am also hoping for it to include a small additional charge to allow every resident to remove the restrictions on their title deeds, so they won't ever need to pay additional fees when moving. This will make houses on the estate easier and cheaper to buy and sell.

IT IS VERY IMPORTANT THAT EVERYONE PAYS THIS LAST BILL AND ALL ARREARS PROMPTLY.

There are currently 14 owners who are behind on service charges, can I please ask that they get those accounts up to date by the end of April. Firstport will continue to pursue debt collection actions against owners not paying.

No one likes paying Firstport but it is currently a condition of owning your house. The restrictions on title deeds will only be removed for those properties that have paid all arrears and the final payment by the deadline.

I would like to thank Kieron for his help and support since last May in getting to where we are, and residents for taking the time to discuss various issues that have arisen to allow us to be in this position. Hopefully, by the time you read this Firstport will be on its three months notice period.

Investment in Newton Leys community spaces

Stoke Hammond Parish Council has agreed to install an outdoor table tennis table and picnic bench in Dickens Lane Park (and also a defibrillator once the lamppost by Hall Green is fixed by Bovis/Vistry). There will also be a picnic bench and park bench installed around the outside of the estate, together with some dog waste bins.

It has also agreed to fund up to 12 grit bins and is waiting for approval of the locations by Bucks County Council.

These improvements together with the community orchard means over £15k has been invested in Newton Leys this year.



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The next Parish Council meeting is on 2 April at the Newton Leys Pavilion.

We hold some Parish Council meetings at Newton Leys Pavilion. We are hoping for a good turn out of local residents for the Management Company decision.

S106 project

We have been doing a lot of work in the background to be able to start using the s106 money that developers have paid for houses built in Newton Leys and Stoke Hammond.

We are hoping to start organising working groups from May to help plan what we want to use the money for.

If anyone is passionate about helping develop leisure, recreational or outdoor/nature spaces then please let us know. We'll be asking for people to get involved during April/May.

We really need people from Newton Leys and Stoke Hammond to work together to help us create something absolutely awesome for residents. We are looking to be really ambitious, and want you all to help shape it. Keep an eye out for updates on the Newton Leys South or Stoke Hammond Facebook pages in the next couple of weeks.

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




STOKE HAMMOND BOOK CLUB



Half of a Yellow Sun - by Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie



The book, which won critical acclaim by winning the Women's Prize for fiction in 2013 and being made into a film shortly afterwards concerns the events of the Nigerian Civil War (also called the Biafran war) and the years preceding it. The action therefore takes place in the 1960s in Nigeria and is a complicated love story and a story of war. The effect of the war is shown through the relationships of 5 main characters including twin daughters of an influential business man and a Nigerian houseboy. There are innumerable other characters of note all with stories to tell and whose lives are torn apart and unimaginably changed by the events of the war.

It was a challenging book to read with very small print and lots of detail. If it had been in normal size print it would have been like War & Peace as it was a very large book! One of the group listened to it on audio and found it preferable to reading it! Although some struggled to get through it several still described it as well written and packed with information which opened up previously unknown knowledge about Africa. Two of the group had had experience in the area, one by teaching a student from Nigeria and the other through contacts at school and college and both felt the book had therefore been of particular interest to them. Everyone had their favourite character but overall Ugwu the houseboy, man and boy, was extremely popular.

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

There were comments about it being overly long and perhaps too graphic regarding the war and was also accused of running out of steam in the second half but it was well written and the author was described as a 'good story teller'.

Conclusion - rather heavy going but certainly worth the effort.

Philomena - by Martin Sixsmith



The true story of a Mother and the son she had to give away. This was a compelling and deeply moving narrative of human love and loss. The cruel treatment of pregnant young women in the Ireland of 1952 (and for many years to come) who were sent to a convent and badly treated as fallen women. Philomena cared for her baby for 3 long years until the Church took him from her and sold him to Americans for adoption. Apparently the making of money this way was a frequent occurrence. She spent the next 50 years searching for him unaware that he too was desperate to find her. His name was changed and he became a top Washington lawyer and a leading

Republican in both the Regan and Bush administrations but he was a gay man, which needed to be concealed in those times, and it seems that his early years affected his happiness throughout his life making him feel that despite his success he had no right to be happy. He sadly died of Alds before he could be reunited with his birth Mother. He wanted to be buried to be in Ireland so at least his Mother could visit his grave.

We had all heard of the book and seen the film starring Judi Dench and Steve Coogan but our recollection of it was rather hazy. We were horrified at the cruelty inflicted on the Mothers and the heartless selling of the children by the Nuns where, in some cases, Christianity seemed to be put to one side. Even those who had read it before found it hard to put down and everyone was hoping for a happy ending - which never came! It was described as sad, well written and a good fast pace but some were confused having expected to learn more about Philomena and her search than details of Michael's life in America.

