PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

For those that attended some or indeed all of the Platinum Jubilee events, and as you can see from the front cover and double page spread of photographs elsewhere in this edition of the SH & NLS News, it was a tremendous success and a magnificent way of marking and celebrating Her Majesty the Queen's 70 years of reign. We would once again say a massive thankyou to everyone involved in putting on the four days of events, but we do need to single out one person who went above and beyond, and that is Hazel Turner. Hazel put in so much time and effort and personally sponsored the Jubilee Spoons handed out to youngsters within our Parish. Thank you from us all, Hazel.



To provide some form of a permanent memorial of the Platinum Jubilee your PC purchased two appropriately themed benches, with one being installed on the Stoke Hammond Sports Field ahead of the celebrations. But for the second bench intended for Newton Leys South, negotiations with the site developers Taylor Wimpy regarding its location and installation took a little longer than expected and thus the bench was only installed, but installed it is, a little after the Jubilee event.

In the last PC News, we were welcoming onboard Cllr Craig Champion who had been coopted onto the SHPC to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of one of our Councillors. We therefore thought the SHPC was now back to full strength with 7 Councillors, but sadly not, for no sooner had Craig come onboard, and as you can see from the advert on the adjoining page that we are now looking to fill another vacancy. We must say a big thank you to Cllr Alan Humphreys for his contribution to the Council, but due to his everincreasing work commitments, Alan felt he could not devote as much time to the PC as he would like and most reluctantly felt he should step aside for someone new. The same also sadly goes for our Clerk, Jo Simonds, who has been doing sterling work but in recent months has found that in a similar vein to Alan that with her other responsibilities and a desire to have a bit freer time, that there are just not enough hours in the day, and something had to give, and most unfortunately for the PC this would be her role as our clerk. But Jo being Jo, wanted to ensure any transition would be as smooth as possible, and although officially relinquishing her position at the end of July, will stay around to assist the new clerk, and a new clerk we do indeed have. With three applicants which was whittled down to one, Kelly Harris, a Stoke Hammond resident was offered and accepted the position of PC Clerk. So, a sad goodbye to Jo, and a warm welcome to Kelly.

Before you ask, we have no further news regarding the Dolphin PH and its potential new owners. The message remains the same that contracts still need to be signed and exchanged. If and when we have any substantiated news we will publish via social media. One bit of news though, is that Bellway Homes have contacted the PC regarding us adopting the street lighting on Brook Farm Close. There are a total of ten columns/lanterns, and the PC is currently in negotiations to agree a commuted sum to cover future running and maintenance costs before the PC can take over all responsibility. The first of the two PC Meetings since the last published PC News was the June meeting held on Tuesday 7th which was attended by 13 members of the public and our Unitary Councillor, Phil Gomm. Our Chair, Cllr Malcolm Newing, sent his apologies, so the Vice

Chair, Cllr Stephen McNally, stepped forward to chair the meeting. Just a reminder at this point that within this PC News section we can only ever provide a brief overview of the most important items discussed at our meetings but one can view the detailed minutes for all past meetings on the Parish Council website www.stokehammondpc.com. So, what were the main items from the June meeting and other than Planning Matters details of which can be found in the separate Planning Section. Speeding or should we say the reduction of same was once again an item of much discussion, noting that after the passing of several months we are still waiting approval from the local authority for the locations we put forward for the siting of the 3 new solar powered speed activated signs, this despite being advised that given the delay our application would be 'Fast Tracked'. However, just as this PC News was being prepared, we received a communication advising that a speed survey will need to be conducted for each location for which they want to charge the PC a total figure of around £1.5K. We are slightly at a loss as to why a survey is required when all we want to do is effectively remind drivers that they are in a 30mph zone! It was also proposed that with speeding being such an important subject, that we should set up a Working Group tasked to tackle the problem and come up with positive solutions to put before the PC. Hence you will see a notice on the inside front cover asking for people to come forward who may be interested in being part of this working group. Our Unitary Cllr, Phil Gomm, will be closely involved with the group and will be able to provide valued insight into what is practical and what is not.

Some other items of interest from the June PC meeting were:

- Cllr Gomm advised that the issue of the Arriva buses speeding through the village has now been dealt with, but if witnessed again, then please record the time and date and pass the details directly to Phil.
- Covert cameras are now planned for Dorcas Lane to record incidents of Fly Tipping and to then prosecute the offenders.
- With regard to the evolving Neighbourhood Plan (NP) a draft letter has been produced to send to local landowners, in an attempt to identify areas of land that might in the future be available for development to form part of the Stoke Hammond NP.
- The PC insurance policy was due for renewal and with our Clerk being successful in negotiating a reduction in our premium, it was agreed to sign up for a 3 year long-term agreement at £1,862.22 per year.
- It was noted the some of the drains in the village had been missed in the recent visit
 by the Bucks Drain Sucker Team, most specifically the drain by the pedestrian crossing
 which is completely blocked. Cllr Gomm advised we were not the only village where
 drains had been missed and that the Drain Sucker is due to return.

The second of our two PC Meetings was held on Tuesday 5th July with your 6 current PC Councillors all in attendance along with Unitary Councillor, Phil Gomm, with one of the first items being as mentioned earlier the appointment of Kelly Harris, as our new PC Clerk, with Kelly officially taking up her new role from the 1st August.

With a representation from the SH Sports Club, much of the meeting was taken up with a debate about a request from the Club for the PC to supply funds to cover the cost of recent improvements made by the club relating to upgrading the toilet facilities for the disabled. The Club had previously applied for funds under the Parish Council Community Funding Scheme, but the level of monies they were seeking were outside the scope by which the scheme was determined. Hence, this new request, and whilst not unsympathetic, the PC

were in a somewhat difficult situation in that this was a retrospective request for works already carried out and not covered within the PC budget set for this year. However, there was some saviour in the form of Unitary Cllr, Phil Gomm, who suggested the Club could be eligible for a grant under the Winslow & Villages Community Board grant scheme, which is just about to be relaunched.

This lead on quite well to the matter of S106 and the question of the monies currently held and due from further housing developments within Stoke Hammond and how these can best be used for leisure and amenities projects in the parish. We have visited this subject before, but your PC is determined to move things forward but not without full consultation with you, our parishioners, to ensure the money is well spent on projects that the majority support. It was agreed an S106 working group would be established with representation from all key groups in the parish.

There was also a very long discussion regarding the planning application 22/01744/APP for two further new homes to the 'The Mellows' site, with much disapproval for the style, potential overlooking of neighbouring homes and whether or not the total homes forming part of this development constituted an allowance for affordable homes. Please see our planning application section for more details.

In previous years and as advised in the last PC News, we do not normally hold a PC Meeting in August, but with so much going on at the moment, it was felt that we couldn't leave it two months between getting together and providing you our residents with the opportunity to meet with your council. So yes, we do have an August meeting to be held

on Tuesday 2nd at the Community Centre, Bragenham Side, commencing at 7.30pm. The September meeting is scheduled for 7.30pm Tuesday 6th again at the normal venue of the Community Centre. But just a reminder you can also catch up with some of your PC Councillors on our stand at the Village Show on Saturday 6th August.

Finally, in last month's PC News we showed a picture of the new replica pump and trough that



the PC had installed on the small green at the entrance to Church Road, and thanked Sylvia Drummond for her efforts in planting the trough with a beautiful array of bedding plants.



Well, if you haven't been past recently, look at it now, an amazing display, still tended and watered by Sylvia. But Sylvia could soon be facing some stiff competition from the new planters installed to the Fenny Road entrance gates by Andy Gladdish, and planted out by Eileen Curry from the Stoke Hammond Gardening Club.



John Bowler 18.12.32 – 17.6.22 – Stalwart of Stoke Hammond



John was born in Blisworth in Northamptonshire at the home of his mum's sister before returning to the family home in Perivale in London. He was his parents' first child: brothers Keith (and Stan after the war) later joined them. In 1939 WW2 broke out and as London was a difficult place to live at that time, John and his brother Keith would be sent to stay at their maternal grandmother's house in Napier St in Fenny Stratford when things "got hot" with the blitz. In spite of the war, John had a happy childhood. He developed many skills in

childhood (included bowling!) – as boys, they would dash off after school to play cricket in the fields. At a young age he learned how to imitate bird songs – a skill he retained all his life, often "talking" to blackbirds and robins in his garden! John and Keith also helped their father on his allotment and developed a love of gardening.