Conclusion: Well written, a unique story and memorable.

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Over 22,000 email and social media account hacked

Data from Action Fraud, the national fraud and cybercrime reporting service, shows that **22,530 people** reported that their online accounts had been hacked in 2023, with victims losing a total of £1.3 million.

How are accounts hacked?

On-platform chain hacking

This is when a fraudster gains control of an account and begins to impersonate the legitimate owner. The goal is to convince people to reveal authentication codes that are sent to them via text. Many victims of this type of hacking believe it's a friend messaging them, however the shared code was associated with their own account and the impersonator can now use it to access their account. Usually when an account is taken over, fraudsters monetise control of the account via the promotion of various fraudulent schemes, while impersonating the original account owner.

Leaked passwords and phishing

The other predominant method of hacking reported is leaked information used from data breaches, such as leaked passwords, or account details gained via phishing scams. This becomes prevalent as people often use the same password for multiple accounts, so a leaked password from one website can leave many of their online accounts vulnerable to hacking.

How to secure your accounts

Use a strong and different password for your email and social media accounts. Your email and social media passwords should be strong and different from all your other passwords. Combining three random
words that each mean something to you is a great way to create a password that is easy to remember but hard to crack. Turn on 2-Step
Verification (2SV) for your email and social media accounts. 2-Step
Verification (2SV) gives you twice the protection so even if cyber criminals have your password, they can't access your email or social media account. 2SV works by asking for more information to prove your identity. For example, getting a code sent to your phone when you sign in using a new device or change settings such as your password. You won't be asked for this every time you check your email or social media.

If you live in England, Wales and Northern Ireland and have been a victim of fraud or cybercrime, report it at www.actionfraud.police.uk or by calling 0300 123 2040. In Scotland, victims of fraud and cybercrime should report to Police Scotland on 101.

Lock your vehicle.

Locking your vehicle, even when filling up or parked on your drive, greatly reduces the possibility of it being targeted by an opportunist thief. Even if you have locked your vehicle, check you haven't left any windows or the sunroof open.

If your vehicle has wing mirrors that fold in automatically when locked, make sure you lock it properly. Criminal gangs are looking for vehicles like these where the wing mirrors are still out because it is clear to them that the vehicle has been left unlocked.

Close windows and sunroofs to prevent "fishing"

Leaving windows and the sunroof open invites fishing for items through the gap by hand or with, say a bent coat hanger, which could also be used to unlock a door for them to get in. Thieves can be ingenious. Do not give them the opportunity.

Secure anything that is on the outside of your vehicle.

Anything left on roof-racks, tailgate racks, holidays top boxes or in tool chests are easily stolen when the vehicle is parked. The use of cable locks, padlocks and self-locking tools chest which are secured to the vehicle, makes then more secure, but still do not leave things inside if you can avoid it.

Take it with you or hide it.

Your mobile phone, coins for the car park, sunglasses, packs of medication or other items that can earn quick cash are irresistible to the opportunist thief. Remember, the cost of replacing a window is often much more than that of what is stolen. And it should go without saying that wallets, handbags, purses and credit cards should never be left in an unattended vehicle.

Hide electrical items and leave no clues.

Leaving Sat Nav mounts, suction cup marks on windows or cables on view gives it away that you have left a Sat Nav, smartphone or other device in your car. Even if they can not see the Sat Nav or iPad they might still break in to see if it is stored in the car, out of sight.

Tool theft from vans

Vans are often targeted by thieves for the tools stored inside. If you have to leave tools in a van overnight, it is a good idea to mark them clearly with your name / company name and address using paint pens and seal with a clear lacquer spray. Alternatively, you can use a variety of other property marking systems. Items that are clearly marked are less desirable and more difficult to sell on.

Consider using a lockable cabinet within your van to store tools – a number of security rated products are available. Small cameras are also designed to record inside vehicles.

April 2024

World Book Day - We had a lot of fun for World Book Day in March. It was lovely to see all the children and staff dressed up as book characters. The Village - 16th March

Take away the fencing and we could see a vast expanse of Tarmac and kerbing for a new road into our next building site. Well said the deliverer "they had to knock down a perfectly good house to do that."

And that road is right next to the recently tarmacked Methodist (as was) church grounds. Where is all the water going to go? Well, ask the cottages on the Green that were flooded last month.

Now I don't mind the smell of asphalt in fact I quite like it. We do however seem to have a lot of it in the village. The new development in Fenny Road got a lick and a promise opposite the entrance. Presumably lorries turning had disturbed the surface and it needed it (like the rest of the road?).