John's parents were surprised to learn that he was very academic, excelling in Maths although he described himself as "a bit of a tearaway". In class, he made friends with Roy, who used to vie with him for the position of top of the class! Roy's family were church goers and John was invited to join Roy in the church choir.

John and his family would frequently visit the London Palladium seeing comedians such as Laurel and Hardy, Frankie Howerd and Tommy Cooper who on one memorable occasion had both John and his brother Keith almost rolling on the floor when he singled them out during a performance!

On leaving school, John was offered 2 options to do accountancy training: one at an accountancy firm which promised to pay about 30% more than the other with the local government office, but John felt drawn to public service so accepted job with Ealing Borough Council.

The time soon came for him to enrol for National Service which he served at RAF Halton. Being good with figures John was posted to the accounts dept. National Service was a bit of a culture shock for him as young men from all walks of life (including some from Glasgow tenements who had never slept in a bed) were billeted together in the barracks. Among his fellow national servicemen was a young man called Ivan who was to become a firm and lifelong friend. On their leave days they would often go hiking together. John continued to enjoy hiking and particularly the Lake District - a place he returned to regularly.

In his religious life John continued to worship in church, and became a Baptist. He resisted the request for his full immersion baptism however (as is usual in the Baptist church) with the unassailable theological argument that it would negate his baptism at birth.

John rose through the ranks eventually applied for a job as Chief Accountant in the borough of Richmond. His application was successful but he had a terrible shock on arrival. That year's accounts couldn't be submitted because the previous year's accounts hadn't been. It was a baptism by fire: the hardest job he'd ever done but John worked tirelessly to complete the accounts and was

ultimately commended by borough councillors as they knew he'd saved them from extreme embarrassment and possibly legal action.

Years later, John was looking for a change and applied for a job in the MOD. After thorough vetting, he was offered the prestigious job and continued to work there until his retirement. During his time working in London, John's parents retired to Coombe Martin in Devon. On the death of his father, John and his brother Stan drove to Devon to visit their mother every weekend. It soon became clear that she couldn't manage, so she moved in with John (to his new home in Stoke Hammond). John was still working full time and caring for his mother until her death.

On retirement, John returned to church, but was uncertain where to worship. His natural inclination was towards the Baptist church, but he prayed over it and his answer came when David Gregg, the priest who many years ago had married his friends Alec and Libby Smith (for whom he had been best man) knocked on the door and announced that



he had just been appointed the new rector at St Luke's! John then joined the church, taking on the positions of treasurer and electoral roll officer when positions became vacant and later also joining the evangelisation group. Retirement gave him more time to pursue his hobbies of gardening and reading about early British history: King Alfred, Boudiccca and King Arthur. In 2013 John was the recipient of the Queen's Maundy money. This small gift is given annually by the Queen (as head of the Church of England) to a number of recipients and is payment in lieu of washing the feet of her subjects (as Jesus did for the disciples on Maundy Thursday at the Last Supper). John felt greatly privileged to be honoured this way.

He was a quiet, gentle mannered, deeply devout man who studied the Bible, particularly enjoying the books of Tom Wright. He lived a life of service to the Lord, but more than that he was a truly generous gentleman who supported many in prayer and would help anyone in need: a wonderful Christian example! WELCOME TO THE NEWTON LEYS SOUTH SECTION



Firstly, I would like to introduce myself. I joined Stoke Hammond Parish Council in April and have lived in Newton Leys for over 6 years. The main driver for wanting to be a Parish Councillor was to help give the residents in Newton Leys South a say in the running of our

Parish Council. The Parish Council contains two major areas of housing, Stoke Hammond village and Newton Leys South, and as Newton Leys South has grown it has become almost as big as Stoke Hammond village. Over time this means that more of the Parish Council's income and expenditure will be in Newton Leys South. I want to help ensure that we consider the needs of Newton Leys South residents and efficiently use the Parish Council's budget to deliver improvements across our part of the estate.

One of the most obvious current concerns of residents is the exit from the estate from Lansbury Road. This road is busy, and the grass is not being mowed on the side of the road to allow visibility to turn right out of the estate safely. I have raised this issue with the Parish Council and Buckingham County Council and the Parish Council is also engaging with Taylor Wimpey to try to get a medium term solution. Buckingham County Council has cut this verge fairly recently, but it needs to be done regularly.

The Parish Council has seven councillors, but due to a recent resignation there is a current vacancy. There are currently two councillors who live on the estate. Can I please ask anyone who lives in Newton Leys to consider whether they would be interested in becoming a Parish Councillor? This would involve attending an evening meeting once every month, but please feel free to contact me at craigchampion@atokehammondpc.com if you have any more questions as to what the role involves. The Council has some interesting ideas and projects it would like to progress; both Newton Leys and Stoke Hammond have some \$106 funds available for Leisure and Amenity projects, we are currently working to develop a local plan which will hopefully help guide future development across the Parish and we are currently trying to implement some form of traffic calming measures to reduce speeding through Stoke Hammond village. In the near future we expect that Newton Leys South roads and footpaths will be adopted by the





Most children's internet use has increased over the last two years, whether it's for entertainment, educational or social purposes. With all the additional time spent doing more online, how can you be sure that the young people in your family are safe from the issues they can encounter every day?

To help, our online safety experts have put together some simple, easy-to-follow tips.

- Have regular conversations with your child about the internet's positive
 and negative aspects. Get them to show you what they're doing and try it
 yourself. Familiarise yourself with new technologies and trends. Discuss
 bullying, oversharing, inappropriate content, stranger danger and spending
 too much time online. Set a good example yourself.
- Explain and encourage safe searching, websites and apps. Check what your child is watching – and sharing – on streaming sites like YouTube and TikTok.
- Gaming, social media, picture/video sharing and many other apps and
 websites have lower age limits for a reason. Download apps only from
 recognised sources like App Store and Google Play. Add your own email
 address when setting up accounts and apps for your child.
- Discuss and agree boundaries and rules from a young age, including time limits and appropriate online usage. Empower your child, but remember that they don't have the maturity or experience to always make the right decisions.
- Use parental control software and apps on computers, mobile devices and games consoles, privacy features on social networking sites, safety options on search engines and safe location settings on devices and apps. Turn on your ISP's family filters.
- Keep abreast of new game and social media trends, especially those attracting negative publicity because they may be violent, encourage gambling or leave the way open for messaging anybody, and hence potential grooming.

- If your child uses video calls, ensure their safety by updating to the
 platform's latest version, following its safety advice and ensuring call
 invitations and replies cannot be seen by anybody outside the agreed call
 group.
- Gaming can be very positive for children but make them aware of things like chatting to strangers, in-game purchases of loot boxes, skins and cheats, and spending too much time online.
- Advise your child that they shouldn't believe everything they read or see, and to avoid spreading random or sensational content. Misinformation and fake news are everywhere, including in links from respectable websites.
- Warn about oversharing confidential information or personal details in posts, profiles, messages and chats. Consider what you share yourself.
- Keep tabs on your child's online activities and get to know the signs of something not being right. For example, criminals have exploited increased online use for recruiting children into illegal activities such as cybercrime and drug muling.

PLANNING APPLICATION NEWS & UPDATES JUNE & JULY 2022



In this section you will find details of planning applications received, comments made by your Parish Council, and any updates on previous planning applications.

NEW PLANNING APPLICATIONS:

22/01433/APP Barn, Bragenham Side, Stoke Hammond MK17 9DB

Conversion of agricultural barn to 2 no dwellings.

This barn already has permission for conversion into a single dwelling under planning application 17/03266/APP and this new application is seeking to sub divide the same barn into two dwellings. Your PC had NO OBJECTION to this new application.

22/01463/APP Paper Mill Farm, Bragenham Side, Stoke Hammond MK17 9DB

Change of use and works to convert an agricultural barn to a dwelling.

Whilst sited in Great Brickhill parish and not a consultee, access is via Stoke Hammond and thus we are invited to comment. The site already has permission to convert another barn into a dwelling but this new application seeks to convert an alternative barn on the understanding it would not go ahead with the other barn conversion. Your PC were concerned about additional traffic on what is a single-track unmade right of way. If this new application is approved your PC would like to see a condition imposed that retrospective planning permission for conversion of the other two barns on the site is strictly prohibited.