And there is a nice bit of new asphalt in the bus stop in Fenny Road – on the pavement that is. Took days of 3 way traffic lights to complete. I call it a bus stop as it is clearly *not* a shelter. It has only one side (back) which is protected by the houses behind. If the wind blows from the North, East or South there is no protection from wind or

Dear Resident 22 March 2024

As I write this it is raining again, so no prizes for guessing the topics that have filled my inbox over the past month. Having driven around all parts of the county and indeed beyond, it is very clear that the weather has done very significant damage in terms of both potholes and flooding. I thought it would be useful to update you on current actions and plans.



Firstly, I hope that you have noticed that this is a national, not local issue. All my colleague county Leaders are reporting similar problems. The BBC have reported on it extensively, as have the RAC and industry groups.

The winter and early spring rain this year and last has had a devastating impact on the nation's roads. Some people write to me and that this cannot be correct as we have 'winter' every year. That is of course true, but this year and last have seen abnormally heavy and continued rain. It's clear this has been one of the wettest Februarys on record with national media reporting the wettest 18-month period since records began. Then by 12 March we had already had more than the normal amount of rain for the entire month. Roadside drains and ditches cannot cope with this volume of rain and this leaves nowhere for the water to go. The surrounding land is saturated and no longer absorbs rain water.

Roads

I want to be very frank with everyone that we cannot repair all the individual potholes and other defects immediately. Continual rain makes that difficult as any repairs to wet road surfaces won't last. Also, we do not have unlimited funds so, like every other council, we prioritise. We have what are called 'intervention levels' which are standards set for requiring repairs. These are professionally assessed. We also assess potholes in terms of their severity so we will prioritise what are called 'Category 1' above 'Category 2'. There are different repair timescales for each, with the shortest timescale for 'Category 1'. This may mean that an individual pothole is filled whilst lower category defects in the immediate area are left until later.

Currently we have 29 crews working around the clock to carry out road repairs and respond to other emergency call outs, like clearing fallen trees or dealing with floods and standing water. This is double the number of crews that we had out during the autumn, as we work as hard as we can to respond to what is seen as a priority for local people.

Where the situation is urgent, we will often do a 'temporary repair' to make it safe and then return later to make a permanent repair when conditions improve. Following last year's bad weather, we carried out over 30,000 pothole repairs. This year, I anticipate we will do substantially more.

In addition to our existing budget, full council agreed to release an extra £5 million from our reserves to spend on the roads. This is really helpful as we can add to our programme of 'plane and patch', where we resurface sections of road, rather than an entire road. We are currently prioritising where these plane and patch interventions will be, based on input from local councillors and technicians. Inevitably we will not be able to meet all the requests. Again, this work ideally requires warm, dry weather for best effect.

Please continue to report defects on <u>Buckinghamshire's Fix My Street</u> and also contact your local Buckinghamshire councillors if necessary.

Flooding

With the water table exceptionally high and the ground saturated there have been a significant number of flooding incidents. Buckinghamshire Council's teams have responded to many emergency call outs since Christmas. This has involved clearing standing water and helping stranded vehicles.

In some areas, paved over gardens make this worse with rainwater running straight into the road. Whilst we do clean every road gully every year, with this volume of rain it is inevitable that soil, leaves and other debris becomes washed into gullies and in many cases blocks them again. In other cases, the gullies appear blocked but are actually still clear; however the ground is so saturated the water has nowhere to go. Several roads around the county have flooded, some for several days. In some, like Seer Green, the flooding has dislodged sections on new road resurfacing and left villagers isolated at times. In others, like Chalfont St Peter, the rainwater has breached the capacity of the sewerage system.

At times like this we will support the local water company who have the lead responsibility for foul water issues. It is vital that these are urgently addressed and resolved. Much of Buckinghamshire's sewage system was built decades or even centuries ago and is not designed for the volumes of waste they are now required to carry, particularly when combined with storm overflow. Whilst I understand the

residents who write to me demanding that 'something must be done', there are rarely easy or quick solutions to many of these problems.

I have asked for the costs to deliver additional gully cleanses where the effects of the winter weather have been the greatest, but this is very costly and we may well again have to use some reserves for this.

In the meantime, may I urge those of you who drive to please be mindful of the conditions and to adapt your driving accordingly. I have personally seen some worrying driving where cars speed through deep water late at night where there could be deep hidden potholes.

Also, I've seen drivers who suddenly see a pothole and then swerve into the middle of the road ignoring oncoming cars. Please slow down, take care of yourselves, and please show others the consideration you would like them to show you. If there is deep standing water, please don't try to drive through it unless your car is suitable.

Longer-term Investment

I will write separately to update you on our main programme of planned road repairs and resurfacing. This is a continuation of our commitment to spend over £110 million over a rolling four-year period on planned maintenance across the county.

I want to finish off by reassuring you that I and all your councillors understand the scale of the issues. We are doing all we can, within existing resources, to address these issues and bring the roads back up to a safe, drivable standard. Hopefully, with spring now well on its way we can look forward to some sustained drier, warmer weather.

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