22/01512/APP Fernbank Lodge, Stoke Hammond MK17 9DB

Householder application to replace 9 windows and front door.

Fernbank Lodge sits within the conservation area hence the requirement to seek permission to change the windows and doors with UPVC replacements. Your PC felt the householder had gone to great lengths to find a manufacturer where the design and construction of the new windows and door was almost identical in appearance to the originals. The PC SUPPORTED this application.

22/01767/APP 30 The Green, Stoke Hammond MK17 9BY

 $Conversion\ of\ integral\ garage\ space\ into\ habitable\ accommodation.$

Your PC felt the design of the proposed conversion was very much in keeping with the rest of the dwelling and thus had NO OBJECTION to this application.

22/01744/APP The Mellows, Hillersdon Chase, Stoke Hammond MK17 9DH

Erection of two dwellings, parking and proposed new vehicular access.

After quite a lengthy discussion your PC resolved to OBJECT to this application, citing the following reasons:

- The plans show that the two houses are proposed to be built where the attenuation pond and overflow was going in for drainage to service the already approved 16 new homes to this site.
- Being 2.5 storey houses, the design is not in keeping with the rest of the development.
- In association with the 16 homes that are already agreed (16/03698/AOP),

these two further houses would effectively mean 18 new homes (or 17 if you take into consideration that Latrigg will be knocked down), but regardless, for 17 or more homes, provision should be made for affordable housing.

- Environmental concerns over the 43 trees the applicant wants to take down.
- The roof windows will likely overlook into the frontage and gardens of the houses in Harrup Close.

PLANNING UPDATES:

22/00917/APP 10 Harris Close, Bletchley MK3 5QH

Loft conversion with rear and front dormers.

Your PC did OBJECT to this application as it was felt that this conversion was overbearing in size and be out of character to the rest of the building with privacy concerns for neighbouring properties. It has however been approved by the planning authorities.

22/01251/APP Rectory Farm, Newton Road, Stoke Hammond MK17 0EB

Erection of 336 sq. m. agricultural building to cover an existing silage clamp. This type of agricultural building would normally fall under permitted development, but because the siting of the building was less than 25 metres from a trunk or classified road, planning permission had to be sought. The PC had NO OBJECTION and it has been approved by the planners.

Bible verse of the month: *Joel 2: v32:* And everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved:

What does it mean?: This quote appears several times in the Bible: not just in Joel, but in Acts 2: v21 and Romans 10: v13. In both Joel and Acts, the quote follows an explanation of the signs leading to the end times and includes both prophesy, visions and dreams as well as "blood and fire and billows of smoke. The sun will be turned

to darkness and the moon to blood" Both these are exhorting followers to confess their sins (in the new testament that would be to accept Jesus as their saviour) in order to be saved. In Romans, the author subsequently calls on believers who acknowledge their salvation to evangelise — to draw unbelievers to faith by preaching the gospel. Either way, we are promised salvation if we call on the Lord when the times of trial come!

Funeral information: You may wish to know that the Rector can conduct a funeral service at a local crematorium if your loved one prefers cremation. New rules mean that crematoria are now no longer offering a religious service by default: it has to be specifically requested by the family. Also, any resident of the village is entitled to have their ashes buried in the churchyard (for a small fee) if they wish. Opportunity Bucks

This is a big priority for the council and is our programme to promote opportunity for everyone in our wonderful county, so we succeed as a place and ensure nobody gets left behind. We've got a huge amount going for us in Buckinghamshire, with incredible opportunities around business, jobs, education, entrepreneurialism, and economic growth.

But we know that there are people within Buckinghamshire who are facing significant hardship, and where outcomes for residents, for example in terms of education, skills, employment, and health, are poorer.

It's essential we make the most of the government's 'Levelling Up' agenda for the people of Buckinghamshire following the White Paper earlier this year. We have carried out extensive work to look at what approach will work best here in Buckinghamshire that will really deliver results.

The outcome is our new programme **Opportunity Bucks – Succeeding for All** – our local response to 'Levelling Up'. Our approach will vary by area depending on what is most important locally.

Our overarching strategy has been agreed by the council's Cabinet and will initially focus on creating action plans for ten wards where outcomes for residents are poorer than in other parts of the county. This is a long-term piece of work and importantly is a partnership approach with other key stakeholders in the local areas such as housing associations, local businesses, voluntary and community groups, schools, and charitable organisations. Activities will be locally led by neighbourhood Community Boards along with local councillors.

Money matters and household support

The cost of living really does continue to bite and I have in previous emails reminded you all about the support the council is providing, through the national council tax rebate scheme, our own rebate scheme for qualifying homes in Bands E-H and through our **Helping Hand programme** which is for any Buckinghamshire resident facing financial hardship. You can find out more about the council tax schemes on our website.

We have pulled together information about where to go for advice if you have money worries so it's all in one place on our website.

It's through Helping Hand that we're also supporting arrivals from Ukraine; some 750 people are now settling into life in Buckinghamshire being supported by a dedicated council team, and of course, their sponsors, of which there are nearly 600 here now.

Support during the holidays

I also want to highlight the extra help available for families in the school summer holidays that are nearly upon us. If children in your household receive benefits-related free school meals in term time then they will be able to access our HAF programme – Holiday Activities and Food. This is a regular programme of free, high-quality holiday clubs where children will be able to take part in fun activities and enjoy a nutritious meal during the school holidays.

Families who qualify can also access digital food vouchers through Helping Hand, to help buy food throughout the school summer holiday; these have been issued directly via schools. If you think you should have received a voucher, but haven't, then please contact your school in the first instance. If you then have further queries about the voucher scheme please contact us directly via our online form.

Covid trends

I'm sure you're also very much aware that Covid cases are increasing again, both locally and nationally, and we are also seeing a local rise in Covid-related hospital admissions. It's a timely reminder to us all to make sure we do all know the current advice regarding what you should do if you do develop Covid symptoms, or test positive; it's available on the Government's website

HS2 Amersham vent shaft design

I'm pleased that after years of pushing on this with HS2 Ltd, they have now reworked the design for this structure as the various previous designs put forward were completely wrong for Amersham and our residents. For those who don't know the history, Buckinghamshire Council met with HS2 Ltd, its contractor, Align, and the HS2 Independent Design Panel in June last year to discuss our major concerns over the

proposed design of the Amersham vent shaft which HS2 Ltd will be building on Whielden Lane in Old Amersham.

During many meetings with Align/HS2 Ltd over the last five years a number of iterations of the vent shaft have been presented and discussed, but the council has always believed significantly more work was needed to ensure the proposal is appropriate to the character of both Old Amersham and the AONB. This very sensitive environment needs a complementary building.

The revised design now being presented, whilst not perfect, is a significant improvement on the initial scheme HS2 Limited first submitted. We pushed hard for a better scheme and are pleased that our efforts have resulted in major changes in the proposals.

Waste collections in the south of the county

I want again to thank residents in the former district areas of Wycombe, Chiltern and South Bucks for their patience and understanding during the recent disruption to their bin collection service. I know that while the vast majority of homes have had bins collected as normal, a significant number have experienced missed collections, some for an extended period. I want to apologise again for this – it simply hasn't been good enough and is the result of a major route reorganisation that also threw up extra challenges for our contractor Veolia.

We have had additional crews out working through recent weekends to help catch up with collections. I'm pleased to report that the service has significantly improved following the measures we've put in place to tackle the problems; however, we are not complacent and know there is still more to do. Every missed bin is still a big problem to those households.

We will keep working on this to achieve the highest possible standard of service for all residents in the area and I'm pleased that the work undertaken is getting us closer to this now. As ever, please report your missed bin online if we do fail to collect and we will pick it up as soon as possible.

Registering to be able to vote

And last, but not least, can I remind you of the importance of checking your details are up to date and correct on the electoral register. We are going through what we call our **Annual Canvass** – where we contact everyone registered in the county to ask them to confirm the names of people listed as eligible to vote in the home are correct. You'll get either an email or a letter and just need to follow the instructions; it's quick and easy. I do want to assure you that emails from

<u>'elections@canvass.buckinghamshire.gov.uk'</u> are legitimate and are not part of a scam, which I know has been a concern for some. If you have any questions, please contact the elections team on <u>elections@buckinghamshire.gov.uk</u> or 01296 798 141.
